It Rains in New Mexico.

Nearly two and one-half inches of rain has fallen at Portales this week up to Thursday morning. It was a very fine rain and came in three sections. Sunday afternoon and night we had a slow, steady rain, which showed 0.85 inches in the rain gauge at six o'clock Monday morning. It also rained Monday and Monday night, which recorded 1.10 inches more. Again it rained Wednesday night, recording 0.48, making a total of 2.43 inches.

The ground is now thoroughly soaked and the growing crops are in the finest condition imaginable. In Portales the ground was fairly flooded and the toads and frogs enjoyed a wonderful revel croaking in the pools.

Portales Post Office Raised.

An item went the rounds of the southeastern New Mexico papers last week, giving the salaries the post masters will receive the coming fiscal year, compared with what they received last year. This list shows that Portales was reduced from \$1400 to \$1300. This is an error, so we are informed by our genial post master, C. O. Leach.

The fact is, the salary of the post master at Portales has been raised from \$1400 to \$1600. Furthermore, the business of this post office for the last year only lacked twenty dollars of being enough to have made the salary \$1700 for the next year. As the list stated, Texico made the highest gain of any town in the territory, being raised from \$1100 to \$1500. Only two other towns in the territory besides Texico, were raised as much or more than Portales. They were Dawson, which was raised \$200, and Silver City, which was raised \$300.

A Fair Association Needed

There is talk of organizing a fair association in Portales in order that an organization can be secured so we can get at the matter of holding a fair here in a business like way.

This is something that we need here and ought to be pushed. Furthermore, we will need a fair ground and park and steps to procure one ought to be

taken at once. This will necessitate the purchase of a suitable piece of ground and then set out to trees. There ought to be enough public spirited people in the county who would take a \$5 or \$10 share in a fair association to buy a suitable piece of land and set it out to trees. A fine park would be a very valuable thing for the community and would be appreciated every year on the Fourth of July.

An Old Timer

James Maxwell, who lives one and one-half miles southeast of Portales, tells a story that places him in a class of "old timers" of this country, even ahead of the cattle men. He says he camped a couple weeks here at Portales springs, in January, 1861. The story he tells is quite interesting.

In 1858, during the early gold excitement, he went from Missouri to Pikes Peak. He remained there, engaged in mining, till the excitement came on of the breaking out of the war. Then he and five companions started for Texas and it was on this trip that they camped at Portales springs. He says at that time most of these plains were as bare as the street, there being grass only in spots. Right around Portales springs the grass was tolerably good.

From here the party went to El Paso and then took the old overland trail east into Texas, where they enlisted in the army. Cale Hufstegel, another member of the party, is now a resident of this county, living thirteen miles west of Portales. Mr. Maxwell said while he was at Pikes Peak, the town of Denver was being started and he and his partner were offered one-third interest in the original Denver town site if they would pay \$75 for getting the charter.

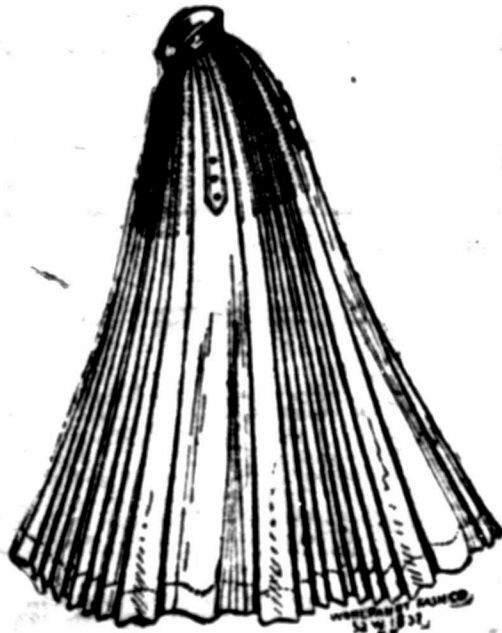

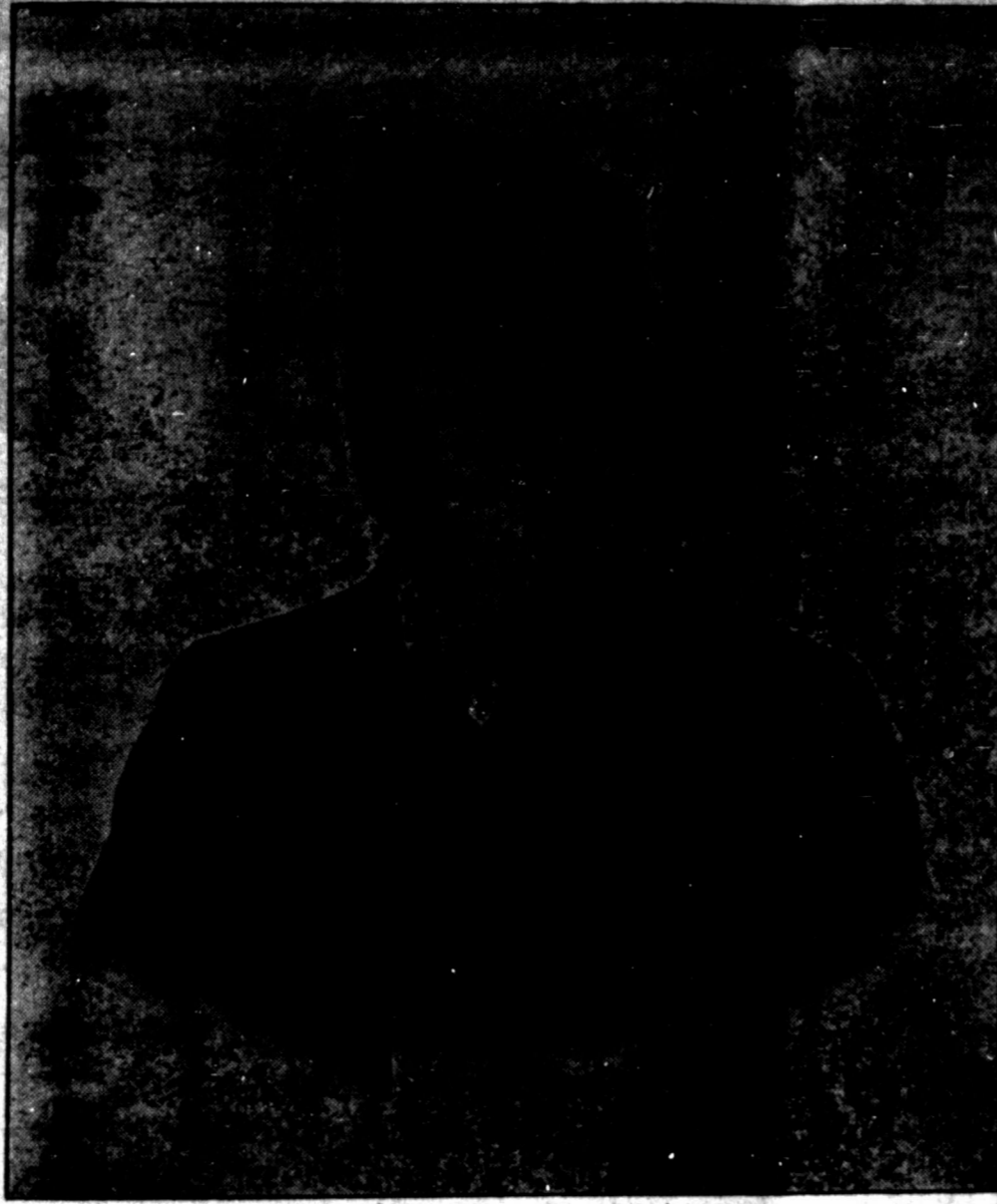
Evidently New Mexico has extensive and valuable mineral resources. A three foot vein of solid lead ore was struck in a tunnel near Raton last week. Also, a fine vein of coal was found in a tunnel on the "cut-off" recently.

The terrible story of murder and assassination told by Harry Orchard is probably the worst an American jury has ever been called on to listen. He confesses that no less than nineteen human lives have been taken by his own hand.

Carlsbad will be the center of attraction in the Pecos Valley on July 4th, with its big Irrigation Celebration. It is proposed to give the people an opportunity to see the wonderful work of the reclamation projects and the benefits resulting therefrom. Reduced rates are granted on the railroads.

An investigation of the official conduct of Arthur Trelford, superintendent of the territorial penitentiary, is being conducted at Santa Fe by Attorney General Prichard. The evidence indicates that prisoners in some cases have been unjustly treated and we are glad to see the matter investigated and hope that proper action will be taken in the matter to prevent further occurrences of this kind. A clean administration of all affairs of the territory is what the people want.

Prof. H. W. Campbell, of Lincoln, Nebraska, known everywhere as the father of farming for the semi-arid region, has just gone to the Canadian northwest under the auspices of the Canadian government, to lecture for three weeks, telling what is being done in the western states to make farming possible in the dry country. He has recently made an extensive tour of old Mexico on the same kind of an errand, the government having large tracts of land which it is desired shall be brought under cultivation. He has also just made two trips to California on the same work, and the past winter has lectured in a half dozen states where farming the semi-arid lands has become a reality. Such has been the success of the new movement in the west that Prof. Campbell is almost as well known in Canada and Mexico as in the states. It is reported that opportunities for this special kind of farming are many in these neighboring countries.



CAPTAIN GEORGE CURRY

Who Will be Inaugurated Governor of New Mexico as Soon as He Arrives Home From the Philippines.

SKETCH OF CAPTAIN GEORGE CURRY

Captain George Curry, who will be inaugurated governor of New Mexico on his arrival from the Philippine islands, is well known in the Sunshine territory. He is in the prime of life, popular and has held many positions of trust and has a splendid military record during the Spanish-American war.

In April, 1895, the Santa Fe New Mexican published a biographical sketch of Governor Curry's early career, which is very interesting. This article was recently reprinted in the daily New Mexican, reproduced from the files and reads as follows: "Among the younger citizens of New Mexico, none are more worthy of mention than George Curry, who has attained prominence in political and business circles and won an honored place among the leading men of the territory. With strength of character and indomitable energy he has risen from the ranks and is now regarded as one of the brilliant statesmen of the southwest.

"He was born in 1862, in Bayou Sara, Louisiana, a son of George and Clara Curry. His father died while he was a mere boy. When he was not yet twelve years of age his mother removed to Dodge City, Kansas, where her death occurred in 1879. Having been left fatherless in early childhood he became self-reliant and was a great help to his mother during the few remaining years of her life. He was seventeen years old at the time of her death.

"Mr. Curry came to New Mexico from Kansas and located at Fort Stanton, near Lincoln. His first employment in the territory was on a cattle ranch, where he started in working for his board and lodging.

"Later he became clerk in a store at Fort Stanton and continued in that position until 1884, when he removed to Lincoln and assumed charge of the mercantile establishment of J. J. Dolan and was also appointed deputy county treasurer of Lincoln county.

"Mr. Curry entered upon his political career in 1888 when he was nominated on the democratic ticket as county clerk of Lincoln county and he was elected by a

large majority. Two years later he was elected as assessor of Lincoln county and in 1892 he became sheriff of Lincoln county.

"In 1894 Mr. Curry was elected to the Council of the Thirty-first Legislative Assembly, representing the district composed of Lincoln, Chaves, Eddy, Dona Ana and Grant counties, and was re-elected in 1896, the latter term being elected president of that body."

The Thirty-first district at that time included the territory embraced in the present county of Roosevelt. The later history of the governor has to do mostly with his military career.

At the breaking out of the Spanish-American war, in April, 1898, he was appointed by Governor M. A. Otero, captain of Troop H, First U. S. Volunteer Cavalry, the "Rough Riders," and saw active service with the regiment during the war. His military record is of the best. Upon muster-out October 15, 1898, of the regiment at Montank Point Long Island, he returned to this territory and engaged in live stock raising and business pursuits in Lincoln county for two years, until he was called to Manila, where he was appointed chief of police of that city, a position which he held for two years and in which he did great and good service. Thereafter, he held other important places in the islands under the Philippine government, and two years ago was appointed governor of the Isle of Samar. His achievements and record in that position are very familiar, having frequently been commented upon by the newspapers of the country.

Governor Curry, during his services in the Philippine islands as chief of the police at Manila and as governor of several provinces, last and most notably the Island of Samar, proved himself fully capable to successfully fill the duties of the important positions which he has held on the other side of the ocean and gained the esteem and respect, not only of his superior officers, but of all those with whom he came in contact, even of the uncivilized and wild natives of Samar. It will be remembered that that island was in a state of tumult and great disorder when he assumed this governorship. Under his administration the people became pacified and peace was restored,
