Serious Accident to Railway Laborers

A report came from Texico that an awful accident happened on the railroad between there and Clovis Thursday, in which four Mexican laborers were killed and eight seriously injured. It seems the men were on a flat car and the car started up. They were either unloading rails or the car came in contact with a rail in some way, the end of the rail swept across the car, striking the men with fearful results. Legs and arms were broken and some of the men were frightfully mangled. The dead and injured were taken to Texico and the injured sent to Amarillo.

Bert Boren Gets His Leg Broken

Bert Boren, nephew of Enoch Boren, got his leg broken Thursday forenoon, by his horse falling with him. He roped a mule in a pasture a few miles west of town and, in some way, his horse got tangled in the rope and it was thrown, falling on his leg, breaking it between the knee and the ankle. He was alone in the pasture at the time, but managed to crawl to the home of John Kerr, a distance of about a quarter of a mile. He suffered very much that night but was reported as resting easier Thursday.

Fine Potatoes Raised on Sod

David Rose, who lives near Dora, brought fourteen bushels of potatoes to Portales last week that he raised on sod land. The potatoes were Early Triumphs, of fine size and were sold out by groceryman Wiggins in short order at ten cents per pound. Considering that Mr. Rose just came here this spring, he did remarkably well in getting about the first potatoes to town in that quantity. The potatoes were really raised by David Rose and Clarence Bray in partnership and this speaks well for them as being progressive farmers.

The Portales broom factory shipped out a big lot of fine brooms to Roswell and Carlsbad Monday. This is to all orders taken by the manager, W. F. Shaw, while on his trip there last week.

Buy Your Coal Now

The old saying is, "in time of peace prepare for war." This suggests that now is a good time to lay in a winter's supply of coal. There are several reasons for this, and in the first place it is economical, because the coal can be bought a little cheaper now than it can in the winter. But the main reason is that if everybody waits till cold weather comes there will be such a great demand for coal on short notice that it will be impossible to supply the demand, as the people here and everywhere else throughout this western country have experienced the last few winters. It is doubly important in this plains country because there is no other supply of fuel.

The dealers here are now receiving coal and they can get all they want. But there is a limit to the amount they can receive on the account of storage room and for the further reason of the cash it requires. The dealer must pay cash for every car of coal he gets before he can unload it, as a bill for both the coal and the freight, comes with every car. For these reasons everyone can plainly see it will be impossible for the dealers to lay in an unlimited supply. If everybody will depend on just buying their coal as they need it the result is that when the first cold storm comes the supply on hand is soon exhausted and the dealers in every town in the United States sends in orders for coal at once and of course they cannot all be supplied at once.

This suggestion to lay in a supply of coal while it can be had is probably more pertinent to the country people than it is to those living in town, especially to those living quite a distance from town. When a storm comes the country people generally find the roads bad, the weather disagreeable for hauling, their stock needing extra attention and a multitude of things to do, on account of which they lack time for making a trip for coal. We make these suggestions merely for the common good, to show the condition and to remind the people of its importance.

T. J. Mullens, who lives about twenty miles southeast, took out a new wind mill and pump Thursday, to put up on his place.

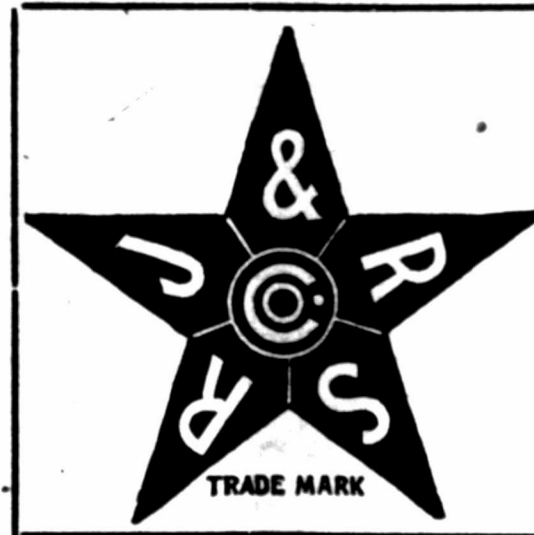

The crops of Roosevelt county are basking, budding, blooming, growing and setting on fruits for an abundant harvest.

The weather bureau at Santa Fe reports that the month of June, 1907, is the coldest June of which that bureau has any record and it has been keeping such records for the past thirty-four years.

The list of people killed and injured by accident in the United States this year, on July 4th, is reported very large. Up to July 6th, the number of deaths is reported to be 59, and the number of injured 3,807. Still we hear talk about a "sane" Fourth.

A New York banking house has issued a circular denouncing President Roosevelt as "a devastating socialistic force." However, the great public, high and low, appears to approve of President Roosevelt's attacks on corporations. One great reason for this is the contempt and lack of courtesy with which officers and servants of corporations have confronted individuals of the public.

That Eastern New Mexico is now the most attractive part of the United States for homeseekers is shown by the reports of the land offices. The land office at Clayton, New Mexico, which lays north of us and embraces part of Roosevelt county, has had the largest number of homestead entries of any land office in the United States, having had ten thousand entries in less than a year. The Roswell land office is second in the country, with over five thousand entries, and the Santa Fe land office is third with over three thousand entries. The rush of business has been so great in these land offices that with the present force of clerks they have got behind with their work. Delegate Andrews has been requested to use his influence to secure more clerks for these offices. The Clayton office handled all this business with only five clerks.

The Portales forest reserve is advertised to be open and subject to entry on August 27, 1907. The official publication for this was published in the Roswell Register-Tribune. There is a notice in this paper describing some lands which were temporarily withdrawn for forest purposes, but which is not designated as the Portales forest reserve, will be open to settlement on August 21st. The lands described in the notice in this paper are not included in the notice in the Roswell paper. While the land advertised in this paper is not designated as the Portales forest reserve or part of it, in the notice, still it is adjacent and we suppose is generally considered part of the reserve. Just why the land advertised in this paper is embraced in a separate notice and opened a few days before the other we are unable to state.

CAMBO-CLOVIS RIGHT OF WAY

In securing the right of way for the new cut-off between Cameo and Clovis, as usual, a hitch has been encountered between the railroad people and the settlers. Clovis seems to be worrying a good deal about it, from the tone of an article in the Clovis News, which paper seems to think the settlers ought to come running to the railroad to give them a free right of way. The News says:

"It appears that some non-progressive settlers who have claims along the Cameo cut-off and who value their dirt equal to a gold mine, are trying to hold up the railroad company in grand style for the right of way along the boundary lines of their land. The company has purposely run the survey along the half section lines, in order not to detract from the value of the land, but the building of the road would on the other hand, greatly increase the value thereof. Some enterprising settlers see these points and have given the company free right of way through their claims as is customary in well regulated communities, however, it may be necessary for the company to condemn certain tracts and go ahead, and in such event, the contrary parties will no doubt receive the regulation price of \$20 per acre. "This, however, will work a hardship on the people of Clovis, who want to see the road built at once without further delay and we hope that the parties above referred to will see the folly of their way and avoid any unnecessary litigation."

The claim is now made that the Belen cut-off is all completed except the ballasting and putting on the finishing touches. The report is that the line will be used only for freight at first and that passenger trains will continue to pass through Albuquerque, where the company owns much valuable property, especially in the hotel and depot, which it cannot afford to abandon, especially when an eating house would have to be built on the cut-off if the passenger trains did not run through Albuquerque. The new cut-off is 268.3 miles in length. Through freight trains from Chicago to the coast by the new route will leave the present route at Florence, Kansas, taking a south-westerly direction to the beginning of the Belen cut-off. The distance saved will be but eleven miles, but the difference in grades will be considerable and these are the important features of the new route. Belen and Vaughan have been made division points, with repair shops at Belen.

The outcome of the investigation of Arthur Trelford, superintendent of the territorial penitentiary at Santa Fe, was that he was removed by Acting Governor Reynolds; and Marion Littrell, sheriff of Colfax county, was appointed as his successor. In addition to showing cruelty to inmates, it is found that the funds have been mismanaged. In seven months, under the administration of Trelford, it is found that a total expense of \$28,000 was incurred out of an appropriation of \$35,000 for the year, and that at that rate there would have been a deficit of \$15,000 at end of the year. It is well that our acting governor is looking after the interests of the territory in the probing out such matters. We want to see the affairs of the territory conducted on a strictly honest, honorable and fair business basis.

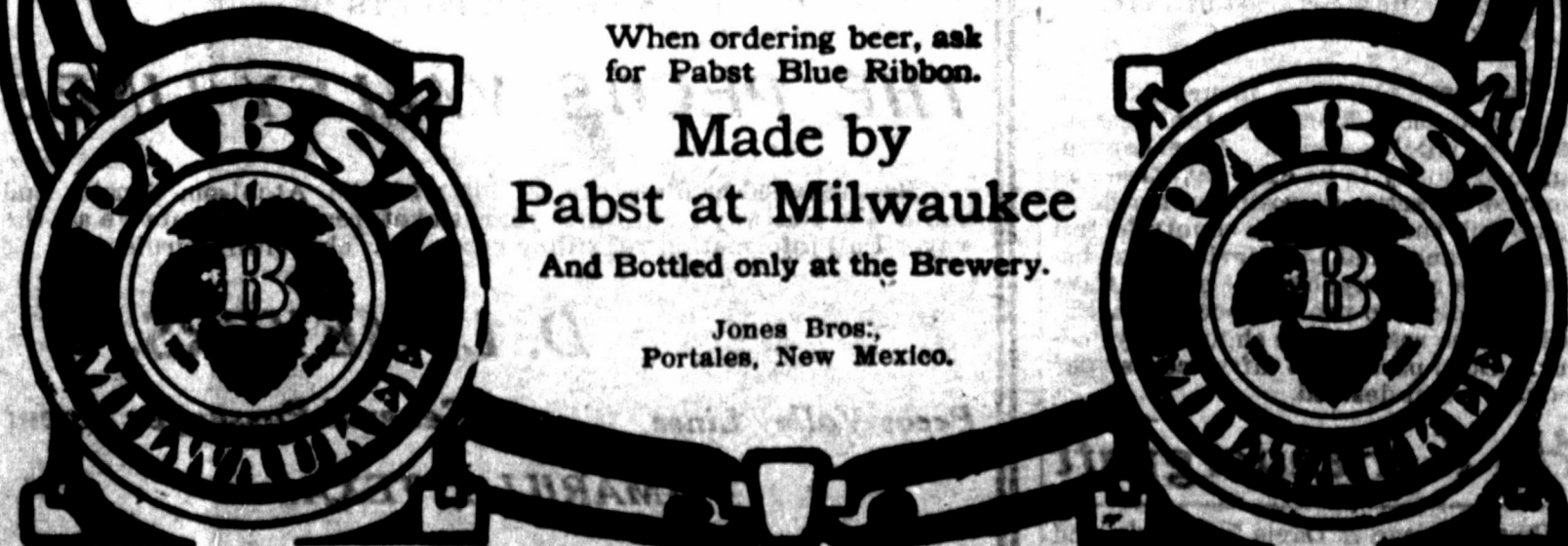

A Neat Bit of Detective Work.

From Texico Trumpet.
For several months past there has been a considerable number of spurious bills, mostly five and ten dollar denominations, in circulation here. The bills were apparently of a defunct Georgia State Bank, and close examination shows them to have been split and two split pieces from different bills, pasted together.

Deputy Sheriff Dycus, of Farmer county, Texas, has been quietly working on the case for several months, and while he felt satisfied that he had his man spotted several weeks ago, he has acted on the theory that it was better to go slow and allow evidence to accumulate, until now he claims to have a strong chain of indisputable evidence woven about the guilty ones. Last Wednesday the officer learned that a letter addressed to one "Martin" at Texico, had been ordered forwarded to Bovina, and he immediately went there and laid in wait. Soon O. D. Callahan, who has been making headquarters at the Oklahoma Feed Store, accompanied by Mrs. Annie Gullahorn, who was formerly employed as a compositor in this office, arrived in a buggy. Callahan called for the Martin letter and started to get into the buggy when Officer Dycus placed him under arrest, and took possession of the letter which was found to contain \$250 of the kind of bills described above.

The prisoner, Callahan, was taken to Hereford and lodged in jail, and the woman was allowed to return to her home. She claims to have had no knowledge of the matter, but promised to be on hand if wanted in court at any time as witness in the case.

Today Mrs. Gullahorn accompanied Sheriff Dycus to Hereford, where she will probably be kept under surveillance until needed in court.
