Killed by Lightning.

About ninety miles west of Portales, a man by the name of Tom Lemay was struck by lightning and instantly killed on Thursday, September 19th. He was walking along on his claim that evening between sundown and dark, when he was struck fairly on the head by the lightning, which passed through his body into the ground. His clothes were torn into shreds and were scattered around for twenty or thirty feet. He had on a cap which was torn into bits and even his shoes were bursted and torn from his feet. His body was scorched black in streaks.

He was a man about 45 or 50 years old and had lived there about four years and was a bachelor. The remains were buried on his claim the next day by the settlers in his neighborhood. He was walking out to meet some teams which were just coming in from Roswell, bringing him some supplies, when the incident happened, so he was found right away. A brother of his, living in east Texas, has been notified and is expected here right away.

Ginning Machinery Here.

C. W. Morris & Sons have purchased the Hereford ginning plant and it is now in Portales. The plant consists of two seventy saw gin stands, one double box press, one cotton suction unloading apparatus, one seed blower, a seventy-two horse power boiler and a sixty horse engine. This is an up-to-date Murray system and is capable of handling a large volume of business.

Mr. Morris states that they have under consideration projects for installing an ice plant, an elevator and, probably, an electric light plant. The gin will be located on the lots north-east of the jail and near the railroad. The work of constructing the building, setting the boiler, etc., will begin as soon as possible and the plant will be in operation about the middle or latter part of October.

The installation of this gin and accompanying enterprises will prove of great benefit to Portales and the surrounding country and Messrs. Morris & Sons are to be congratulated upon their enterprise and business sagacity. They are firm believers in the future of Roosevelt county and are willing to hazard their money on their judgment.

Some Scrapping.

On last Saturday night quite a number of affrays occurred with more or less serious consequences. President Roosevelt left his summer home at Oyster Bay Wednesday, ending his summer vacation, which began on June 12th. He starts Sunday on an extensive tour of the west, accompanied by Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Ethel and Quentin.

The Wolvertons have put in a business college at Portales, and the first thing they should do should be to issue free scholarships to all of the members of the board of education. If there ever was a collection of individuals that needed instruction in the rudiments of business sense it is that board. —Roswell Register-Tribune.

In the district court at Silver City last week, Judge Frank W. Parker heard the argument in the matter of exceptions filed by the territory, through former Attorney-General George W. Pritchard and Ormsby McHarg, special assistant United States Attorney, to the report of Referee Charles V. Safford, in the suit of H. O. Bursum, for an adjudication of his accounts as superintendent of the New Mexico penitentiary. Verdict rendered by Judge Parker confirms Referee Safford's report, vindicating H. O. Bursum, which means that the territory is under judgment to repay Mr. Bursum the sum of \$4,333.66.

The editor of the Times has spent most of this week out on a trip over the plains, on invitation and conveyance furnished by Wm. O. Dunlap, locating agent. The start was made on Friday of last week and the trip took us out beyond the Pecos river, a distance of about ninety miles by road from Portales. There is some fine land out there. Part of the crowd, including the editor, came back by rail over the cut-off, getting on the train 108 miles west of Texico and arrived safe and sound back at Portales Thursday evening. We enjoyed the trip very much, camping out and riding over the unsophisticated plains. Work trains are being run over the cut-off, but no regular passenger or freight traffic is being done west of Sunnyside, which is on the east bank of the Pecos river.

"The Portales Times gets wild and woolly because the city school board sent the course of study out of town for publication. This is a little matter, brother; look about and see how many of your business firms are getting the bulk of their printing done abroad, and how many of your citizens are buying government stationary simply because the said government goes into competition with the printer and being unable to make up deficiencies from other sources, is thus enabled to furnish supplies at a much lower rate than the printer can possibly afford to. The patrons of the catalogue house are entitled to the same argument and we have condemned them unmercifully for following in the footsteps of some of our strongest business firms." —Artesia News.

STATEHOOD OUTLOOK.

It seems there is to be an energetic effort made to secure statehood for New Mexico at the coming session of congress and the outlook is very bright. A significant item along that line is the following, taken from the Daily International American, published at Douglas, Arizona:

"All of a sudden a single statehood boom has hit New Mexico. It sprang into existence immediately following the open letter written to the governor of Arizona by President Roosevelt, in which the declaration was made that the joint statehood policy of the republican party had been abandoned. There is great enthusiasm in our adjoining territory and already it is proposed to hold a constitutional convention in Santa Fe sometime in November.

"Governor Curry, Max Frost and Delegate Andrews are notably active just now in promoting the single statehood boom and it is an easy matter to read the handwriting on the wall.

"Two letters left Oyster Bay on the same day. One was addressed to Governor Kibbey, of Arizona. The other was addressed to Governor Curry, of New Mexico. In one, the declaration was made forever more against joint statehood, and in the other, Governor Curry was told to get busy. Are we right?"

"Republican New Mexico is to be admitted at the next session to offset Democratic Oklahoma. "Arizona will not be admitted at this session, but the next best thing that could happen to Arizona would be the admission of New Mexico.

"By all precedents Arizona and New Mexico are both entitled to separate statehood. Both territories have more population and more wealth than some of the states already in the union and possess even more population and wealth than thirteen states at the time they were admitted. At present New Mexico exceeds Arizona in population, but not in taxable wealth, and if the Republican policy is to admit New Mexico and deny Arizona admission at the next session of congress, the only excuse to be offered will be that party expediency demands it."

HERVEY'S RESIGNATION.

In speaking yesterday of Mr. Hervey's resignation, Judge Wm. H. Pope, of whose courts Mr. Hervey has been district attorney for the last four years, said:

"Mr. Hervey's resignation causes a distinct loss to the public service. He has made a most capable district attorney, fearless, fair, courteous, conscientious; he possesses all the qualities which make the ideal prosecuting officer. With health restored it will not in my judgment be long before he is called to positions on public service even higher than he has just relinquished. The territory cannot long spare such young men from public life." —Roswell Record.

A representative of the Standard Oil company has made the statement that the company will be reorganized as soon as freed from the labyrinth of litigation now involving it. Also the capital stock will be increased to something more in harmony with its assets, which will be something like \$500,000,000, and a change of name is probable.

He shook his head savagely. "God! she was not meant for such a life. It was a wild, foolish little whim such as comes sometimes to the very young in heart." The Poet rose, stretching forth his arms as though in dumb entreaty to the black night overhead. "This, in the clarity of my poet's vision do I know: She was designed by the sweet, sane wisdom of Nature for the sanctuary of a Poet's Garden."

Slowly, his arms dropped to his sides. He stood motionless, his face uplifted toward the south, his ears straining for the distant roar of a great city, his heart heavy with a hundred undefined fears. From the dark branches of a tree beside the wall there rose the drowsy "cheep-cheep" of some little bird sleepily awakening to the night. The second spoke of safety, of trust and protection. From the Poet's heart went forth a bitter cry:

"O Violet-Maiden! O my Violet-Maiden!"

He turned as he said it, a faint, vague rustle beneath the wall suddenly stirring his heart with a vague premonition—a dim, half-shadowy blur of white causing his pulses to leap wildly through his body. He passed his hand across his eyes. He had been straining them too severely of late. He had been gazing, perhaps, too long, at that sweet white blur of paper. Breathlessly he took a step forward—
 "O Poet in the Garden!"

He had her in his arms, her face upturned to his, striving, through the mist of his tears, to look into the loved eyes.

"O Poet in the Garden, I—I've been so homesick for—for your garden!"

The Poet laughed aloud, a joyous laugh that echoed through the garden, surprising the awakened birds into sleepy protestations.

"And I've been such a—such a failure in that cruel city!"

The Poet stooped, kissing her. "Dear," he said, "I could have told you that such transplanting could not but be a hurt to Violet-Maiden. But, to-morrow," he looked down into her face, uptilting it, so that the sweet eyes shone like stars into his own; "to-morrow I will plant you as a life-flower in my garden!"

The two members that will form the membership of the Union before the frost falls, will by the tremendous power of its united numbers be an inspiration to all to a nobler view of life and its responsibilities. 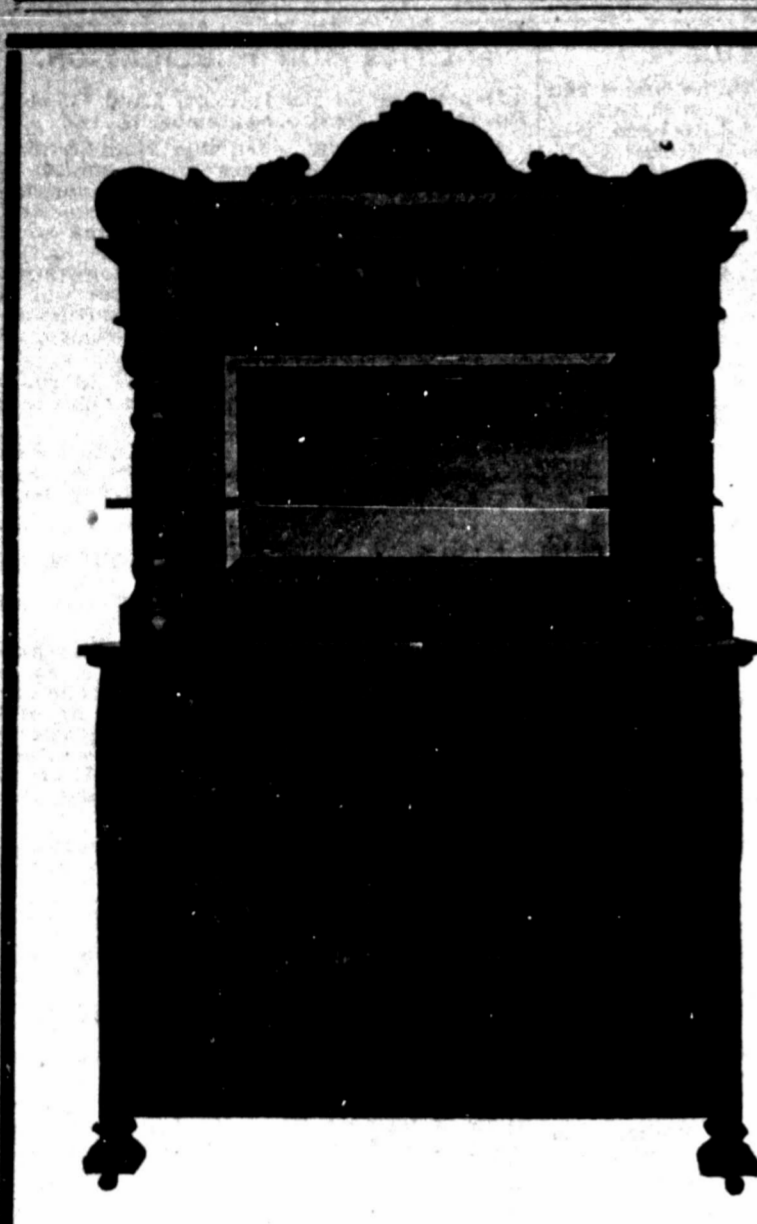
