HIGH GRADE GOODS AT LOW GRADE PRICES.

What the Court Has Been Doing.

The October term of the district court adjourned by Judge Pope yesterday evening, after transacting a large volume of business. The petit jury was discharged Thursday evening.

The case against Byron Parrish, on charge of murder, was continued till next term of court on account of lack of court funds to try the case at this time and for lack of time by court, as federal court is to be opened by Judge Pope, at Roswell, next Monday. Parrish's bond was fixed at \$7,500, which he promptly furnished.

Two cases against Frank P. Jones, one for discharging pistol in settlement, and the other for assault, were continued.

Case against B. L. Bates, charge, assault with a deadly weapon, affray happening at Texico in July, jury found defendant guilty of assault and battery, and defendant was fined \$100 and costs, amounting to \$55.20.

Case against J. L. Hylman, charged with larceny of a pocket book at Texico, jury found defendant guilty and sentence rendered was one year in the penitentiary and costs, amounting to \$137.45, the penitentiary sentence to stand suspended at discretion of court.

Case against John Rogers, of Tolar, charged with carrying a deadly weapon, resulted in a fine of \$50 and costs, amounting to \$51.45.

Case against John Oldem, for unlawful carrying a pistol and flourishing same, sentenced to ninety days in jail and pay costs, amounting to \$54.30.

Case against Joe Barnes or Mayes, charged with carrying and flourishing a deadly weapon, jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

Case against J. J. Reynolds, for contempt, sentenced to thirty days in jail and \$30 fine and costs of \$42.26.

Case against W. H. Boykin, contempt, sentenced to ten days in jail and pay costs of \$20.15.

Two cases against Gertrude Kennon, defendant plead guilty to charge in both cases and sentence rendered was a fine of \$10 in each case and costs amounting to \$96.40, and sentenced to sixty days in jail on each case, jail sentence to stand suspended, but to be put in force by sheriff in case she resumed, either directly or indirectly, the business of running a bawdy house.

Cases of vagrancy against Ethel Duncan, Maud West, Clara Williams, May Morrison, Gertrude Herron, Bee Hill, Amy Gilbert, Ray Smith and Cloe Hawkins, defendants plead guilty and were each fined \$10 and costs, amounting to \$9.70, also a jail sentence was passed on each to stand suspended as long as defendants remain out of Fifth judicial district, and defendants were given till leaving of north bound train today to leave.

A civil case was heard in which Milton Mason was plaintiff and J. A. Street, sheriff of Quay county, was defendant. The case was one for false arrest and imprisonment. Evidence showed plaintiff had been arrested in this county without a warrant and taken to Tucumcari and placed in jail and no case was brought against him. The defendant did not appear here in this trial in his own defense.

The jury in the case returned a verdict in favor of plaintiff and assessed damages against defendant in the sum of \$1250.

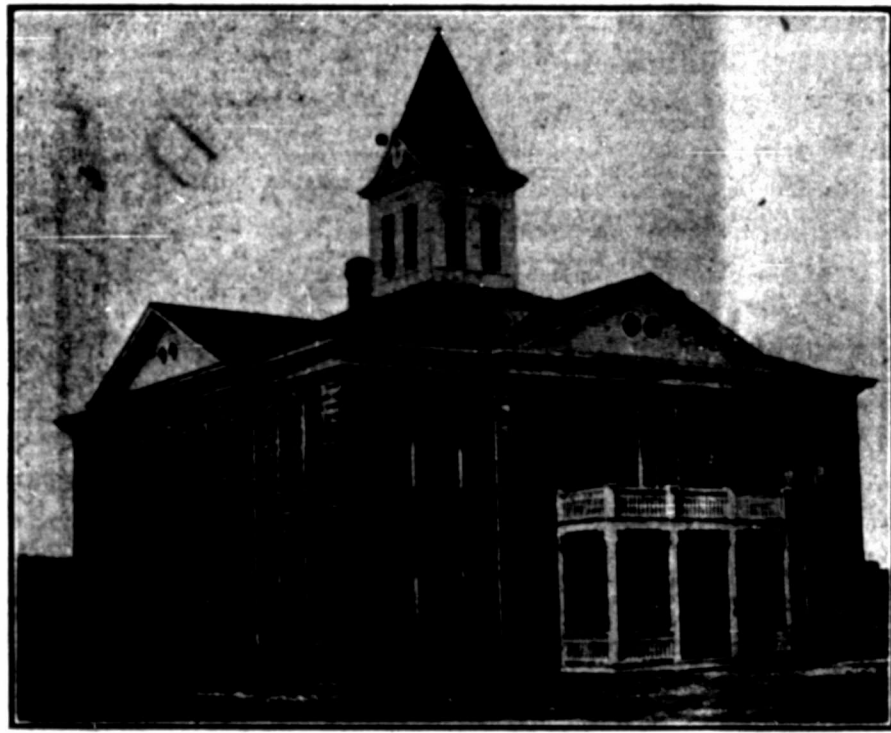
Echoes From District Court.

Among the civil cases heard in court were a couple relative to the right and possession on the unsurveyed strip between New Mexico and Texas. Claims on this strip cannot be filed on, and are held only by "squatter's right," or actual settlement and possession. The first of these cases heard was that of W. C. Triplett vs. J. M. Cudd, the claim in question being a few miles north of Texico. Evidence showed that the plaintiff had been living with his father on land adjoining this claim for, perhaps, two years, and that he was in business in Farwell and drove to town each morning and back each night. The claim laid next to the Texas fence, being a mile north and south by a quarter, or less, east end west. The Triplett family had exercised some authority over the land for two years, and up to last fall they thought it was not really subject to being located on. Last fall a sister of defendant decided to take the claim, but made no settlement or improvement. Early this spring a man by the name of Oliver jumped the claim and built a small shack thereon. Oliver, being informed by defendant that his sister owned the claim, agreed to quit the claim on being paid for the shack, and he received payment. Plaintiff then traded another claim he had been holding, which was more convenient to his father's house, to his sister for this claim, on account of convenience to his sister, who was a widow and had small children. In the spring of 1907 plaintiff hired a few acres broke and crop planted on the claim. In July, plaintiff still not having made residence on the claim, hired a man to break twenty acres and move the shack. When this man went on the claim on the following Monday morning, July 22, to do the work he found the defendant had taken possession of the claim during the previous night, having a load of goods on the claim and bringing more that day. The court instructed the jury empaneled on the case to bring in a verdict for the defendant. The court explained that under the law improvements put on land by a claimant exclusively through an agent, or man employed, would not give the claimant any rights thereunder. No residence having been established by plaintiff prior to settlement of defendant, and improvements having been made by plaintiff by proxy, the court held that defendant, Cudd, had gained right and possession to claim by settlement.

The other claim jumping case was a good deal the same, only different. This controversy also concerned a claim a few miles north of Texico, W. O. Temple being plaintiff and A. Mendenhall defendant. Evidence showed that plaintiff had signified his intention to take up the claim in question in January, 1906, by plowing a furrow around it. Later, in same year, he built a shack thereon, and plowed about twenty-seven acres. In May or June he moved on the claim with his wife and child and household effects and planted the ground which had been plowed. Both he and wife had been engaged in the actual work of harrowing

and planting, had cooked their meals in the house and slept in the house during the nights he had been there. Plaintiff testified that he had not the means to stay on the claim and work it, that he had no team and could not get work while staying on his claim, and that he went to Texico and did some work with a team for his father, and later he worked for his father, who had a contract rebuilding railroad near Bovina. Plaintiff and wife visited their claim frequently left such household goods as they had in the house on the claim, except bedding, which they needed in camp. Plaintiff bought posts and wire and had fencing built on the claim during the year 1906, plowed a fire guard and burnt around his house in October, 1906, and early in 1907 had taken lumber out and nailed strips on his house, both he and his wife doing the work. Though when plaintiff moved on the claim he only stayed there about a week he established a home no where else and lived nearly all of the time he was off the claim in the railroad camp where he worked and his wife did cooking, both for wages. When the snow came in April, 1907, he notified his father that he and his wife

purposes. Some time in May of this year the defendant had appropriated the two outlying lots which had only been used as a playground, not being fenced. The defendant fenced the ground and built a residence and out-buildings thereon. The trial in this case went somewhat into the title to lots in the town of Texico and the history of the organization of the school district. The land on which the original town of Texico is located was originally a desert entry, made by a man by the name of Ragsdale. Without gaining any title to this land under this entry or otherwise the land was platted into town lots in 1903. J. A. Fairly, who is now county superintendent, was then county surveyor, surveyed and platted the town. The title to this land still stands in the land office under the original desert entry, it never having been cancelled, though all rights under this entry are void owing to failure to comply with provisions of law thereunder. The lots in question similar to other lots in the same town are without title, being held by rights of possession, improvements and quit claim deeds. The defendant produced a quit claim deed to the lots in question but failed to show that he had any rights to convey the lots or ever had possession of them. The defense had the his-

would quit work and go on their claim to plow and put in a crop, as the snow had put season in the ground so he could plow, it having been very dry before that time. After plaintiff had made arrangements to go on his claim he heard it had been jumped by A. Mendenhall. Plaintiff moved on claim in April, 1907, raised a crop this past season and lived on it continuously since. Plaintiff indicated good faith from his first entry on the land that he intended to make it a home, and established a home no place else. The defendant, Mendenhall, had a shack built on claim when plaintiff returned to it in April, and defendant's wife arrived a few days later. The jury empaneled in the case brought in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff, W. O. Temple.

Another case a good deal on the same line was that of the trustees of school district No. 3, the Texico district, vs. J. W. Childers. Evidence in the case showed that the school district had been given or donated a half block of ground, consisting of five lots, for school purposes in 1903. A school house had been built on the ground which had been and is being used for school

tory of the school district dug up, attempting to show the district was not properly organized. Under the law school districts should be organized by the school superintendent, and from evidence shown it seems the county commissioners designated and outlined the original school districts of this county which included this district, for which they seemed to have authority under the act creating Roosevelt county. Incomplete record also showed that the district had been claimed by the county superintendent at the time and evidence showed that it had been acting as a district and duly considered as such since its organization. The defendant testified that he had \$900 worth of improvements on the lots in question. The jury empaneled on the case returned a verdict in favor of the school district.

President Roosevelt concludes his two weeks hunt in Louisiana today. He "roughed it" and had plenty of recreation, but reports of game are meager.

Governor George Curry has formally appointed Benjamin M. Read, of Santa Fe; W. F. Childers, of Albuquerque; H. Dougherty, of Socorro, and Louis Ifeld, of Las Vegas, members of the commission to revise the laws of the territory of which Attorney General Fall is ex-officio member. He also made the formal appointment of Captain John W. Green, of Gallup, to be superintendent of the territorial penitentiary to succeed Marion Littrell, resigned.

Both republican and democratic newspapers seem to think the railroads are not losing any money by reason of the two-cent rate. Here is what the Globe-Democrat of St. Louis thinks of the Ohio situation: "In Ohio, which led off in the 2-cents-a-mile rate for passengers, the receipts from this source for the year ending June 30 last, showed an increase of \$1,332,282, from which must be deducted a decrease of \$55,645 reported by ten small roads off the main line of travel. As a whole, there is nothing confiscatory or discouraging to the railroads in these figures."

The people generally of the town of Portales and Roosevelt county extends their thanks and high appreciation to Judge Wm. H. Pope, District Attorney Louis O. Fullen and other court officials for their good work done in this term of court in the enforcement of law and order. Our people have great confidence in and respect for our court for its ability, energetic work and firm stand in upholding the law. To save expense the work was pushed with all prudent dispatch, night sessions being held every night. A term of court here always has a good moral and wholesome effect on this community.

Brigadier General George M. Helm, commanding the Second Brigade, Mississippi Division of the United Confederate Veterans, a wealthy planter and life-long Democrat, has written an open letter in which he strongly advocates the election of President Roosevelt for another term. General Helm urges that party lines be dropped in order that the business interests of the south may be benefitted by the retention of Roosevelt in office, the chief of which being the deep waterway channel from the Lakes to the Gulf. General Helm makes a dramatic appeal to the voters of the south to send this message to the voters of the north: "We assure you from the bottom of our hearts of our great confidence in the ability, honesty and integrity of Theodore Roosevelt and will help you elect him in 1908." He declares that the achievements of Roosevelt have made Democratic success impossible and that as an expedient the Democratic party should unite in electing him president.

LOOKS LIKE THE FORTY-SEVENTH STAR ON THE FLAG.

Governor George Curry and Delegate W. H. Andrews are working hand in hand to secure statehood for New Mexico during the year 1908. Governor Curry has seen the president and has secured the active aid of the nation's executive for the plan. He has also talked to about forty senators and representatives during his recent eastern visit, and has received many favorable responses to his request for the admission of New Mexico. Delegate Andrews is already at the national capital working for votes for the bill for an enabling act for New Mexico, which he will introduce during the first week of the coming session of congress and working as Delegate Andrews knows how to work in such matters, namely: carefully, diligently and successfully. The delegate will do some necessary work in this direction with the Hon. Joseph B. Cannon, speaker of the house of representatives, who will succeed himself in that position in the Sixtieth congress. Fortunately, the speaker entertains a very cordial friendship for New Mexico's suave and politic delegate. Conditions in the national capital are therefore very promising.

At home leading Republicans have commenced to push the question of statehood to the front and that in earnest. There is not a single prominent Republican who has not announced his intention to work for the project from now on. Republican newspapers, without exception, have aligned themselves on the right side. The daily Republican papers are in line and the weekly newspapers are following suit. Among the dailies, especial credit is to be given to the Santa Fe New Mexican, which has been a staunch and consistent advocate of statehood since its birth, over forty years ago. It has always been a leader in the statehood movement, and for that matter, in everything also that has stood or stands today, for the growth, the progress and the benefits of our territory. The Albuquerque Citizen is found doing everything possible on the same journalistic firing line, and it can truthfully be asserted that the Republican press of the territory is united in the movement.

Last year's election shows conclusively that the people, with insignificant exceptions, are for statehood. They gave nearly 15,000 majority for joint statehood to demonstrate their desires. This great majority was not given because they wanted joint statehood so very much, but because they wanted to prove to the country that they wished any kind of statehood, at any cost, and that they desired to become a self-governing political subdivision of our great country. All in all, conditions are most favorable, and it certainly looks like the forty-seventh star on the American flag in 1908.

A statehood league was organized at Santa Fe Tuesday. It is the purpose of this league to devise ways and means to further the statehood movement and to urge the organization of a non-partisan statehood league in each county in the territory with a view of holding a statehood convention in Santa Fe before congress meets.

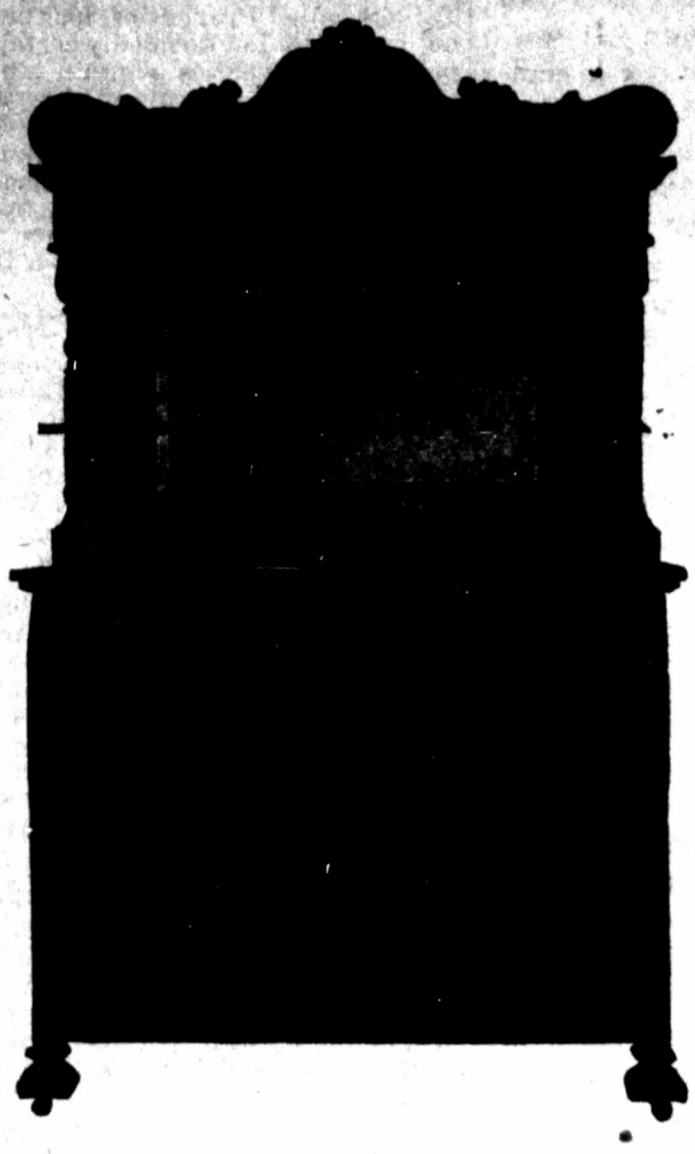
