In Amarillo an election will be held on Tuesday, December 3, to vote under local option law on prohibition.

The people have celebrated Thanksgiving day this week, and the usual crop of fowls have been slaughtered and devoured. Likewise appropriate services were held, which were well attended, giving due respect and reverence to this important and appropriate holiday.

A new jail is being built at Carlsbad, the county seat of Eddy county. It is being built of brick, two stories high, fully equipped with all modern conveniences, the lower story to be used for office and residence of sheriff and upper part for jail with separate apartments for women.

On notification that the stringency in the currency supply is proving a hardship on entrymen who are obliged to make cash payments at land offices, the commissioner of the general land office is granting thirty days grace upon such payments. This concession has been granted in California, Oregon and Wyoming, and will be granted in other public land states if requested.—Ex.

Americans have obtained the contract for the designing and engineering work for one of the largest iron and steel plants ever built outside of the United States. This plant, which will cost nearly \$10,000,000, is to be located in British India, where it is estimated that the cost of production of various iron and steel products will be less than one-half that of the most favored American steel making concerns.

Roosevelt county ought to have a statehood club. With statehood almost within our grasp we should exert every effort to gain it. Organized effort will accomplish much. It will show to congress that it is the wish of the people that New Mexico be admitted as a state. Congressman Andrews and Governor Curry are working night and day to secure this boon for New Mexico, and we, as citizens, should show our colors on this question. How can we do better than to organize a statehood club composed of Roosevelt county citizens.—Texico Trumpet

The financial situation in the United States is indicated to be in a very safe condition by the report of enormous demand for American products abroad. The Nashville Tennessean says: Products of fields and mines of the west and south being rushed to European markets, to bring millions of gold into the country. Wheat, cotton, copper, tobacco and meats now being exported. Tobacco exports to bring \$1,000,000,000. Copper sales abroad for one day aggregate \$14,000,000. Fifty ships in harbor of New Orleans loading cargoes for foreign ports. Demand for wheat on continent will prevent foreign bankers from retaining gold.

WE HAVE THE DOLLAR.

In the monetary crisis of 1893 gold flowed rapidly out of the country. Europe drew a hundred millions of the metal from us in that year.

If you are hungry and somebody takes away what food you have, recuperation, obviously, will be slow. Within a few days following the monetary crisis of 1907 we drew twenty-five millions of gold from Europe, and sharp advances in European discount rates did not at once check the movement. Our need of gold was, in fact, much more urgent fourteen years ago; but we couldn't get the metal. We simply did not have the financial power to command it.

We have that power now, and the fact gives, in a nutshell, the difference between the two periods.

In 1893 we could give no conclusive assurance that we would pay in gold. Our legal dollar was "coin," which might mean a hundred cents worth of gold or sixty cents worth of silver. Europe was disinclined to take the chances. The law of 1900, making gold the standard, removes that handicap.

But there is not much use in having a gold dollar on the statute book unless you have it in your pocket, too. One of the forerunners of the real panic was a pretty universal condition of insolvency among those concerns that made a special business of lending money on western farm lands.

In 1892, 1893 and 1894 the west was broke. Production of wheat and corn those three years was under six billion bushels against ten billions in 1904, 1905 and 1906; wheat averaged 55 cents against 78. Cotton production was 23 million bales against 35 millions the last three years; the price 8 cents against 11. Total bank deposits in 1893 were 4 1/2 billions against 12 1/2 billions now. In 1904 the treasury's stock of gold was 64 millions against 280 millions in October, 1907; total gold in the country, 598 millions against 1432 millions. Everybody now knows what Uncle Sam's dollar is, and that he's got the dollar.—Saturday Evening Post.

Governor Curry, accompanied by Major W. H. H. Lewellyn and Captain David J. Leahy returned Tuesday from their trip to Washington. Governor Curry did some telling work for statehood while in the national capital and it is reported that he has strong assurances from President Roosevelt of his support and is sanguine that New Mexico will soon be admitted into the union as a state. A mass meeting has been called a Santa Fe today at the suggestion of Governor Curry to select a delegation to go to Washington to work for statehood. It is believed that now is the time to strike, while the iron is hot.

In Albuquerque, New Mexico, the saloon men are alarmed over the action taken by the city council last week when they instructed the city attorney to draw up an ordinance advancing the saloon licenses from \$200 a year, the amount of the present license, to \$1,500 a year. The council takes the stand that as the city will lose the large revenue derived from gambling licenses after January 1, 1908, that this measure will have to be taken in order to supply the deficit that must follow in the city's revenues.

LET US HAVE TREES.

The Creator made trees and he made man to love them. A landscape without a tree is like a home without a mother—there looks to be something lacking. Trees are not only ornamental, but they are useful and their uses are many and manifold. They are a shelter from the chilling blasts of winter and the sweltering heat of summer, and likewise a thorn in the flesh of the March wind that kicks up the dust in our faces.

The fruit we eat, the choicest viands that tickles the palate of man, comes from the tree. The product of the tree is so varied in character that if man had access to the fruits of the different trees of the world he could live well without other food. Many of our most valuable medicines come from trees, also gums, resins, rubber, and another product of no little importance—maple sugar.

The mechanical purposes to which the wood of trees are put by man towers far above their other uses, and the different kinds of timber has been of more utility to us than any other one material, with the possible exception of iron. Wood enters into construction of almost every device created by man, be it tool, vehicle, machine, building, steamboat or railway train. Wood furnishes a great part of the fuel we use. The art of landscaping, which is the art of planting and arranging trees and shrubs about a residence, a farm home or an estate to produce harmony and beauty to the greatest degree, is something on which the American people need instruction. Trees are beautiful anyway they occur, but by proper arrangement they can be made much more beautiful. Trees we need on this plains country, and trees we must have to make it more habitable. A great many trees have been planted but we need more and those that are planted should be well cared for. Let us have trees.

Explore Palo Duro Canyon.

The Plainview Herald reports that the Canyon City, Texas, commercial club has arranged to send a party of explorers into the Palo Duro canyon this week. There will be half a dozen or more gentlemen in the party, including an expert photographer who will secure numerous views along the romantic gorge. The explorers will take ample provisions to run them a week or ten days, and it will be their aim to gather sufficient data to convince congress that a national park or game reserve should be set aside, embracing this wonderful canyon.
