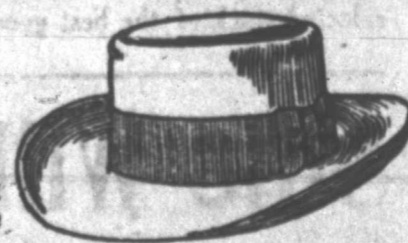

County Division Question.

In the territorial legislature the matter of county division is the most lively matter before that august body. There are two bills for dividing Roosevelt county. One bill divides the county on the base line which runs east and west and taking in two tiers of townships from the south side of Quay county, the new county to be named Curry, with Clovis as the county seat. The other bill takes from this county the northwestern part, includes some of Quay, Guadalupe and Chaves counties, names the county Taft, and places the county seat at Taiban. Besides these two bills there is a bill to create a new county out of parts of Eddy and Chaves counties with Artesia the county seat, and another bill to create a county out of parts of Mora, Colfax and Union counties with Roy as the county seat.

Judge Lindsey, who returned from Santa Fe Tuesday, reports that he had a conference meeting with Governor Curry and leading members of the legislature on the matter of dividing Roosevelt county. From what he says it seems the Clovis boosters are making a very strong fight for the creation of Curry county, having the support of Governor Curry in its favor, but among the members of the legislature there is no pronounced sentiment in favor of this division. Judge Lindsey succeeded in having all parties agreed to an amendment to the bill in case it is passed. These amendments provide that the dividing line be placed three miles further north, placing it along the middle line of township one north instead of the base line, and that the new county shall assume its share of the county indebtedness and take no credit for value in the county buildings at Portales.

The Name New Mexico.

Santa Fe New Mexican:
 It was a timely protest that the legislature voiced against any change in the name of New Mexico and it was a fine plea that was made by Councilman Prince for the present name, at yesterday's session of the Council. While he traced the origin of the name back to Espejo in 1583, Colonel R. E. Twitchell is authority for stating that the name was bestowed already in 1561, although not exactly to what is now known as New Mexico, which received its name definitely in 1783 as correctly stated in the fine address by Governor Prince. Colonel Twitchell says:

"The country now called Mexico was not so called till 1810, when the revolt against Spain began. Up to the time of independence the country was called New Spain and was divided into the same number of provinces as Spain, each with a name of a province in Spain, with the prefix 'new', but New Mexico was not included in this division. It got its name in this way: In 1561 Francisco Ibarra was in charge of an expedition of exploration into what is now Northern Durango and Southern Chihuahua, and discovered an Indian village near where Santa Barbara now stands in which the houses were white-washed and the people made and wore cotton cloth, raising the cotton in the neighborhood. He wrote an account of his discovery to his brother in the city of Mexico, telling him he had discovered 'una nueva Mexico', a New Mexico, another Mexico, meaning that he had found another town like the City of Mexico, and thereafter all this portion of Northern New Spain was known as 'Nueva Mexico', that is, New Mexico, which name it has retained, though now much reduced in extent."

The people of the north part of the county are against county division as shown by a House item in Tolar Tribune as follows: "It is reported that there is a bill before the legislature designating Clovis as the county seat of a new county. Of course this would be all right for Clovis, but we fail to see how it is going to help the people in the west half of the county as it will not make us much, if any, nearer to the county seat than we are now, besides burdening us with additional expense. We think it would be best to defer this matter a few years."

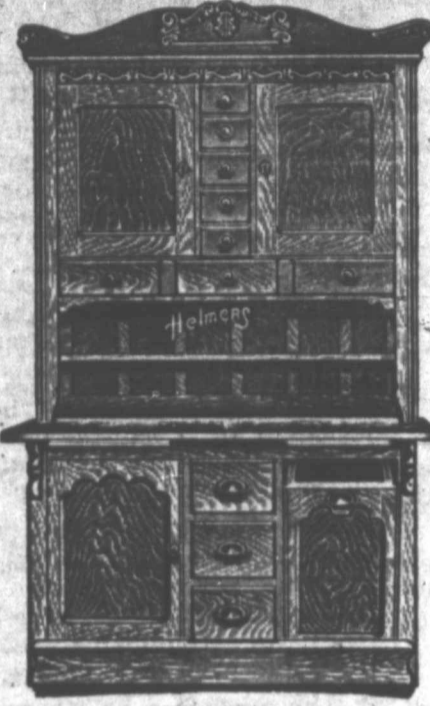

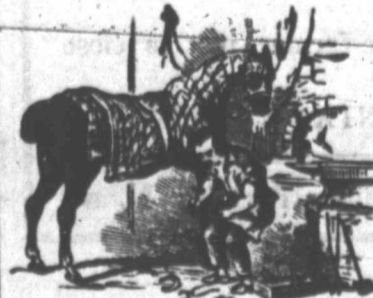
