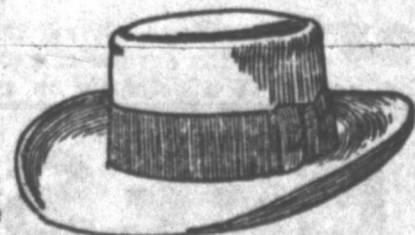

Skimming Station Opened in Portales

Beginning next Tuesday they will receive milk, separate it at once free of charge and return you the skim milk. The cream will then be tested and patrons will be paid for the butter fat in their milk when they bring in their milk the next day.

We hope that this method of paying will give our patrons better satisfaction than the former method, and that many who do not have separators will take advantage of our offer to skim their milk, and that in consequence we will be able to ship a large amount of cream from Portales this season. The price of butter fat is now 30 cents per pound and we believe it will be to the interests of the farmers to market all the cream they possibly can.

Bermuda Grass for Pasture.

The following from the Oklahoma Farm Journal seems to be a very good suggestion for the farmers of southeastern New Mexico to consider:

"Just as alfalfa is one source of our hay crop which will increase in importance, bermuda is the one grass which may be depended upon to provide pasture for all farm stock, even through the driest of summers. Folks from Texas and other southern states are often just as determined that they will just make blue grass grow. Both are mistaken and finding it out rapidly.

"Some years ago, the Oklahoma experiment station distributed roots of a hardy variety of bermuda grass which had been growing for ten years on the experiment station farm and which had passed through two winters when the temperature

fell to seventeen degrees below zero and when bermuda recently grown from seed froze out entirely. Through this distribution by the station and the sale of bermuda roots by those who had pastures of the hardy variety, this sort is now growing in practically every township in the state. It can be distinguished from the tender kind easily by the fact that it will be putting out new growth before April 1st. After the January freeze, green shoots of this variety were abundant in a lawn of hardy bermuda in Oklahoma City.

Your southern friends will protest and tell you that "it will take the country." Be patient with them. They have forgotten that Oklahoma is considerably further north and that the trouble here is to keep from getting rid of bermuda involuntarily, as the result of hard freezes.

Local Option Herd Law.

Senator Meechem, of Quay county introduced and the council passed, a local option herd law applicable to Quay, Roosevelt and Guadalupe counties. This is the first of the much talked of herd laws to make its appearance in the legislature. Mr. Meechem has been ready for several days to introduce his bill but has been awaiting an agreement with the members from southeastern New Mexico, says the Albuquerque Journal.

The bill is designed to settle the somewhat large and vexing question of the control of livestock on the public domain and the fencing of homesteads. It is one of the larger problems with which the assembly is called upon to deal and is far from being easy of solution. There has been some agitation, coming from the farmers of Chaves county and eastern New Mexico, for a local option herd law, under which the people of any county would be allowed to decide the question for themselves.

In parts of Chaves and Roosevelt counties the question of right to the public domain and protection of crops has become a serious one. The farmers are coming rapidly into a country for many years considered the exclusive domain of the cowman and the cow man is reluctant to give away before the march of immigration. There have been times within the past few months when the situation between cattlemen and settlers has been somewhat tense, although the desire of both sides for avoidance of serious trouble has always prevented any serious outbreak. This situation has passed to a large extent but it has been expected that the present assembly would be called on to consider legislation which would avert the possibility of future trouble.

The town of Portales has expressed itself in favor of prohibition in the election, for which the town may be justly proud. In the little campaign we passed through there were no personalities. There was not a thing against a man on the defeated ticket, personally. The election was made on the issue, for or against the saloon, and Portales, like all progressive communities voted for the higher moral standard. Portales starts out as an incorporated town with a set of officers and conditions favorable to make it a model city, favorable for homes, investments and business opportunities. May Portales prosper.

The bill providing for statehood for New Mexico was unanimously agreed to by the full committee of the House on Wednesday of last week and the chairman was ordered to have it printed and procure a rule to have it passed in the House, allowing one hour on each side for general debate and no amendments allowed to be offered. The date set for its passage in the House is next Monday, February 15th. As to the reception the bill will receive in the Senate, it is reported that Senators Beveridge and Aldrich have expressed themselves as opposed to the passage of an enabling act for New Mexico, but that these two men practically stand alone among the members of the Senate in opposition to this measure. Friends of this bill do not think they can exert enough influence to defeat it, because arraigned against them in favor of the bill is President Roosevelt, President-elect Taft, Speaker Cannon and other republican leaders.

Geo. W. Shearon has been appointed postmaster at Santa Fe to succeed Paul F. Walter who resigned to become editor of the Santa Fe New Mexican.

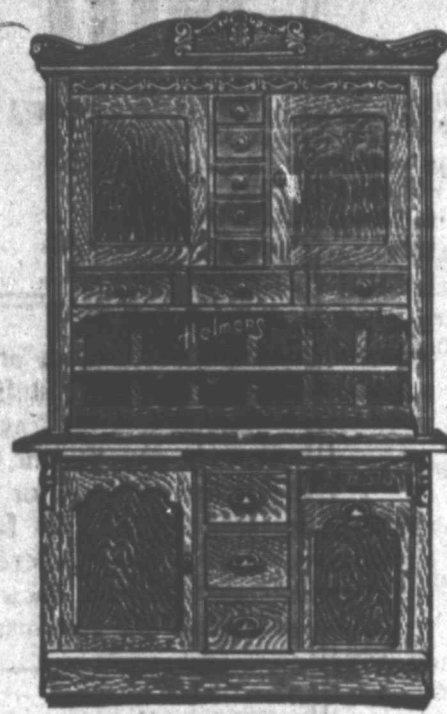
Probably on the account of pending statehood the territorial legislature does not seem to be doing much work. Last week a resolution was passed by both houses asking the Governor to appoint a delegation of prominent citizens to proceed to Washington to work for the passage of the enabling act. This delegation of seven influential citizens, accompanied by Governor Curry and a few others left Santa Fe Sunday evening for Washington.

A dispatch from Washington states that a bill has been reported favorably by the committee on public lands authorizing the Secretary of the Interior to have surveys or retracements of public lands made whenever he may deem essential after investigation. Under the present law one must resort to a private bill before congress in order to have a piece of land retraced. A bill of this kind would be a good thing and provide a way to straighten up and establish lines in dispute in this country.

A fund has accumulated in the territorial treasury at Santa Fe from proceeds of grazing and other privileges in national forests during the last three years amounting to \$39,751.51. In the absence of an act providing for the distributing this fund, a bill was introduced in the legislature providing it be distributed to the various counties in which the forests or parts of forests are located, to be used for school purposes. The amount apportioned for Roosevelt county is only \$197.06. There are ten national forests in New Mexico aggregating 8,475,574 acres.

Every new country has its discouraging features to contend with and faint hearted men have gone away in despair, but others came in and in the end countries that were thought to be worthless have been found to be the very choicest of agricultural lands. New Mexico has no more draw backs than the pioneers of Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and the Dakotas had to contend with and in all these states agriculture has long since passed the experimental stage. No man could urge a single objection to this country that was not urged against all the above in their early days. The moral is: "Stay with it and win."—Homesteader.

There is no valid reason why the women of New Mexico should not be granted the privilege of voting at school elections, or be empowered to serve as school directors, or county school superintendents, especially in view of the fact that New Mexico employs more women than men teachers and its schools are attended by girls as well as boys. It is true, there will be additional work for registration boards, and the election machinery will be made more cumbersome, but these are but minor considerations and not arguments against the bill introduced last week by Representative Mullens granting the above privileges to the women of the territory. The two arguments that are unanswerable are that the women of New Mexico are as good and intelligent as those of Colorado, of Kansas or of any other state that grants female suffrage in school elections, and the other argument is that women take a more direct and a more intelligent interest in the schools than do the men as a rule, and that to the mother the school interests of the children are nearer and dearer than to the father. Why, therefore, should not the women have a voice in the management of the public schools? It can not possibly hurt the schools, nor the women, nor the commonwealth and the only real object is that the women of New Mexico are not asking for the school suffrage and will exercise it but indifferently if granted them.—New Mexican.
