ORDINANCES

Of the Town of Portales, Roosevelt County, New Mexico.

ORDINANCE NO. 3.

CITY OFFICERS—DUTIES AND POWERS.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1.—That each and every officer of the town of Portales, whether elected or appointed, shall, before entering upon the duties of his office, take and subscribe an oath that he will well and truly perform all the duties of his office to the best of his skill and ability, and that he will support the constitution of the United States and the laws of the territory of New Mexico, and said oath shall be in the form prescribed by law.

Sec. 2. The officers of said town of Portales shall consist of five trustees one of whom shall be chairman, a town clerk, a town treasurer, a town attorney, a town marshal, a town physician, a pound keeper and a scavenger.

Sec. 3. There shall be nominated by the town trustees, at the first meeting after election of such board, or as soon thereafter as practicable, one chairman of the board of trustees, one town clerk, one town treasurer, one town marshal, one town attorney and one town physician, who shall hold their offices, respectively, for the term of one (1) year, and until their successors shall be appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed.

Sec. 4. The officers hereinafter mentioned shall, before entering upon the duties of their respective offices, execute bonds to the town of Portales, with securities to be approved by the board of trustees, conditioned that they will faithfully perform the duties of their respective offices, and that they will, when they vacate their respective offices, surrender and turn over to their successors all moneys, books, papers, property and other things in their custody or control belonging to the town. The penalties of the bonds, as required by this section, shall be as follows:

- For town clerk, the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00)
- For town treasurer, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00)
- For town marshal, twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00)
- For town scavenger, two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00)
- For pound keeper, five hundred dollars (\$500.00)

And the board of trustees may require a bond from any town official and fix the amount thereof when, in their judgment, the same is necessary. Said bonds shall be filed with the clerk of said board, and by him be preserved and kept in some secure place, subject, however, at all times, to the inspection of the said board of trustees, and that of any tax payer of the town who shall desire to examine the same, and shall be recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

TOWN TREASURER.

Sec. 5. The treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to the corporation, and shall keep his books and accounts in such a manner as may be prescribed by ordinance, and such books and accounts shall always be subject to the inspection of any member of the board of trustees. He shall keep a separate account of each fund or appropriation and the debits or credits belonging thereto. He shall give every person paying money into the treasury a receipt therefor, specifying the date of payment and upon what account paid, and he shall file statements of such receipts with the clerk at the date of each monthly report. He shall, at the end of each and every month, and oftener, if required, render an account to the board of trustees, or such officer as may be designated by ordinance, showing the state of the treasury. He shall also accompany such accounts with a statement of all moneys received into the treasury, and upon what account, during the preceding month, together with all warrants redeemed and paid by him, which said warrants, with any and all vouchers held by him, shall be delivered to the clerk and filed with his said account, in the clerk's office, upon every day of such statement. He shall return all warrants paid by him stamped or marked "paid." He shall keep a register of all warrants redeemed and, which shall describe such warrants and show the date, amount, number, the fund from which paid, the name of the person to whom paid and when paid. He may be required to keep all moneys in his hands belonging to the corporation in such place of deposit as may be designated by ordinance; provided, however, no such ordinance shall be passed by which the custody of such money shall be taken from the treasurer. The treasurer shall keep all moneys, belonging to the corporation, in his hands separate and distinct from his own moneys, and he is hereby expressly prohibited from using, either directly or indirectly, the corporation money or warrants in his hands for his own use or benefit, or that of any other person or persons,

whomsoever. Any violation of this provision shall subject him to immediate removal from office by the board of trustees, who are hereby authorized to declare said office vacant, and in which case his successor shall be appointed by the board of trustees and shall hold his office for the remainder of the unexpired term.

Sec. 6. He shall report to the board of trustees, as often as required, a full and detailed account of all receipts and expenditures of the corporation, as shown by his books, up to the time of his report, and he shall, annually, between the first and tenth of April, make out and file with the clerk, a full and detailed account of all such receipts and expenditures, and all his transactions as such treasurer during the preceding fiscal year, which account the clerk shall immediately cause to be published in a newspaper printed in the town.

Sec. 7. All warrants drawn on the treasurer must be signed by the chairman of the board of trustees and countersigned by the clerk, stating the particular fund or appropriation to which the same is chargeable, and the person to whom payable, and no money shall be drawn except as hereinafter provided. All moneys received on any special assessment shall be held by the treasurer as a special fund to be applied to the payment of the improvement for which the assessment was made, and said money shall be used for no other purpose, whatever, unless to reimburse such corporation for money spent for such improvements.

Sec. 8. The treasurer shall have and keep in his office a book to be called the "Registry of Town Warrants," where shall be entered and set down every town warrant, and the date of the presentation thereof, and without any interval of blank lines between any such entry and the one preceding it. Such registry of town warrants shall be open, at all reasonable hours, to the inspection of any person desiring to inspect or examine the same.

TOWN CLERK.

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of the town clerk to record all proceedings of the board of trustees in a book, or books, provided for that purpose. He shall countersign all warrants drawn upon the treasurer under the town seal. He shall make out all licenses authorized by the ordinances of the town and countersign the same under the town seal and, before issuing any license or warrant, shall present the same to the chairman of the board of trustees for his signature and approval. He shall keep a full and complete record of all warrants and licenses issued, with the names of the parties in whose favor they are drawn, including dates, amounts and numbers, and purposes for which given, and shall, on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as the same can be completed, and at such other times as the board of trustees may require, prepare a full and complete report of all warrants and licenses issued, also of all moneys collected belonging to the town treasurer, and of all other transactions of his said office during the month last preceding the said report, and shall submit the same to the board of trustees at its first regular meeting in each and every month. The town clerk shall be the keeper of the town seal and shall affix it to all instruments which are required to be attested by the town seal; he shall have custody of and safely keep all records and documents of the town, except as are otherwise provided by law. The town clerk shall receive a salary of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per month and, in addition to such salary, shall be allowed twenty-five (25) cents for each license or notice issued.

TOWN ATTORNEY.

Sec. 10. The town attorney shall, at the time of his appointment, be a resident and a qualified elector of the town of Portales, a member of the bar in good standing, and admitted to the practice of law in the courts of the territory of New Mexico.

Sec. 11. That the town attorney shall, if in the town, attend the regular and special sessions of the board of trustees; he shall give his opinion on legal questions, verbally or in writing, to the board of trustees, chairman, or any member whenever requested; he shall advise when applied to, any officer of the town as to the conduct of his office and he shall prepare and pass upon the legality of all ordinances, contracts, bonds and other writings, affecting the interest of the town. The town attorney shall by virtue of his office represent the town as its attorney in all suits in the justice courts and district court to which it is a party, including cases appealed from the justice court, and for his services so rendered shall receive a salary of twenty-five dollars per month.

Sec. 12. That the town attorney shall represent the town as its attorney in all suits and proceedings to which it is a party in the supreme court of New Mexico, and for services so rendered he shall be paid just and reasonable fees and compensation, to be fixed by the board of trustees in each instance of service. Provided, that whenever the town attorney, by reason of interest or other reason is disqualified, or because of any disability should not be able to attend any such suit or proceeding, other counsel

if more than four, 25 cents for each person notified, and for license collected, 25 cents. In all cases where the fee is not herein provided, the marshal shall be entitled to demand and receive the same fees as are now allowed constables under the laws of New Mexico.

Sec. 22. The justice of the peace of said town shall, before proceeding to try any person for the violation of any ordinance of said town, cause complaint to be made, and warrant to issue to arrest said person, and return to be made on said warrant.

Sec. 23. All cases tried before said justice of the peace shall be docketed in the name of said town of Portales against the defendant, and said justice of the peace shall enter on said docket, in a plain, intelligible manner, a minute of each step taken in such case, and of particular costs assessed in same.

Sec. 24. Judgment shall be entered in each and every case of guilty or not guilty of the offense charged, and by said judgment defendant shall be discharged, fined or imprisoned, or fined and imprisoned, as the case may be; and where defendant is found guilty, the cost of such case shall be assessed against him, and no cost shall be taxed otherwise; and all judgments imposing a fine except where a fine and imprisonment are both imposed, shall be in the alternative of imprisonment for a specified number of days, or until such fine and costs are paid, in default of immediate payment of such fine and costs.

Sec. 25. Where judgment of guilty shall be entered in any case before him, said justice of the peace shall issue a commitment against the person of defendant, commanding the marshal of said town, in default of immediate payment of such fine and costs as may have been assessed, to commit the defendant to the town or county jail, subject to labor in accordance with the terms of said judgment and the ordinances of said town of Portales.

Sec. 26. Whenever, in accordance with the laws of said territory, defendant in any case may be entitled to an appeal, the same shall be allowed in accordance therewith, by filing bond, with two sufficient securities in double the amount of the highest pecuniary penalty that could or might be assessed in such case. Provided, that said appeal shall not operate as a supersedeas in such case until such bond shall have been given and approved, and no costs shall be demanded as a condition of such appeal, nor the approval of said appeal bond.

Sec. 27. That the justice of the peace of the town of Portales shall be entitled to demand and receive for his services the following fees, to-wit: For issuing each warrant \$1.00; for docketing each case, 50 cents; for entering judgment in each case, 50 cents; for presiding at trial, 50 cents; for taking and certifying to an oath of acknowledgment, on behalf of the town or any officer or its order, 50 cents. In all cases where the fee is not herein provided the justice of the peace shall be entitled to demand and receive the fees as are now allowed justices of the peace under the laws of New Mexico.

Sec. 28. In all cases where the defendant pleads guilty, or a conviction on a plea of not guilty, the costs shall be assessed against and collected from the defendant, unless defendant be committed, when the town of Portales will pay the costs.

CITY PHYSICIAN.

Sec. 29. The board of trustees shall appoint a competent physician who shall be known as the town physician, and shall hold office until his successor is appointed and qualified. He shall reside within the corporate limits of the town of Portales, and shall receive such compensation as the board of trustees may fix.

Sec. 30. It shall be the duty of the town physician to attend professionally, the indigent sick of the town free of charge; to report to the board of trustees all infractions of the ordinances in relation to the public health, and to perform such other services in the line of his profession as the board of trustees shall direct.

Sec. 31. It shall be the duty of the town physician to assist the board of trustees, or any committee thereof, to enforce the provisions of the health and sanitary ordinances, and all laws, making, enforcing and establishing all necessary rules and regulations regarding the sanitary condition of the town; to attend all meetings of the board of trustees, when requested, and advise the said board of trustees upon all matters pertaining to the health of the community, and he shall attend such cases of sickness as are under the care and supervision of the town as paupers and, in general, to do such things as may be required of him by the ordinances of the town of Portales and the regulations of the board of trustees.

Sec. 32. The board of trustees shall cause a thorough inspection of the town by the town physician at least once every thirty days, and he shall, at each regular meeting of the board of trustees, submit a report in writing of the sanitary condition of the town, stating the location of all nuisances prejudicial to the public health, source of filth and causes of sickness, the number of persons having contagious or infectious diseases of any kind, and the character of such diseases, together with a report of his action in the premises.

SCAVENGER.

Sec. 33. That there is hereby created the office of town scavenger, who shall be appointed by the board of trustees. Said town scavenger shall, before entering upon the duties of his office, file an oath with the town clerk, to faithfully perform the duties of said office, and he shall enter into a good and sufficient bond in the sum of two hundred and fifty (\$250.00) dollars, conditioned to faithfully perform the duties of said office, and he shall be liable to be removed or inconvenienced by the non-performance of his duties.

Sec. 34. It shall be the duty of said scavenger to remove from the town to a point not less than one mile from the limits thereof, all of the filth, trash, excrement, etc., under the provisions and in accordance with the sanitary ordinance. And he shall perform such other duties as provided by ordinance.

POUND KEEPER.

Sec. 35. At any regular meeting of the board of trustees said board may elect a pound keeper, whose duty it shall be to take and safely keep any animals found running at large within the limits of the town of Portales. But, before the pound keeper shall enter upon the duties of his office, he shall file an oath of office and execute a good and sufficient bond in the penal sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars to the town of Portales, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of his office. And said pound keeper may be removed at any time by a proper vote of the board of trustees. He shall receive such compensation per month as the board of trustees may allow. Any vacancy occurring, at any time, for any cause the office of pound keeper may be filled at at any regular meeting or at any special meeting called for that purpose.

Sec. 36. The pound keeper shall receive the following fees for the care and keeping of the animals taken and impounded by him, to-wit: For each animal impounded, 50 cents; for each animal sold, 50 cents; for the care and keeping of each horse, mule or neat cattle, per day, 50 cents; for the care and keeping of each burro, goat or hog, per day, 50 cents. Any animal fed night and morning shall be deemed to have been held one day and liable to full charge per day; and only the proper proportion of the fee provided per day shall be charged according to the number of times such animal has been fed.

ORDINANCE NO. 4.

Prohibiting the selling or giving away of any intoxicating, malt, vinous, mixed or fermented liquors within the limits of the town of Portales, New Mexico.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico.

Section 1. The sale, barter, giving away or otherwise furnishing, except as hereinafter provided, of any intoxicating, malt, vinous, mixed or fermented liquor within the limits of the town of Portales, New Mexico, or any part thereof is hereby prohibited.

Sec. 2. Any person, individual or corporation who shall sell, barter, give away or otherwise furnish any intoxicating, malt, vinous, mixed or fermented liquor, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, or who shall within the town of Portales, advertise for sale or solicit the purchase of any such liquor, or who is in the actual possession and control, as lessee, owner, or otherwise of the premises upon which such liquors are sold, offered for sale or given away, except as hereinafter provided, shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than thirty days nor more than ninety days in the discretion of the court trying the case; provided, the board of trustees of said town of Portales, may issue licenses to registered druggists and pharmacists which said license shall authorize such druggists and pharmacists to buy and sell such liquors for medical, sacramental and chemical purposes only, and to buy and sell alcohol for scientific purposes for such scientific institutions, universities and colleges, as are authorized to procure same free of tax under the laws of the United States provided, that no sale of such liquor for scientific purposes shall be made except upon the sworn statement of the applicant in writing setting forth the purpose for which the liquor is to be used, and no sale of any such liquor shall be made for medicinal purposes (except sales to registered druggists) unless the purchaser presents to the registered druggist a bona fide prescription signed by a regular practicing physician of the town of Portales, which prescription shall not be filled more than once and shall state for what particular malady such prescription became necessary. Each sale shall be duly registered in a book kept for that purpose by such druggist, and the register thereof and the prescription pertaining thereto, shall be open to inspection by any officer, citizen or resident of the town of Portales, New Mexico, at all times during business hours.

Any physician who shall prescribe any such liquor, except for treatment of diseases upon his own personal diagnosis, shall upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than \$25.00, nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail not less than thirty days nor more than ninety days, in the discretion of the court trying the case; and any druggist who shall be convicted of making any sale or otherwise disposing of liquor contrary to the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25.00, nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than thirty days nor more than ninety days, in the discretion of the court trying the case, and in addition thereto, he shall have his license herein provided for revoked.

Sec. 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after the 22d day of March, 1909, after the date of its publication.

The national feeders and breeders show at Fort Worth will be held this year from March 13th to 20th.

The Mondell bill providing for 320 acre homesteads passed Congress and has been signed by the President. The bill provides that only non-irrigable, non-mineral land in the western states and territories come under this act.

The great American fleet of nineteen battleships arrived Sunday at Fortress Monroe, Va., completing their trip around the world in a little more than a year. A grand review of the fleet by President Roosevelt occurred Monday. This is the first time a great fleet of battleships have encircled the globe.

Portales is still on the map, and is still the county seat of Roosevelt county and is the best trading and business point in this part of New Mexico. The town is on a sound, safe, consecutive basis, there being no boom to inflate the value of town property beyond reasonable prices, and we have the best and most thoroughly developed country in this part of the plains to draw trade from. Portales is alright.

E. A. Priest & Son sold the plant and business of the Herald the latter part of last week to Rev. E. P. Alldredge and Rev. O. N. McBride. The new proprietors took charge Monday and will continue to publish the Herald and also will issue a Baptist publication. Rev. O. N. McBride, who comes here from Clovis, assumes the chair as editor and manager. The Times wishes the new proprietors of the Herald success.

The territorial legislature saw fit to create Curry county out of Roosevelt and Quay counties, but if it had have been left to a vote of the people of the whole county of Roosevelt there would have been ten votes against it to one vote for it. The Taft county bill has been rejuvenated in the house by being renamed Jaffa county and has passed the house as a substitute. We suppose, from the way things are going that this county will also be created before the session is closed.

This has been an ideal winter in southeaster New Mexico, especially favorable for stock and fruit. The weather has been neither too cold nor too warm, so stock have not suffered and the fruit buds have not been unduly advanced. A year ago and two years ago the peach trees of some varieties at least were in bloom early in the month of February. From the present outlook this ought to be a splendid fruit year for us. The farming prospects also ought to be exceptionally good if there is anything in the saying that a dry fall and winter means a wet spring and summer.

The County of Curry.

The bill creating the new county of Curry makes the south boundary line of the new county along the middle line of township one north. This makes the county line eight miles north of the north line of the school section adjoining Portales. The west line of the new county is the line between ranges 30 and 31 east, which makes Curry county extend about thirty-nine miles east and west, taking Melrose and Cantara in the new county and leaves Tolar, Taiban and LaLande in Roosevelt county or to be cut off in another new county. The north line of Curry county is a line in the shape of a stair step. At the northwest corner it extends to township five north, one township into Quay county, thence east twelve miles, thence north six miles, thence east six miles, thence north six miles, thence east six miles, thence north six miles to the northwest corner of township 8 north, 35 east, thence east to the Texas-New Mexico line.

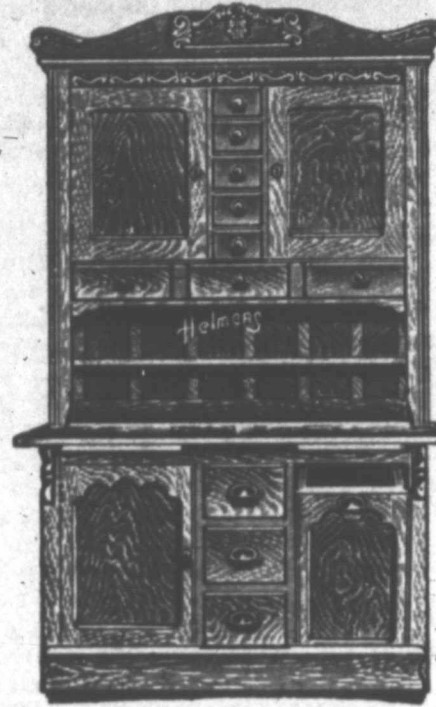
The county seat is temporarily located at Clovis for one year after which time the board of county commissioners of Curry county shall call an election to vote on the location of the permanent county seat. The Governor of The Territory shall appoint the county officers of the new county on or before April 1st, 1909, these officers to serve till their successors are elected at the next general election.

Curry county is authorized and directed to issue bonds to the amount of \$29,000.00, bearing interest of five per cent, to be dated July 1, 1909, payable absolutely thirty years after date, and offered for sale at not less than par. Out of the proceeds of the bonds, \$9,000.00 shall be paid to Roosevelt county and \$20,000.00 to Quay county, in full satisfaction of all claims of Roosevelt and Quay counties for county indebtedness in consideration of territory removed. If the bonds are not sold by January 1, 1910, then the bonds in amounts as stated above, with coupons attached shall be delivered to Roosevelt and Quay counties respectively in full satisfaction for said indebtedness. Curry county shall levy a tax to pay interest on these bonds, and after five years commence levying a sinking fund to pay the bonds. The bonds shall be designated the "Curry County Establishment Bonds."

Curry county may also issue bonds for a court house to the amount of \$20,000.00, and \$5000 for a jail, to bear five per cent interest payable thirty years after date and at the option of the county twenty years after.

Curry county shall be entitled to receive all unpaid taxes for the year 1908 and prior thereto, which have been levied on property within the boundaries of the new county, and Curry county shall be entitled to receive from Roosevelt and Quay counties respectively such proportion of moneys received from licenses in force in Curry county during any part of the year 1909, as such unexpired term of each license shall bear to the whole term. All school funds in the treasuries of Roosevelt or Quay counties on April 1, 1909, due to school districts of Curry county, shall be paid to the treasurer

Election of School Directors.

1. On the second Monday in March, (March 8th) school directors shall post notices of election to be held by them on the first Monday in April, (April 5th). Please note that the elections are to be held by the directors serving, and not by any three persons, as was attempted in some counties last year.

2. Hours of election, 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

3. Place of election, school house or some other convenient place specified in notice.

4. Result of election must be certified to county Superintendent by directors giving notices of election and acting as judges of such election.

5. Term of office of newly elected directors begins the first Monday in May following the election, (May 3d, 1909).

6. Directors must file oath with county superintendent before first Monday in May, (May 3d, 1909). Take oaths before a notary public and send them to the county superintendent separately, by registered mail.

7. The term of office of all appointed directors expire May 3d, 1909. If the district has been recently organized and all members of the board of directors hold office by appointment, three men must be elected, one for three years, one for two years, and one for one year.

Consult section 1532, Compiled Laws of 1897. Also Chapter LV, Laws of 1901. Directors please give attention to the above provisions of the election law, as submitted to the county superintendent, by the territorial superintendent.

ORDINANCES

Of the Town of Portales, Roosevelt County, New Mexico.

ORDINANCE NO. 5.

An ordinance providing for the licensing of occupations and trades in the town of Portales, New Mexico.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico.

Section 1. All licenses shall be signed by the chairman of the board of trustees, and issued by the clerk, under his hand and the official seal of the corporation upon payment of his fees and the receipt for the sum provided and assessed by this ordinance for such license.

Sec. 2. The town clerk shall issue all licenses fixed by this ordinance. All licenses issued under section five of this ordinance shall be issued and dated on the first of each quarter, and the same shall be due and payable on said date; for each part or fraction of a quarter, license shall be issued until the first of the next quarter.

Sec. 3. The town clerk shall deliver all licenses to the town marshal and charge him with the amount thereof; and the said marshal shall collect such amount and deposit the same within two days with the town treasurer, taking his receipt therefor, and such receipt shall be filed with the town clerk and the marshal credited therewith.

Sec. 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to conduct, pursue or carry on, in the town of Portales, any occupation or business named in the following section without first having paid the license fee thereon.

Sec. 5. All persons, firms or corporations shall be subject to and shall pay an annual license authorizing the pursuit or conducting of such occupation, at the rate and in the amount specified in the following schedule, to-wit:

Sec. 6. Any person, firm or corporation, liable under section five for the payment of any license, shall pay the same quarterly in advance.

Sec. 7. License for any show or theatrical performance shall not authorize the licensee to give any exhibition or performance which is against public morals and decency, and the board of trustees shall have power to revoke such license at any time.

Sec. 8. Any person violating any of the provisions of sections four (4), five (5), six (6) and seven (7) of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for a period not exceeding twenty-five days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court trying the case, and each day's conduct of such occupation shall constitute a separate offense.
