KILLING AT LA LANDE.

C. A. PECK WAS MURDERED BY ED HARWELL LAST SATURDAY

Preliminary Set to be Heard at
Taiban on Wednesday.

Last Saturday, at La Lande, C. A. Peck was shot and instantly killed by Ed Harwell. The shooting occurred on the streets of the town about four o'clock in the afternoon. From reports we hear the trouble arose between the two men over the burning of Ed Harwell's saloon, which occurred while he was attending court in Portales, he being complaining witness in the case against Boyce Kennedy. Harwell made no attempt to escape, but surrendered himself at once to the authorities.

The shooting was done with a 45-calibre Colt's pistol. Sheriff Bain went to La Lande Sunday and returned with the prisoner Monday. The preliminary examination was set for Wednesday, March 31st, at Taiban, being set there because the justice of the peace at La Lande is a witness in the case. Deputy Sheriff Duncan left Wednesday on the north bound train, taking Harwell to Taiban to attend the preliminary.

C. A. Peck, who was murdered, was a man about 35 years old and has a family. He was shot three times. Harwell is a single man, about 25 years of age.

Prohibitory Ordinance Upheld.

In the case testing the validity of the prohibitory ordinance in Portales, which was heard last week by Judge Pope in Roswell, the decision was rendered in favor of the town, the ordinance being declared valid. The question involved was purely a legal one, the attack being made on the authority of incorporated villages or towns to pass an ordinance prohibiting the sale of liquor. The main point of contention was over the fact that the ordinance as passed in Portales provided a minimum penalty of twenty-five dollars, whereas the statute provides that towns may make a maximum penalty of three hundred dollars fine and three months in jail, without specifying a minimum penalty. The validity of the ordinance was upheld by the court on all points brought out, and also held that the incorporation was valid. This probably settles the matter and Portales takes its place with other towns in the territory, Artesia and Aztec, as prohibitory towns.

Farming Possibilities in Great West.

John L. Cowan, one of the interesting writers on subjects concerning the great west, has written an article relative to farming subjects in the semi-arid regions from which we take the following excerpts:

"During the past two years, 45,000 homestead entries have been filed upon the public lands of New Mexico alone—taking up perhaps 6,500,000 acres, adding probably 175,000 to the population of the territory. In Western Kansas and Nebraska, the Texas Panhandle, Eastern Colorado and portions of Wyoming, Montana and Idaho, the relative increase has been almost as great. It has been one of the most remarkable 'land rushes' in the history of the West.

"Dry farming in the semi-arid region is a success that admits of no denial. The exhibit of dry farmed crops made at the Dry Farming Congress at Cheyenne, Wyoming, February 23, 24, 25, could hardly have been beaten at an eastern fair or a southern irrigation congress. There are failures, of course—just as there are failures in every other industry, the world over. Last year there were many crop failures in New Mexico, Colorado and other portions of the Great Plains area. So, also, were there many crop failures due to drouth in Ohio, Pennsylvania and other states in which no one thinks of farming as a doubtful or hazardous undertaking. Almost without exception, the failures in the plains region were due to neglect or refusal to adopt farming methods in unalterable conditions. The men who take up homesteads anywhere in the Great Plains region, in any section in which lands for homesteading can be found today—with the intention of farming in the same manner that farming is conducted in the east, predetermine their own failure.

"The Great Plains region, between the 98th meridian and the Rocky mountains, is 300 miles wide (from east to west), and 1,100 miles long, extending from Mexico to Canada. It contains 330,000 square miles, or 211,200,000 acres. The average annual precipitation throughout this region is from 16.6 inches in the northern portion to 20.9 inches in the southern. Just why there should be so much skepticism as to the possibility of farming with this rainfall (the major part of which usually falls during the growing season), is a little difficult to understand. The San Joaquin valley of California has long been a famous wheat growing country, with an average annual rainfall of 12 or 13 inches.

"In all semi-arid America, excepting the stretches of absolute desert, it would be difficult to find a region more unpromising, from an agricultural standpoint, than that inhabited by the Hopi Indians of Arizona. Yet these untaught aborigines have 'dry farmed' the sand wastes at the feet of their mesas for at least 500—probably 1000 years. They raise an average of 25,000 bushels of corn every year. They have 1000 acres of peach orchards; and it is estimated that they plant 1,000 acres in beans, melons, squashes, pumpkins, onions, chile pepper and other crops annually. Their crops are small, but they

suffice for a population of 2,000.

"But the recent settler upon these western or southwestern plains, or the man who is looking towards the cheap lands of the semi-arid region, can not have it impressed too strongly upon his mind that his success or failure depends absolutely upon his learning, or failing to learn, how to adapt his farming meth-

THE NEW GAME AND FISH LAW.

A Synopsis of the New Laws of the Territory of New Mexico.—
Open Seasons for Game and Fish

The following is a synopsis of the new game laws of the territory which went into effect on March 18:

Deer with horns—with gun only; October 15 to November 15 of each year. Limit, one deer to each person.

Wild turkey—with gun only; November 1 to December 31, of each year. Limit, four in possession at one time.

Grouse—with gun only; October 1 to December 31, of each year. Limit, six in possession at one time.

Native or Crested quail—with gun only; October 1 to December 31 of each year. Limit, thirty in possession at one time.

Doves—with gun only; August 1 to October 31 of each year. Limit, thirty in possession at one time.

Snipe, Kerlew and Plover—with gun only; September 15 to March 1 of each year. Limit, thirty in possession at one time.

Ducks, limited to thirty in possession at one time. No closed season.

Elk, Mountain Sheep, Beaver and Ptarmigan (White Grouse), killing capturing or injuring prohibited at all times.

Antelope, Bob-white Quail, Pheasant and Wild Pigeons, killing, capturing or injuring pro-

hibited until March 18, 1914.

Prairie Chicken, killing, capturing or injuring prohibited until January 1, 1915.

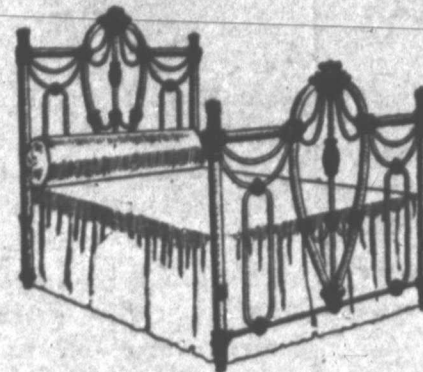

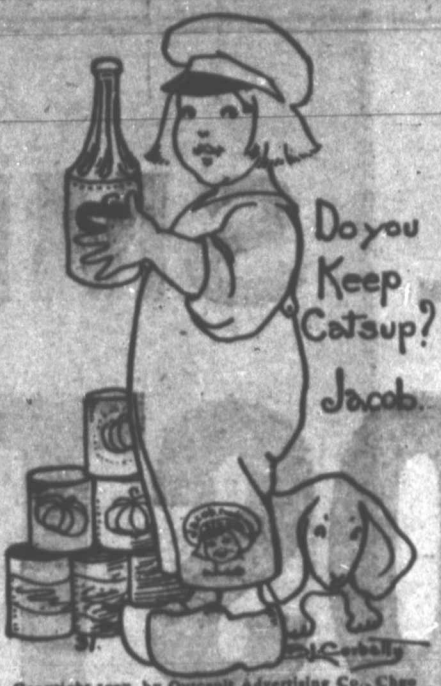
A New Law Firm.

Making a Market for Maize.

From the Elida News

D. V. Jones, who has been working up a market for milo maize and other grain for the Farmers' Union, returned Tuesday evening from Albuquerque and other points in the western portion of the Territory.

Since the first of January Mr. Jones has started more than 160 outfits, including some of the largest livery stables, ranches, mining and lumber camps in the Territory, to using milo maize chaps, as their only grain feed. It has given splendid satisfaction in every case and meets all the requirements for horse feed in the higher altitudes.

In conversation with the News man, Mr. Jones said: "The farmers of Elida and the eastern portion of the Territory should plant large crops of milo maize grain this year, as it is a sure and dependable crop. Heretofore there has been only a limited market for it, but next year, with the proper organization, there will be a market for all that can be raised and a hundred times more. The sheep men are becoming interested and want to drive to Elida next year and feed the grain fields, so as to save high freight rates. They say they will drive thousands of head into the Elida valley next year if they can get the milo maize."

"I would advise the farmers who want to make their lands worth \$40 an acre to plant at least half of it in milo maize. It is as sure and dependable a crop here as wheat in Kansas and Missouri, where land is worth twice that amount."
