A petition has been presented to the Secretary of the Interior asking that township 1 south range 31 east be designated as land subject to entry under 320 acre act. If the facts are properly presented it seems that there would be little doubt but what this should be granted. There is a mesa in this township about four miles across each way which together with the slope takes about all the land in the township. In the wells in this township in which water has been found the water is from 100 to 275 feet deep, and they only furnish from one-half to six barrels a day, and in the majority of the wells no water has been found. I. R. Greathouse, who lives in this township, has put down twelve wells and of these only three devoloped water, one well furnishes six barrels a day and the other two about two and a half barrels. Still Mr. Greathouse says he is there to stay and will put down more wells. He has spent four or five thousand dollars in improvements and has one of the finest barns in the country. In township 1 south, range 30 east, which is the township just west, which is included in the lands designated as subject to the 320 acre homesteads, water is much shallower and the land is of much better quality. The people in this township, all who were seen, signed the petition asking that the lands in this adjoining township be included in list of lands for the 320 acre filings. It was thought best to have disinterested parties sign this petition, and all who know the circumstances and the justice of the petition have sign-

establishment of a central power station at Portales for the dissemination of electric energy to be used in pumping for irrigation. It is especially worthy of note from the fact that if the government can not see its way clear to install the works, a number of individuals have signified their intention of doing so just as soon as it becomes apparent that Uncle Sam is not going to take hold of the scheme. Of course it would be preferable all around to have the government do it, as the experiment would have a deep significance to this phase of the reclamation service, which has infinite possibilities, beyond that attainable by the principle of irrigation from streams. In all likelihood no other portion of the southwest offers such favorable conditions for a test of the plan. All over the rich Portales valley, there is an underlying sheet of the finest kind of water at from eight to forty feet, and the soil is royal in its richness. There are no engineering obstacles in the transmission of power, and seemingly no reason why the plan should not be a success from the start, the pessimistic conclusions of 'The Tenderfoot' to the contrary notwithstanding.

The truth of the matter is that the Portales country has reached that point where the work must be done, either by the government or by private capital. The land is so rich and productive that there is an enormous waste every time a dry year comes along and the crops fail. Portales Valley will this year lose more than enough to install the system in short crops, and while this may not occur again for years, it is quite possible that it may occur again in 1910. The risk is too great to be longer taken. It is not good business to take it when a nominal cost will make that land produce an average of \$100 an acre in orchards, and as much or more in diversified crops under careful tillage. Even supposing that the installation of the work placed a lien of \$25 an acre on the land above described, before W. E. Linda placed a lien of \$25 an acre on every foot of land involved, it would be well spent, and would add many times that sum to the basic values. It would change \$30 to \$50 land to \$200 land, and make Portales one of the leading cities of the southwest, simply because no other city has such a remarkable body of contiguous

agricultural land. The people of Portales seem to be wise to these facts, and it certainly is well that they are. They have come to the parting of the ways, and if they have the wisdom we think they have, they will keep up steam on this power proposition. There are millions in it, while on the other hand is the stagnation of uncertainty, the instability of rain dependence, and the perpetuation of ways, and if they have the wistution and probably the only one place of highly productive cer-


