New Mexico: Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any railway engineer, conductor, yardmaster, agent, or any railroad employe, having charge, either permanently or temporarily, of any railway engine, train, car or cars, to allow, suffer or permit any railway engine, crarn, cars, to remain across or upon any open street or road within the town limits for a longer period than five minutes at any one time, except it be in case of inevitable accident or casualty.


