New Lindsey-Oldham Building.

The contract for the new Lindsey and Oldham building was let this week to John W. Tucker. It will be built next to the Miller & Luikart store and will be a building similar to the one occupied by Miller & Luikart. The new building will be occupied by the Portales Drug company when completed. Work will commence on the new building as soon as the foundation can be built and the material can be put on the ground.

J. H. Spillers Suicides.

J. H. Spillers, age 70 years, 9 months and 20 days, who was making his home temporarily with J. P. Stone and was an uncle of J. P. Stone, took his life last Thursday by shooting himself in the head with a 32 calibre pistol, death resulting instantly. The deed was committed on J. P. Stone's farm a mile north of town. Mr. Spillers had no family and the cause of his act is despondency. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon, services at J. P. Stone's residence.

On Tuesday night the town board of trustees appointed Charles T. Duncan town marshal vice E. S. Boucher, resigned.

Bonds Are on the Road.

Judge W. E. Lindsey has received word that the bonds for the water works and sewers have been shipped to Portales for signature of the town officers. These bonds will be here right away and will be properly signed, then they will be returned and the \$75,000 will be forthcoming, with \$1,000 premium. The town will then be in shape to get ready and make contracts for these improvements.

Plenty of Water Here.

With the new engine the pump has been working very successfully on the Lindsey well, pumping as high as one thousand gallons per minute. The water pumped has run down the road until it has reached town, a distance of two miles. More than ever the certainty of the supply of water has been proven. The pump will soon be moved to the Elliott well, near Bethel.

Mass Meeting Called.

A mass meeting is called to be held at the court house, Saturday, October 30th at 2 p.m., and it is especially requested that all who have signed the contract to take water be present. It is the purpose to make further arrangements for the great irrigation project.

You don't have to go to war to be patriotic. Improve your locality, uphold your town, enlarge its interests, and lend a hand to progress, and you are a patriot—a lover of your country—as truly as the soldier who shoulders his musket.

It is stated that last year 75,000 families, probably 300,000 people have emigrated from the United States to Western Canada to make homes on the cheap lands in the dominion. This is quite a drain on the population of the United States and their loss will not compensate for twice the number of immigrants coming from Southern Europe. While this is Canada's gain it presages a time when it will be hard to tell in western Canada whether the ancestors of the men you meet first gave their allegiance to the Stars and Stripes or the standard of Great Britain.

The latest fad in society is the tub cure. In this the patient arises just as the crisp air of the morning is mellowed by the first sunbeam. An ordinary washtub is then filled with hot water and soap suds, into which various articles of linen are thrown. After they are thoroughly saturated the patient takes them up one at a time and rubs them briskly up and down on a washboard placed in the tub. This is kept up until the hands, arms and face are a glowing pink. The patient then goes into the open air and hangs all the linen articles on a line stretched for that purpose. The one completing the task first announces the time to others over the telephone, and is entitled to a prize. It is exciting sport and invigorating exercise.

Encourage every home enterprise. Take an interest in every industry, invest liberally in the stock of faith and good will, and distribute it all over your city, in every factory, every work shop, every business house. Stand by your churches and your schools—they are the hopes of your future. Stand by your press—it is the tireless sentinel that guards your interest.

Without referring to statistics it seems the progress of our nation during the last decade or two has been greatly in favor of the farmer. It is common to hear old timers who lived in the leading western agricultural districts tell about when corn brought them 12½ to 15 cents per bushel, wheat 35 to 50 cents per bushel and hogs and other produce in proportion. Of late years corn has been bringing from 50 to 75 cents per bushel,

wheat is now over a dollar, hogs, poultry, butter and eggs are averaging higher prices on the market than ever before. On the other hand, manufactured products, such as the farmer needs, are reasonably cheap, though there has been brief periods when they have been cheaper. All things considered the environments of the former are today better on the average than ever before, and the trend is that they will still get better. In many places farmers are buying automobiles, building residences that are veritable mansions and live and dress as good as anybody. Truly the coming lord of the land is the independent farmer and land owner.

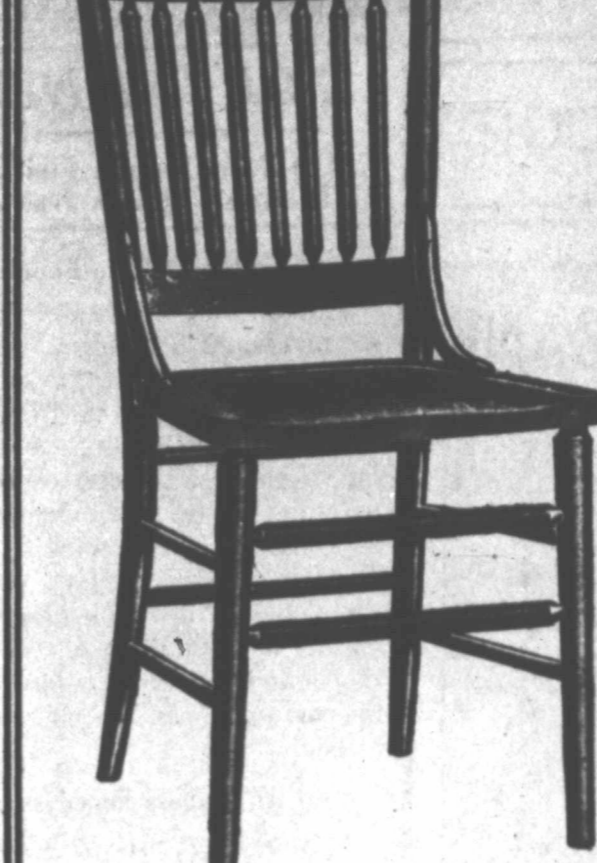
