## The Tepary Bean-A New South western Legume.

This new bean is being demontions of the experiment sta proven a prove
try. It originated from native seed wich is to be found today in the country and mountains along the Pecos River. The indians, who are now extinct, and have only their old villages to that they ever lived at all, were evidently the first people to cover that the plant was a good food. Their ancestors all raised this bean, and even where these
half savages farm this plant it haif savages farm
yeilds enormously.
When the experiment station first began their researches they found these Indians and Mexicans using this bean as food and after making some experiments with it to ascertain if it would
do as well as other beans, and whether it could be used in the same way, they have come to the conclusion that there is no hardier plant in existence that it is a valuable food. I will grow on dry land as well as irrigated land, and though the yield on dry land will pos ibly not be more than one hal as large as on irrigated land, a the same time it wil produce from the land; in fact a better return than the average maiz and kaffir crops bring.
There are two varieties of this pean that are good, but the white possibly the best. The white old navy bean and will take it place in every way 80 f ar a
cooking is concerned. The bean is very nearly the same as th ordinary navy bean except that when first coming up it is smal instead of throwing out tw large leaves. After it gets t some size the plant begins gets grown the only difference is that the leaves are not so large and are not exactly the same shape, A test which will tel you whether or not it is a tepary bean or not is to put it in water
and if the seed wrinkles within en minutes it is a tepary, as th ordinary bean takes nearly an hour before it begins to wrinkle In cooking the tepary swells nearly twice its original size and thus is different from tht or dinary bean. The tepary, when cooked, has the bean aroma. Some of the Mexicans prefer the pink beans to these but the same people prefer the western raised pink bean to the eastern raised, and can distinguish a difference between them. Cooked with
bacon or other meats the tepary nd the nevy bean are practic the same.
The tepary will easily yield twice as much either dry or irrigated and. On dry land the seed can be planted five inches deep in or
der to get it down to the der to get it down to the moist
ure. On the irrigated land there is no necessity of planting so deep as it will only tanting so longer to come up. The best time to plant this bean on dry land is from the 10th to the 20th from the 20th of March to the 1st of April. The summer plant.
ing on the irrigated land is the
same as the dry land planting.

The mid-summer planting would
be best here on account of the high winds which they do not mountains.
In planting the beans the rows hould be about three feet apart
nd the seed should be droped y an ordinary corn planter, and about two seeds should be dropped every foot in the row. By planting them this way it should ake about twelve pounds of seed the acre.
