Joe Hastings Visits Hitler's German Retreat

The following letter, which we believe will be of interest to our readers, was received here recently by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hastings, from their son, Joe, who is stationed in Germany with the occupation forces:

Freising, Germany
25 May, 1946

Dear Folks:
Tomorrow I am going to Hitler's retreat, Berchtesgaden, from all reports it is a beautiful place.

I am back from my little tour of Hitler's retreat. A person will go a long way to find a more beautiful place. Most of the buildings were blown to bits, but the magnificent scenes were not damaged. You look down on a valley and the town of Berchtesgaden. The valley is green. The whole thing looks like a very beautiful sand table model. To the south you see only stone mountains covered with snow.

It was peculiar to be walking around in rooms where only a few short months before Hitler, Bormann and Goering themselves were planning the war.

We hit a German girl while firing two weeks ago, so I had to go to Dachau to investigate. Dachau you know was the location of one of the worst concentration camps. Here are some pictures of Munich that I have seen, of course the place isn't as pretty now.

I am now stationed in Freising in General Von Stein Kaseine. No matter how much I dislike the army I am seeing and learning many things which otherwise I would have never known.

It makes me want to cry about the wheat being hailed out, but that would do no good.

I will close for now.

HERSCHEL BROWN IS HONORED AT ROAD BUILDERS MEETING

Lubbock, June—Herschel Brown, maintenance foreman for the state highway department at Dimmitt, was one of nine veteran road-builders honored here in recognition of more than 20 years of meritorious service with the department.

Representing the state highway commission, District Engineer S. C. McCarty presented a gold lapel pin and scroll to the old-timers. A special ceremony was held for the occasion during a special assemblage of district highway employees at Mackenzie park.

Commission Chairman John S. Redditt announced at Austin that more than 200 employees over the state had qualified for awards. Sixty employees had previously been honored by the commission for more than 25 years of service with the department.

Brown is an East Texan by birth, born in Cooke County and moving to West Texas over twenty years ago. He did his first work for the highway department in Plainview in 1925. His first experience was on Cooke County roads. He has been building and maintaining roads in Texas for 24 years. Before going to Dimmitt in 1939, where he has charge of maintenance in Castro and Parmer counties, Brown was foreman at Plainview.

Jesse was in the 4th Armored Div. Landed in Liverpool, England, went on to Paris, France, then to San Low, on the Rhine River, stayed in the hospital 4 months in England, was sent to Colo. Springs General hospital where he received more than a year.

Marvin W. was trained in 3214th Ord. Base Small Arms Co. Landed in Liverpool, England, April 21, 1944, went to France Jan. 5, 1945, and to Bremerhaven, Germany October 1, where he stayed until March 7 when he sailed for home.

Leonard joined to Army March 5, 1941, went from Fort Bliss to Camp Bowie March 11. Took his basic training there with the 111th Med. Regt. Transferred to 204th Gen. Hospital December 31, 1941, at Fort Bliss. Left for overseas duty April 7th, 1942. Arrived at Honolulu, Hawaii April 16. Was stationed at various places on the Island, left for Guam Dec. 1, 1944, arrived at Guam Dec. 21, returned to the States Oct. 20, 1945. He was discharged Oct. 30 at Fort Bliss, Texas.

DAIRY HERD IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION REPORT

Seven Dairymen in Castro and Deaf Smith counties had their cows tested in the Dairy Herd Improvement Association. Robert Huseman of Nazareth, who tested the cows reported the following as a summary of June testing. Seven herds had a total of 146 cows that gave a total of 93,377 pounds of milk and total fat of 4179 pounds. This was an average per cow of 633.5 pounds of milk and 23.8 pounds of fat.

B. E. Brumley of Hereford had the highest herd average of 775 pounds of milk and 30.7 pounds of fat. Mr. Brumley also had the highest testing cow which was a Jersey that gave 903 pounds of milk that tested 5.8 per cent making a total of 53.1 pounds butterfat.

Frank Huseman had the 2nd highest testing cow, also a Jersey, that gave 903 pounds of milk and testing 5.8 per cent making a total of 52.1 pounds fat.

Harry Rothwell had a Milking Shorthorn cow that produced the highest amount of milk 1230 pounds that tested 4.2 per cent making 51.7 pounds of butterfat.

Dairymen in the testing association are Harry Rothwell, Frank Huseman, Morgan Dennis, T. R. Davis, and M. L. Simpson of Castro county and B. E. Brumley and Clinton Jackson of Deaf Smith county.

FERTILIZER FILMS TO BE SHOWN

About an hour and half moving picture films showing the use of fertilizer to plants as well as needs of soils for various fertilizers will be shown by Nelson Armstrong of Hereford, Tuesday night, July 9, at 8:30 in the District Court room at Dimmitt.

Since more irrigation is done in Castro county and needs for fertilizer is becoming more urgent according to County Agent R. L. King, all farmers in the county are urged to attend the showing of the films. The application and use of fertilizers will also be discussed by Mr. Nelson.

These films are produced by the National fertilizer association and will show the amount of chemical foods different crops remove from the soil.

Also to be shown will be the film of the Castro county beef calf show held last April 20. All 4-H Club boys interested are asked to attend to see this show, as well as the pictures on fertilizer.

Remember the date July 9 at 8:30 in the District Court Room in Dimmitt.

WEED CONTROL

Now is the time to control most noxious weeds. Bindweed and Johnson Grass are the two most noxious weeds affecting Castro county farmers according to County Agent R. L. King. Bindweed can be controlled by applying a spray of a Chemical weed killer containing the new 24 4. Chemical. Several samples of this chemical are available at the County Agents' office and any farmer wishing to try a sample of this may secure it as long as it lasts. This chemical is mixed with water and sprayed on the plant. One spraying should be very effective and 2 treatments should give a complete kill.

Bindweed also can be controlled successfully if it is summer fallowed for two years. It should be plowed with a duck foot sweep every 14 to 21 days until the kill is complete. King says this control method is recommended by the Hays, Kansas, Experiment Station.

Johnson Grass is another noxious weed that is rapidly spreading to all the farms in Castro County. Even though Johnson Grass is considered a valuable crop in some areas Castro county farmers must do everything possible to eradicate and stop the spread of Johnson grass.

The Johnson grass committee urges the support of this program and information on Johnson grass eradication may be secured at the County Agent's office.

Several methods of eradications are use of Attacide or Sodium Chlorate as a spray, applying salt, spraying with distillate or kerosene and proper cultivation.

Johnson grass can best be controlled with chemicals while in the booting or blooming stage.

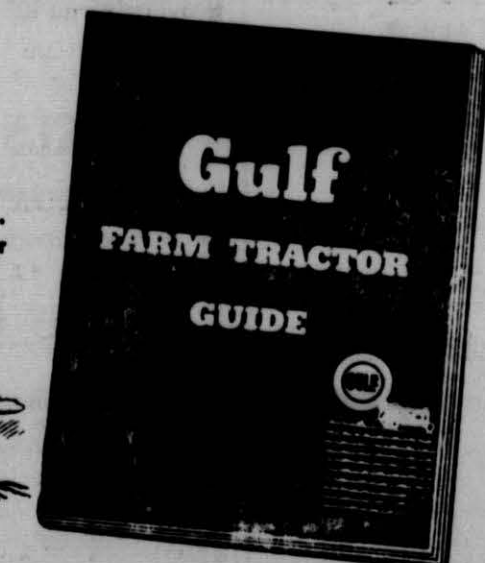
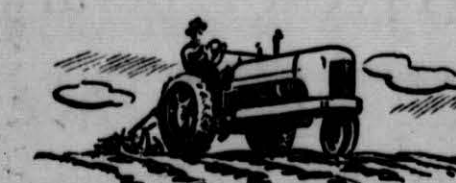
