

Deadline Drawing Near for Paying Poll Taxes

County Tax Assessor-Collector Birdwell this week warned voters to get their poll taxes before January 31. Traditionally the day for paying poll taxes, this year on Sunday, so last day for paying will be Saturday. Ordinarily the tax assessor's office is closed on Saturday, but it will remain open until 5 p.m. Saturday, January 31, to take care of last minute poll tax orders.

Birdwell estimates that about 2,000 poll taxes and exemptions will be issued this year. Normally 1,800 to 1,900 are issued but since this year is a big election year, he expects additional business. In definite prospect for this year will be two Democratic primaries and a general election including the election of a president. The primaries will be held May 7 and June 4 and the general election will be held November 8.

Other possible elections include a county-wide local option election and several bond elections. Whether any of these materialize or not, 1960 portends to be one of the biggest election years in recent times. Poll taxes are \$1.75 each. Of this amount 25 cents stays in the county treasury and \$1.50 goes to the state. There has been a movement in recent years to abolish the poll tax but it has met with little success.

Student Shot In Liquor Store Break-In

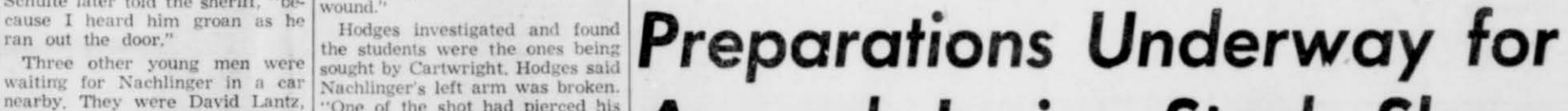
A young Texas Tech student was hit three times by shotgun blasts about midnight Friday during an attempted burglary of the Oasis Liquor Store at Nazareth. The wounded youth is Terry Jim Nachlinger, 20, a sophomore animal husbandry major from Hermleigh. Nachlinger is in fair condition at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo after having the heel of his left foot blown off and receiving wounds in the right leg and the left arm which was broken.

According to sheriff Jack Cartwright, Nachlinger kicked open the door of the liquor store and made enough noise doing it that it awakened Clarence Schulte, owner of the store, who was sleeping in the back. Just as the door came open and Nachlinger stepped inside Schulte fired at the figure three times with his twelve gauge shotgun. It was loaded with No. 7 1/2 shot. "I knew I hit one," Schulte later told the sheriff, "because I heard him groan as he ran out the door."

Hodges investigated and found the students were the ones being sought by Cartwright. Hodges said Nachlinger's left arm was broken. "One of the shot had pierced his metal watch band, and he couldn't get it off," Hodges said, adding "it had to be cut away with scissors." "There was lots of blood all over the car. It looked like that boy must have lost a quart of blood," the chief said.

He notified Cartwright who picked up the three unhurt students. A Dennis Funeral Home ambulance took Nachlinger to Amarillo for surgery. Cartwright said inspection of the door at the liquor store revealed it was probably kicked open. Doctors said Nachlinger's Achilles tendon in the left heel was blown away.

Preparations Underway for Annual Junior Stock Show

Rules and regulations for the Sixth Annual Castro County Junior Fat Stock Show and Project Show were announced this week by the County Agent and County Home Demonstration Agent offices. Sponsored by the Castro County Chamber of Commerce, the show will be held February 5 and 6 at the Fair Grounds. This is a popular show with county 4-H, FFA, and FHA youngsters. A sale is held each year of the show on Saturday afternoon in which county businesses pay heavy premiums for their animals. The Livestock Show Committee of the Chamber of Commerce is Charlie Hays, Carl Kemp, G. L. Willis, Ward Golden and Bob McLean. General Superintendent will be Bob Anthony. Other show division heads will be J. O. Seale and Jim Dowty, building and grounds superintendent; Charles L. Hottel, Beef Calf Division Superintendent; Emersor Brister, sheep division superintendent; Lanny Tucker, swine division superintendent; Lee Couch, poultry division superintendent; Ollie Limer, Hale court agent from Plainview, livestock judge; Jack Howell and Dean Sanders, auctioneers; Raymond Wilson and B. M. Nelson, clerks of sale; and Aaron Isaacs, official weigher. General rules include the following: All entries must be in the Chamber of Commerce office or county agents office by January 30. The entry fee, to be used for bedding, will be \$1.00 for calves and 50 cents for burrows and lambs. All livestock must be in place by 5 p.m. Friday, February 5. All animals must be weighed at the time of entry by the official weigher. Only one weighback will be allowed. This weighback must be before 5 p.m. All animals must be tagged at the time they are weighed. Each boy or girl will be allowed to place not more than two calves, two pigs, and two lambs in any one class of singles. However, he may enter three pigs, or three lambs in the show. He will be allowed to place only two animals of any division in the sale which will follow the show. All livestock (calves, hogs and sheep) will be sifted for condition, quality, grooming and training. All sifted animals will be the responsibility of the owner. All grand and reserve champions must be sold at the sale following the show. Other lower-ranking animals may be withheld from the sale for entering in another show if the owners so desire. In the beef calf division, only steers will be eligible to show. All calves entered in this show must weigh between 700 and 1,200 pounds. The light division will be 700-950 pounds and the heavy division will be 951-1,200 pounds. Calves must be 18 months of age or less and must have been owned by the exhibitor 180 days prior to the show. There will be a 3 percent shrink on calves in the sale. In the lamb division, only wether lambs will be eligible to show. Light lambs will weigh between 80 and 102 pounds and heavys will weigh between 103 and 125 pounds. There will be five classes: Southdown, Southdown Crosses, other mutton breeds and crosses, fine wool type lambs, and group of three lambs. In the swine division, only barrows are eligible to show. Pigs will be shown according to breeds as near as possible and the final division as to how the pigs will be grouped will be determined by the Superintendent before show time. First and second place pigs in each of the single classes will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Champion of the show. Pigs weighing less than 180 pounds and more than 240 pounds will not be allowed to show.

Friday afternoon the FHA girls had a tea and style show for the mothers. The Freshman girls modeled skirts and blouses made of cotton which they had made in school.

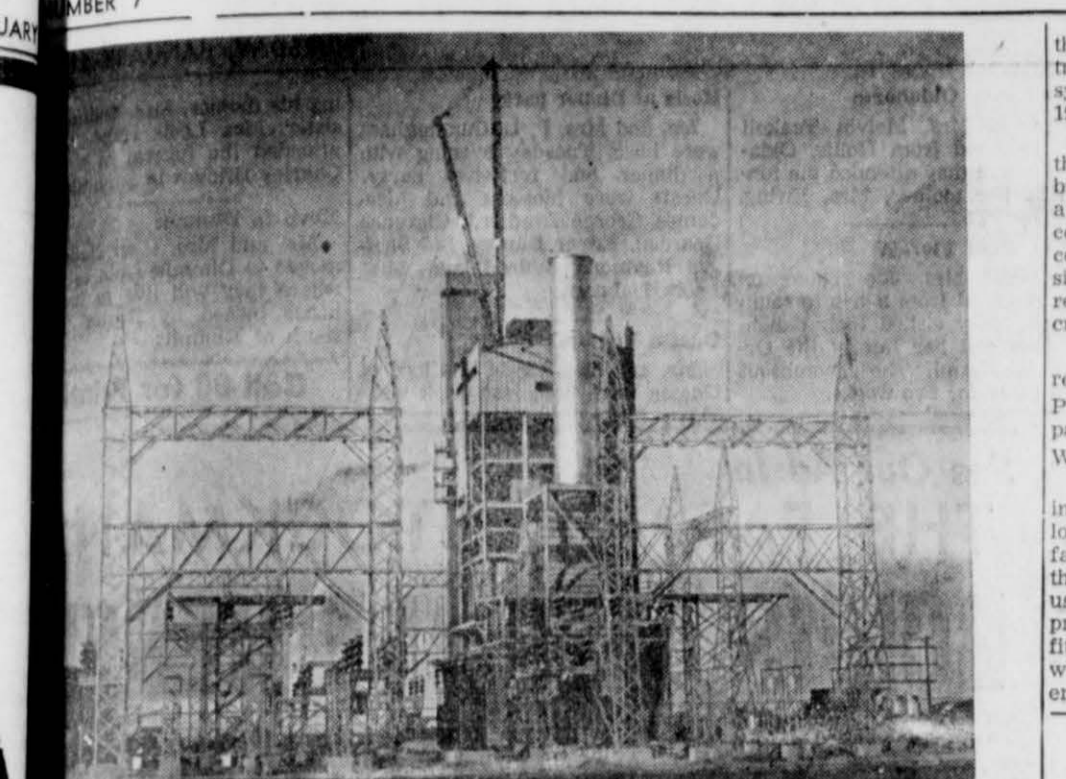

Western Public Service Co. At the same time that it announced the 14.3 construction investment, Watson revealed that the company's long-range forecast anticipates a \$95,000,000 investment in new facilities in the next five years.

Southwestern Public Service Company's 12th major generating station will go into service in June. Located north of Amarillo, the new plant will have a generating capability of 112,500 kilowatts when it goes on the line.

When the second unit at the station north of Amarillo does go into service, Southwestern Public Service Company's generating capability will pass the million mark for the first time. The capability of the 12 major generating stations will be 1,637,000 kilowatts in 1962.

D&B Report Shows County Businesses Increased in Number. The growth of Castro County is reflected in statistics released by Wayne A. Clark, manager of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc. at Amarillo which covers this area.

For the third year, fertilizer used on soybeans did not increase the yield enough to pay the cost of fertilizing at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, Delbert Langford, Assistant Agronomist, reported this week.

The 1959 fertilizer applications used on the Low variety of soybeans included nitrogen, phosphorus and potash. The form of nitrogen used was anhydrous ammonia (82 percent nitrogen), phosphorus was phosphoric acid (37 percent P2 O5) and potash was muriate of potash (60 percent K2O).

Rates of application were forty pounds of nitrogen, eighty pounds of phosphorus and eighty pounds of potash. Each of these were applied alone and in all combinations.

Researchers Say Fertilizer On Soybeans Unwise. In reporting these results, Mr. Langford pointed out that chemical analysis of the soil upon which these tests were conducted, show an ample supply of phosphate and potash. Nitrogen, though not in ample supply in the soil, is produced by the micro-organisms growing on the roots of the inoculated soybeans.

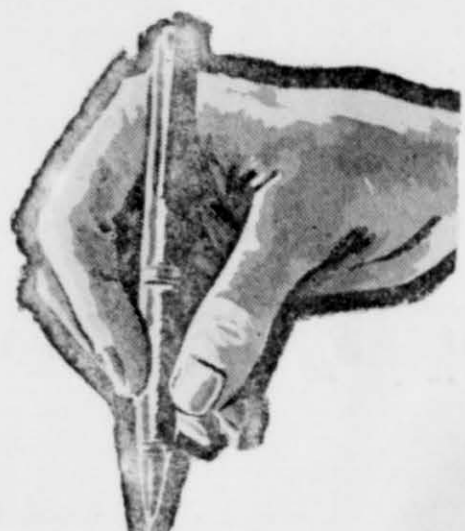
