## Rain, Hail and High Wind Cause Damage Again

A battering hail storm left shattered crops in its wake across South Castro County late Wednesday afternoon, playing havoc for the third time with crops on some farms in that area.

High winds blew down barns, outbuildings, and pushed combines around during the onslaught. Some farmers were convinced a small twister was responsible for the damage.

In the Flagg area tremendous amounts of rain fell. From 3 to 4 inches were reported in some vicinities, falling in a matter of half an hour.

Dimmitt received no rain and Hart received only a trace. The hail and rain started about three miles south of Dimmitt and moved Southwest.

## Little League Starts Second Half of Season here Monday

The Castro County Little League has finished the first half of the season. The managers, coaches and players are taking two weeks off and the next scheduled game will be played at Dimmitt with the Cardinals versus the Redlegs. A make-up game was scheduled for Wednesday between the Redlegs and Braves at Hart.

The first half of the season finished with the Cardinals of the major league winning 8 out of 9 games. The Cardinals are managed by Danny Schmucker. The success of the team has been the fine work and the outstanding pitching of Marvin Hoelting. First baseman Jimmy Hoelting has contributed much to the team's standing.

The Gold Sox finished second in the first half of the season. The Braves and Redlegs are battling for third place with three wins and five losses. Ted Sheffy, manager of the Gold Sox has recently been encouraged by the good playing of second baseman Larry Dobson and pitcher Steve Myers.

In the minor league, the Gold Sox won the first half of the season with eight wins and one loss. The Cardinals came in second with seven wins and two losses with both losses at the hand of the Gold Sox. The Braves are expected to improve during the second half and the Redlegs with no wins can yet give the league leaders a hard time. ## Construction For First 6 Months Slightly Off

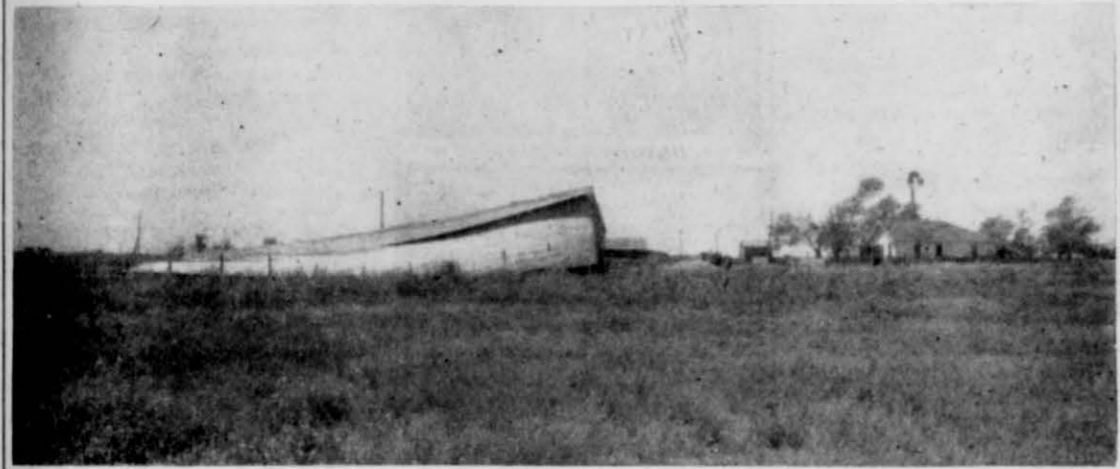
Dimmitt residential construction continued during the first six months of 1959 on a high level, favorably comparable to past years, despite an increase in the number of rent houses available in the city.

However, there were no business building permits issued during April, May or June.

April's residential construction totaled 7,395, mostly for remodeling. May was way ahead with a total of \$40,000 in permits issued and June showed a substantial \$28,500.

\$141,195 has been spent on residential construction so far this year, trailing last year's near-record \$172,295.

There is apparently a slight slow-down in construction here over the past several years. For the first time since World War II good quality rent houses are becoming available in Dimmitt and the need to build is no longer so pressing from that standpoint of non-availability of rent housing. Also a factor in the decreasing building boom that saw its heyday in 1955-56, is the low crop price supports and recent falls and other crop hazards which have brought about a slight decline in real farm income.

## First Country Club Stock Sold

Some thirty families were represented at a Country Club formation meeting Tuesday evening in the Dimmitt Grade School Cafeteria. Of those present, 28 families signed agreements to purchase membership stocks.

This figure was later pushed to between 75 and 100 members. Names of members will be published in next week's issue of the News.

B. M. Nelson, manager of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce, was moderator for the evening session and explained what had been done by the steering committee which had been formed to make preliminary arrangements.

According to Nelson, a breakdown in costs of the operation

would run something like this:

Golf Course	\$18,000
Swimming Pool	20,000
Land	16,000
Water Well	7,000
Club House	35,000

Nelson emphasized that these figures were tentative, but had come from authoritative sources. Goal of the organization is \$100,000 for the project and stock is being sold at \$500 per share with an aim of 200 members.

"We consider that this project will pay for itself many times over," Nelson told the group, "and we feel that it is something the community owes itself."

Also brought out at the meeting was the feeling that greater recreational opportunities would

bring more people to Dimmitt and the nearby area.

Not figured in the cost estimates at present is a proposed fishing pond which partly already exists on the land to be purchased. The land is 80 acres about a mile south west of town belonging to Joe Butler.

Stock in the new organization will sell for \$500 per share and any person caring to inquire about membership may do so at the Chamber of Commerce office or at the First State Bank where present members of the Country Club organization will be on hand to answer questions and sell stock.

## Oldest Grocery Store In Dimmitt Purchased From Mrs. Jess Wright

The oldest grocery store business in Dimmitt changed hands this week when Mrs. Jess Wright sold Wright's Grocery to Mr. and Mrs. Bill Baker.

Mrs. Wright operated the store for 26 years continuously except during World War II when she was in the WAACS. She started the store during the depression in an old wooden frame building on Bedford Street where the Moran and Miller Law Building now stands. In 1938 she purchased the building where King-Seely Furniture operates its second-hand furniture store from N. L. Wesson. She was operating the store there when she married Mr. Jess Wright, then owner of Dimmitt Implement Company. Mr. Wright died several years later. The store is in its third location in north Dimmitt on Highway 385.

Mrs. Wright says both Dimmitt and grocery prices have changed a lot since she first began her store experience.

Mr. and Mrs. Baker have lived in Dimmitt for the past four years, having moved here from Hobbs, New Mexico. During their stay in Dimmitt they have worked for two other grocery stores here.

Mr. and Mrs. Baker will operate their store from 6:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. daily and from 6:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. Sundays except during church service times, both morning and evening, when they will be closed.

## Pioneer Man and Wife Plan 60th Wedding Anniversary

Sixtieth wedding anniversaries are very rare, especially in a small town. But on July 19th, there will be a sixtieth anniversary observed by a couple who have lived here virtually all their married life. They are Mr. and Mrs. John Smith of 806 West Bedford.

They were married July 19th, 1899 in Mercer County Missouri by G. W. Brown, principal of the Princeton, Missouri, Public Schools. Mrs. Smith says she realizes school principals can no longer perform marriage ceremonies. Aside from being married sixty years, Mr. and Mrs. Smith probably are the only people living who had a high school principal conduct their wedding ceremony.

Mrs. Smith still has a clipping from his home-town newspaper describing their wedding. Here is the complete account:

**Smith-Hoof Wedding**

"Mr. John Smith, of Modena (Mo.), and Miss Bertha Hoof, of Farmersville, were united in marriage at the residence of George Stephens, four miles northeast of Princeton, Wednesday evening, the 19th. The ceremony was said by Prof. G. W. Brown, of the Princeton public school.

"The groom is a son of Wm. Smith, formerly of Modena, and is an excellent young man, held in high esteem by his friends and associates. The bride is unknown to the writer, but is said by those who know her to be a bright, intelligent, ladylike lady, possessed of those qualities of head and heart that will make her home happy. It is likely that the newly wedded couple will make their home in Texas. The Press wishes them unbounded success and happiness wherever they locate."

Friends and neighbors of Mr. and Mrs. Smith are staging an open house commemorating the anniversary on Sunday afternoon, July 19th, in the Smith home at 806 West Bedford. Time of the open house will be from 3-6 in the afternoon. Everyone is invited.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith are true pioneers of this country. Mr. Smith left Missouri for Texas in August after being married in July. He stayed for a while with a sister in Happy, while looking for a place to live. While there the rumor reached Happy that gold had been found in Bovina, so Mr. Smith and several relatives decided to go investigate. The gold turned out to be simply

some small ground up pieces of brass worn from the pumping mechanism of a windmill that had collected under the windmill's spout. Observers at first thought the windmill well shaft passed through a vein of gold and the tale got out before it was disproved.

However, while he was making the trip across the prairies, Mr. Smith ran across a four section farm about five miles west of Dimmitt that appealed to him. He paid \$1,500 for the four sections which, he says, were about what the improvements were worth. A three-room house was on the place and that became the Smith home when Mrs. Smith came to Texas between Christmas and New Years.

Mr. Smith farmed nearly all of his life before his retirement. His brother Ed homesteaded the last two sections of land in Castro County.

At that time Dimmitt was "just a wide place in the road," Mrs. Smith says.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith have no children of their own, but they have an adopted son, Frank, who lives in Tulla.

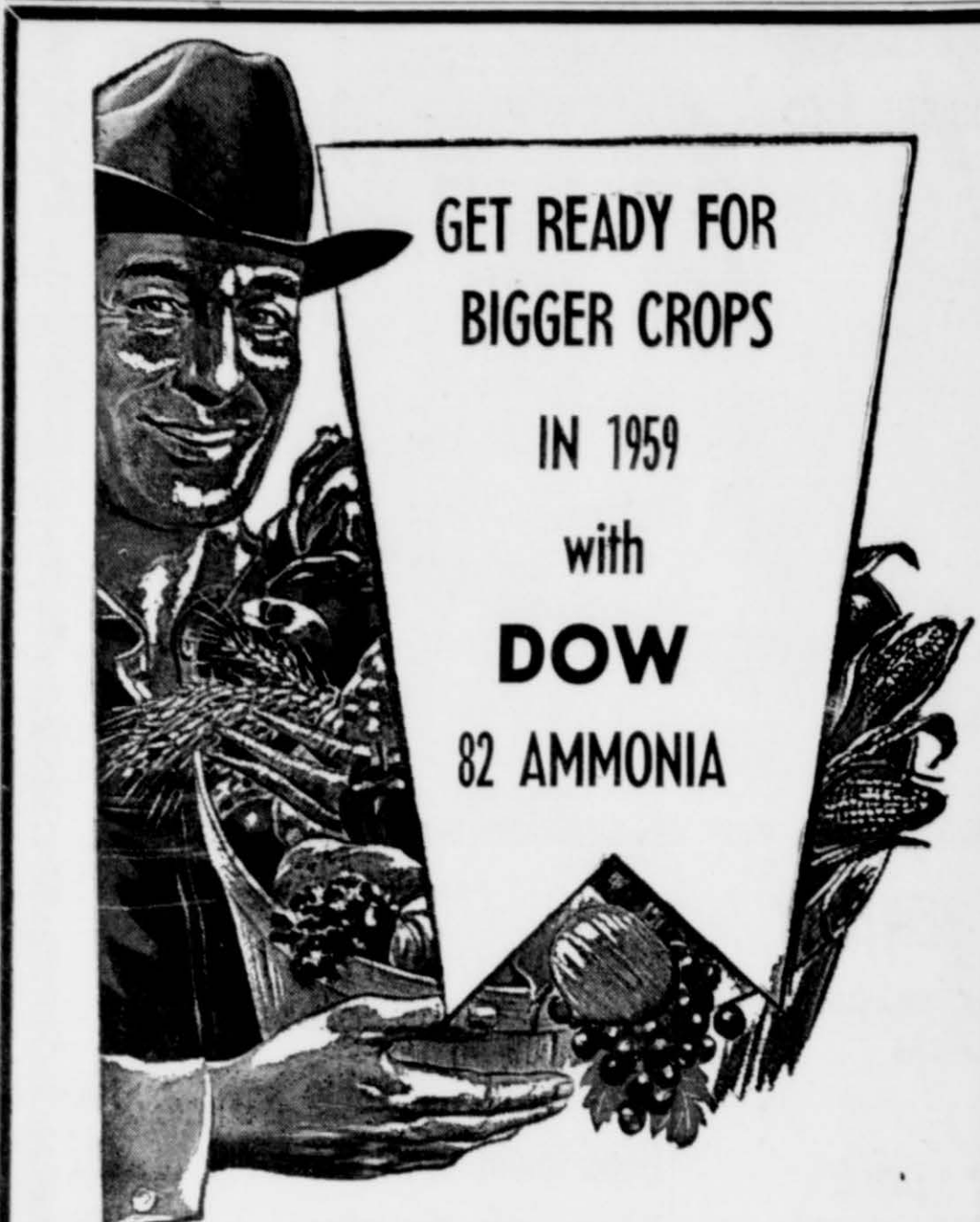

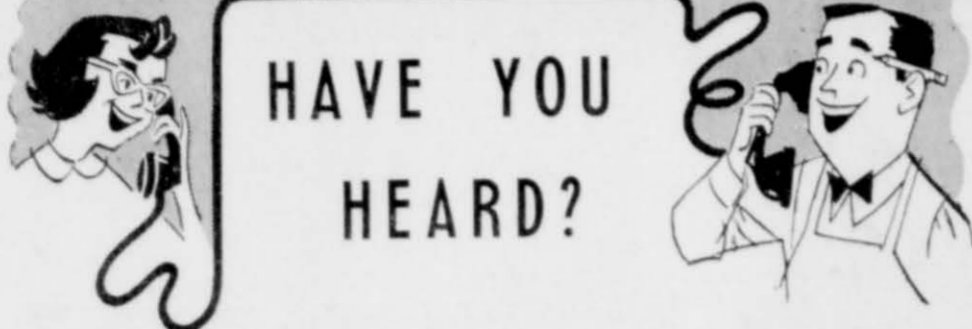
