Stuffed Peppers.

Grind a pound of lean beef and one half pound of pork or veal, mix with three tablespoonfuls uncooked rice, pepper, salt, a chopped onion and a tablespoonful of fat or butter. Clean the peppers, take out the seeds and fill them with this mixture, then strain a can of tomatoes into a stewpan, add a pinch of sugar and salt and simmer the peppers for two hours in this. When done thicken the sauce with a little


Berry Mold.

Take a stale loaf of bread, cut in thin slices and spread lightly with butter. Stew a scant quart of small sweet berries of any kind and when soft add sugar to taste. In a deep dish put a layer of the bread, pour over a quantity of the boiling mixture, then add more bread and fruit until all has been used. Cool, set on the ice and serve very cold with a little whipped cream.

Getting Juice From Lemons. If lemons are dried and do not seem to contain much juice just pour boiling water over them and let them stand until the water is cold. You will be surprised at the amount of juice they contain, and the juice is not weak-

PROFIT IN POULTRY.

Farm Flocks Can Be Increased Without Much Added Expense.

Increased attention given to the poultry industry will prove one of the country's greatest defenses against food shortage, declare the poultrymen at Iowa State college. Poultry can be kept profitably on practically every farm and on many town and city lots, they say. They can be more quickly increased than any other important class of farm animals without increased use of valuable foodstuffs, for they uti- clean nests, gather eggs twice each day

Adding a hundred hens to every farm flock would involve no extra labor and would be a profitable move for every farmer. Then the adoption of better poultry practices with flocks on hand will tremendously increase the country's supply of poultry products and the profits of those who adopt them. Early hatched stock will undoubtedly lay more eggs next winter than late hatched, for well matured pullets make the best layers. These eggs will probably bring the highest price ever realized. But good feed and care will do much to overcome the handicap of late

Rules for Cutting and Baling Bear Grass:

The plant must be split open, cut off from the roots above the ground close to the live lower leaves and above the dead leaves, and no more of the root, or bulb, left attached to them than is necessary to hold the leaves together. If desired to sell dry loose, the plant must be thoroughly dried and contain no dirt or other waste material, as we will not pay for water, dirt or other waste material. If selling baled, all plants must be thoroughly dried and all dirt and sand must be shaken out before balinfi. You can use any kind of baling press that best suits you, provided it is not smaller than 17x22 inches, but all ba'es must be tightly baled and three wires used to keep them in shape.

Instructions for Baling

Regulation size of bale is 17x22 inches, however, I will receive bear grass baled in hay balers 14x18 inches, but all must be tightly baled and have three wires.



MANAGEMENT OF FOALS.

Care of the Young Horses During Their First Winter, [Prepared by United States department of agriculture.]

Colts can be housed satisfactorily either in the stable or in an open shed. The main requirements are that the quarters be dry, sanitary and provide fairly warm protection from winds. their feed by the stronger. The quarbedded and occasionally should be diswhen the animals get to rubbing and tar disinfectants will kill lice. open every day that is not stormy. It is harmful, however, for them to remain out in a cold rain. The foal should be taught to lead and to stand tied during the first winter.

Feeds that will promote growth should be supplied. Good, clean clover hay is palatable and slightly laxative. Timothy hay commonly is fed. Well cured alfalfa hay free from dust is one of the best roughages for growing, but because of its relatively high protein content it generally is economical to supplant it with other roughage such as timothy, mixed hay or corn fodder Besides lending variety to the ration such a method of feeding alfalfa would offset any likelihood of kidney or bowel I felt all run down and miserable irregularities. Sheaf oats can be used to advantage to supplant other rough age. The animals should not be allow ed to gorge themselves on dry feed. They should be given only what they will clean up readily, but at the same time enough feed should be supplied. Oats, corn and peas, preferably fed ground, are suitable grains. Bran, oil meal or gluten feed will add protein and lend variety. Cottonseed meal should not be fed to foals. Appropriate grain rations for the first winter are: Two parts corn, five parts oats. three parts bran and one part oil meal. or four parts oats, one part corn and one part bran

> Silage should not be fed to foals to any considerable extent. Sliced roots, such as carrots and sugar beets, are very palatable and have a cooling effect on the digestive system. The quantity of feed generally should be regulated by the appetite, although occasionally the appetite may be too ray. enous to be a good indication. The general condition of the colt and the droppings should be observed daily I'sually not over a pound of grain per hundred pounds of live weight should be fed until the animal is two years old. A liberal supply of salt and good water and plenty of fresh air and exercise are essential for the proper development of young horses. Idleness succeeding exercise will cause constipation. It is often said that a horse is made during his first winter. Certainly this is a critical time in the animal's life, and at no other age will proper feed and attention do as much to make of him a good horse. If stunt ed during the first winter be never wil gain proper size and shape.

Change Horse's Diet.

If a work horse loses its appetite it must not be assumed that it has ac quired some serious disease. It probably has been kept on a too steady diet of one kind of food. The diet must be changed, and if an improvement is not noted quickly it is evidence that the animal needs both a purgative and a tonic. A tablespoonful of aniseed in the feed is an excellent tonic, as it sweetens the stomach and stimulates the appetite.

Feeding the Calf.

At first the calf is fed whole milk the quantity being gradually increased Fkimmilk is substituted as soon as practicable and, if cheap, is continued antil the calf is six months old. Ordinarily the maximum quantity of skim milk that can be fed economically is wenty pounds a day. When the calf is two weeks old grain and bright. clean hay should be offered. The quanity fed should be increased as the alf's appetite demands.

Keep Milk Utensils Clean.

Don't forget to use plenty of boiling water for scalding the vessels used in the care of milk. Keep all chemicals away from the milk. It should never be "preserved." It must not be adulperated.

FIGHTING HOPPERS.

Trapping and the Use of Peisoned Bait Most Effective Methods.

The eggs of grasshoppers are deposited in the ground or in the crowns of plants, such as alfalfa, in the drier regions. Where cultivating implements can be used the ground containing eggs should be thoroughly plowed or disked and harrowed in the fall, as these operations prevent the eggs from DR. J. S. The hopperdozer cannot be used on uneven, stony or recently cleared land nor in meadows or fields of grain where the crops have reached a considerable height. Even where grasshoppers escape being killed.

bran bait has proved to be a simple reliable and cheap method of destroy ing grasshoppers. This balt is pre pared as follows:

Wheat bran, twenty-five pounds; paris green, one pound, or white arsen ic, one pound; six finely chopped lemons or oranges; low grade molasses such as refuse from sugar factories or cattle molasses, known as "black strap," two quarts; water, three to four gallons. The bran and paris green or other arsenical are mixed thoroughly while dry, then the fruits are chopped finely and added, and lastly the dilut ed molasses is poured over the balt and the whole thoroughly kneaded. A coarse flaked bran is most desirable although where this cannot be obtained easily ordinary middlings or alfalfa meal may be substituted. A low grade. strong smelling sirup or molasses how ever, is essential to success.

Better Gains.

It is not claimed by expert stockmen that pure bred cattle will eat less feed than scrubs, but it is claimed that they make much better and quicker gains from what they do eat.

Cows Like Peas. Cows are very foud of cowpeas or so beans, and these feeds supply protein.

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

JAIL HORRORS

When Imprisonment For Debt Was the Law of the Land.

TORTURE FOR ITS VICTIMS.

Poor Wretches Unable to Pay the Trifle They Owed Were Flung Into Prison to Starve to Death Unless Resoued by Charity or Their Creditors.

In the early part of the last century there was started an earnest effort to entirely abolish or at least to regulate the old colony law of imprisonment for debt. The movers in this abolishment felt that no class of the commu-

nity deserved consideration more. It had been the inhuman rule that for the smallest debt possible to contract, though it were but a cent in value, the body of the debtor, whether the creditor and cast into jail.

Each year poor wretches had been dragged to prison by thousands on what were truly called "spite actions." Once behind the prison walls they were

consigned to a fate harder than that which awaited worse criminals.

Murderers and thieves, forgers and counterfeiters, real criminals of all kinds, were fed, clothed and cared for at the expense of the state, but for the unhappy man whose only offense was his inability to pay a triffing sum of a few cents no such provision was made. The food he ate, the shreds that covered him, the medicine he tooknay, the very rags he wrapped about his sores-were provided, if provided at all, by his friends, by the public or by some humane society.

The room in which he was confined with scores of other offenders was utterly without furniture of any sort. In it were neither beds, nor tables, nor chairs, nor so much as a bench or stool. He sat on the floor, ate off the floor and at night lay to sleep on it like a dog, and this misery he endured until he died or his debt was paid or his creditor released him.

Against this at length humanity re volted, and in 1794 a change for the better was ordered. It was stipulated that the inspector should provide fuel and blankets for such debtors as, by reason of their dire property, could not get them and should make an allowance of 7 cents a day for food and charge this against the creditors. If any creditor refused to pay after ten days' notice his debtor was to be dis-

One man remained, it was noted, in the New York jail for three years, who was only indebted to the extent of \$50, before death ended his misery and during the entire time was fed by the Humane society. Another unfortunate had been imprisoned six years and was supported by charity. In the face of such striking evidence the legislature of New York state relented and in 1817 forbade the imprisonment of debtors for sums less than \$25. This led the way, and state after state fol-

When the new states in the west framed their constitutions they ordered that no one should be imprisoned for debt. The old statute was dnally stricken from the laws of the eastern states until today none of our states has a law requiring that a debt is punishable by imprisonment, unless it has been contracted under some fraudulent misrepresentation.-Philadelphia

Cooking the Rooster To Make Flesh Tender

Hang the dressed fowl up for sev eral days before cooking to soften the fibers, but be careful it does not spoil Long, slow cooking in moist heat is best for meat that is likely to be tough The fireless cooker is the best for this. Add one or two tablespoonfuls of vine gar to the water to help soften the fibers. If more rooster meat is on hand than can be used at once and if the supply of cans is not short can the surplus meat by the cold pack method

for winter use. Do not always serve boiled rooster; vary the dish. Mix the meat with crumbs, seasoning and eggs and make 'rooster loaf," similar to meat loaf Make croquettes or chicken pie or jellied chicken. Many good recipes can be found, using either gelatin or the chicken aspic to set the stock for this latter. Make a scalloped dish, using chopped meat, rice and gravy.

In case the roosters have not yet been killed it is best to separate them from the flock and feed them on a mash of ground oats, bran, shorts and tankage moistened with sour milk. This will help soften the flesh.

Blanching Early Celery. Blanching with paper is one of the most satisfactory ways of handling early celery. It gives perfect results with the so called "self blanching" varieties, especially during the warm weather of summer and early fall. It is much cheaper and much easier to handle than are boards, and it permits of much closer planting than is possible when the rows are to be banked with earth. The paper comes in rolls and may be used several times. It is held in place by long wire staples like croquet arches, which reach over the row and are pushed down deep into

ENDLESS CHAIN LETTERS.

The One That Started the Ball Rolling

In This Country. The first of the "endless chain" schemes that have proved such an annovance to postal officials in all countries was launched on June 27, 1898, by a young girl, Natalie Schenck, of Babylon, N. Y. Her project was purely benevolent and was animated by a spirit of patriotism. Desiring to raise a fund for the aid of American soldiers then fighting Spain, she originated the endless chain idea as an adaptation of a scheme that had a vogue in England until it was stopped by act of parliament.

The "chain" was started with four letters written by Miss Schenck to as many girl friends. Each was asked to contribute 10 cents and write four similar letters to other friends. A few days later the Babylon postoffice began to get busy, and as the days went by the postal officials got busier and busier until they were fairly buried under the weight of mail which descended upon them like an avalanche. A hurry call went to Washington for

extra help, and mail was delivered to

Miss Schenck by the truck load. Now

that young lady began to feel the effects of the scheme. Her home was littered from cellar to garret with letters, letters and more letters, all containing dimes. Before the thing died out of its own accord she had received more than a quarter of a million dimes. Fakers all over the world heard of it, and, as fakers will, they immediately got busy. Hundreds of thousands of people were swindled out of money in this manner until the postal authorities put an end to it. The famous endless chain prayer, which threatens endless punishment to any person who

breaks it, has been one of the hardiest

survivors of all.-New York World.

Game and Fish Laws. State of New Mexico

OPEN SEASONS

Deer, with horns (horns to accompany carcass at all times), limit one deer, during open season. North of thirty-fifth parallel of North latitude, from October 16th to November 5th of each year. And south of said thirty-fifth parallel from October 25th to November 25th of each year.

Squirrel, Tassel-eared gray Squirrels, from June 1st to November 30th of each year.

Grouse, from September 16th Perch. to November 25th of each year. Limit, 5 grouse in one calendar

any one calenadr day.

September 30th, of each year. Limit, 20 in possession in one calendar day. Fish; Trout, Large and small Mouth Bass, Crappie and Ring Perch, from June 1st to November 25th of each year. Limit; Trout, 10 pounds in possession in one calender day; size limit, 6 inches; Bass, 15 pounds in one calendar day; size limit, 7 inches; Crappie, 10 pounds in possession in one calendar day.

The presence of any person in any open field, prairie or forest, whether enclosed or not, with traps, gun or other weapon for hunting, without hav ing in his possession a proper hunting license as, herein provided, shall be prima facie evidence of the violation of this section. Hunting licenses shall be issued by the county clerks when duly authorized by the State Game and Fish Warden, and such deputies as may be designated for that purpose by the state game and fish warden. None of the provisions of this act shall require any resident of this state to obtain or have license to fish for trout.
