





ment station by selecting seed in the fall from standing corn. The best ears grown under average conditions of stand and fertility can be picked out by such field selection. A good ear chosen at husking time or from the crib may owe its excellence to especially fertile soil or to the fact that only one stalk grew in the hill. An ear equally good, but grown on average soil and with three stalks in a

hill, will likely yield more when planted the next year. Such an ear may be marked in the field by a little paint or a string and then separated from the others at husking time. Corn left in a crib over winter is fre-

quently injured by weather conditions and germinates poorly the next spring.

DISINFECT STABLES.

Thorough Cleanup Checks Cattle Diseases and Dairy Herd Losses. Disinfecting dairy stables checks contagious and infectious cattle diseases. A thorough cleanup followed by disinfection about twice a year with a coal tar disinfectant is recommended by the Ohio experiment station.

Calf diseases have been lessened in the dairy herd at the experiment station by disinfecting the stables each spring and fall. Digestive troubles, particularly white scours, have not been troublesome and fewer deaths in calves have occurred after this practice was adopted. Less garget in cows has been evident. The same treatment will help to hold in check tuberculosis and contagious abortion in berds where these diseases are prevalent.

Thorough disinfecting is urged to kill all disease germs in every possible lurking place. Mangers, stalls and floors need special attention. Coal tar dips are used at the experiment station. After disinfection the stables are whitewashed.

MANURE VALUABLE.

Can Replace Effectively the Costly Commercial Fertilizers.

Can barnyard manure be worth \$8 to \$9 a ton for use on farm crops? At present prices for commercial fertilizers it has had this value in tests conducted by the Ohio agricultural experiment station.

Eight tons of manure re-enforced with 320 pounds of acid phosphate have been as effective in increasing crop yields as the same quantity of acid phosphate mixed with 480 pounds of nitrate of soda and 260 pounds of muriate of potash in tests covering twenty-years at the experiment station at Wooster.

Nitrate of soda now costs nearly 4 cents a pound and muriate of potash 20 cents. At such prices the eight tons of manure has had a replacement value of at least \$70.

There are numerous devices to be used as holders for ground grains. Some are good, others fair and some worthless. While good hoppers help in preventing waste, dry feed can be satisfactorily supplied in a variety of ways and no special machinery is necessary. The main points to observe are accessibility and as great cleanlyness as can reasonably be secured and to avoid waste.

Poultry, however, is in many ways less fastidious than people, and a good deal of time and labor are spent in providing unnecessary refinements for unappreciative fowls. Where rats are in numbers they will get more of the feed than where the old style of feed ing is carried out. The remedy for this loss is more cats and hoppers and as near rat proof as can be devised.

The saving of labor where dry feeding is practiced is enough in itself to make reasonable profits where before the balance was on the wrong side of the ledger. Filling the hoppers may be done once or twice a week. The only limit on the amount supplied at one filling is the capacity of the holder Such whole grain as is fed may be scattered morning and night, although there are poultry raisers who hopper feed grain. 

Shark fishing is an important indus try at Aden, Arabia. The poorer this fish for their only taste of sea food. Some of the meat is dried and preserved in salt. The fins and maws are shipped to China, and the livers produce an oil that is used for a varnish on boats.

The Arab in his primitive boat, or dhow, a flat bottomed craft of some 150 tons burden, finds his best fishing grounds between Aden and Shukra during the cool months from October to March. He uses both nets and hooks. Fishing is sometimes done from a small boat, but this is dangerous, as a large fish occasionally overcome the prey of other sharks.

Small sharks are sold in the Aden fish bazaar for about half the price of other edible fish. Fresh shark meat is very strong, and one must develop a taste for it to enjoy it.





Fried or Baked, They Are a Delicious

and Nourishing Food. Americans already eat millions of bananas a year as raw fruit, but our capacity would be much larger, according to the food economists, if we would use it more extensively as a cooked food. There are many ways of cooking bananas, and in most of the lands where they grow fried and stewed bananas are staple articles of diet.

The banana contains as large a persugar) as does the potato and nearly the same proportions of other constit-It is not a perfect substitute for the potato, but very near it.

Most American housewives do not know how to cook bananas. For fried bananas peel and split them, dip each half into well beaten egg, then into fine breadcrumbs and fry in hot oil. More digestible are baked bananas.

Bananas may be baked whole, one side of the skin being stripped back in this case, or they may be peeled and cut in halves. The fruit should be put in a baking pan, sprinkled with cinnamon. a half cupful of sugar, a pinch of salt and tiny bits of butter. Pour into the pan a half cupful of water and baste frequently while baking in a quick oven. Lemon juice may be substituted for cinnamon, making it into a sirup before baking, then pouring over the fruit when placed in the oven. Apples may be baked with the peeled bananas. and the combination is delicious.






