Mr. Davis was one of several people who applied for the job by taking a Civil Service test recently. Mr. Davis' appointment came through regular Civil Service channels upon recommendation of Representative Walter Rogers.

He will replace Mrs. Tina Rawlings, who has held the post since the resignation of permanent postmaster Thomas Bice.

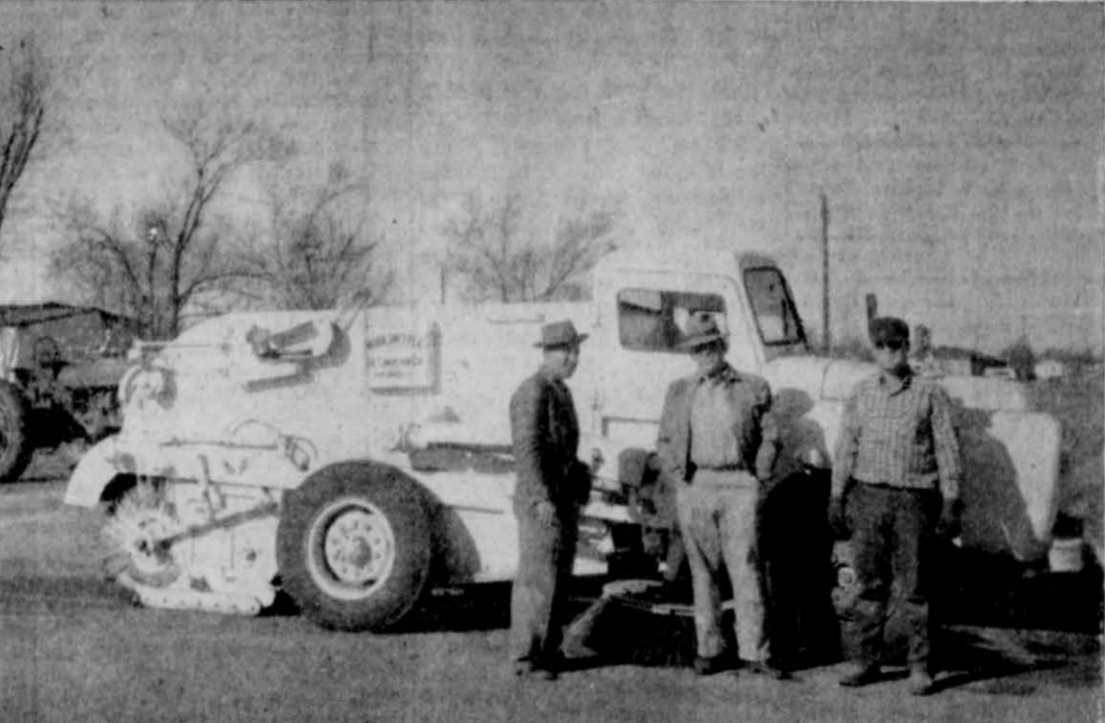
Mr. Davis, who is 49 years old, has been farming 12 miles west of Dimmitt for the past six years. He moved here from Hale County where he lived for twenty-four years. A member of the Baptist Church, he graduated from Olustee, Oklahoma High School in 1930 and spent two and a half years in the Navy during World War II.

"This won't be the first time for me to work for a salary," Mr. Davis said in an interview Thursday. "I have also worked for several lumber yards, a cotton gin and have done custom combining."

Mr. Davis also worked on several defense construction jobs before joining the Navy. Mr. and Mrs. Davis live at 1001 West Lee and they have two daughters, Linda, 13, and Elaine, 10.

"I'm sure there will be many problems at first until I learn the job and fit in with the other employees," Mr. Davis said. "But I plan to be as efficient and capable as the job as possible and will do everything in my power to render the best service I can right from the start. I will certainly appreciate any cooperation the general public can give me until I can get squared away."

Mr. Davis does not know when or if he will be named permanent postmaster.

## Dimmitt Schools Big Business

Public Schools Week is being light was Public Schools Week is observed in Dimmitt and the highlight was a well-attended open house and science fair Tuesday evening.

Castro County's public schools represent a tremendous investment and are the leading industries of the area.

Dimmitt's Public School system for instance, has an operating budget of \$4,309,555 for this year. With an enrollment of 1,416 students, this means that educating local youngsters costs about \$327.10 each year. This means that a child's public education, through twelve grades, comes to \$3,925.20 meaning that schooling is a big investment not only for parents but for all taxpayers.

The local school system has 71 colored children plus a white enrollment of 665 in grade school, 450 in junior high, and 227 in high school.

Much of community life is built around the school system. The athletic department draws larger crowds through its football and basketball activities than any other single activity during the year. Other activities such as choir, band, drama, P-TA, the science fair, and others bring parents and the general public in close contact with the school during the year.

Students have a generally improving curriculum to choose from in the Dimmitt system. In what started out many years ago as reading, riting, and arithmetic, has evolved into a list of such varied courses as English, math, science, vocational training, business courses, dramatics, history, civics, foreign language, driver education, music, sports, physical education and band.

Administratively, the school system is governed by a school board elected periodically by the voters of the school district. This school board is made up of M. E. Cleavenger, president; Jim Elder, vice president; R. E. Hendrix, secretary; and members Ward Golden, H. C. Nelson, J. G. Davis, and James Bradford. To carry out their decisions are Superintendent Paul Hillburn, who is in charge of the entire system; Alvis Fuquay, high school principal; Bill Reisdorph, Junior High School principal; and Mrs. Helen Richardson, grade school principal. They have supervision over sixty-four teachers throughout the system.

Half of the cost of conducting school comes from local taxes and the other half comes from the state. Local taxes account for \$241,000; county sources for \$509; the state for \$218,550 and the National Defense Act for \$3,000.

Transporting students to and from school costs \$30,000 a year and operation of the physical plant runs to \$30,112 a year. Maintenance costs are \$8,548 this year.

Just keeping the big buildings clean and functioning requires the work of seven full-time custodians.

In charge of collecting the vast county taxes is Mrs. Shirley Stephens. As of February 1 her collections were \$231,594.50 for the year with delinquency accounts in the amount of \$2,559.31 for a collection percentage of 94.3 percent.

For this investment Dimmitt gets education and economic opportunity for its children. The values of education are not measured in the dollars and cents it costs. However, one week is set aside each year to encourage the general public to pay particular attention to the schools of the state and their problems. These figures are presented so the people of Dimmitt can get an idea of the complexity and size of the local school system and how much it contributes to the economical and cultural values of the community.

## George Bradford Files for Mayor

The name of only one person had been submitted for the post of mayor of Dimmitt by the deadline Saturday. The candidate will be George Bradford, local gin operator and cotton buyer. Present Mayor Buddy Birdwell will not seek re-election. The election will be held April 4th. Mr. Bradford reportedly consented to permit his name to be placed on the ballot when it became apparent no one was planning to file for the office.

## 'Cats Second in State

For the second time in a row the Dimmitt Bobcats came away from Gregory Gymnasium in Austin as state place class AA team in the state Saturday evening.

An estimated 7,500 sweltering, jam-packed and partisan fans saw the Buna Cougars roll majestically over the desperate Bobcats to the conclusive tune of 60-36. It was by far the soundest beating the Bobcats have taken all year and it was done by probably the best team in the tournament.

Dimmitt's Bobcats worked hard against the mighty Cougars, but they never could click and Buna could make no mistakes. Scores of people made the trip to Austin to see the Bobcats trounce Needville Thursday night and get trounced by Buna Saturday night.

The Buna team used a full court press from the opening jump and never trailed. The Bobcats started out trailing six and eight points but after the game got into the second half it was well apparent they were going to improve their 42-0 record at Dimmitt's expense.

It was a sad turn of events for the Bobcats, who lost their chance for the state championship last year in a similar game against Linden-Kildare, who was also undefeated.

Buna ended the season the only undefeated and untied team in the interscholastic League.

Junior Coffey, Dimmitt's all-state forward, accounted for 19 of Dimmitt's 36 points — although he was often two-teamed by Buna. Coffey kept Dimmitt in the game with his free-throws. He was uncannily accurate as he sacked free throw after free throw. His score for the evening was six for seven. Dimmitt made only three field goals during the first two quarters.

Dimmitt's defense was hurt because they could not concentrate effectively on two or three Buna men because all the Cougars were capable field goalers. James Burke made 19, Melvin Ellison 10, B. Kirkpatrick 7, Glen Stanell 13, and John Hatch 4 for the Cougars. Dimmitt scoring was Kelton Calves 3, Junior Coffey 19, Mike Calvert 9, and Jim Ratcliff 5.

The scores by quarters ran like this: 14-6 at the end of the first; 23-14 at the end of the second; 41-25 at the end of the third and 60-36 at game's end. Buna led all the way.

The Cougars began pulling away gradually during the second half despite feverish playing by the Bobcats. Their rebounding strength they reclaimed 41 to 15 for Dimmitt — was probably the key to the game for Dimmitt lost the ball nearly every time they attempted a field goal and failed to score.

This game was the swan song for Junior Coffey, who is presently being wooed by half a dozen colleges. The fabulous young Negro athlete made both the basketball and football all-state teams and has received many bids to continue his sports career in college. He is an "A" student and is planning to study medicine. The 18-year-old son of a local farm laborer will need an athletic scholarship to attend college.

The other Dimmitt Bobcats will be back next year. Kelton Calves and Gene Bradley are juniors and Mike Calvert and Jim Ratcliff are sophomores.

## High Taxes of Today Started At Slow Pace

T. E. Harrison of Taylor-Harrison Insurance Agency, has been processing income tax returns for other people for a long time and has seen numerous changes come about.

For instance, the income tax on the average family farmer in 1937 was about 4 percent as compared to about 20 percent today. "Taxes back then were hard enough for most people to pay," Harrison says, "but they didn't take near the percentage of gross income that they do today."

Instead of a \$600 personal exemption as is the case now, this exemption was \$1,250 in 1937. "At that time a good salary was \$100 a month," Harrison continued. "So most wage earners didn't even have to pay an income tax." In 1937 a man with a net income of \$3,000 with two exemptions paid \$7.64 in income taxes. The same man with the same situation under today's tax schedule pays \$805.00 to Uncle Sam.

"Farm net profit was a lot higher then, too," Harrison continued. "Not only did he pay a lot less in taxes, but he made a lot higher percentage return on his investment. A farmer then could net \$3,000 out of a \$4,000 gross on his dryland farm. The same man now makes considerably more — both net and gross — but his profits are a considerably smaller percentage of his gross."

## City Commission Makes Lobbying Trip to Austin

City manager E. B. Noble, and city commissioners Joe Benson and Glenn Ratcliff were accompanied by Bob McLean to Austin last week end where they contacted area state senators and representatives regarding legislation concerning Texas municipalities.

The group traveled to Austin in the city's new Chevrolet sedan Thursday and returned Sunday. "Representatives from city governments all over the state have been going to Austin to try to stop or change legislation that would increase the cost of city government," Noble said. "We figure our trip down there was a good investment. If we can help halt or change one or two proposals before the legislature that would cost the city taxpayers a thousand dollars a year or more we feel it would be time well spent."

Noble cited two proposals concerning firemen that the city is concerned about. One would allow firemen to call a public referendum vote for wage increases, circumventing the city commission. There would be no limit to the number of elections. This wouldn't affect Dimmitt now but could someday, Noble indicated, and it would be setting a dangerous precedent because the city commission must be left free to conduct all of the city's business. Another proposal, to create a Fireman's relief and pension fund, would cost Dimmitt \$31,022 over a 25 year period. "We think the firemen ought to have a relief and pension fund," Noble said, "but we can't stand the cost. There has to be another way of doing it. This proposal will cost us well over \$1,000 a year if it passes."

They also worked against a measure allowing anyone to appeal a city commission decision without having the reason for the commission's decision brought before the higher appellate court.

They encouraged legislators to vote for a measure which would extend city jurisdiction over health and construction matters to one-half mile past the city limits to cut down on eventual sub-standard construction and health standards being annexed to the city.

Another measure the commission was against was guaranteeing time and a half for overtime for city employees. "We pay as much as we can," Noble said, "and we'll do as well by our men as possible in the future, but we don't want the state telling us how much to pay."

## ASC Reminds Farmers of Grain Forms

County grain sorghum farmers were urged this week to get their Feed Grain Survey forms filled out as quickly as possible by Charley Hill, secretary of the local ASC.

"We need to secure the corn and grain sorghum history acreage for the establishment of farm feed grain base acreages on farms on which such grains were produced in 1959 and 1960," he said.

"All producers are urged to call at the Castro County ASC office no later than March 15th and give us this information about their farm," he said. "We must have your complete cooperation in order to secure this information by the March 15th date. We do not know the final provisions of any feed grains program which may be enacted but feel that not only is it necessary, it is important to each farmer that this information be reported promptly and accurately."

"We will have records of the cotton and wheat acreages on the farm, but you can assist us immensely by preparing a list of the acreages of all other crops or land uses on the farm in each of these years. It will be necessary that we account for all the cropland on your farm," he continued.

"This is an extremely rushed job, but we know that we can count upon the complete cooperation of Castro County farmers," the secretary said.

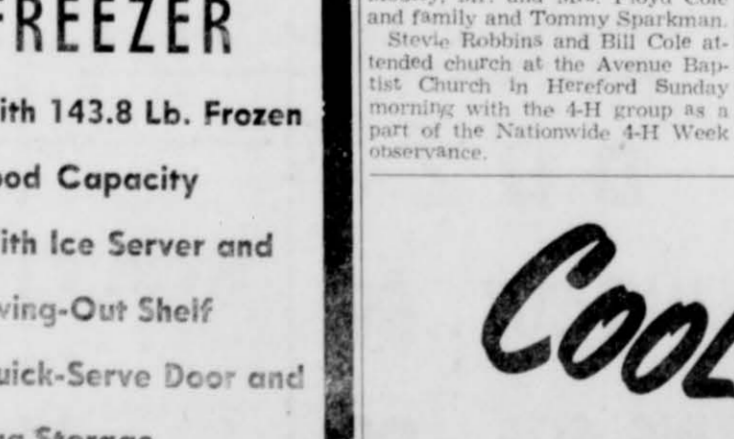

### THE PRESS BATTLES for its Freedom

Pat Zenger was arrested "for printing and publishing several seditious libels dispersed over his journals or newspapers."  
 Zenger was a New York printer in the days when the colony's Governor Cosby had an autocratic overbearing manner. Several seditious citizens started a newspaper to expose the public against his tyranny. Zenger was thrown into prison, and his bail was set at \$500 pounds, a large sum for those days and size beyond his ability to furnish. He stayed in jail for months, and his situation appeared hopeless. The case finally was called to the attention of Andrew Hamilton, a distinguished Pennsylvania lawyer, who took up Zenger's case as a public service. Hamilton forced the case to trial by sending a speech to the jury, which led to Zenger's acquittal. It is a ringing statement of what the press in America must still vigilantly fight for.

All men have the right, Hamilton maintained, "publicly to retrace the abuse of power... and to assert with courage the reason they have of the press are counter to law. Nevertheless, even today the press must be constantly kept that freedom intact."

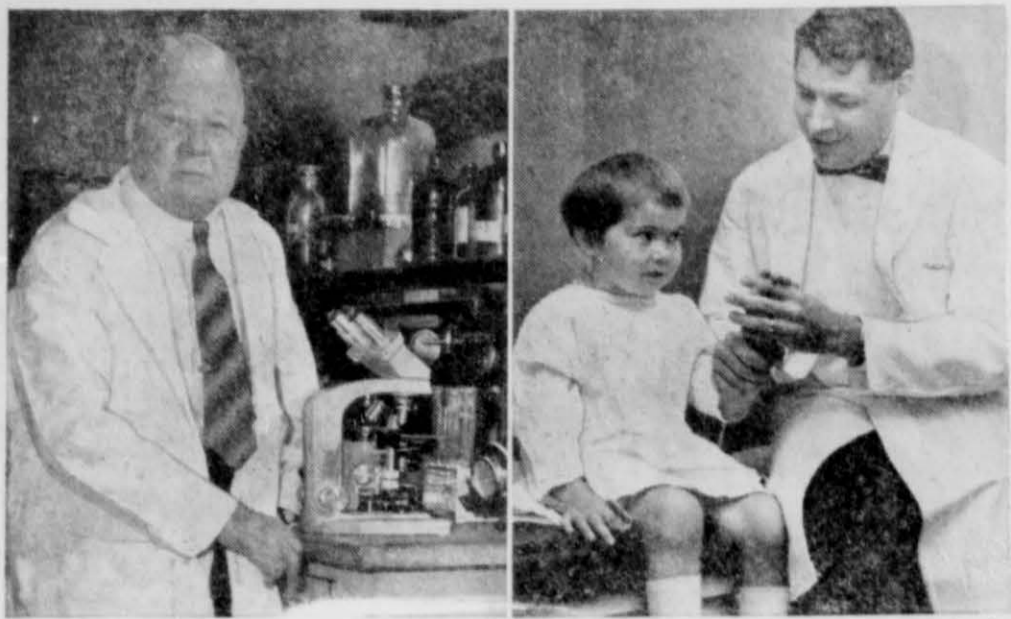

### Texas Gets 84% of March of Dimes Funds



**THE FIGHT AGAINST CRIPPLING** goes forward on many fronts with funds raised through the March of Dimes. The scientist in the laboratory seeks answers as the slides under a powerful microscope. NEW YORK, N. Y.—The state of Texas has been the principal beneficiary in the allocation of March of Dimes funds raised in the state over the past 23 years, it was disclosed today in a financial summary prepared by The National Foundation.

More than 84 cents of every dollar from Texas' March of Dimes has been put to use in aiding the state's disease victims and in research and education projects conducted by Texas institutions. Of the remaining 16 per cent accruing to the national headquarters, a large portion also has come back to Texas in shipments of polio vaccine and gamma globulin and in other nationwide services conducted by The National Foundation.

The summary covers the period since the first March of Dimes was held in January,

1938, and compares the net total of funds raised in the state with amounts made available to Texas through September 30, 1960.

In this period, Texas chapters of the March of Dimes organization raised a net total of \$26,255,310.50 at an average fund-raising cost of less than 7 per cent. Of this amount, \$20,878,742.57 has been available to the county chapters in carrying out their extensive patient aid programs, including advances of \$8,592,351.71 from the national office to meet local emergency situations.

In addition, 65 grants totaling \$2,946,584.11 have been made in support of research and professional education projects at Texas institutions. Principal beneficiaries of these grants have been: Baylor University, \$1,748,928.28; Jefferson Davis Hospital, \$654,797.54; University of Texas, \$332,781.57 and the Texas Institute for Rehabilitation and Research, \$162,179.85. The latter institution also has benefited to the extent of \$1,514,672.42 from

those grants made to Baylor University and Jefferson Davis Hospital.

Over and above the 84 per cent used by institutions and county chapters in the state, The National Foundation has financed within the state projects such as the historic field trials which proved the effectiveness of the Salk vaccine, epidemiological studies and scholarship and fellowship grants to Texas residents. National headquarters' expenditures for the vaccine trials in Texas amounted to \$359,728.07. In addition, the national office has sent into Texas \$291,718.84 worth of Salk vaccine and 654,924 cc's of gamma globulin in support of its polio prevention programs.

Two years ago, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis changed its name to The National Foundation in expanding its areas of interest beyond polio to include birth defects and arthritis, using the scientific knowledge and experience gained in the fight against polio.

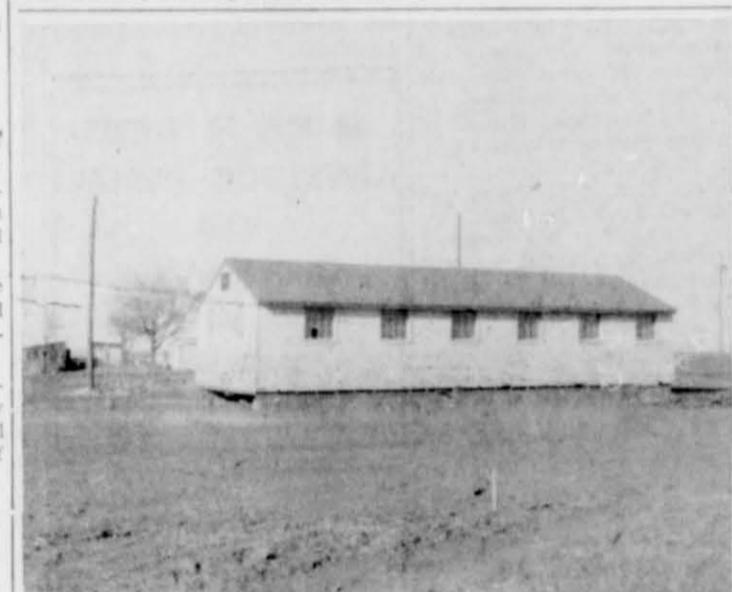
### Sammye Moore Finishes Clinical Training
