Inquiries received at the Nu-Mex offices show the results of the articles appearing in various sections of the country. Not a day passes but some representative of oil interests outside the state drives into Portales looking into the local situation.

The developments in the Eastern tier of counties are receiving particular attention at this time on account of the phenominal gas showings near Amarillo. People in that city have gone wild with excitement. Stocks in Amarillo companies have yielded profits that rival those of Burkburnett and Ranger. One stock jumped from \$10 to \$1000 per share in 48 hours after the last gas well

Action of greatest importance to the state of Arizona was taken by the State Land Board at their meeting in Phoenix. At the suggestion of the forest service the board voted to relinguish to the federal government all state school lands within the various forest reserves that are suitable for agriculture, so as to allow the government to have them entered upon and improved as homesteads. The total amount of land to be relinquished is 6,322 acres located in six different forest reserves, and is at present administered by the forest service and not by the State Land Department,





Where insect powder is used, it should be applied three or four times a year, or oftener if the fowls become infested with lice. Provide a small box in the house, partly filled with dry road dust or fine dirt, in which the hens may dust themselves, thus helping to keep them free from

The army worm feeds by preference upon grasses, both wild and cultivated; next, upon the grasslike grains, such as millet, which suffer severely in outbreaks. Killing Worms in Furrows. It is the massing together of the caterpillars which gives to the farmer the chance of destroying them in great numbers. Furrows or ditches are plowed or dug completely around the infested area, or directly across the path of the advancing borde. In attempting to cross such ditches the worms fall into them, and can easily be destroyed by crushing them with a log dragged back and forth through the ditch or furrow. If shallow post holes are sunk in the bottom of the stay. ditch at intervals of about 20 feet, the worms will crawl along the ditch bottoms and fall into the holes, where they may be destroyed by crushing or other means. Spray infested grass or other vege tation not intended for forage purposes with a mixture of 1 pound of paris green to 50 gallons of water. Do not use the sprayed grass or vegetation for forage.

Spray growing grasses and other forage crops intended for use at a considerably later date with a solution of 1 pound of arsenate of lead (powder form) in 50 gallons of water, or 2 pounds of arsenate of lead (paste form) in 50 gallons of water.

When corn is infested, spray with one of the following mixtures: Arsenate of lead (powder form) 2 pounds, or 4 pounds of the paste form, in 50 gallons of water; or 1 pound of paris green and 2 pounds of freshly blaked lime in 50 gallons of water.

Scatter poisoned balt broadcast over infested fields. Take 50 pounds of bran and mix thoroughly with it either 1 pound of paris green or crude arsenic, then add 2 gallons of lowgrade molasses diluted with from 3 to 4 gallons of water, and 6 finely chopped lemons. This is especially recommended for fields containing mixtures of grass and cowpeas, cowpeas and sorghum, or fields in which grass has been consumed by the caterpillars.

Do not pasture stock in fields where the grass or other crops have been sprayed with a poison mixture until after heavy rains have fallen, and not before three weeks after the application of the insecticides.

SANDWICH FILLING OF VARIOUS KINDS.

A sandwich may be filled with meat, hicken or fish, making a sandwich which is in itself

a meal, or filled with sweets, a dessert or a dainty to serve with a cup of tea or a glass of cooling beverage. Cold meat but through the meat

chopper, with a sweet pickle or two and bound together with a salad dressing, makes a good sandwich and one in which leftovers may be used without remarks from the family.

Veal and Tongue Sandwiches .-- Put the Veal and tongue through the meat chopper and moisten with a small amount of soup stock; season with paprika and nutmeg. Spread on buttered bread after chilling the meat. Any kind of meat, minced or sliced, mixed with various seasonings such as capers, pickles, nuts or olives will make, with a little ingenuity of the cook, a countless number of good and appetizing sandwiches.

Thinly sliced radishes, cucumbers, onions, chopped green peppers and lettuce make most tasty sandwich fillings.

Olives, either stuffed, green or ripe, may be mixed with nuts and boiled dressing, or added to cream cheese or to cottage cheese.

Cottage cheese with chopped candled cherries (or cream cheese is richer), makes a most tasty sandwich for a sweet sandwich.

Chopped celery and cheese (the American) and Roquefort are all good as filling.

A club sandwich is enjoyed by the men prepared as follows: Place a slice of tomato with salad dressing on a buttered slice of rye bread, add a layer of cream cheese mixed with chopped nuts, then top with a slice of rye bread.

Chopped hard-cooked egg mixed with butter, a pinch of mustard, salt and pepper makes a most appetizing sand-

A Health-Bringer!

Make your morning ce-real dish a strangthener.

There is nothing that takes the place of good vegetables for hot weather dishes;

they rank with fruit in importance. A healthy diet must include vegetables, for they not only build up the bones and teeth but supple built but supply bulk,

which is an essential to intestinal movement: their chief value is in their mineral salts, which are needed to make good blood and produce changes in the body cells which are necessary to keep the body young and supple.

A rule which has no exceptions, is to cook vegetables in boiling water and most liquors should be saved for soups or to serve as a sauce with the vegetable; the liquor from beets is one to except.

String beans served with a bitter sauce or in a rich cream sauce are delicious, but for variety cook them two to three hours with a quarter of a pound of salt pork or a few slices of bacon if preferred. Cook down with the saucepan uncovered until the moisture is nearly all absorbed and evaporated, then add a tablespoonful or two of vinegar, salt if needed, and a dash of cayenne.

Creamed Onions and Tops .-- Take finger-sized onions, cut, leaving a three-inch stem, cook until tender and serve in white sauce on toast as asparagus is served. Young beets, tops and all, are very good served as a vegetable. Cook them until tender, chop or cut up in coarse bits and serve with butter and vinegar. The secret of savoriness in vegetables is care in seasoning. Do not always serve the same dish with the same seasonings.

When teaching a child to like a certain kind of vegetable make it as attractive as possible in appearance, and go farther to avoid disappointment; make it so tasty that no further uging is necessary.

Such vegetables as tender green peas should be cooked in as little water as possible, not to lose the good flavor. For this reason steaming is an economical method to use. The French cook peas in lettuce leaves in the top of the steamer; the lettuce is served as greens, making a most tasty dish. Serve with butter and a dash of vinegar.

Salads of various kinds, using both vegetables and fruits, are most uc ceptable hot weather dishes.

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


