One of the saddest accidents which has occurred in Roosevelt county for many years took place last Tuesday morning at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Smith, who live some twenty miles northwest of Portales, when Mr. Smith accidentally shot and killed his little eleven year old son, Andrew. Mr. and Mrs. Smith had arose rather later than usual and Mrs. Smith went to the lot to milk while Mr. Smith built a fire to prepare breakfast. The children had been in the habit of sleeping on a bed in the yard which was partly covered by a tree and vines but the evening before the smallest child became ill and the father had taken him in the house and thought that the older boy had followed, as had been the custom. While Mrs. Smith was milking she noticed a strange dog about the lot and when she scared the dog away he ran toward the house and Mr. Smith thinking he would give him a little scare to keep him away, shot toward the dog which ran around the bed in the yard. "Watchful Waiting" Can't Go On Forever, If Mexican Outrages Against Americans Continue.

NEAR AN END

Washington.-The first definite policy in dealing with Mexico was

Carranza has been warned that if the murders and outrages of Amerms continue, the United States "may be forced to adopt a radical change in its policy with regard to Mexico."

With the announcement at the state epartment, however, came no author-**Rative** indication of how far the Amerlean government is preparing to go to enforce what lacks only the diplomatic technicalities of an ultimatum.

The text of the American note and the reply from the Mexican government which was dated July 28, were given out by the state department, without explanation for the delay in making them public. The department's statement follows:


"In view of the long series of murders and outrages of American citizens in Mexico, culminating in the murder of Peter Catron in San Luis Potasi last month, and the perpetration of other acts in disregard of American lives and property, the American embassy at Mexico City on July 22, by direction of the secretary of state made the following representations to the Mexican government:

" 'Mexico City, July 22, 1919. 'Sir: With reference to the embassy's note dated July 16, 1919, relative to the murder of Peter Catron, near Valles, San Luis Potosi, on or about July 7, last, I have the honor to inform you that I am now under telegraphic instructions from my government to arge upon the Mexican government the capture and punishment of those responsible for this murder, and the adoption of adequate measures to prevent a recurrence of the murder of American citizens.

"I am also instructed to state that should the lives of American citizens continue to remain unsafe and these murders continue by reason of the unwillingness or inability of the Mexican government to afford adequate protection my government may be forced to adopt a radical change in its policy with regard to Mexico.

"Accept, sir, the renewed assurances of my highest consideration. "GEORGE T. SUMMERLIN.

One of his very earliest gifts, as far back as 1891, was the Carnegie music hall in New York, at a cost of \$2,000,000, and as president of the New York Philharmonic society he spent his money liberally in furthering its ideals. 

Made Efficient Citizen By New Plan,

Washington,-Demobilization of the army "so far as combatant troops are concerned," will be completed the last of October, Secretary Baker announced. Many men now in the army, it was explained, will be retained to care for large stores of equipment remaining on hand.

Mr. Baker announced some time ago that the army would be reduced to the peace-time strength provided in the national defense act by September 30. At that time, however, there still will remain in the army a number of men enlisted for the emergency. These will be released as rapidly as they can be replaced by volunteers.

"I fear that in the days before the war, we had fallen to the habit of taking the regular army for granted," Mr. Baker said. "We had lost sight of the tremendous potential value of the army as an educational institution for training young men to become not only finished soldirs, but citizens able to earn more and be more. The whole new program of helping the soldier to become a more efficient and useful citizen will now be put into play."

COMING EVENTS. Arisons State Fair-Nov. 3 to 5, 1919.

Exploration of the large, low-grade ore body opened up on the 1,100-foot level of the Verde Combination recently at Jerome, Ariz., is developing a much better grade of ore, which is steadily improving in value with depth. The ledge cut is now fifteen feet in width, and widening out.

"The Livestock Squad" sent over Arizona by the Agricultural Extension Service have experts on poisonous plants of the range grasses, browse and grazing, livestock breeding, animal parasites, livestock diseases, silos and livestock feeds, and many other livestock subjects. Twenty public meetings are being held.

One of the largest mining deals completed in Arizona since the war broke out was consummated at Phoenix, when thirty-two claims of the "Daggs group" about a mile from Superior, Arizona, being sold to a syndicate of about forty New York and Philadelphia men, headed by C. C. Steinbrenner of New York.

In the presence of a crowd of thousands of people from all parts of New Mexico which packed the state house grounds at Santa Fé, N. M., Maj. Gen-Leonard Wood, U. S. A., was presented, on behalf of the state, with a medal in recognition of his services to the country during the great war. The presentation speect. was made by Maj. W. H. H. Llewellyn, who served under General Wood as a Rough Rider in the Spanish-American war, members of this historic organization being present in force at the ceremonies.

In Union county, N. M., all phases of county club work are being presented try as well. This county now boasts largest calf clubs in the world. To sup-100 head of high grade and registered Holstein calves and about fifty head of Jersey calves have been brought into the county. Club work of this kind is not only interesting to the children but many of the parents are becoming interested and it is believed that through the efforts of the club the county will be well supplied with fine dairy cattle in the next two or three years.

the Carranza government is doing the best it can to cope with conditions in remote and sparsely settled regions still affected by the results of the civil war and suggests that Americans in those remote places, come into populated centers, where they can be protected. Referring to robberies of paymasters of oil companies, the Mexican government declared the oil companies had declined guards for them either on the grounds that the presence of the guards invited attacks by bandits or that the guards misbehaved. Mrs. Carnegie was at her husband's bedside in the last hour of his life, but he did not revive sufficiently to permit of any sign of recognition. Their daughter, Margaret, who last April married Ensign Roswell Miller, of New York, was notified that it was apparent that the illness would be fatal. and she hurried from her home at Millbrook, N. Y., arriving a few minutes after her father had died.

Andrew Carnegie began a race against time when, in 1901, at the age of 65, he resolved to give away his enormous fortune. He held it "disering idle millions. In the comparatively few years which the actuary could allow him, he would disembar rass himself of practically all he had. No man had ever launched a philanthropic campaign of such dimensions. His was then a fortune of just about a quarter billion dollars. To give this stupendous sum away in about half the time he had taken to gather it. was a purpose Carnegie had fairly well sulfilled when death overtook him. He had distributed about \$300,-000.000. It was giving money away at the rate of over \$20,000,000 a year, or more than \$50,000 a day.

His first big gift was the setting aside of \$4,000,000 to supply pensions and relief for the injured and aged employes of his steel plants.

He added an extra million for the support of libraries for his workmen, and took up his library hobby in a wholesale way by giving \$5,200,000 to New York City for the erection of sixty-five branch libraries in the metropolis. Another million he gave for a library in St. Louis.

On libraries alone he spent upwards of \$53,000,000. He gave them to some two thousand English speaking communities throughout the world. mittee.

The letter concludes: "Everything is already prepared for the wedding, including the money which is to be given the said court as agreed." The signature affixed is Ferdinand's famous "Yo, El Rey" ("I, the King").



It is the order of the Board of County Commisioners of Roosevelt County, New Mexico, that a Special Election shall be held in the various precincts of Roosevelt county, on Tuesday, September 16th, 1919, in accordance with House Bill No. 405, Chapter 138 of the 1919 Session Laws; which provides as follows That all Amendments to the Constitution of New Mexico, proposed by the Fourth State Legislature, shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of New Mexico at a Special election to be held on the third Tuesday in September, A. D. 1919. There were three Amendments proposed to the Constitution. Namely: Senate Committee substitute for Senate Joint Resolution No. 5, a Joint Resolution providing for an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, by adding thereto another section of Article VII, the same to be numbered Section 6, (Permitting Soldiers and Sailors to vote when absent from their place of legal residence.) Senate Joint Resolution No. 8 A Senate Joint Resolution provides the amendment of Section 3, of Article XIV and Section 13 of Article XII of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, relative educational and public institutions, (Creating Board of Control of all State Institutions consisting of four members appointed by the Gevernor.)) Committee Substitute for House Joint Resolution No. 30. proposing an amendment of Section 8 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, entitled, "State, County and Municipal Indebtedness (Giving the Legislature power to authorize the issue of bonds and certificates for construction and maintenance of roads and bridges not to exceed \$2,000,000.)

It is just about as reasonable to expose butter to the heat of the midsummer sun and expect it to retain its firm, solid consistency as it is to try to keep apples in an attractive, marketable condition in the storage houses available on many farms. An efficient storage is the grower's insurance against loss; it permits of carrying the fruit in good condition after it is removed from the orchard and previous to the time when it is consigned to commercial storage. Common storage consists of an inexpensive, ventilated house for the storage of apples for the season, utilizing natural ventilators with cold night air instead of refrigeration. Another use of common storage is to furnish temporary housing for the crop so that the apples may be kept under favorable conditions after picking and previous to shipment to market or permanent cold storage. Time was-and not so very remote at that-when common storage for apples was a prerequisite on every farm which boasted much of an orchard, and this applies equally to the eastern

A new interest is developed in common storage for apples, particularly in the eastern states, as well as in other sections of the country, such as the Pacific northwest where about 50 per cent of the apples placed in storage are held through the season in common storage houses.

Better Storage Facilities. It is not to be supposed that common storage for apples can displace the commercial cold storage ware house which offers greatly improved conditions for proper storage. However, the insufficiency of cold storage space during the war period in many of the old apple-growing sections as well as difficulties in handling or moving the crop promptly, emphasized the importance of better facilities for the handling of storage apples, and the new districts planted during recent years are in some cases entirely without commercial storage warehouses. The United States department of agriculture is receiving many inquiries from fruit growers and shippers in all sections of the country relative to the proper construction of suitable apple storages. Federal investigations of the handling and storage of apples, which have been conducted with special reference to the Pacific northwest, have shown that properly insulated storages, provided with the necessary means of ventilation, can be successfully operated, and allow the grower to hold his fruit in prime condition for the market. Care in the operation of these storage houses is just as important as in their construction. The best of storage houses sometimes fail through the carelessness of the owners in neglecting to provide proper ventilation for the building, particularly as regards the provision of ventilators which may be kept open when the temperature conditions outside make it desirable, while the ventilators should be closed tightly whenever the outside temperthe house. The early commercial storage houses were insulated with mill shavings and may die. sawdust, investigations by the federal department demonstrating that these materials are ideally suited for insulation and not so expensive as cardboard and other prepared insulation materials. It is essential to keep all insulation material dry, this being why shavings are preferred to sawdust, as it is difficult to obtain dry sawdust in large quantities. On the other hand, planer-mill shavings made from seasoned lumber require no artificial drying and should be tightly packed in the wall, which must be at least six inches thick. ### Look After the Smoothing Iron.

Another reason for deterioration comes from allowing the picked apples to remain in the orchard or in a warm packing house exposed to daily changes in the temperature, or exposed directly to the sun's heat. As a rule it is not possible to note the serious effects of this exposure at the time the apples are placed in storage, although a heavy loss is sure to occur later when the fruit is treated in this manner.

Apples properly handled and placed in storage promptly may keep in excellent condition from four to six months, while fruit from the same trees may deteriorate quickly in storage due to delay in handling promptly from the tree to the storage house. From the storage standpoint one of the most serious problems that the individual grower and shipper has to work out is to arrange his operations so that his apples can be handled promptly and expeditiously from the trees to the storage.
