## IN THE DISTRICT COURT

The case of the State of New Mexico vs. C. E. Wantland, charged with the murder of John Trotter, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

The next case coming up was that of John Anthony, charged with the theft of some meat, and the jury found the defendant not guilty.

The case of Walter Cox charged with incest, the defendant pleaded guilty and was sentenced to serve not less than twenty nor more than fifty years at hard labor in the state penitentiary. The case against Cooley, charged with the same crime was postponed and will come up for hearing Monday, December 1st.

The case of the State of New Mexico vs. Henry George, charged with the murder of Jeff Partip, is now being tried. Considerable time was spent in getting the jury for this case and a special venire if sixty men was required to complete the jury.

Also a few minor cases have been disposed of during the past week.

## TOO MUCH MONEY IS SPENT SAYS LINDSEY

Former Governor Declares New Mexico Should Conduct Its Affairs on More Economical Lines.

(From Santa Fe New Mexican.)

"Waste in Government" was the subject of an able address by former Governor W. E. Lindsey before the taxpayers' associations. During the five years, 1913-18, the cost of state government increased 75 per cent and the taxable wealth of the state only 48 per cent, he said. In other words the power to pay has not kept pace with the expenditures. State government in 1913, as well as that government for the time intervening even up until now, must meet with approval or condemnation, according as it measures up to the requirements of representative democracy, efficiency and economy, or falls short of these axiomatic principles of good government.

Items of waste in our state government are all too numerous. Money could have been saved by holding the election on the constitutional amendments at the general election in 1920. Expenditures from the war fund, had proper foresight prevailed, could have been made more judiciously and economically. The multiplicity of officials, boards, commissions and other agency result in great waste.

Mr. Lindsey continued: "The revelations disclosed in the investigation of the issuance of series 'C' bonds, constitute irrefutable proof of inefficiency and wastefulness of administrative government by boards and commissions.

"With all these agencies responsible to themselves alone, the governor, so-called executive, is held responsible, but with power so limited as to be absolutely unable to exercise effective leadership and prevent the inevitable waste resulting therefrom.

"Relatively there are too many people on the pay rolls, directly or indirectly, in the state government, and relatively too few of our people giving a legitimate service in productive and creative

industry—all contributing to waste in government.

"The 1919 legislature made possible increased burdens at a time when retrenchment is imperative. Taxes were laid upon corporation franchises, incomes and inheritances without providing for a corresponding reduction in the general property tax rates. The gasoline tax, the mounted police appropriation, the county road superintendent act, the soldier settlement act in its appropriation feature, the numerous increases in specific taxes and other additions of objects of taxation must be held to have been wholly unwarranted at this time, and as creating and attempting to create, in several instances, presumptive employment for additional party henchmen at the cost of the taxpayer.

"To remedy these conditions, there must be a combination of power and responsibility. In the words of Elihu Root: 'Responsibility without power can never be justly enforced. Power without responsibility can never be duly controlled. The fundamental principle to be applied, I take it, is that responsibility and power shall go together.' Perhaps this could be brought about by electing a number of party 'bosses' including a few dominant leads and thus placing responsibility upon those who so often exercise the real power. Under present conditions, our political conditions we have no true power exercised by the people's representatives.

There is, however, a different tendency appearing in the civil codes adopted in various states such as Illinois, Nebraska, Idaho and New York and in time New Mexico will fall in line with a resulting simplification of government with power and responsibility vested in an executive administration answerable to the people only.

## THRIFT IN THE SCHOOLS

Having for its objective the instruction and training of the child in thrift, savings and intelligent personal economy, the thrift course of study, which is being taught this year in all grades of the public schools, will undoubtedly have a far reaching effect and be the means of starting thousands of young Americans on the road that leads to prosperity and independence.

The Savings Division of the Treasury Department, which in this district has its headquarters at Dallas, has through the co-operation of the State Superintendents of Public Instructions of Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and New Mexico placed free text books in the hands of every teacher, and each instructor has been called upon by his State Superintendent to teach his pupils the simple lessons of thrift and saving which, learned in early youth, will undoubtedly make a lasting and beneficial impression that will be reflected some years later in a more prosperous and savings citizenship.

As a result of the savings campaign waged in the schools last year by the Government and the teachers, it has been found that the school children of the 304 Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and New Mexico counties and parishes in this district actually saved and invested \$14,500,000 in United States Government War Savings and Thrift Stamps, not to mention a large sum saved and invested in other ways. This year an even greater saving will be made, because nearly every school child has acquired in some degree the habit of thrift.

In their work of thrift instruction the schools are performing a service in which every parent should interest himself, appreciate and help to forward.

It is hoped that our local schools will present this vital subject to our children in such a manner that they will receive its full benefit.

James Hill, the railroad builder and financier, once remarked that the person who could not and would not save money could not and would not do anything else worth while and that he might as well abandon the game of life because he had not the seed of success in him.

This statement is no less true today than when it was first made by Hill.

RED GOVERNMENT NEAR AN END

LENINE'S ANARCHISTS ARE SURROUNDED ON ALL FRONTS

PETROGRAD-MOSCOW TO FALL

Kolchak, Denekine, Vindemitch and Poles Pushing Reds into Small Circle in Central Russia.

London.—The other world war has been forced back by the onslaught of enemies of the four fronts, the armies of the soviet or anarchist government of Russia appear to be facing a period pregnant with disaster.

Wedge Driven Into Russia Petrograd is deemed to capture, in the opinion of observers, General Yushkevich being at Udmia, only twenty-

Five miles south of the former Russian capital. In the extreme north the northern Russian army has broken the resistance of the anarchists, according to reports, and are pursuing the enemy toward Onega, a village about 150 miles west of Archangel.

West of General Denekine's army are forces of Ukrainians who, while supposed to be hostile to the anarchists, have declared war on Denekine because of alleged atrocities perpetrated by the latter's soldiers on their advance toward Moscow.

Further north General Denekine's troops advanced eastward in the direction of Barisoglevsk, on the Orel-Tsaritsyn railroad line, the enemy retreating under pressure.

Anarchist offensive has developed in the region of Voronezh, the soviet forces hoping to check General Denekine's advance beyond Orel and his threat at Moscow by striking hard at his line in the vicinity of this important provincial capital.

The anarchists, despite the discouragement of the capture of Orel, seem to be fighting hard also in the vicinity of Kiev and Mogilev, possibly encouraged by the opening of hostilities against General Denekine by the Ukrainian forces under General Petura in this region.

New Turkish Party Swings To Sultan, London.—The Turkish nationalists, whose movement, headed by Mustafa Kemal Pasha, to set up a new government for Turkey free from the supervision of the allied powers, had been recently reported to be gaining strength, are declared in a Constantinople message received here to have agreed to support the existing Turkish government. This, the message points out, will solve the political crisis. Mustafa Kemal has issued a manifesto undertaking to abstain from interference with the government.

COAL STRIKE STILL THREATENS MINERS MAY WALK OUT ON NOVEMBER 1

Union Wants To Check the Whole Matter Up To the President For Settlement.

Washington.—Some official action, either by President Wilson or the cabinet to avert the threatened strike of soft coal miners November 1, is to be expected, it was said at the White House. Officials regard the matter as one requiring governmental action if other efforts to avert a tie-up of the coal mines fail.

Possibility Seen Of Averting Strike.

Washington.—A nation-wide strike of coal miners yet may be averted. William Green, secretary of the United Mine Workers of America, in a statement said that there was a "possibility of averting a strike, even after the strike call had been issued."

Following failure at a recent conference of bituminous coal operators and miners to reach an agreement on demands of the miners, John L. Lewis, acting president of the United Mine Workers, announced on leaving Philadelphia for Indianapolis that he would issue a call for a nation-wide strike of soft coal miners on November 1.

SHAKE-UP IS DUE IN ITALY

Duke of Aosta Is Reported in Exile in Belgium.

Annemasse, France.—In spite of Signor Tittoni saying the Fiume storm is clearing, the actual indication is that the situation is becoming more grave. The duke of Aosta, who failed in his mission to d'Annunzio on behalf of the government, has been exiled, going to Belgium. The ministers of war and marine are reported to be about to resign and even the king is threatening to resign in the face of the refusal of the regular army to oust the poet-dictator from Fiume.

The entire Italian nation is aroused and is manifesting its extreme sympathy by means of a subscription in aid of d'Annunzio which has already reached \$250,000. New troops are continually joining him by land and sea. The Junco-Slav front is held by eight volunteer battalions fully equipped with artillery. Searchlights are used nightly in fear of an unexpected attack.

Army Camps To Be Sold.

Washington.—Camps Mills, Mineola, L. L. and Shelby, Hattiesburg, Miss., the cantonments in Chickamauga and Chattanooga national parks, Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., and government improvements at Newport News, Va., are to be sold by the war department. It was announced that sealed proposals for Camps Mills and Shelby and the Georgia cantonments would be opened here Nov. 6, and for the Newport News improvements Nov. 11.

Spain Observes Columbus Day.

Madrid.—The anniversary of the discovery of America was celebrated here and throughout the provinces.

Free Cotton Seed Asked.

Washington.—Congress was asked to appropriate \$100,000 to provide free cotton seed to farmers in Arkansas, Nueces and San Patricio counties, Texas, where crops were destroyed by the recent gulf storm in a bill introduced by Representative Bee, Texas.

French Senate Ratifies Treaty.

Paris.—The French senate ratified the peace treaty and also the Franco-American and Franco-British defense treaties.

357 Killed in Texas Storm.

Corpus Christi.—The total number of known dead and missing as a result of the tropical hurricane here was officially announced as 357 by the bureau of information, as a result of revision of figures. Of these, 183 are dead and 174 missing.

Another War Ends.

Paris.—The state of war in France and Algeria is declared to be ended and the censorship lifted by two presidential decrees.

Alfonso To Visit South America

Madrid.—King Alfonso will visit South America next spring, according to the newspaper Imparcial.

End of War Army Seen.

Washington.—Officers and men totaling 3,378,365 or 91 per cent of the war time strength of the army, have been discharged since November 11, the war department announced. The strength of the army now is 335,777, of which 24,988 are in Europe and 3,427 in Siberia. Enlistments to date total 134,871.

ANARCHISTS PLOT DESTRUCTION OF ABANDONED U. S. ARMY CAMPS AND CANTONMENTS

GORSKI IS ARRESTED AT GARY Troops Are Placed As Guards in the Threatened Camps—Gorski is Charged With Chicago Bomb Plot.

Chicago.—Military authorities and federal investigators assigned to follow the trail of radicals who have been spreading their propaganda in connection with the strike of the steel workers, announced their discovery of an anarchist plot to destroy abandoned army cantonments and other government property.

The plot was unearthed in connection with the discovery in Gary, Ind., of Anton Gorski, radical leader, who is under surveillance in connection with the explosion of a bomb in the Chicago postoffice in September, 1918, four persons being killed and thirty injured by the explosion.

Information gained by the military authorities at Gary, indicated that the radicals have plotted against government property in the middle western states ranging from West Virginia to Colorado. Five hundred of the federal troops on duty here entrained and it was supposed they were being dispatched to protect endangered property.

Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood, commanding the central department of the United States army was in conference with Col. W. S. Mapes, commander of the troops at Gary. Drastic measures to combat the "red" plots were arranged by the military leaders.

Colonel Mapes announced that no confession had been obtained from Gorski in regard to the Chicago federal building bomb plot, but it was intimated that he would be a federal witness. The federal officers are now searching for Alexander Ivanoff, Gary steel worker, and electrician, who was implicated by Gorski as a maker of the thirty-six bombs which were sent to prominent men throughout the country in forged wrappings of Gimbel Brothers store in New York.

Intelligence officers continued their raids at Gary in search of radical literature. They found a quantity of radical propaganda printed in German and a large German flag made of silk. Steel Mill Guarded.

The strike bulletin by the steel workers disavowed the proclamation issued by the "communist party of America" calling on the workmen to establish a dictatorship and wrest control of Gary from the federal troops.

Beer Cases Before Court December 8.

Washington.—The legality of 275 beer will be determined by the supreme court at hearings set for December 8, the court having granted the petition of the government to advance for early decision the appeal against an adverse decision by Federal Judge Ross, at Baltimore, in favor of the Standard brewery.

Burning Ship Has 250 Passengers.

Havana.—The Fabre liner steamer Venezia, which is reported abandoned on fire at sea, carried at least 250 passengers, according to best information available here. The Venezia arrived here October 3 from Mexico ports with fifty three passengers in transit for Spain and some 200 other passengers were taken on here. The vessel had a cargo of 16,250 sacks of sugar.

Decree Signed Disbanding Poilu.

Paris.—President Poincaré signed decree of general demobilization, effective upon "the cessation of hostilities." Neither the British nor the Italian ratification has reached the peace conference but they are expected momentarily and it is believed the exchange of ratifications and the other necessary formalities will be completed early next week. Signor Tittoni, the Italian foreign minister is in Paris with the Italian ratification papers.

He Killed Wife in 1894.

Mandan, N. D.—Stricken with paralysis, Albert Brooks, 72 years old, called the state's attorney to his bedside and confessed he had killed his wife in Columbus, Ohio, twenty-five years ago.

House Arrives From Europe Sick.

New York.—Edward M. House, chief adviser to President Wilson and representative of the president in Paris for several months, returned from Europe on the transport Northern Pacific, a very sick man.

Troop Movement in Morocco.

Madrid.—An announcement has been received here of the commencement of a new military movement by the Spaniards in Morocco to obtain complete control of all the regions assigned to Spain.

New York To Keep Daylight Saving.

New York.—Daylight saving, as a local ordinance, was adopted for New York City, by unanimous vote of the board of aldermen. The ordinance will be effective next spring.

Washington.—The vote for adoption of the Shantung amendment was: Democrats—Ashurst, Bankhead, Beckham, Chamberlain, Culberson, Dill, Fletcher, Gay, Gerry, Harris, Harrison, Henderson, Hitchcock, Jones (New Mex.), Kendrick, King, Kirby, McKellar, Myers, Nugent, Overman, Owen, Phelan, Pittman, Pomeroy, Ransdell, Robinson, Sheppard, Shields, Simmons, Smith (Ark.), Smith (Calif.), Smith (Maryland), Stanley, Swanson, Thomas, Trammell, Underwood, Walsh (Mont.); Williams and Wolcott—41. Total against adoption, 55.

The six senators absent or paired, were: For adoption—Fernald, republican, Maine, and Ekins, republican, West Virginia.

Against adoption—Edge, republican, New Jersey; Johnson, democrat of South Dakota; Martin, democrat of Virginia, and Smith, democrat, South Carolina.

Washington.—The long-debated amendment to the peace treaty, presented by Senator Lodge and approved by the foreign relations committee, finally was rejected in the senate. In the vote of 35 to 55, fourteen republicans swung over to the pro-treaty forces while three democrats lined up with those supporting the proposals. Of the six senators absent, two republicans were put on record as in favor of the amendment and one republican and three democrats as opposing it.

Only three of the committee's forty-five amendments now remain to be acted on by the senate, thirty-six previously having been rejected. Of those remaining one relates to American representation on the reparations commission and two to equalization of voting power in the league of nations assembly.

After the vote was completed Senator Lodge announced that later he would move to strike out entirely the sections awarding the Shantung rights to Japan. Notice was also given by a number of the republican senators who opposed the committee amendment that they would present reservations dissenting from the Shantung award.

THE LEAGUE IS ORGANIZING

Plans Going Ahead For Bringing Union Into Existence.

Washington.—While no official declaration can be made in advance of the action of the senate on the treaty of Versailles, plans are being laid for bringing the league of nations into existence almost immediately upon the publication in Paris of the ratification of the treaty by Great Britain, France, Italy and Germany which will put it into force.

Although the United States cannot participate in the initial stages of the league's work, it is understood that the decision has been reached to have President Wilson issue a call for the first meeting of the council of the league within the fifteen-day period provided in the treaty for the appointment by the council of three members of the commission which is to determine the boundary of the Saar basin.

House Bars Reds From U. S.

Washington.—By an overwhelming majority, the house passed the bill effective for one year wartime passport restrictions, so as to keep radicals and undesirable aliens out of the United States. Secretary Lansing urged the proposed legislation to reinforce existing restrictive immigration laws until congress shall have time to enact general immigration legislation. The bill was passed by a vote of 244 to 1. Representative Gallagher, democrat of Illinois, casting the lone negative vote.

Berlin Newspaper Suppressed.

Berlin.—Gustav Noske, minister of defense, has suppressed the newspaper Freiheit for three days because of its accusation that "central murder stations" were being installed in Berlin which were offering assassins big money and employing weak persons for similar purposes.

Shoe Prices To Remain High.

Chicago.—Shoe prices will remain high, according to predictions made at the national council of tanners' convention here.

Negro Saved From Mob.

New London, Mo.—A mob armed with shotguns and ropes, was prevented from lynching Charles Day, an 18 year old negro, by Sheriff Thomas Clark, who secreted the negro in an automobile and took him to Hannibal, 10 miles north of here.

Gonzales Gives Bail.

New York.—Alfredo Gonzales, former president of Costa Rica, arrested in connection with the Ibel suit brought by Lincoln G. Valentine, was released on \$25,000 bail, furnished by friends.

Southwest News From All Over New Mexico and Arizona

COMING EVENTS.

Arizona State Fair—Nov. 7 to 9, 1918. Agents of the Department of Justice, at Gallup, New Mexico, seized a complete opium smoking outfit and several parts of a whiskey still and arrested the supposed owners.

The military department at the university of Arizona under Major Boniface, has completed its organization with an increase of more than 100 in its personnel over last year. The number of automobile licenses issued by the secretary of state of New Mexico to date, has reached 17,879 which is just 100 fewer than the highest number last December.

Federal aid project No. 36 has been submitted for approval to the Department of Agriculture. This is a road, six miles in length, extending from the southern boundary of Sandoval county to the city of Bernalillo. Its estimated cost is \$48,000.

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce of Phoenix, appointed a committee to arrange for the housing of the large numbers of visitors expected from all parts of Arizona during the state fair November 3rd to 8th, inclusive. The committee will cooperate with the State Fair Commission.

The Arizona Cattle Growers' Association will call a special convention to be held in Phoenix, probably in November, to decide what will be done by the association in the matter of the Kenyon and Kendrick bills, now before congress, for the regulation of the packing and cattle industries.

Perry Bean of Roswell, New Mexico, who has one of the most up to date dairies in the state, has just recently installed a \$1,200 milking machine to handle the products of the dairy. The new machine will milk four cows at a time and Mr. Bean says it insures absolute cleanliness in the handling of the milk.

Governor Larrazolo of New Mexico again extended executive clemency, when he commuted the sentence and then granted conditional pardons to Bonnie MacKinnon and his brother, W. Bonnie MacKinnon of Grant county, who had been sentenced to serve ten to fifteen years in the penitentiary in 1917 for second degree murder.

Owing to the unusually large crops which have been raised around Roy New Mexico this year and the scarcity of threshing machines, the farmers are now facing a possible loss on account of not being able to get their grain threshed. Nearly all the machines in the vicinity are working day and night and still it is thought that some of the grain will not be threshed before Christmas.

The laboratory and clinic for Douglas, Arizona and vicinity has been opened to the public. The laboratory is in charge of Miss Wills McNitt as technician. She received her training at the Philadelphia Polytechnic hospital and has been employed in several of the large laboratories of the east. Special attention will be given Wasserman tests and for laboratory experimental work, guinea pigs, mice, sheep and rabbits having already been prepared.

President Wilson has signed a proclamation adding 29,440 acres to the Crook National Forest, Ariz. The lands added are located in the Winchester mountains and southeast of the Galluro division of the Crook forest. They are rough and broken in character and are not suitable for agricultural purposes. Practically the entire tract is covered with a stand of oak, juniper, and cedar timber of fair quality.

In the Tijeras cañon road project a piece of work for which the contract was \$18,000, is nearing completion and will be ready for traffic in a day or two. The project covers the road through Tijeras cañon in New Mexico and was surveyed by the Good Roads Bureau, the contract being let to the Springer Company. The location survey for the road from Tijeras post office to the Ellis ranch is completed. The advance estimate amounting to \$165,000 will be rectified when the survey is complete.

Investigation of the wholesale and retail prices in Phoenix where groceries, meat, vegetables or fruit are for sale, conducted by members of the food administration under George H. Smalley, Federal Executive Secretary, at the instance of County Attorney Laney has revealed the fact that many dealers are charging excessive prices one or more lines of goods. The report made by the men of the food administration, who investigated 104 dealers in the county, has been turned over to Federal Food Administrator Timothy A. Rigdan and United States Attorney Thomas A. Flynn.

The New Mexico highway department has received notice that the director of storage of the War Department has been directed to ship the following War Department supplies for use in highway construction in New Mexico: One 10-ton Holt tractor and three 5-ton Ree tractors from Norfolk, Va.; seven 24-inch gauge locomotives and six 24-inch V type dump cars; seven 150 gallon 2-wheel water carts; three 4x5 cylinder pumps and 17 pipe ton hand-power pumps; 17 transits, 22 level rods, one hand level and 82 steel tapes.

LESSON TEXT—Matt. 14:22-33. GOLDEN TEXT—I believe; help thou mine unbelief.—Mark 9:24. ADDITIONAL MATERIAL—Mark 5:23-34; 16:7-8; Luke 11:13-22.

4. Jesus walking on the sea (vv. 25-27). It was in the fourth watch of the night (v. 25). He did not come to them immediately, but waited till almost dawn.

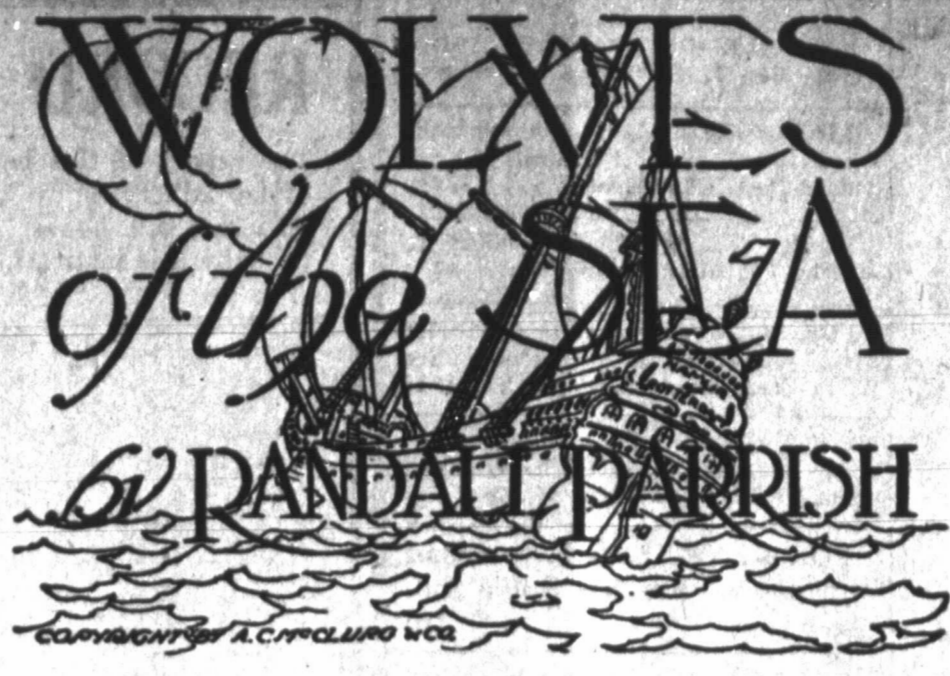

**WAR RECORD OF LEVIATHAN**  
 Monster Transport Carried Many Thousands of Soldiers to French Ports.

The giant transport Leviathan, following her arrival in New York harbor with Gen. Pershing and troops of the First division, brought to a close her important service in helping win the war. The big ship, after being refitted for passenger service, is to be turned back to the United States shipping board, the agency which seized it when the United States entered the war. While the future of the ship is uncertain, it is reported that she will be assigned to American passenger trade between New York and Liverpool, with possible extension in the future to Hamburg.

The Leviathan, formerly the Vaterland, the second largest ship in the world, was interned in New York by the Germans in 1914. She was "wildly damaged" to the extent of more than \$1,000,000. After being reconditioned by American engineers, she was assigned as a transport, and during and since the war made 19 round trips on the Atlantic, carrying a total of 185,500 soldiers, of whom 96,821 were carried overseas through submarine-infested seas. She was always a mark for U-boats, but her speed and the armament with which she was equipped saved her.

**Economy Corner**



The following simple recipes have no harmful ingredients and will accomplish results as well as ready-mixed remedies for the same ailments.

**An Astringent Cream.**  
 A well-recommended astringent cream is made from four ounces of mutton tallow, one and a quarter ounces of glycerin, one-half a dram of tincture of benzoin, a quarter of a dram of spirits of camphor, one-eighth of a dram of powdered alum, one-quarter of a dram of Russian isinglass and one-half an ounce of rose water. The rose water is warmed in a china cup set in hot water and the isinglass is dissolved in it. The mutton tallow, which has previously been tried out at a gentle heat and added to the glycerin, is then blended with the rose water, and the other ingredients are added while the mixture is being beaten. This makes a cream which is astringent, tightening the skin, without allowing it to become flabby, as often happens when one is reducing flesh.

**Receding Gums.**  
 Good teeth are requisite for both health and good looks. Go to a dentist and have the tartar removed from under and around the gums, then use table salt on the gums several times a day. Scrub the teeth downward, never crosswise. The teeth should be cleaned before breakfast, after each meal and before retiring.

**For a Slight Scar.**  
 Spirits of camphor, touching the skin with it twice a day, will sometimes eradicate the spots left from pimples. The liquid should be gently rubbed in.

**To Remove Corns.**  
 Salicylic acid, 1 dram; trim the corn with a very sharp knife or razor blade. Apply the acid; cover with a piece of court plaster. In three days remove the plaster and the corn will come with it. Soft corns may be cured by wrapping the afflicted toe with a soft linen rag which has been saturated with turpentine, night and morning. Care should be taken to wear shoes sufficiently wide but not too large.

**Excessive Perspiration.**  
 Sponge off the parts affected at least once a day with boric acid; use 20 parts of hot water to one of acid. Also dust the face and neck and wherever it is necessary with a dry boracic powder.

**To Overcome Odorous Perspiration.**  
 When bathing put a few drops of ammonia in the water, dry the skin well and dust with the following powder: Oleate of zinc, 1/2 ounce; powdered starch, 1 ounce; salicylic acid, 1 scruple.

**For Chapped Lips.**  
 To prevent the chapped lips that so frequently result from the high winds try rubbing the lips each time before going out with rose water and glycerin, mixed in the proportion of two parts of the former to one of the latter.

**For the Feet.**  
 No. 1—Wash the feet in warm water to which a little hydrochloric acid or chloride of lime has been added.  
 No. 2—Bathe the feet often in a strong solution of borax or in common kitchen soda dissolved in water. Change the hosiery every day.

**Breakfast Linen.**  
 Colored breakfast linen is in favor. Square cloths which hang only a few inches over the edge of the table and small napkins, about 14 inches square, are either of colored linen or else are bordered with color. Some in sets show border wreaths of red roses, some show red roses with bright green leaves. They suggest breakfast sets of English china with its gay colors and stiff figures. The all-colored sets show pink, blue or yellow flowers on tan or gray linen.

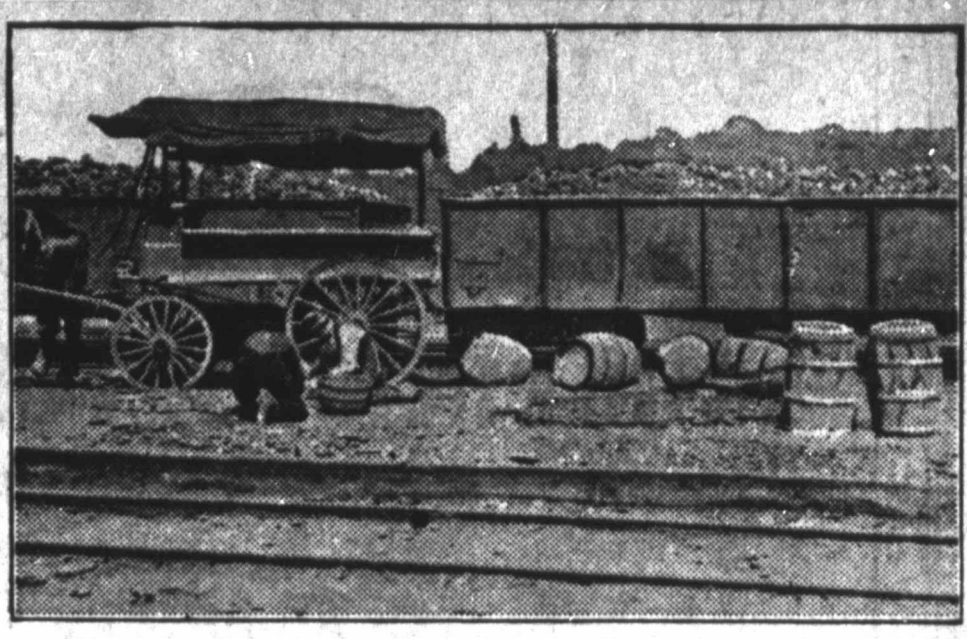

## GOOD LOADING IN CARS AND PRECAUTIONS AGAINST DEVELOPMENT OF DISEASE URGED



Hucksters Salvaging Damaged Potatoes in Freight Yard.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)  
Cars of fruit and vegetables are often dumped at large market terminals but persons who witness this proceeding should not conclude that this practice is uneconomic or done to keep up prices, according to men in the bureau of markets, United States department of agriculture. The wholesale dealer is not in a position to resort and repack damaged produce and often enough decay is present to render the produce unsalable in its original container or bulk shipment.

Sometimes hucksters do go over the damaged cars and salvage a limited amount of food. More often, however, the labor cost of such salvage work is greater than the value of the products saved.

Losses May Start on Farm.  
There are many causes for loss of perishable foods between the farm field and the market. Some of these causes go back to the time crops are harvested. Take potatoes, for instance, which are injured in digging. Unless these injured potatoes are sorted out and not packed with the good potatoes, rot may develop in the shipment and spread rapidly to other potatoes, especially if the temperature in the car is favorable for rot to develop.

Another source of great loss in perishables is found in lack of care in loading. The packages must be spaced to permit air circulation and also braced to prevent shifting. Temperature can not be controlled in loads packed solid without any air spaces between the containers, while bracing must be carefully done or packages arrive containing only a part of their original contents.

Although care in packing, loading,

hogs, or a calf now and then, a lamb, etc.

Where there is a year-round requirement for labor it is also possible to utilize to better advantage the services of married men, and their wives and children can often be useful. Where laborers are not needed on the farm the year around there is not the advantage of this preference for married men.

### THRASHING TO SAVE WHEAT

Farmers of Minnesota County Prevented Loss of \$77,000 by Using Clean Methods.  
(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)  
Members of the farm bureau of Kittson county, Minnesota, saved \$77,000, or about \$500 to each thrashing machine, by using tight-bottom racks, canvas under the feeder, cleaning up when required after each setting of the machine during the thrashing season. A conservative estimate of the saving by clean thrashing by this county was 27,500 bushels of wheat, 20,400 bushels of oats, and 10,000 bushels of barley.

### GENERAL FARM NOTES

The wise use of cover crops will conserve the fertility of the soil and better its physical condition in many cases.

In purchasing commercial fertilizers consider the cost of the crop to be grown as well as the price of the fertilizer.

A good dog is like a good son—he stays at home at night. Kept in good habits, he is a guardian rather than a murderer of sheep.

Few animals like rye as a steady diet as they do oats or corn. When rye is crushed and mixed with ground oats or corn it makes good horse feed.

Drain tile set over each celery plant blanches it nicely. Paper or boards may be used in cool weather, but are apt to decay the plants in warm weather.

Clover will contain the proper amount of dry matter to make good silage if allowed to stand until somewhat more than one-half of the blossoms are brown.

It is said that exposure to weather causes greater destruction to farm implements than using them. Avoid this loss by storing all machinery and tools properly under shelter before winter sets in.

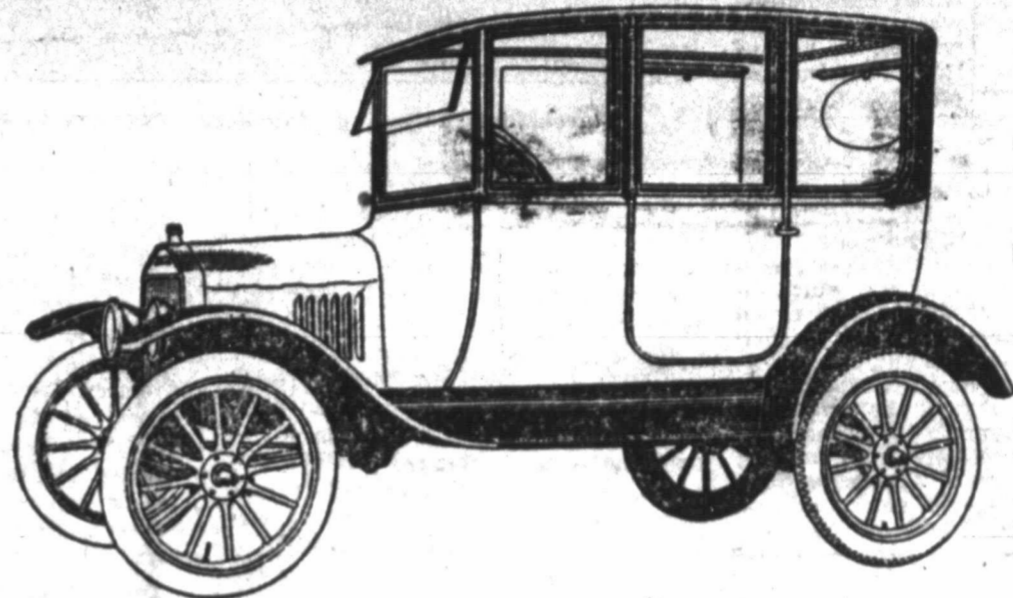
