Republican publicity is full of the name and fame of Abraham Lincoln these days. No one can blame the G. O. P. for diverting public attention from Lodge to Lincoln, but it is well to remember that it is the Pedant of Nahant and not the Great Emancipator that is directing Republican affairs in the Senate just now.

More than seven million words were spoken on the subject of the treaty and the League of Nations. But that is no vindication of free speech. The cost to the taxpayers was many thousands of dollars.

Senator Borah is right when he tells his Republican colleagues that it is by the present congress and not by the rhetoric of an unofficial committee that his party will be judged in the coming campaign.

**REAL FRIENDS OF PEACE**

It remains to be seen whether the Republican majority in the Senate in the latest attempt to effect ratification of the treaty of peace can be unanimous in action as well as predominant in numbers. They have succeeded thus far in preventing any final satisfactory disposition of the treaty. They were strong in opposition; it is now to be demonstrated whether they are equally powerful in their announced advocacy of compromise and settlement of those differences—chiefly in their own ranks—by which peace has been delayed and the state of war prolonged.

With one or two exceptions Democratic Senators have been willing to accept the treaty as the Peace Conference framed it, but in the interests of the United States and all the world they have been agreeable to ratification with such reservations as, without requiring resubmission of the pact or impairing the potency of the League of Nations, would at the same time express this country's understanding of its obligations. The points of importance for the public's recollection are that the Democratic Senators preferred the treaty as it came to the senate, but were ready to forego this preference to hasten and insure ratification. Their attitude was always affirmative.

From the beginning—before the provisions of the treaty and the covenant of the League were reduced to formal verbiage—the Republicans showed their hostility and threatened obstruction. They have continued their opposition to this moment. They disagreed among themselves not as to whether the treaty should be adopted as it was written, but as to whether it should be crippled or destroyed outright. It was a division not between enemies and friends of the treaty, but a divergence of opinion between those who would paralyze it and a covenant with an act of seeming approval, and those who would kill both without qualm or quibble.

These differences and distinctions between Democratic Senators and Republican Senators ought to be remembered. If ratification results from the present reconsideration of the treaty it will come because of Democratic friendliness and espousal, and in spite of Republican reaction and recalcitrance.

There are almost as many varieties of Republicans in Congress as there are on that committee of 171.

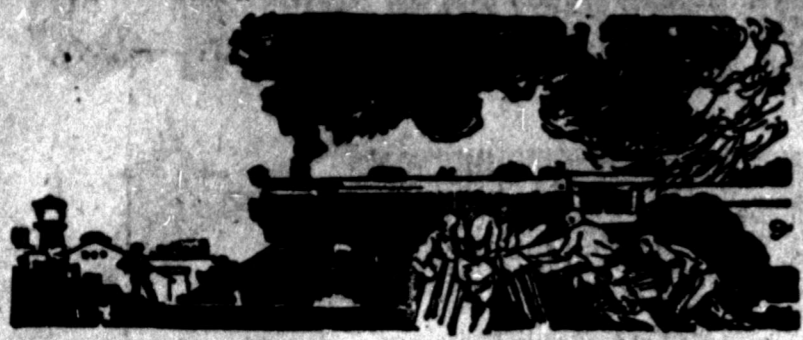

## Carrying a Ton a Mile for less than a Cent

Freight rates have played a very small part in the rising cost of living.

Other causes—the waste of war, under-production, credit inflation—have added dollars to the cost of the necessities of life, while freight charges have added only cents.

The average charge for hauling a ton of freight a mile is less than a cent.

A suit of clothing that sold for \$30 before the war was carried 2,265 miles by rail from Chicago to Los Angeles for 16½ cents.

Now the freight charge is 22 cents and the suit sells for \$50.

The cost of the suit has increased 20 dollars.

The freight on it has increased only 5½ cents.

Other transportation charges enter into the cost of the finished article—carrying the wool to the mills and the cloth to the tailors—but these other charges amount to but a few cents more.

The \$10 pair of shoes that used to sell for \$5 goes from the New England factory to the Florida dealer for a freight charge of 5½ cents—only one cent more than the pre-war rate.

Beef pays only two-thirds of a cent pound freight from Chicago to New York.

American freight rates are the lowest in the world.

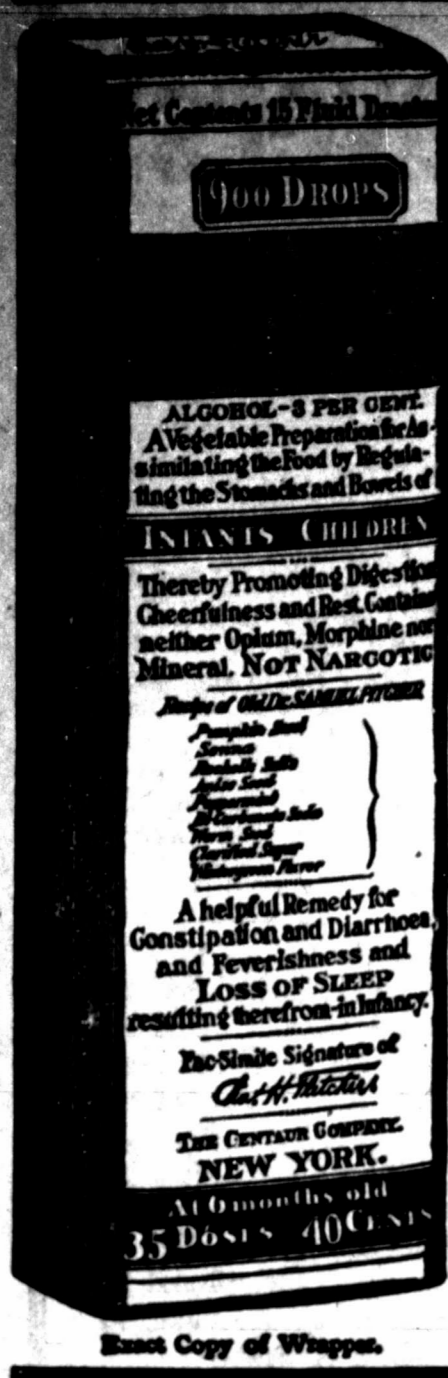

### LEFT WHEN OCEAN RETIRED

Californian Reports Finding Millions of Shells Far Above the Present Sea Level.

Oris I. Kennedy, an attorney of San Bernardino, Cal., has returned from an exploration trip on Painted hill, which is 40 miles east of San Bernardino. He brought with him samples of seashells from the great bed of a one-time ocean that is older than Mount San Jacinto and a story of seeing an old Spanish musket and Indian water vessels in an inaccessible place on the hill.

Kennedy plans to organize a party to return and get the musket, which, he believes, is at least one hundred years old. To obtain the relic somebody will have to be lowered from a cliff on a rope and then swung into what probably is an old sea cavern.

Some of the shells, he said, were found 2,050 feet above sea level. He stated there probably were millions embedded in the rock formation.

**Amber Beads Long Popular.**

### DON'T BELONG IN BIBLE

American Educator Explains Presence in Book of Myth of Jonah and the Whale.

Dr. R. G. Moulton, professor of literature at the University of Chicago, addressing a gathering of Wesleyans at Bath, England, where he received his education, insists that Jonah was not swallowed by the whale and that the story forms no part of the real Bible.

The Bible, mighty in itself, said Doctor Moulton, had passed through the hands of commentators who had no knowledge, no understanding of literature, and who reduced it to a form which had little or no likeness to the real Bible. One of these numerous commentators had written into that most spiritual and beautiful book of Jonah the narrative of the whale, the only effect being one of distortion and disfigurement.

In actual fact the story, asserted Doctor Moulton, had been originally in the form of a mere footnote comment in manuscript, but by some blunder, due to careless, slipshod printing from which the Bible suffered more than any other book in the world, the fable of the whale had been included in the general text. And in this way had it come down through the ages to the modern world as pure comedy, or, what was worse, ribald satire.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

### LESSON FOR FEBRUARY 29

PETER WRITES ABOUT CHRISTIAN LIVING.

**LESSON TEXT**—1 Peter 2:1-15, 11-13. **GOLDEN TEXT**—He that saith he abideth in him ought himself also so to walk, even as he walked.—1 John 2:6. **PRIMARY TOPIC**—Doing as Jesus did. **JUNIOR TOPIC**—How to Treat Those Who Wrong Us. **INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC**—The Nobility of Patience. **YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC**—Ideals for Christian Living.

The purpose of Peter was to establish all who were passing through suffering and testing. See for example 1:7, 3:14, 4:12, 5:10-12.

#### 1. Christian Growth (vv. 1-5).

The Christian obtains his life through the new birth, and the agent of its accomplishment is the Word of God (1:23). The same vitalizing and energizing power which makes the believer a child of God is essential to growth and development. In order to have spiritual growth there must be both renunciation and appropriation.

1. Renunciation (v. 1). Certain things injurious to spiritual life must be put away (1) malice—all wickedness, that is, the will to do injury to others without cause; (2) guile—deceit of all kinds; (3) hypocrisy—feigning to be what one is not—assuming a false appearance; (4) envy—hatred of others because they possess excellencies which we do not; (5) evil speaking—all kind of slanderous speaking—against others.

2. Appropriation (vv. 2, 3). (1) Spiritual food must be taken (v. 2). The principle of the new life was conveyed through the Word (1:23), and the Word is the means by which that life is to be strengthened and developed. Just as a new born babe loves milk, so men who are born again love the Bible. (2) Spiritual food must be assimilated (v. 3). The Word of God must be received and assimilated by meditation.

3. The grand objective (vv. 4, 5). It is coming to Christ—to grow up and become a part of the glorious church, the spiritual house, which is designed to show forth the glory of God.

#### II. Seemly Behavior of Christians (vv. 11-25).

1. As pilgrims and sojourners (vv. 11, 12). Christians are merely sojourners on the earth; they are journeying through it on their way to the eternal home in the heavens. Our heavenly citizenship (Phil. 3:20) should constrain us to (1) abstain from fleshly lusts (v. 11). The term "lusts" includes the entire army of unclean forces springing from our carnal natures; they are enumerated in Galatians 5:19-21. These war against the soul. (2) Behavior honest before the heathen (v. 12). Christians should so live that it will be impossible for the world to speak against them as evildoers.

2. As citizens (vv. 13-17). While the Christian's true citizenship is in heaven, he has a responsibility as a citizen on the earth. A Christian man recognizes the necessity of social order, and will not only graciously submit to the authority of rulers regardless of the form of government, but will faithfully perform his obligations as a citizen. This he will not do through cringing fear, but as the Lord's free man. By this free submission as a servant of God he puts to silence the ignorance of foolish men (vv. 15, 16). (1) Honor all men (v. 17). He will see in every man the image of God and therefore give honor to him. (2) Love the brotherhood (v. 17). The Christian has a peculiar love for those who are of the same household. (3) Fear God (v. 17). (4) Honor the king (v. 17). This has peculiar significance, for in all probability the wicked Nero was the king then reigning.

3. As servants (vv. 18-25). While doubtless slaves were meant here, the principle applies to all who have relation to employers. The Christian will be in subjection to his master. He will not only do this when his employer is gentle and reasonable, but even when it means wrongful suffering. It means not only submission, but loyalty. It is the duty of a Christian to consider and further the interests of his employer. Many times to do so means hardship and suffering. The grand example of suffering wrongfully is Jesus Christ. While his suffering is an example to us, it was much more, because he suffered in order to break forever the power of sin so as to do away forever with oppression.

## FIND WEALTH IN WINTER

Canadian Farmers Turn Winter Months to Good Account.

Large crops and good prices for the wheat, oats, barley and flax from Canadian farms have made the winter months in California at times resemble a meeting of a Canadian farmers' institute, but the practice among successful farmers of spending their winter holidays seems to be on the wane. After all, nothing can be more tiresome than having nothing to do, and the farmers of Western Canada are now finding winter employment right on their farms which rivals the attractions of the sunny South.

Live stock is the explanation, according to a six-foot Westerner who dropped into the Canadian Government Information Bureau at 811 Jackson street, St. Paul. He was on his way back to Western Canada with a carload of selected breeding stock which had carried off blue ribbons at several state fairs in 1919. "We have found," said he, "that there is just as much pleasure and a great deal more profit in developing a herd of prize stock as in listening to the murmur of the sad sea waves. Where we used to grow grain exclusively now we are raising stock as well. The fact that steers raised in Western Canada took the grand championship at the International Live Stock Show at Chicago two years in succession shows how well we are getting along. And instead of depleting our bank rolls we add a tidy sum to them."

"But don't you find the life monotonous?"  
"Not in the least. You see, we have a rural club which meets in our school house, where we thrash out all kinds of problems. Here we exchange ideas and also have occasional talks from government experts, and the man who goes abroad for the winter only realizes how much he has missed when at a summer picnic he hears an address by a neighbor that would do credit to a college graduate."

"It was at one of these meetings that we decided to import a prize-winning stallion, and today our district is raising some of the best draft horses in Canada. The carload of breeding stock which I am now shipping to my farm is indirectly the result of our club meetings. We are going to make that little corner of Saskatchewan one of the big stock centers of America. Why shouldn't we? Everything is in our favor—climate, fertility, cheap land, free grazing land adjoining lots of farms, creameries, government supervision. You know how energetic the northern climate makes a man? Well, it's just like that with stock. They get to be great, husky fellows, hardy and big-famed—and that counts on market day."

"I'll show you some of the finest land and live stock out of doors, and treat you to a real farm meal—everything but the coffee and sugar grown right on my farm. That counts some in these days of high prices."—Advertisement.

**U. S. SHIP AUCTION IS HELD BOARD RECEIVES BIDS ON 30 SHIPS**

Wilson Expected to Deny Agreement With Britain for Low Price on Vessels.

Washington.—Despite protests in the senate and elsewhere and court proceedings designed to stay the action, the shipping board received bids for the thirty former liners.

When the ships first were offered by groups in the services in which the board had planned originally to operate them no bids were received, but spirited bidding developed later for individual vessels or selected groups to run in specified service.

While the bidding was in progress these developments came:

Justice Bailey of the district supreme court took under advisement the application of William Randolph Hearst of New York for an injunction to stop the sale of the vessels.

It was expected President Wilson would inform the senate "there was no basis" for reports that there was an agreement between the shipping board and British interests for the sale of the vessels. Information as to this report is asked in a resolution by Senator Brandegee, republican, Connecticut.

The first vessels offered were the Black Arrow, The Amphion, and the Philippines, composing the group of the Black Sea service. No bids were offered for them.

The first group composing the South American service, the Aeolus, DeKalb, Princess Matoka and Pocahontas, was then offered.

P. A. S. Franklin, president of the International Mercantile Corporation, made a bid of \$14,000,000 for nine vessels for service to the United Kingdom and northern European ports.

The vessels covered by the bid were the Leviathan, George Washington, America, President Grant, Nanzmond, Albright, Pocahontas, Princess Matoka and Callao.

Moore & McCormack offered \$4,000,000 for five vessels, for the South American service, and the Munson S. S. line, a conditional bid, approximately \$3,880,350, for the same vessels, the Martha Washington, Aeolus, Hinton, Princess Matoka, and the Pocahontas.

George Goethals, American Ship & Commerce Corporation, offered \$10,900,000 for six vessels for the Hamburg and Bremen service, the service being rapidly bid up to \$10,500,000 by President Franklin, of the International Mercantile Marine.

**WILSON - ALLIES QUARREL**  
Over Settlement of the Fiume-Adriatic Question.

Paris.—A summary of the many points in the allied reply to President Wilson's Adriatic note, discloses that President Wilson threatened to withdraw his signature from the British-French-American treaty establishing security for France, to which the allies reply that such action would destroy absolutely the "new French policy," for which President Wilson invited protection. The fundamental points of the reply to President Wilson according to the correspondent are:

First: The allies answer the accusation of having prepared a convention for the annexation of Fiume to Italy, which presupposes bad faith on the part of Italy by saying that President Wilson is unable to demonstrate that.

Second: The Italian petition for the establishment of territorial contiguity with Fiume is a very small thing compared with the cessation of Dalmatia, which the whole world is able to prove by merely examining the map of Europe.

Third: The allies observe that the project of President Wilson which comprehends the creation of a buffer state, has been rejected by the Jugoslavs and the allied nations have been unable to insist upon it.

Fourth: The strip of territory necessary to establish the contiguity of Fiume with Italy has not sufficient value to justify procrastination in re-establishing the peace of Europe.

Fifth: Italy entered the war inspired by ideals at a moment at least as critical as that when the United States entered. She suffered sacrifices in blood and money incomparably more serious than those of the United States.

Sixth: The president, in threatening to withdraw his signature from the treaty of Versailles, which established the security of France, gravely injures the very new French policy for which he invited protection. He not only destroys the value of his first and most important act, but annihilates it absolutely since he shows that engagements contracted in accord with his policy can be destroyed lightly.

**Conviction Reveals Crime.**

Dumas, Ark.—Following the conviction and 21 year sentence of Jenkins Jefferson, negro, at Arkansas City, on a charge of criminal assault, it became known here for the first time that Jefferson had attempted to assault a white girl 13 years old. Parents of the child aided the officers in keeping the matter a secret until Jefferson had been convicted at a special session of the Desha court and was sent to the penitentiary at Dumas, where he was taken by

Approximately 1,000,000 acres of free lands in the four western provinces of Canada have been taken up by returned soldiers in the last year. The soldiers' settlement board reports that up to August 1, 3,768 soldier-grant entries had been made in these provinces; 858 in Manitoba, 1,124 in Saskatchewan, 1,702 in Alberta and 84 in British Columbia. At 100 acres each, this means 602,880 acres. About two-thirds of these soldiers have also exercised their right to take up homestead land.
