



Of New Agreement Which Lewis Ex pects Will Be Adopted-Then He Hopes To Force Another







### HOOVER ACCEPTS G. O. P.

#### Former Food Dictator Says He Might Make Presidential Race.

San Francisco.-Herbert Hoover telegraphed the Hoover Republican Club of California that he would accept the republican nomination for president, "if it is felt that the issues necessitate it, and it is demanded of me." Hoover aligned himself with those favoring the United States' en try into the league of nations with reservations "safeguarding American traditions and interests" and declared he differed just as strongly with "the extreme view advocated against any league at all" as he did with "the streme position taken by the president on participation in purely European affairs."

# STATE KILLS SUFFRAGE

Women Now Looking Te Vermont and

North Carolina.

Washington .- "We will now turn our attention to Vermont and North Carolina," declared' Mrs. Florence Brewer Boeckel, of the national woman's party, after receiving notification that the suffrage amendment had been defeated in the lower house of the Delaware legislature by a vote of twenty-two to nine.

The national woman's party is hopeful that ratification of the amendment will yet be completed before mid-summer. The hopes that the Vermona legislature will be called into special session are somewhat shaky.

#### Wilson Centrols Troops.

Washington .- President Wilson informed the house in response to a resolution of injuiry that American troops on the Rhine still were controlled by the terms of the armistice and were subject only to his orders as commander-in-chief of the American army. Field Marshal Foch of France, the president said, had no jurisdiction over the troops nor are they in any way controlled by the decisions of the allied Rhineland commission which makes rules for the governing of the occupied territory.

7. Neither shall the sunlight of heat come upon them (v. 17). 8. God shall wipe away all tears



SUFFRAGE VICTORY IS SURE

Last Three Necessary States Will Soon Ratify.

Washington .- The woman's suffrage amendment to the federal constitution is now practically certain of ratification in time for women to vote for the next president of the United States, according to members of the national woman's party headquarters here.

A telegram received at party headquarters announced that a special session of the Delaware legislature has been called by Governor Townsend for March 22, and that there was every reason to believe the amendment would be raified.

At the same time word has been received here that West Virginia had reconsidered its vote on the measure which ended in a tie, and that Senator George A. Block came all the way from California, purposely to cast his vote in favor of the amendment.

The republican national committee provided a special train from Chicago to Charlestown at a cost of \$5,000 for Senator Block.

Washington will also vote on national suffrage for women March 22, the same day as Delaware. Oklahoma ratified last week, making the thirtythird state.

No Vermont Special Session. Burlington, Vt.--Governor Clement refused the plea of suffrage leaders to call a special session of the Vermont legislature to ratify suffrage

Magnolia Doubles Its Capital Stock Houston, Texas -- Magnolia Petroleum Company officials arriving here announced that the company had voted to increase its capital stock from \$60,000,000 to \$120,000,000. The stock will be used to declare a stock dividend with part held in the treasury.

#### Taggart To Try Again.

Indianapolis .- The name of Thomas Taggart will appear on the Indiana primary ballot for the democratic nomination for United States senator.





This Pretty Plant Provides Pasture, Hay and Fertility for Growing Other Valuable Crops on Farm.

(Prepared by the United States Depart- | can be so "sour" that even alsike will ment of Agriculture.) Clover is the most important crop

on the farm for keeping up the land. Old? Yes. But perhaps you remember that once when the queen of France demanded something absolutely new in a frock the dressmaker replied, "There is nothing new-except what has been forgotten." Maybe the forage crops specialist of the United States department of agriculture had just that thought in mind when he made the statement just quoted. Farmers have been drifting away from clover. Apparently, some of them have forgotten the old truth that clover is the most important crop for keeping the land productive, and the clover story needs to be told again.

Crops demand a soil containing four things-organic matter, nitrogen, potash, phosphoric acid.

Of these four essential things, clover supplies two, organic matter and nitrozen. It cannot add phosphorus or potash, but it can return what it takes out. The most important point is that clover in the crop rotation will not grow. In such a case there is nothing for it but to lime or to quit clover.

On land that has lime but is otherwise poor and lacks organic matter, try sweet clover. It is no use sowing this on "sour" soil. It won't thrive. But with lime it is about the best clover for poor land. It will add organic matter and nitrogen and leave such a soil in better shape for the following crops. Sweet clover seed is cheaper than red and in many cases a farmer could profitably substitute sweet clover for red in the rotation. The questions involved in the importance of clover and methods of getting a stand, use of lime, and sweet clover are only touched on here. Any state experiment station or the United States department of agriculture will send bulletins or additional information on request.




