RESULTS OF CITY ELECTION HELD TUESDAY

In the election for city officials Tuesday the following candidates received the number of votes as shown below:

For mayor: G. L. Reese, 175.
For trustees: A. D. Ribble, 180; W. H. Ball, 122; Watt Stewart, 120; C. J. Whitcomb, 117; C. V. Harris, 64; S. B. Fletcher, 60; C. W. Ison, 58.
For town clerk: S. N. Hancock, 177.

Besides the above vote some patriotic believer in "woman's rights" cast a ballot for two ladies for trustees, but unfortunately they were not elected.

The new council will be: G. L. Reese, mayor; A. D. Ribble, W. H. Ball, Watt Stewart, and C. J. Whitcomb, trustees; S. N. Hancock, clerk.

The candidates for mayor and clerk had no opponents.

The waterworks bond issue election, which was held at the same time, to decide whether or not the trustees of the Town of Portales be authorized to issue bonds in the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars for the purpose of securing funds for the construction and extension of a system for supplying water for the town, resulted in a vote of 100 for and 28 against.

Salvation Army Rescue Work

Denver, Colo., April 7.—Growing, kicking, gurgling babies, fifty three of them, all children of fallen girls, greeted Mrs. Commissioner Thomas Estill on the occasion of her visit to a western rescue and maternity home, according to a story she told members of the Denver commercial club at a luncheon given in her honor here recently.

"These fifty three children appealed to my mother heart," Mrs. Estill said. "I am the mother of eight children and the grandmother of seven. Every child and grandchild has been given good opportunities in life despite the fact that all my own children were born in different nations.

"My heart bleeds at the sight of these little fellows, long babies, short babies, fat babies, skinny babies, all of them pretty. They are the victims of circumstances. Some of their mothers were bad. Most of them were not. Most of them were the victims of outrages. The average age of their mothers is 19 years. The youngest mother is eleven years old.

"I never see these little fellows, some of them reflecting the heartbreak of their mothers' disgrace in their pinched little faces, but that I determine that the Salvation Army will give every mother and child a chance to grow into sweetness and goodness."

The Portales band is now getting in shape to furnish some real music this summer. They have employed Mr. Croft of Clovis to give personal lessons twice a week and also to meet with them in their rehearsals each Tuesday and Thursday night. The boys are already showing a great improvement and by summer will be playing music that will be a credit to any band. Let the good work go on.

UNUSUAL FACTS ABOUT OUR PRESIDENTS

Of the 27 men who have been President of the United States, 14 were sons of farmers, 3 of clergymen, 2 of lawyers, 3 of merchants, 1 iron manufacturer, 1 tanner, 1 constable, 1 statesman and 1 jurist.

Farmers' sons evidently have a better chance of occupying the White House than any others.

The last farmer's son to attain the Presidency was Benjamin F. Harrison.

The fathers of Presidents Arthur, Cleveland and Wilson were preachers.

Fifteen Presidents were of English descent; 1 Welsh, 3 Scotch, 6 Scotch-Irish, and 2 Dutch.

Ten of the Presidents were not college graduates. They were: Washington, Jackson, Van Buren, Taylor, Fillmore, Lincoln, Johnson, Cleveland and McKinley.

Nineteen Presidents were lawyers at the time of their election. Washington and William Henry Harrison were the only farmers ever elected.

The religious inclinations of the Chief Executives varied considerably. Eight were Episcopalians, 4 Unitarians, 7 Presbyterians, 2 Reformed Dutch, 4 Methodist, 1 Disciple and 1 Liberal. Garfield belonged to the Disciples, Jackson was the Liberal and Roosevelt and Van Buren the Reformed Dutch, and the two Adams, Fillmore and Taft the Unitarians. Some authorities claim that Andrew Johnson was not a member of any church, but that his wife belonged to the Methodist congregation.

Eight Presidents were born in Virginia—Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, William Henry Harrison, Tyler, Taylor, and Wilson.

Six Presidents were Ohioans by birth—Grant, Hayes, Garfield, Benjamin Harrison, McKinley and Taft.

Buchanan and Cleveland were the only bachelors elected President. Cleveland married during his first term, but Buchanan stuck it out for life.

Cleveland was christened Stephen Grover, Grant was named Hiram Ulysses, and Wilson, Thomas Woodrow.

Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley were assassinated while in office.

Diek Lawrence, a house painter, tried to kill Andrew Jackson at the Capitol in 1835. The pistol however, missed fire. After his retirement from the Presidency, Roosevelt was painfully shot at Milwaukee.

William Henry Harrison was the oldest President, Roosevelt the youngest. The former was 68 and the latter 42 at the time they assumed office. Harrison broke all records as to the number of children. He was the father of six boys and four girls. Rutherford B. Hayes ran him a close second with seven sons and 1

CHRISTIANIZED FOREIGNERS PROVE LOYAL TO FLAG OF UNITED STATES

SOUTHERN BAPTISTS FIND THAT NO EVANGELIZED PERSON FROM OTHER COUNTRIES HAS PROVED TRAITOR TO HIS ADOPTED LAND—LARGE WORK IS BEING DONE AMONG THEM.

Patriotism and religion go hand in hand in the work which Southern Baptists are doing for the foreigners in their midst, declare the several workers in this field who have found that wherever a man, woman or child of foreign birth or parentage has been won to the Christian religion that one stands foursquare for the flag, laws and institutions of the United States.
 Work in evangelizing and Americanizing the 4,000,000 people of foreign birth and parentage residing within the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention has been carried on by representatives of the Home Mission Board and the Woman's Missionary Union of the Southern Baptist Convention and the various state mission boards for several years, but this work will be enlarged and intensified as a result of the larger proceeds made available for it through the 75 Million Campaign.
Important Centers Named.
 Among some of the more important centers in the South and Southwest where work of this character is carried on are Richmond and Norfolk, Virginia; Baltimore, Maryland; Louisville, Kentucky; Tampa, Florida; Birmingham, Silver Hill and Mobile, Alabama; Meridian, Miss.; New Orleans and Church Point, La.; San Antonio, Laredo, El Paso and Fort Worth, Texas; Krebs, Okla., and East St. Louis, Herrin, Christopher, Harrisburg, Granite City and other points in Illinois.
Aims That Are Sought.
 Indicating the aims that are sought in this work, they may be briefly summarized as follows:
 1. To reach the little children that their feet may be started in the upward path.
 2. To inspire the older boys and girls with ideals that will help them to improve their environment and give them strength to cope with temptations.
 3. To interest the young people in sane and wholesome pleasures that their energies may be rightly directed.
 4. To help the women to be better home-makers, more careful wives and mothers and better Christians.
 5. To give Christ and an exalted citizenship to the neighborhood.
 In addition to the nurseries and playgrounds maintained for the children, clubs and classes are held daily for young and old, the neighborhood houses being open during the winter months from 8 to 6 in the afternoon and four nights in the week from 7 to 9. In addition to the English courses, cooking, sewing, first aid and nursing are taught girls, manual training and other useful courses are given the boys, along with practice in debating; while for the mothers there is instruction in housekeeping, care of the sick, sanitation and food selection. Through the mission Sunday schools, vacation Bible study classes and otherwise a knowledge of the Bible is afforded and the way thus opened for a personal surrender of lives to God.
Life of Communities Changed.
 And in every community where a Good Will Center or other social work has been established by the Christian workers there has come about a marked transformation in the lives of individual members of the community and in the appearance of the homes and general premises. Cleanliness has superseded dirt, happiness has taken the place of sorrow, and hope has come to lighten the faces that were formerly overshadowed by depression and doubt. Little tots who previously wandered through the streets now find pleasure and helpful entertainment in the games, stories and Bible lessons provided at the settlement houses; aimless boys and girls have been fired with zeal and ambition to become useful Christian citizens; mothers burdened with handicaps of heavy work and poverty have taken a new lease on life when they have found that there are those in the world who want to help them to a higher life; and the fathers, noting the improvement of the members of their families, have yielded to the refining and uplifting influences that have been thrown about them in the home and the community. The viewpoint of the whole community has been changed and better citizens, from both the patriotic and the religious viewpoint, are the result.

GIRL, 13, SEES FAMILY SLAIN

Claims Moonshiner Beau of Sister Committed Quadruple Murder.

ONLY ONE ESCAPES

Facing Trial for Attack on Girl, Man is Believed to Have Planned to Wipe Out Whole Family.

Amory, Miss—Charlie Marshall, moonshiner and backwoods beau, is under heavy guard in the jail at Aberdeen, charged with the most brutal quadruple murder ever known in this section.

For, when they buried the charred and shattered bodies of Fannie Green Miller, who had been Marshall's sweetheart; her eight-months-old baby, Burley, said to have been Marshall's son; Robert Miller, Fannie's father, and Leonard, her brother, sixteen, the stage was set for the lynching of Charlie Marshall.

Pearl Miller, thirteen, the only surviving member of the family, says that she watched Charlie Marshall at the hideous task of slaughtering the four victims of the swampland tragedy.

The belief of the countryside is that Charlie Marshall, facing trial shortly for an attack on Fannie Miller, planned to dodge this trial by wiping out the whole Miller family, and that the escape of the thirteen-year-old girl upset this plan.

From miles about the lean and swarthy dwellers of the bottom country drove in with their womenfolk seated in chairs in the boxes of the lumber wagons to discuss in shocked whispers what had been done in the blackness of a stormy night.

Sheriff John B. Lewis fled from Amory with his prisoner in an automobile and saved Marshall from the vengeance of the countryside.

There was much talk in the Tom Bigbee bottom about the Miller family and Charlie Marshall. Fannie Miller had known Marshall all her life, but started "keeping company" with him three years ago, when he "saw her home" from a circuit rider's meeting.

She was fifteen then, and Marshall twice her age.

Her mother died 12 years ago, and in the lonely farmhouse Fannie had no one to whom she could confide.

Later she was compelled to tell her father what had happened. She said that Marshall had seized her as she

was walking with him in a field, and had dragged her into a canebrake, smothering her cries by pressing his hand over her mouth.

Robert Miller had his three motherless children to care for, one of them needing him more desperately than ever, so he determined to let the law take its course.

According to Pearl Miller's story, which she tells with the self-control of a strong-minded adult, Marshall entered her home after her father, brother and sister had been shot down and the home dynamited.

He clubbed to death the baby crawling on the floor beside its dead mother, soaked the place with oil and set fire to it as Pearl fled through the loft and ran, with a sprained ankle, over a mile of flooded fields to the home of a neighbor.

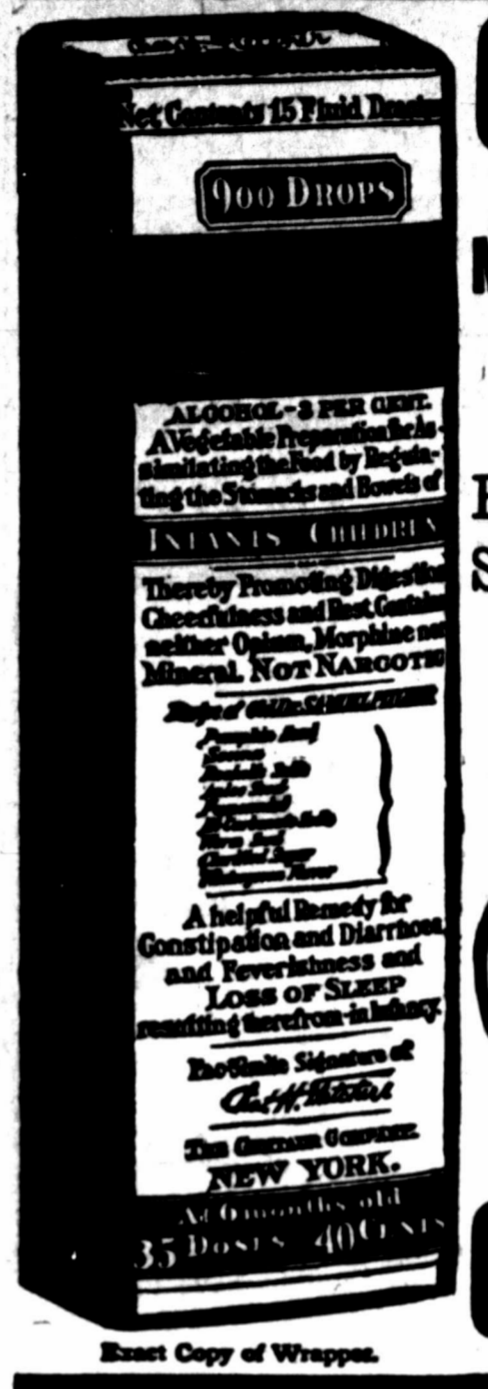

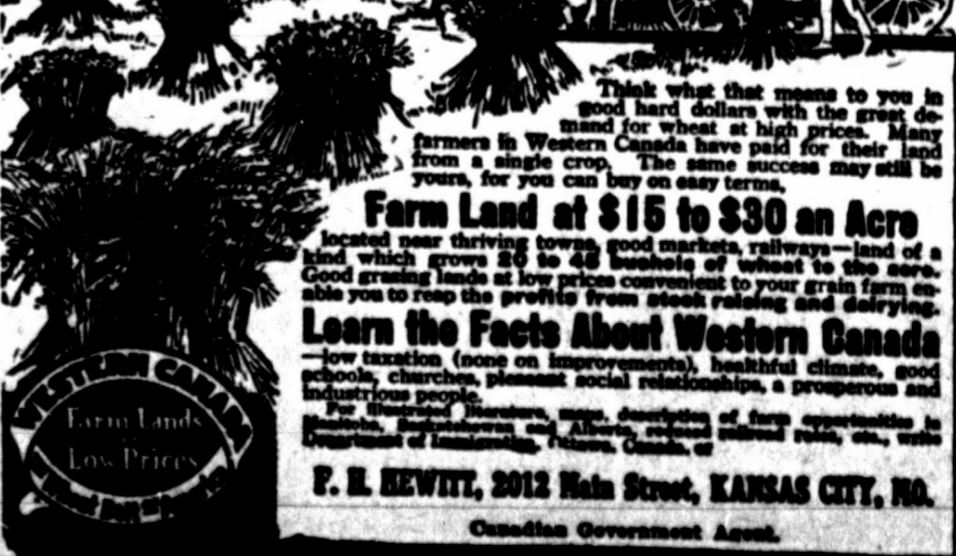

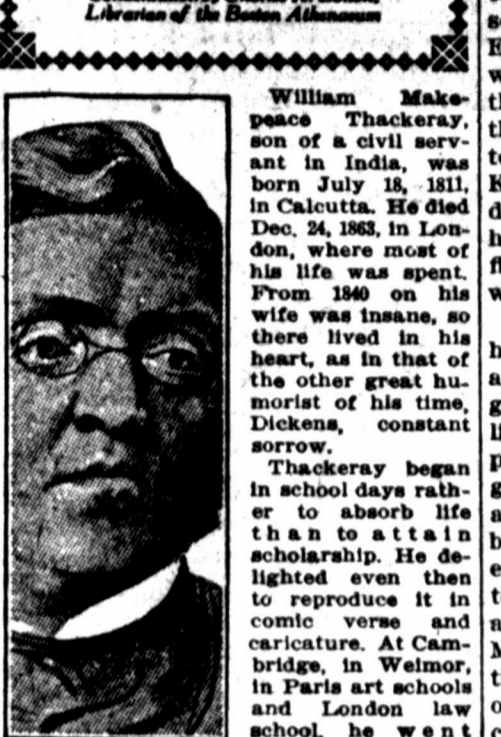

Will the Senate Concur?

By the spirit in which the senate determines Truman H. Newberry's fitness and right to hold his seat while under sentence to the penitentiary for debauching an election, the Republican majority of that branch of congress will test the sincerity of their own and their party's professions in behalf of a clean ballot and honest government. There is no longer any doubt as to whether Mr. Newberry was justly charged with complicity in this corruption. A court has heard the evidence, Mr. Newberry has presented his defense, and a jury has found a verdict of guilty. The question for the senate to answer is whether it wants to continue its membership a man who has purchased his seat by the criminal use of money. An apparent effort is being made in some Republican quarters to give an impression that Newberry's prosecution and conviction was the partisan act of a Democratic administration. The facts belie such a suggestion. The grand jury which indicted Newberry and his co-conspirators was composed of 21 Republicans and 2 Democrats. The jury which tried Newberry and his fellow defendants was made up of 10 Republicans and 2 Democrats, and the federal judge who presided at the trial is a Republican, appointed by President Roosevelt, in whose cabinet Newberry served as secretary of the navy. The people of the country concur in the verdict of the Michigan jury. Will the Republican majority of the Senate do likewise?

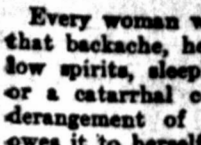

El Paso.—Francisco Villa commanded the bandits who held up and robbed the north bound Mexico City passenger train near Carrizales, when thirty-three persons were killed and several held for ransom, including one American, according to passengers who reached Chihuahua City.

According to passengers the train was stopped by an explosive placed on the track which derailed the locomotive. A pitched battle ensued between fifty Yaqui soldiers of the train guard and Villa followers numbering 300, commanded by Francisco Villa in person.

After vainly attempting to break open the express car safe, the bandits set fire to the train. Before leaving Villa harangued the passengers, telling them he was not a bandit but that he was fighting for civil liberty and to avenge the death of General Felipe Angeles.

The passengers walked twenty-four kilometers north where they were picked up by a train from Jimenez. It is reported that a number of passengers hidden in the cars were burned to death when the train was destroyed but that it not confirmed.

American Killed by Mexican. Tucson, Ariz.—Stanley White, Los Angeles, who was killed in Sonora, Mexico, in June 31, 1919, was killed by Mexican soldiers instead of Yaqui Indians as reported by the Mexican officials.

EMBARGO FOLLOWS STRIKE Only Funeral and Newspaper Express Business Handled. Chicago.—An embargo was placed against all express shipments except newspapers and funeral equipment by the American Railway Express Company following the strike of insurgent railway express clerks who demanded an increase in wages of \$35 a month.

INDICT MINERS AND OPERATORS

FOR CONSPIRACY TO ADVANCE PRICE OF COAL TO CONSUMER

ANOTHER INCREASE TO MINERS

President's Commission Awards Total of 25 Per Cent, Includes 14 Per Cent Already Being Paid.

Indianapolis.—An indictment charging conspiracy in violation of the Lever fuel control act and the federal criminal code, naming 125 coal operators and miners as defendants, was returned in federal court here by a special grand jury which has been investigating the coal industry since December 17, 1919.

Ten Overt Acts. Ten overt acts are charged against the coal men in the indictment which contains eighteen counts. It is understood that many of the violations charged have no connection with the strike of bituminous miners but occurred prior to the signing of the armistice.

The indictment was brought under sections four and nine of the Lever act and section thirty-seven of the criminal code and charged in general that miners and operators conspired to enhance the price of necessities by restricting distribution, limiting manufacture and by other means, and conspiring to commit offenses against the United States as defined in the criminal code. The penalty on conviction is a fine not exceeding \$10,000, imprisonment for not more than two years, or both fine and imprisonment.

Washington.—The commission appointed by President Wilson to settle the coal strike has split definitely on the question of wage increases and hours of work.

The majority—Henry M. Robinson, chairman, representing the public and Rembrandt Peale, representing the operators in a report submitted to President Wilson recommended a general wage advance of approximately 25 per cent and that hours and conditions of labor remain unchanged.

Washington.—The woman's suffrage amendment to the federal constitution is now practically certain of ratification in time for women to vote for the next president of the United States, according to members of the national woman's party headquarters here.

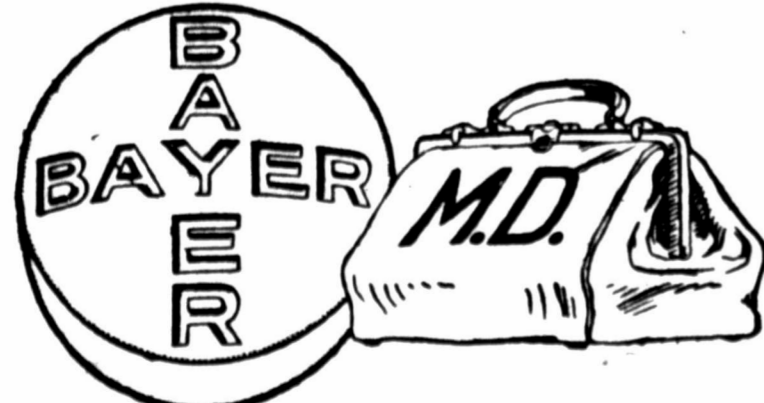

CLOVER IS MOST ESSENTIAL CROP FOR BEST MAINTENANCE OF SOIL FERTILITY



This Pretty Plant Provides Pasture, Hay and Fertility for Growing Other Valuable Crops on Farm.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Clover is the most important crop on the farm for keeping up the land. Old? Yes. But perhaps you remember that once when the queen of France demanded something absolutely new in a frock the dressmaker replied, "There is nothing new—except what has been forgotten." Maybe the forage crops specialist of the United States department of agriculture had just that thought in mind when he made the statement just quoted. Farmers have been drifting away from clover. Apparently, some of them have forgotten the old truth that clover is the most important crop for keeping the land productive, and the clover story needs to be told again.

Crops demand a soil containing four things—organic matter, nitrogen, potash, phosphoric acid. Of these four essential things, clover supplies two, organic matter and nitrogen. It cannot add phosphorus or potash, but it can return what it takes out. The most important point is that clover in the crop rotation will supply the nitrogen or most of it. Numerous demonstrations of that fact have been made by the state experiment stations. Land on which clover is grown in rotation with other crops makes better yields than land on which no clover is grown. The specialists believe that unless there is a more general return to clover productivity will certainly decline.

Be Sure Seed is Right. Here are some of the things they say about sowing clover this spring. Clover seed is high—probably 80 cents a pound at retail. Do not plant it unless you plant it right. Have the seed tested. The state seed laboratory or the seed laboratory of the United States department of agriculture will do it. You can't afford to take a chance by not testing it.

Clover seed is most commonly sown on winter wheat in the early spring. This is ordinarily good practice, but if the wheat field was left rough in the fall the seed bed may not be favorable and much seed may be wasted. Clover needs a seed bed that is firm below but fine and loose on top. Use a drill when possible. On loamy soil harrow the seed in on the wheat, but do not attempt it when the land is wet.

Best Soil for Clover. As a rule red clover will not do well on land that is "sour," either naturally or because it has been so long cropped that the lime in the soil has been used up. There are occasional exceptions. Clover has been known to do well on land that had a lime requirement of 1,400 pounds an acre, but this land had been heavily manured and fertilized. Usually clover wants soil that is neutral or nearly so. It is a safe statement that in most cases where clover goes out or fails to make a fair crop two tons of ground limestone an acre would help a great deal. In many cases this would make the difference between success and failure. In other cases lime may have to be supplemented with phosphoric acid or potash. The use of potash will not be warranted when the price is as high as it is, except in the rare case when this element is decidedly the limiting factor. Lime, however, is fundamental. There is generally no use seeding red clover on "sour" soil.

Use for Alsike Clover. If the farmer cannot lime and the land is worn or "sour," or if the land is poorly drained, low, and damp, alsike clover should be seeded. It is a common practice now to mix the red clover with alsike for worn or partly run-down land. Alsike likes lime, too, but it will make a crop on land that will not bring red clover. This is especially true if the soil is both "sour" and damp. Of course, soil

can be so "sour" that even alsike will not grow. In such a case there is nothing for it but to lime or to quit clover.

On land that has lime but is otherwise poor and lacks organic matter, try sweet clover. It is no use sowing this on "sour" soil. It won't thrive. But with lime it is about the best clover for poor land. It will add organic matter and nitrogen and leave such a soil in better shape for the following crops. Sweet clover seed is cheaper than red and in many cases a farmer could profitably substitute sweet clover for red in the rotation.

The questions involved in the importance of clover and methods of getting a stand, use of lime, and sweet clover are only touched on here. Any state experiment station or the United States department of agriculture will send bulletins or additional information on request.

IS FARM PRODUCING FOODS FOR FAMILY?

One of Important Factors Determining Amount of Income.

Garden and Live Stock Are Usually Cared for at Times That Do Not Materially Interfere With Regular Farm Work.

The farm producing such of the family foods as are adapted to local conditions in ample quantities for the welfare of the family?

The value of the family living furnished directly from the farm is one of the important factors determining the amount of the income of the farm and the degree to which the farm business is safe and profitable, says the United States department of agriculture. This is especially true of the smaller farms.

The garden and live stock which supply the larger part of the family food are usually cared for at times that interfere comparatively little with the regular farm commercial enterprises, and by labor which otherwise would not be utilized. Further, it has been found that, up to a considerable size of farm business, when the family food is produced on the farm, this item, plus the fuel and shelter furnished by the farm, amount to an equivalent of the rent for the entire farm or interest on the whole farm investment.

DRAINAGE FOR GARDEN LAND

It is Advisable to Thoroughly Drain All Soil Inclined to Contain Too Much Moisture.

Garden land inclined to be wet should be thoroughly drained before crops are planted upon it. If tile drains or open ditches cannot be provided, the next best thing is to plant the crops on slight ridges, so as to get their roots above the water table in the soil.
