

In a proclamation the governor declared these officials had "failed, refused and neglected to maintain orders and preserve the peace' and that their suspension was for the duration of martial law, which be-Galveston June 7.

Governor Hobby's proclamation folcommanded of state troops at Gal- country and he came to no harm. veston, in which it was held that the governor had constitutional authority to suspend the city officials. General Wolters made a personal report on the Galveston situation to the attorney general. The nature of the report was not made public.

In his proclamation Governor Hobby CHRISTENSEN PLANS TOUR said Galveston officials have made "no attempt to prevent and suppress the riots that occurred in Galveston or to arrest and apprehend the persons who engaged and participated therein; neither did they put down the insurrection that existed nor would they attempt to do so."

Southwest News From All Over New Mexico and Arizona

Western Newspaper Union News Service. All mining claimants in Arizona who expect to make application for surveys and patents this year with a view of obtaining final receipt before the end of the year and avoiding annual assessment work should make application to the surveyor general without

At a regular meeting of the Tucumcari, N M., Chamber of Commerce, Mr. McGee suggested that a bonus be given to the first oil company bringing in a well in Quay county or within thirty miles of the city. No final action was taken but it is believed the bonus will be raised.

A civic organization at Albuquerque has started a movement to change the name of the state of New Mexico. A esolution was passed saying that in view of the turbulent conditions in Mexico and association of names, the Legislature be asked to rename the state. No name was recommended in the resolution

Federal aid for Arizona, and there is no possibility that any money originally allotted to that state will be withdrawn because of failure to match the funds. This is the import of a wire received by the State Highway Department from Assistant State Engineer F. M. Holmquist.

Indications are that mining operations will be resumed at Tyrone camp in New Mexico, about August 1. The new Marcey mills have been received and are being installed and there is more machinery in transit so it is expected that another month will put the big concentrator in working order.

W C. Churchill of Hazelton, Pa., was found dead in his berth on a special train of Shriners of Rajah temple of Reading when it arrived at Albuquerque. His death was said to be due to heart disease. The train made a stop of two hours while brief services were held and the body prepared for shipment to Hazelton.

The Universal garage of Portales, N. M., has established a free camping ground for tourists which when completed will be one of the best in that section of the state. The ground is located in the rear of the garage and will be equipped with free water and lights and all the expenses will be paid by the garage people.

Nearly all the equipment for building the road from Lovington to Carlspad, N. M., has arrived and work will be started soon. Several large trucks will be used in the work and a power grader has also been shipped and will arrive in a few days. Part of this road has already been graded by the Lea County Construction Company.

Fulfilling every confident expectation of the members of the county highway commission, the board of supervisors, Judge Rush in Federal Court in Chicago has ruled against all those attempting to block the highway building program in Maricopa county, Ariz, by denying the application for a temporary injunction to prevent the delivery of any more of the \$4,000,000 issue of highway bonds to the purchasers, and dismissed the case.

The big motor convoy which is making a transcontinental run from Washington to San Francisco under the auspices of the War Department will pass through Silver City on its way across New Mexico. The total personnel besides the big trucks is twenty officers and 160 men. The trip will be made at the rate of forty-five miles per day and barring accidents should arrive in Silver City about the 25th of August.

The Western Trading and Elevator Company has purchased a site and will let the contract soon for its new elevator building at Clovis, N. M.

Gen. Alvaro Obregon, in a statement at Nogales, Ariz., regarding reports of revolts in parts of Mexico against the de facto government, said the revolting generals are former Carranza adherents who fear punishment by the present government on graft charges The revolts, the general said, are confined to two or three local sections and are regarded as a bluff, preceding flight of the revolting parties to the mountains as fugitives from justice.

The long-talked-of and much-to-bedesired highway through the Black range, one of New Mexico's most beautiful scenic routes, is now an assured fact, for the boards of commissioners, both of Sierra and Grant counties, have made special tax levies, in accordance with an act of the State Legislature, to raise the necessary funds with which to build the road. This highway will open up a new link in an east and west transcontinental highway between the Elephant Butte dam in New Mexico and the Roosevelt dam in Arizona

A resolution calling on President Wilson to place an embargo on further importations of beef, mutten and wool for the rest of this year, or until such time as is necessary to stabilize home markets was adopted at the joint convention of the Arizona Cattle Growers' Association and the Arizona Wool Growers' Association at Flagstaff,





TO DAMAGE NEW ORLEANS AS COTTON CENTER IF STEPS NOT TAKEN

IS TO BE IN EFFECT AT ONCE

Would Be Modified So That Quarrantined Area Would Not Extend Accross the Mississippi River.

Washington. - Establishment federal quarantine against interstate shipment of cotton from sections of Louisiana and Texas infected by the pink boilworm, will be effected within a fortnight, it was announced at a conference of cotton growers and state officials with the federal horticultural board.

The federal quarantine order would include these districts:

Infested areas—Counties of Orange, Jefferson, Chambers and Galveston and parts of the counties of Brazoria. Harris, Liberty and Jasper in Teaxs and the parishes of Cameron, Jeff Davis and Calisieu, in Louisiana.

Regulated areas-Portions of Fort Bend and Newton counties, Texas, in addition to the Texas counties within the infected district; the area within a three-mile railway, planter's oil mill at Hearne, Texas; all the counties of Maverick, Kinney and Valvere, all the counties of Presidio and Brewster; all the counties of Ward and Reeves; and in Louisiana, areas around Grenta, Eunice, Bossard, Alexandria and Shreveport.



GIVE CLEAN BILL TO NOMINEES SENATE PROBE SAYS CAN-

Further Inquiry Into Palmer's Office Is Planned By the Committee.

DIDATES IN BOUNDS

Washington. - Governor Cox and Senator Harding, respectively democratic and republican candidates for the presidency, will be given a 'clean bill" by the senate committee investigating pre-convention campaign expenses, according to statements made by members of the committee.

Senator Kenyon of Iowa, chairman of the committee, has before him a mass of testimony relative to the ailged activities of the department of justice in the campaign. It now appears likely, it was stated, that the committee will be unable to make a report on this case before the fund appropriated for a high cost of living investigation has been expended.

"It is true we shall give fo ther consideration to the activities of the attorney general's offices," Kenyon declared, "but I do not wish to go into the details of this or any other matter until both sides have had an opportunity to be heard."

Kenyon said that every place the committee has held sessions, testimony has been obtained which will broaden the scope of the investigation. All pre-convention campaign expenditures will be taken up before the election disbursements of the various parties and senatorial candidates are touched upon.

The committee inquired into the campaign expenses of both Cox and Harding before the convention and found that each "had conducted a conservative campaign from the standpoint of finances, according to members. The committee will not conclude its hearings until all matters brought to its attention are thoroughly gone over, Senator Kenyon, de-



The death of Saul lay open to David the path to the throne. This would have rejoiced the heart of many, but David was sad. Instead of reward being given to the slayer of Saul, quick vengeance was executed upon him. I. David Made King Over Judah

He knew full well that the Lord by the hand of Samuel had anointed him to be the successor of Saul. He had learned the essential lesson which the School of Providence was designed to teach, namely, that the position now open to him was no easy one to fill. His exile and sufferings gave him selfcontrol. He had the good sense to know that promotion to the throne did but bring "harder duties and multiplied perplexities." He threw himself upon God and asked for guidance. He rendered instant obedience to the Lord's answer. If we are to enjoy God's fellowship and blessing we must render quick obedience. He made a right beginning, therefore God prospered him. When he reached Hebron the men of Judah came and anointed him king over them. Thus a part of the nation recognized him as king and ratified the work which Samuel did many years before. When David went up he took with him all who had been with him in exile and suffering. They are now sharers with him in the kingdom. When David's great son, Christ, shall enter upon his glorious reign, those who have been faithful to him in his rejection shall reign with him. "If we suffer we shall also reign with him." (II Tim. 2:12); "To him that overcometh will I grant to sit with me in my throne, even as I also overcame, Facts vs. Fiction am set down with my father in his throne." (Rev. 3:21).

II. David's Behavior Toward the 44 TOHN SHELL is without Men of Jabesh-Gilead (2:4-7).

The men of Jabesh owed much to Saul (I Sam. 11), and they showed this recognition of debt by making a daring dash to rescue his body from the ignominious exposure at Bethlehem. David's act of sending men to Jabesh with a message of good will the court house at Harlan gave the date of his birth, as for their affectionate remembrance of Saul is an exhibition of his noble generosity. His leve for the unfortunate age of 107. king survived all the injuries which he suffered at his hands. He forgave he was an expert maker of flint-lock rifles. John Shell rifles, and forgot them all. This was an act marked with his private mark just behind the lock, are of political shrewdness as well as a generous one. In fact the only policy which proves effective is that which proceeds from a generous heart. He deftly follows this generous commendation with a solicitude for the men of Jabesh to transfer their loyalty to himself, since he is now their legal king. Since Saul is now dead, he urges them to be valiant for him. In view of the civil war which was to follow he knew it would require valiant men to stand by God's king. This appeal to be valiant is needed now, for we are all called upon to take sides between God's appointed king, Jesus Christ, and Satan, the pretender to the throne. May Christ's appeal result in making us faithful and valiant for

III. The Dual Kingdom-War Between the House of Saul and the House of David (2:8-4:12).

This period of civil war lasted seven and a half years. Most of the tribes of Israel clung to Ishbosheth, Saul's son, whom Abner had proclaimed king at Mahanaim. Feuds continued between the rival generals. David's power increased while that of Ishbosbeth's waned.

IV. David Crowned King Over United Israel (5:1-5).

Though the struggle for supremacy lasted long and was a bitter one, Abner's death and Ishbosheth's assassination put an end to David's opposition. David's behavior during this time gradnally won for him the confidence of the tribes so that they all came to him at Hebron and anointed him as their king. They accepted his divine right to rule (v. 8). The reasons for aneinting him their king were:

1. He is their brother (v. 1). This is true of Christ our King. Through the incarnation he has become one with us. 2. He was their true leader in war, even in Saul's time (v. 2).

3. He was the Lord's choice (v. 2).
