

Castro County Farm Bureau Hits at Rise in Electricity Cost

The Castro County Farm Bureau held its annual policy convention Tuesday night and adopted 17 resolutions which may be likened to a 17-rung ladder: they extend from purely local matters to the top rung level of international relations.

Members met in the District Court Room to outline the county organization's policies and resolutions for the coming year.

The assembly adopted resolutions in three phases: local, state and national. The state and national resolutions could become main topics of conversation at the Texas annual convention and the national get-together.

Among the more noticeable resolutions passed by the Castro County Farm Bureau was a strongly-worded indictment of rising prices in the rural electricity program.

The "Resolution on Wholesale Electric Power," the bill was read and adopted as follows:

"WHEREAS, it has come to our attention that the contracts with which fourteen electric cooperatives were purchasing power from the West Texas Utilities Company with headquarters at Abilene, Texas, expired and that the power company recently asked for about a 27 percent increase in wholesale power cost; and

"WHEREAS, the wholesale rate was 5.6 mills per kilowatt-hour, has now increased to 7.1 mills per kilowatt-hour and will go up in case gas costs increase; and

"WHEREAS, a fuel clause was added to protect the power company in case the cost of gas became higher; and

"WHEREAS, we believe that any increase in wholesale power rates will cause power to cost the farmer more than he is now paying as the electric cooperatives were operating at cost before this increase in wholesale power to them was recommended by the company; and

"WHEREAS, the farmers are making less profit now than in former years and are unable to absorb any further increase in cost of production; Now therefore be it

"RESOLVED that the Farm Bureau go on record as being opposed to this or any other increase in wholesale power to the electric cooperatives who in turn must of necessity pass it on to the farmer.

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Rural Electric Cooperative Administration use all diligence in making generation and transmission loans available to the co-

operatives in Texas and the country as a whole with a minimum of delay in order that the cooperatives may be in a position to put in their own generating plants in case other power companies attempt to increase the cost of power on a percentage basis comparable to that of the West Texas Utilities Company."

In all, three amendments were passed at the Tuesday night meeting pertaining to local matters; seven were devoted to state affairs; and seven were resolved as problems of national interest. The "state" resolutions could possibly become part of the Texas Farm Bureau's platform, and the "national" resolutions might influence the National Farm Bureau's movement to obtain federal legislation favorable to agriculture.

Following is a summary of all the resolutions adopted by the Castro County Farm Bureau; their plateaus of significance is denoted by "Local," "State," and "National":

LOCAL

1. Be it resolved that the Castro County Farm Bureau commend the Commissioners Court for its efforts in keeping county road Right of Ways clear of noxious weeds. We also recommend that each precinct use discs on the Road Maintenance to further these efforts as has been practiced in some areas of the county.
2. Be it resolved that the Castro County Farm Bureau urge farmer members to direct their business to established merchants of the county and avoid trading with temporary merchants or businesses that may in the future come into the area during rush seasons and force unfair competition upon our established merchants.
3. Be it resolved that the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District be complimented in its efforts to obtain federal law allowing income tax deductions for water depletion.

STATE

1. We re-affirm our position of opposing any and every effort to repeal the Texas Right to Work Law.
2. We recommend that the State Directors elect a different president in lieu of Walter Hammond.
3. Be it resolved that the Castro County Farm Bureau favors the Rural Electric Cooperative Act in the registration fee in lieu of vehicles as personal property.
4. Be it resolved that, in the

event any bill is introduced in the Texas Legislature limiting enrollment number necessary for high schools, we urge the Texas Farm Bureau to oppose any such measure.

5. Whereas, the American Farm Bureau Federation has a number of member states organized in youth activities, Be it resolved that we favor a youth organization being organized within the Texas Farm Bureau.

6. It is understood that the State ASC Committee has expressed its intent of asking the USDA Secretary for permission to withhold 8 percent reserve of the state cotton allotment. We therefore recommend that the Texas Farm Bureau Board take immediate steps to implement our position of a 2 percent reserve.

7. Whereas, cotton growers are now allowed to have their cotton grading re-classified only once, Be it resolved that we favor a second re-classification on cotton grading at another office be allowed a farmer at the farmer's expense, if he is dissatisfied with his cotton's first re-classification.

NATIONAL

1. Be it resolved that we urge the Texas Farm Bureau to work toward obtaining federal legislation allowing income tax deductions for water depletions.
2. Be it resolved that we urge the Commodity Credit Corporation to sell our surplus farm commodities to foreign countries and allow the commodities to be shipped in transportation to be chosen by the buyer. The present laws require one-half all commodities to be shipped in American vessels.
3. Be it resolved that we favor feed grains being supported at 95 percent of the support price for corn in non-commercial corn areas.
4. Whereas, cotton classing under the Smith-Doxey Act is of great value to cotton growers, we recommend that this act be expanded and improved. Grade cards should accurately reflect the true grades of cotton. Research should be expanded in developing mechanical means of grading cotton.
5. Be it resolved we recommend that the "Pink Sheet" (listing of the cotton classes) be returned to the gin where the practice has been discontinued and that each cotton classer be given a number and that this be placed on the listing sheet returned to the gin.
6. Be it resolved that the Castro County Farm Bureau favor 50 percent parity on basic commodities with acreage control.

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Heavy Local Rain Dampens Hopes For Early Harvest

Hail Also Reported As Cotton Growers Fear Yellow Stains

The annual "when you don't need them" rains hit much of Castro County Wednesday just as the cotton harvest was going into full swing.

Hail was reported from parts of southwest Castro County. Andy Behrends of Big Square reported an inch of rain and said enough fine hail fell to put a white covering on the ground. He said he didn't think it damaged his cotton, however.

Cecil Ginn, who lives south of the Flagg Gin, said his farm received .70 of an inch with light hail, and heavy hail was reported in the vicinity of the George Carpenter farm in the southwest corner of the county.

The rains were heavier in some areas than in others, and it was hard to ascertain how much or how little fell in the weather path.

However the rain belt apparently extended from the Sunnyside Store, which reported a sprinkle, to the western edge of the county. The rain clouds traveled in a northeasterly direction Wednesday, and as much as three inches of rain with hail was reported between Earth and Flagg.

The rains hit Dimmitt at 2:50 p. m. Wednesday after covering a swath through the county from southwest to northeast. Dimmitt received about .15 of an inch in a five-minute rain, and a slow drizzle continued through Thursday. Edwin "Goose" Ramey, official precipitation compiler for Castro County, reported .40 of an inch at noon Thursday.

The rain clouds covered a general area Thursday morning, extending in a 15-mile radius from Dimmitt in all directions. The heavy clouds that had passed over the county were later reported dropping rain between Hereford and Canyon, an area which had received harder rains the previous day.

Cotton was delayed for periods of two days to a week, local farmers estimated, and the delay could easily be extended by more rains.

Many county farmers were worried about the rain yellow-tinting the fine cotton crop this year, while others thought no damage would be done if weather conditions allow the cotton to dry quickly.

The rains in general ranged from three inches between the drops to three inches deep. It was still raining late Thursday and regional weather bureaus could see no let-up.

S. P. Maxwell, 95, Buried on Sunday

Funeral services were conducted in the First Methodist Church Sunday afternoon for one of the oldest citizens of this area, Mr. Sterling Price Maxwell.

Mr. Maxwell, who would have been 95 on January 4, is the father of Troy Maxwell of Dimmitt. He had lived in Dimmitt with his son's family for 28 years.

Mr. Maxwell died Friday in the Morgan Convalescent Home at Claude, where he had lived for three years.

Sterling Price Maxwell was born in Springfield, Mo., January 4, 1862. He married Miss Allie Tipton in Little Rock, Ark., in 1883. His wife passed away in 1913.

Mr. Maxwell farmed in Delhi, Okla., until he was 64 years of age. He moved to Dimmitt in 1925. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include his two sons, Troy of Dimmitt and Claude of Bakersfield, Calif.; one surviving brother, C. G. of Arvix, Calif.; five grandchildren, including Dale Maxwell of Lubbock and Donnie Maxwell of Dimmitt; several grandnephews and nieces.

Services were conducted by Rev. Raymond Van Zandt, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Dimmitt. Burial was in Castro Memorial Gardens under the direction of Demis Funeral Home of Dimmitt.

Hart Farmer-Merchant Dinner Is Termed As 'Very Successful'

Sixty-three Dimmitt and Hart farmers and merchants met together over the banquet table Monday night in one of the county's most successful farmer-merchant dinners to date.

The meeting was in the newly-rededicated Hart American Legion Building. Members of the Hart Senior Home Demonstration Club prepared and served the banquet meal.

Ed Harris, Jr., Hart lumberman, acted as master of ceremonies at the dinner. Principal speaker was Hal Mayfield of radio station KGNC, Amarillo.

After Rev. Jack Johnson, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Hart, had pronounced the invocation, each businessman and farmer present stood and told his name and occupation to the other Castro Countyans.

Mr. Harris made the welcoming address for the Hart men present, and Russel Moran, county attorney and member of commerce president made the response for the Dimmitt businessmen.

Mr. Mayfield, in his keynote speech, cited the agricultural success of this region and exemplified this success by commending four Panhandle boys who received American Farmer Degrees at the national FFA convention recently. This is the highest degree that may be won by a member of the FFA, he explained, and other sections of the country would consider it indeed outstanding to have four such awards go to boys in a similar-size area.

Mr. Mayfield also noted that many youths in the eastern and northern parts of the United States will see livestock and basic farm products for the first time this year. A number of youths from the large cities are sponsored on trips to midwestern exposition each year for this purpose.

Mr. Nelson said, however, that many factors besides production are involved, quotas, allotments, diversification, and markets all enter into a county's agricultural income, he said, and that our relatively new county could one day go to the top of the list in this bracket.

Mr. Harris opened the floor to informal discussion, and the good will atmosphere of the banquet was made apparent as many men present stood to make informal announcements, commendations, and invitations to the group.

Steve Taylor of Dimmitt, treasurer of the Dimmitt Junior Chamber of Commerce, invited all young business men of Hart to meet with the local JayCeos to help plan necessary civic projects for our county. The JayCeos meet in the Steak House Cafe dining room each Thursday for the noon meal, and on the third Thursday of each month they meet for a husbands-and-wives dinner at 7 p. m. in the dining room.

Willis Hawkins, Jr., representing the Hart American Legion, publicly thanked the people of Hart for their cooperation in helping obtain the Hart American Legion building. He expressed the Legion's desire for the building to be used as a central meeting place for people in the Hart area. He also urged Dimmitt businessmen to cooperate in the construction of Dimmitt's new American Legion building.

Glen Youts, secretary of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce, invited all farmers and businessmen in the Hart and Dimmitt areas to make full use of the Chamber's facilities and services. Mr. Youts warned against patronizing unscrupulous fall solicitors and told of the Chamber's methods of determining the character of fall solicitors.

John LeMay, superintendent of the Hart Public Schools, reaffirmed the need for encouragement of the boys and girls of our county, the local youth activities and organizations, and the county's schools.

Bob Hill of Hart, tall-twister of the newly organized Hart Lions Club, invited all Lions Club members from Dimmitt to meet with the Hart club at their earliest opportunity. The Hart Lions meet on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 7:30 p. m. in the Hart American Legion Hall.

This was one of the largest gatherings in the history of the Castro County farmer-merchant dinner series. The meeting was sparked with a combination of good humor and serious discussion as farmers and merchants of this area tried to learn more about how they could be of benefit to each other.

Nine Directors Elected Monday By Farm Bureau

Nine men from eight county communities were elected Tuesday night to the Castro County Farm Bureau board of directors.

New directors elected at the annual County Farm Bureau policy convention, are J. H. Floyd, Easter community; Roy Pyeatt and Earl T. Jones, Hart; Noble Howard, Sunnyside; Roy Botkin, Summerfield; Leo Witkowski, Arroyo; A. T. Morgan, Big Square; Forrest Collins, Southgate; and J. G. Davis, Jr., Dimmitt.

These men constitute one-half of the board of directors for the coming year. The board consists of representatives from each of the county's 16 communities; each member serves a two-year term. Half of the membership is elected each year.

Guest speaker at the meeting was Leo Forrest of Hereford, an REA spokesman, who explained the problems of rural electrification.

Hugo Beyer is president of the local Farm Bureau and Leo Witkowski is county secretary.

Besides electing new board members, the organization passed resolutions and established policies of the local Farm Bureau for the coming year. (See story, this page.)

This convention, and other county conventions over Texas, will be followed by the state convention in Houston November 11. At that assembly, the county groups will outline state Farm Bureau policy and recommendations to be presented at the National Farm Bureau Convention.

Western Auto Store Robbery Linked With Others in Area

The recently-opened Western Auto Store in Dimmitt was robbed Tuesday night in what officers thought might be a chain robbery.

The burglars broke into the new store building through a roll-up garage-type door in the rear of the store. They first tried to pry the door open with a long steel rod, but later gave up and broke out a window in the door, through which they gained entrance.

The burglars apparently knew what they wanted: they stole two rifles and a rifle-shotgun combination, and cleaned out a display case full of ammunition for the stolen firearms.

Included in the theft were a .22-caliber Stevens tubular automatic rifle, a Winchester Model 94 lever-action 30-30 repeater, and a Winchester .22-caliber and 410-gauge over-under rifle-shotgun combination.

Also stolen were 30 boxes of 22-caliber shells, 1 1/2 boxes of 30-30 shells, and two boxes of Savage 300 rifle shells. No shotgun shells were stolen.

The guns were taken from the center section of the store's gun display rack, while several shotguns in the same rack were not bothered.

Gaston Robison, owner of the Western Auto stock, noticed the robbery when he opened the store for business Wednesday morning. Nothing else in the store had been taken or misplaced, he said.

Mr. Robison estimated the total loss at \$200.

Sheriff Day Thompson of Vega arrived in Dimmitt Wednesday morning to confer with Castro County Sheriff Jack Cartwright on the possibility of a chain robbery. Two similar robberies occurred in Vega Tuesday night, Sheriff Thompson said, during which

about \$300 worth of typewriters, tools and ammunition were stolen. Sheriffs Cartwright and Thompson worked Wednesday morning with members of the Texas Highway Patrol to see if any connection between the robberies could be ascertained.

Tire tracks leading from the rear of the Western Auto Store were identical to those found at the scenes of the Vega robberies, Sheriff Thompson said.

Tests are also being made on footprints found near the scene of the local robbery, and on fingerprints left on part of the plate glass which was broken.

The law officials said that so far their tests have shown "every indication" of a possible triple robbery.

In either case the robberies constituted felonies. One of the rifles alone which was stolen from the Western Auto Store carried a wholesale price of more than enough to constitute a felony, while each of the Vega stores reported losses of more than \$50.

Sheriff Cartwright was notified Thursday by officers in Farwell and Littlefield that similar burglaries also occurred in those cities Tuesday night. Clues have not yet been compared on these robberies, however.

Funeral Services Held Wednesday For Doris Singer, Gunshot Victim

Funeral services were conducted at 3 p. m. Wednesday for Doris Lee Singer, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Singer of Dimmitt.

Miss Singer died in the Castro County Hospital shortly before 5 p. m. Monday, 45 minutes after a bullet had been discharged into her right temple.

Miss Singer received the gunshot wound at 4 p. m. Monday, shortly after she had returned home from school. Her mother heard the shot and ran to Doris' bedroom, where she found her daughter lying on her back across the bed. When doctors arrived, Mrs. Singer had taken the pistol from her daughter's hand and placed it in the bedroom closet.

The pistol, a .22-caliber repeater, was turned over to Sheriff Jack Cartwright by Frank Lattimer, manager of the Castro County Hospital.

Attending physician Dr. Carl Page said death resulted from a severed artery in her brain. The bullet had lodged two inches inside the right temple.

Justice of the Peace Rube Jones' verdict read, "All evidence revealed that the wound was self-inflicted, probably accidentally." There were no witnesses.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Earl R. Landtroop, pastor of the Temple Baptist Church in Clovis, N. M., and Rev. George Ray, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Dimmitt.

Burial was in Castro Memorial Gardens under the direction of the Demis Funeral Home of Dimmitt.

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Bobcats, Wolves to Clash In 1-AA Opener Here Friday

The Dimmitt Bobcats will play their first conference game of the season in Bobcat Stadium Friday night when they take on the long-distance Dalhart Wolves.

The Bobcats will be meeting a potential giant-topper in the Wolf team. Despite a mediocre 1-3-1 record, the Dalhart line-up contains several players who could change the complexion of a game if they get a chance.

Leading the pack in play-breaking for the Wolves is Jimmy Donohoo, offensive left end and defensive line-backer. Mr. Donohoo, besides being the Wolves' favorite pass receiver, is deadly on defense. He made 70 percent of the team's tackles against Perryton, and will probably be the hardest-hitting defensive man the Bobcats have run against.

According to scouting reports, the 175-pound Donohoo is extremely hard to block because of his speed and shiftness, and is the kind of defensive player who will be the last man up on either side of the field.

Starting at right end for the Wolves will be Harvey Pate, who also is a top flight defensive player. The 185-pound Pate plays right end both on offense and defense and has a reputation for covering his territory well.

At tackles will be Larry Miller (left) and Tom Herron (right). These boys are both heavy and fast—their weights are 185 and

190, respectively—and the coaches expect them to make matters a little difficult in the line.

At guards, the Wolves will have Bill Cassio (left) and George Davis (right). Both these boys are reconverted backfield men who were active in the defensive line of their school. Both of these boys block well; a favorite Wolf play is up the middle behind their blocking.

At offensive center the Bobcats will meet Mr. Charles Childers, providing an injury he received in the Perryton game doesn't keep him from playing. Filling in for Childers on defense will be Bill Crawford. After the defensive shuffle is complete, Childers usually ends up on the bench waiting for the Wolves to get back on offense, and Crawford ends up at left tackle, trying to see to it that the Wolves do, indeed, get back on offense.

Quarterbacking the Dalhart team will be Ronnie Ledbetter, a triple-threat punter, passer, and runner. He is deadly on short passes and the screen pass, and just may uncork a long one downfield if he sees a place for it. The Wolves may rely heavily on Ledbetter's passing against the Bobcats.

In the back yard the Wolves will place halfbacks Roy Suddarth, who is fast, and Gary Finch, who is even faster. These boys will be winking at the stands often Friday night; a favorite Wolf tactic is to run these boys wide around the ends.

hard runner in fullback Raymond Root. When Root isn't running with the ball he'll likely wind up in front of the carrier on end sweep plays.

Records of the two teams are almost identical: the Bobcats have won two and lost three, while the Wolves have won one, tied one and lost three. Their only victory of the season was a 44-0 runaway over Clayton, N. M.

Records will mean little, however, when the wild and woolly District 1-AA race begins Friday night in Dimmitt. Game time is 8 p. m.

Completion Date Still Uncertain On Highway 51 North

Completion date of the Highway 51 construction project in North Dimmitt is still uncertain. H. C. Brown, senior engineer's assistant of the Texas Highway Department, said Wednesday. He estimated, however, that the job could be completed within the next 30 days, weather permitting.

All concrete work, dirt work, and base-laying on the west half of the road have been completed, Brown said, and the salvage base has been laid on the east half.

After the dirt work and base-laying have been finished on the east half, Brown said, caliche must be hauled in, crushed, and pressed. The freeway will then be ready for black-topping, he added.

This project involves the altering of more than one-fourth of a mile of the former two-lane highway to a four-lane freeway with islands separating north- and south-bound traffic. The islands, constructed of concrete, will be filled in with base material and a single asphalt surface.

The contract job began September 15, and is on the same contract with two similar jobs at Earth and Littlefield. Brown said. Neither of the other two jobs are complete, he said, and 140 working days remain in the contract period.

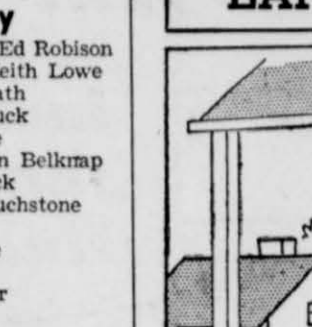

MUSIC IN CHRISTIAN WORSHIP

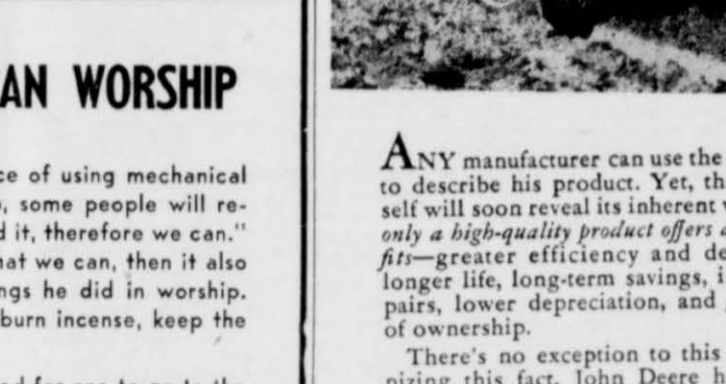
