Hamon, the republican national committeeman who held court in the Lawrence hotel and received plaudits of the state and personal messages from Senator Harding. Harry M. Dougherty, Will Hayes and the members of the "inner circle" of the republican council, on which Hamon sat and assisted in directing the campaign from the night Harding was nominated. Hamon, whose wife is a relative of Senator Harding, is one of the six members of the executive committee of the national campaign comnittee. Martin Condition 1 and

Democrats believed certain to be in the next senate include Ross N. Lillard of Oklahoma City, fourteenth district, L. L. West of Anadarko, fifteenth district; W. H. Woods of Purcell, twentieth district and W. T. Anglin of Holdenville, twenty-second district. Pottawatomie Senda Two Democrata.

Late returns upset several election predictions on the strength of incomplete returns. Pottawatomie county. reporting its returns complete, sent both democratic candidates, C. A. Knight and W. S. Pendleton, to the house of representatives, by narrow margins. The county had been expected earlier to go republican. Kiowa county, on the other hand, reporting complete, elected both republicans, G. E. Mitchell and S. D. Bailey, Pittsburg county, reporting complete, elected Charles S. Brise and W. A. Polk, democrats. * 1 W

Although LeFlore county representatives were claimed by democrats on the strength of incomplete returns, state and congressional offices were filled by republicans by pluralities of approximately 1,000, complete figures showed. The county races have not been reported here yet.

Speculation as to whom the democrats would elect speaker of the house of representatives, indulged in before the election when a democratic majority was presumed to be certain, has proved to be idle. The discussion has switched to the republican side of the chamber. with no candidates for the speakership announced as yet.

Fifty-Nine Seats Won.


The republican landslide had given them fifty-nine seats as against thirtysix for the democrats. Late returns andetermined the lead of Senator Beckham, democrat, Kentucky. His republican opponent, Richard L. Ernst, lorged ahead in a nip and tuck fight over the only senate seat left unsettled and is apparently the winner. Of the thirty-four senate contests, the rebublicans won twenty-five and the demoarats nine. Among the democratic sen tors who went down to defeat Chamberlain, of Oregon, former chairmay of the military committee; Smith of Arizona, who lost to Former Representative Ralph Cameron and Henderion of Nevada who was defeated by Former Governor Oddie.

Congressional Returns Slow.

Final returns from a few congresional districts still were belated, some fue to close races which upset a few previous announcements and others from isolated sections. With these missing districts, the republican roll n the house had climbed to 287 to 140 lor the democrats.

Among house members whose reelection was reported definitely was Representative Volstead of Minnesota, author of the Volstead Prohibition enlorcement act and chairman of the souse judiciary committee, a position ae is scheduled to retain. On the eighth of May, prohibition officers raided the residence of Silas May at Tucumcari, N. Mex., and seized nine cases of whisky. Mr. May claimed it was unlawful and took it to federal court. Mayes, Nowata, Okfuskee, Pushmataha, Semincle, Garfield and Lincoln. Counties not reporting that are expected to elect democrats are Atoka, Choctaw, Greer, Harmon, Love, McCurtain, Murray, Tillman, and Muskogee. Craig Arkansas. Cotton, medical director of the Trenton State Hospital, is said to show that two patients have been cured of insanity by pulling their teeth. In chapters 8 and 9 are grouped a number of miracles which exhibit what the King can do over the chief foes of mankind-sickness, sin, satanic power, death, sorrow and storms. It is fitting that they should be grouped here, following the laws of the kingdom, for they show the King's power to administer the affairs of the kingdom, and produce within his subjects the graces of character set forth in these laws. It will make the lesson too long to attempt to consider all these miracles. It will also be unsatisfactory to confine ourselves to the particular section selected by the lesson committee, so we will select several of the most outstanding ones.

I. Jesus Heals a Leper (8:1-4).

1. This dreadful disease was the most loathsome and hopeless known. In the Jewish ritual it was regarded as a symbol of sin. It was incurable by man. Only the Divine Physician can cure sin.

2. The leper's faith. His cry was most pitiable, but his faith was strong. He fully believed that Jesus was able, but was uncertain as to his willingness to heal him.

3. Jesus' power. He put forth his hand and touched the leper, bidding the disease to depart, and instantly the man was clean.

11. Jesus Heals the Centurion's Servant (8:5-13).

1. The disease-paralysis. In parylsis the victim is helpless and disqualified for service.

2. The centurion's faith. He believed that if Jesus would but speak the word his servant would be healed. 3. The wonderful power of the King. He did not need to go to see the centurion's slave and touch him. but only needed to speak the word and

WAY TO MARKET **COUNTRY HIDES** Producer Under Unnecessary Handicap Due to Roundabout **Distribution Methods.**

STUDY GRADES AND CLASSES

Practice of Farmer, Ranchman and Local Butcher Usually Needlessly Complex and Costly-Omit Immediate Agencies.

There is no magic formula for simplifying distribution. Improvement in methods can only come from careful study of the routes followed by each kind or class of commodity in its "long, long trail" from producer to consumer. This fact is recognized by every student of present economic processes and likewise has been taken into account in the studies of marketing problems carried on by the bureau of markets, United States Department of Agriculture. One of these specific problems which the department's specialists have studied and regarding which they offer definite recommendations that involve a real saving to consumer and producer, has to do with the marketing of hides, a by-product from which almost every farmer can derive profit if he will give it proper atten-Is recognized by the delicate fascinattion.

Knowledge of Grades Needed.

The first need in the present situa tion is a familiarity on the part of the producer of country hides with the recognized grades and classes of hides and skins. Such an understanding will enable him to prepare and dispose of his products much more intelligently

the saving which this simpler method makes possible. At the same time a lowering of prices for the final prodact will be the tendency, since distribution costs will be less. The use of a local dealer as intermediary between the producer and the large hide dealer in some cases is advisable, since he is in a position to do needed sorting and classifying.

Either of these simpler methods suggested for the producer of country hides--selling direct to the large dealer or through a local dealer-approaches more nearly the packer's methods now prevailing.

Obstacles to Overcome.

Such consignment marketing, however, presupposes mutual confidence and fair dealing by both producer and dealer and, unfortunately, this does not always exist. Another obstacle to the establishment of this method is the producer's preference for ready cash. Many producers prefer to accept any price obtainable from local buyers, such as general stores, produce dealers, junk collectors and traveling hide buyers rather than consign their products to distant car-lot dealers in central markets. The place that traveling buyers or agents occupy in an improved system of distribution is a matter on which one can be less specific, since opinions of the trade differ as to me practicability of traveling hide buyers or agents or large hide dealers. Already country producers of hides are coming to see the saving that results from the simpler system briefly indicated here and are making, contracts with large dealers in whom they have confidence and who in turn see that it is the part of good business to respect and foster this confidence. Farmers and others interested in putting this important side line on a more profitable basis are invited to communicate with the bureau of markets, United States Department of Agriculture, which will supply them with full information regarding the best methods of marketing hides, as well as instructions for proper skinning and curing.



Handling Hidee in Large Quantities Permits Grading and Classifying Product So That It Can Be Sold to Best Advantage.

and profitably. But even if he should produce the best quality of hides and skins, the small producer is at a disadvantage compared with large producers like the packers, for example, because the latter handle large quantities of hides and can sort and grade them according to the demands of various tanners. The extremely scattered sources and the comparatively small individual production of country hides and skins makes it impossible for country producers to sort and classify their product in marketable

Nevertheless, many features of the present methods of marketing country hides can be improved, since these methods support expensive nonessential profit-absorbing and speculating intermediaries which operate, possibly unintentionally but inevitably, to suppress this branch of the industry and to discourage the quality of workmanship displayed.

Distribution Systems.

Three principal methods of market ing domestic hides and skins prevail at present, as shown by studies made by the bureau of markets. The one in which the farmer, ranchman and local butcher usually participates is needlessly complex and costly. The hides which any one of these individuals has to sell are usually disposed of either to a junk dealer or a local buyer. These men, in turn, sell to a traveling buyer. The latter passes on his goods to the large hide dealer, and this dealer sells to a broker or a tanner's buyer from whom the collected skins are finally disposed of to a tannery. Thus there is maintained a long, circuitous distribution system that adds needlessly to the final cost.

Contrast this system with the direct methods which the packers are able to employ. Each packer having a large assortment of hides is able to grade and classify his output so that he can dispose of it advantageously to a hide broker or a tanner's buyer direct. From these men the hides go direct to the tanner. Thus various intermediate agencies and their profits are eliminsted.

So simple a distribution system is of course, impossible for the small producer. However, experience has shown that the farmer and ranchman and the local butcher can dispense with the funk dealer and the traveling buyer. and in some cases, with the local dealers as intermedic-les in the distribution system. When the producers negotiate directly with the large hide dealer, the latter sorts and classifies the hides sent in and is in a position to share with the producer a part of

by reseeding and fertilizing. Reseeding an old lawn should be done at the same time of the year as new seeding. South of New York it should be done in the early autumn. If the lawn is patchy the small areas should be scratched with steel rake or similar implement and dressed with a mixture of good loam, compost, or humus and the grass seed then sown. The loam or humus forms a suitable medium for the germination of the seeds and the development of the young grass plants. If the turf is thin over large areas, seeding can best be accomplished by a disk seeder, which cuts into the turf and deposits the seed. If a disk seeder is not available, some implement should be used that will loosen the soil but not tear the turf badly. After seeding, a dressing of loam or compost should be given and the area rolled lightly. In the northern tier of states re-


seeding should be done early in the spring. At that time the soil is more open than later in the season and offers a better seed bed. Light rolling after seeding in the spring is usually beneficial.

Care should be taken when mowing or watering newly patched areas to avoid disturbing the young grass.

FEEDING STOCK IN TRANSIT

Shippers Who Patronize Roads Without Proper Facilities Must Make Own Arrangements.


When the distance is such that a live stock shipment to destination cannot be made within the time provided under the federal 28-hour law, animals must be unloaded, fed and watered. The failroads which have the heaviest long-distance shipments provide feedin-transit stations for this purpose at ntervals along their lines. Railroads which do a small live stock business often are without feed-in-transit stations, and the shipper patronizing these lines must make his own arrangements for feeding and watering.



Must Protect United States. This will enable the American Red Cross to continue its humanitarian effort to aid stricken peoples to re-estab-lish themselves, to fight the disease spiics which threaten many countries and to efface largely the remaining traces of the blight left by the World War. It is regarded as social as well as physical sanitation on a large scale that will have a direct bearing on fu-ture conditions in America. Central Europe, the chief sufferer

from the conflict, today is facing another winter of famine, pestilence and ruin. 
