It seems to us a good bill and one that should work to the advan-

The livestock growers of New Mexico should feel encouraged over the official report of the livestock situation in the United States. While the industry shows a gain in number in the state over a year ago, there is a great shortage in the United States which should insure a fair price for all that we have to sell the coming spring. In the sheep industry alone the number is less than it has been in twenty years. The prospective stockman who waits until spring to stock up his pasture will have to pay the price regulated by supply and demand -and the available supply is 1,-880,000 less than in 1917. You will find the official report elsewhere in this issue.

Fever Present in Mental Disease.

Doctor Bond in the Boston Medical Journal adds a new item to medical knowledge of mental disease. In 71 mental patients, fevers, slight or severe, transitory or chronic, occurred in over 50 per cent, a surprising result for consecutive cases. The diagnoses varied and show that fever occurred in imbecility, epilepsy, arterioscierotic dementia, general paralysis, dementia praecox and maniac depressive psychoses. Of 19 maniae depressive insanity patients, 13 had fever and 6 did not. Of 19 dementia praecox patients, 8 had fever and 11 did not, this being the only disease in which normal temperatures were found more often than the reverse.



TEACHERS PENSIONS ASKED BY DEMOCRAT

SANTA FE, N. M., Feb. 9th. Teachers who have served twenty years in the Public Schools of New Mexico, will be pensioned in the future if the legislature acts favorably upon the bill proposed in the house of representatiyes by Puryear, democrat of Chaves.

Under provisions of the bill any teacher with twenty years work in New Mexico schools would be eligible to retirement on a pension of \$500 a year, the sum to be paid out of the general school funds of the year.

At present, thirty-three states of the union and virtually all the leading European counries have pension laws for teachers on their statute books. The democratic proposal is based upon experience which shows that the pension system promotes efficiency of workers.

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
