

NEW INDUSTRY FOR NEW MEXICO

Scientists Now Working on Cross Between Cat Fish and Prairie Dogs for Stocking of New Mexico's Dry Lakes.

Since the passage of the gasoline tax of two cents per gallon, local scientists are working on a proposition for the crossing of prairie dogs and jack rabbits with cat fish, so that the dry lakes can be stocked, thus enabling the gasoline tax money which will be used for fish hatcheries, collected in this part of the state to be kept at home. In case this move becomes successful it will be one of the greatest industries in the west. It will probably result in substituting fins instead of ears for the jack rabbit, and instead of gnawing fruit trees they will probably feed on humpbugs, which will be another great saving for the state. The only difficulty is the eliminating of the suckers which are already thriving in several sections.

CHARGED WITH FORGERY

On complaint by Mrs. G. A. Starnes, Wallace W. Chesher and Clint Johnson of Roswell were arrested by Sheriff McCormack Sunday night on a charge of forgery. They came up from Roswell on their own recognition to receive service of warrant.

These gentlemen are in the employ of Jaffa-Prager on their sheep ranch near Roswell, and recently accompanied a train load of sheep to Kansas City. In returning they missed their train out of Kansas City and their return pass ran out at Clovis, so they were put off the train at Portales. It is charged that while here one of them gave a check at the Starnes restaurant signing the name of Cobb.

The preliminary hearing was held in Justice Fairly's court on Tuesday afternoon, with the results that the defendants were bound over to await the action of the grand jury. Their bonds were fixed at \$500 each and on the sheriff of Roswell assuming responsibility, they were allowed to return to Roswell to make their bond. The state was represented by District Attorney Compton and the defendants by Attorney G. L. Reese.

COUNTY CONTEST IN DECLAIMING, DEBATING AND ATHLETICS

On Saturday, April 23rd, the contest of Roosevelt county schools will be held at Portales. The following events will be held in declaiming, debating and athletics:

A contest among the grades in declaiming. One representative, either boy or girl, from each grade school, and two from each contesting High school consisting of one boy and one girl. The declamations shall be of a serious nature and shall not exceed ten minutes in length.

A debating contest between the High schools of the county will also be held consisting of a team of two from each school, either two boys or two girls or a mixed team. The question is: "Resolved the armament of all Nations of the World shall be limited to that required for police duty."

In the afternoon an athletic contest will be held with the following events for High school boys:

- Tug-of-War.—Team of 6, maximum weight of team, 840 lbs.
- 100 Yard dash.
- 220 Yard dash.
- 880 yard dash.
- Relay, 440 yards, 3 contestants.
- Pole vault.
- Shot put.
- Running broad jump.
- Standing broad jump.
- Running hop, step and jump.
- Running high jump.
- Standing high jump.

For Grade Girls and Boys
(Age limit 14 years.)

- 50 yard dash.
- Potato race. 10 potatoes 3 yds. apart.
- Tug of War, team of six.
- Sack Race for boys.
- 3 leg race for boys.
- Relay race for girls, 220 yards, team of four girls.

Two schools must participate in each event. No contestant shall be eligible who habitually uses tobacco in any form or is failing in his studies. His attendance must be 75 per cent of the school year.

The success of this county meet will depend upon the interest and active part taken by each grade and high school of the county. Let us make it worth while by putting forth our best efforts, entering as many of the contests as possible.

PASS SCHOOL TAX BILL

After an hour's session in committee as a whole, the house passed house bill No. 121, the state unit school tax bill, by a vote of 23 to 20. This bill would fix a uniform school tax of 11 mills on every county in the state, and would give the state department of education practically unlimited power to approve or disapprove county and municipal school budgets. It proves that any balances remaining in any county of municipal school budget shall be turned into the state treasury, and distributed by the state superintendent of schools wherever in his judgment the money may be needed.

The bill completes the centralization of school finance begun with the adoption of the county unit school law, the distribution feature of which is now involved in an injunction proceeding pending in the Bernalillo county district court, in which the constitutionality of the taxing feature of the law is questioned. The present bill involves the same principle.

In opposing the bill, Mr. Winston, of Sierra county, asserted that it would add \$700,000.00 a year to the school tax burden of the state. Others who spoke in opposition to the bill were, Lee of Dona Ana county, Webster of Colfax, and Robinson of Grant.

Representative Ortega of Taos county, appeared as the champion of the measure, which he said was in behalf of all the children of the state.

BOYS AND TEACHER ENGAGE IN FIGHT

Teacher Reports to J. P. Court to Settle Difference in the Case

On Tuesday of this week occurred the most deplorable affair that has happened in the history of the Lovington schools, when Carl and Pete Hooper engaged in a fight with their teacher, Glen Stevenson. The boys were arrested on complaint and their trial was set for Thursday morning. At the time the case against Pete Hooper was dismissed on account of his being only fourteen years old.

Carl Hooper was tried in police court Thursday afternoon before Judge Eaves. Mr. Powhatan Carter was prosecuting attorney and M. J. Forrester was attorney for the defense. Quite a number of witnesses on both sides appeared and they were needed as they were excited and some had suffered loss of memory.

From the testimony introduced it appears that after some words between the teacher and Carl Hooper, the teacher ordered him to go to the office. They got as far as the door when the altercation of the state.

The bill is expected to meet determined opposition in the senate, although it is understood to have supporters in that body.

A schedule providing for an aggregate increase of \$13,000, annually had been refused as insufficient by the teachers' association.

The News would suggest an amendment to the school laws so that the poll taxes would be collected by the county collector at the same time that other taxes are collected. We believe that by this means twenty-five per cent more poll taxes would be collected and at less cost to the county than by the present method. It is some job for the secretary of the school board to visit say ten to fifty poll tax payers in some of the school districts in Roosevelt county to make these collections for ten cents per head.

THE PROPER WAY TO MARKET EGGS

This week the News printed a good order of shipping tags for Henry Holland of Rogers, which read: "This case contains 30 dozen strictly fresh, clean, Leghorn eggs, produced, packed, guaranteed and shipped by the Holland Egg Farm, Rogers, N. M." Now the farmers all over the county are kicking about the price of eggs. The restaurants are kincking about the quality and price they are having to pay for inferior eggs. Why not get together!

The average farmer—and we speak from experience, as we are one of you—pay about as much attention to the marketing conditions and quality of the eggs they have to sell as if it was a load of wood they were hauling to market.

There is a demand for strictly fresh eggs in every city and in a number of rural districts throughout the United States the poultry growers have organized and market their eggs with some system. One popular way is to ship in cartons with each egg the same color and stamped on each egg the date it was laid. Then a label on the carton similar to Mr. Holland's tag, guaranteeing the quality of the egg. Eggs in this condition will bring above the market price in any home or hotel where eggs are bought. Get your guarantee read that the eggs are gathered each day and kept in a sanitary condition till they reach the consumer.

MORE GRAFT AT THE FARMERS EXPECSE

SANTA FE.—2-cent gasoline tax bill passed the house of representatives Thursday afternoon by a vote of 32 to 9, after it had been amended to protect consumers in the distribution of the tax paid in under the old gasoline tax law, now pending before the United States courts; together with an amendment to limit the amount of the revenue to limit the amount of the revenue to be applied to fish hatchery construction to \$30,000.

CALLS FOR MANY QUALITIES

Archaeologist Must Be Scholar, Linguist, Engineer and Artist, and Expert Handler of Men.

The modern archeologist in Egypt must be more than a scholar. He must have studied history, it is true; he must be familiar with what is known of the art and life of Old Egypt and he must have mastered the ancient language so that he can read the hieroglyphs carved on temple and tomb.

But scholarship is only part of his equipment. He must know something of engineering and something of drawing; he must have a sense of organization; he must himself be ready to turn to with pick and shovel, should occasion arise.

The task of disinterring ancient structures and their precious contents uninjured is a delicate one, not to be done hastily or haphazardly.

In addition to being scholar and engineer, linguist and artist, the modern archeologist must understand how to handle men. The men employed in archeological excavation in Egypt are usually boys from 10 to 20 years of age. Older than that, in a country where men and women age tragically fast, they are likely to be stupid.

Usually they are irresponsible and, spurred on by the light-fingered "antika" dealers in neighboring villages. The wise archeologist puts them on piece-work—so much for every cubic foot of earth removed, with bakabish, carefully calculated on the basis of the "antika" dealers' current rates, for every object unearthed.

Since the bakabish varies with the condition of the object, it is to the interest of the worker to get each "find" out entire, if possible, or, if breakage is inevitable, with no part missing.

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THE FARM HOME

Take a pride in planning closely. Thrift in food means providing neither too much nor too little.

The foods upon which the two-year-old's diet should be built, are:

- Milk (chiefly). Strained, well-cooked cereals. Small amount of fruit juice and pulp. Egg yolk (about one per day). Strained vegetable juice or pulp. Stale bread or toast.

See that the growing girl eats plenty of green vegetables and fruits, for she needs a good supply of iron for her development.

What is the proper time to eat candy? At the end of a meal for it is a useful food.

Kill every winter fly. Every fly that lives over will produce a million or more before another winter.

Statistics show that rural children show a greater per cent of physical defects than city children do.

FEEB ACCORDING TO MILK PRODUCTION

Dairy cows should be fed in proportion to the milk they give, says the dairy specialist of the Agricultural College.

The most practical rules that may be given to determine the amount to feed, are the following:

- 1. Always feed all the roughage the cows will up clean. 2. Feed one pound of grain per day for each pound of butterfat the cow produces per week.

For instance, a cow producing eight pounds of butterfat per week would receive eight pounds of grain per day according to this rule.

Since one gallon of milk weighs 8.6 pounds, this means approximately 3 pounds of grain for one gallon of Jersey milk and 2 pounds of grain for one gallon of Holstein milk.

CORN VARIETIES THAT GIVE BEST YEALDS

What corn varieties give the best yields, is a question frequently asked representatives of the Agricultural College.

Mexican June corn has given uniformly good results in the lower valleys of the state, corroborating results obtained at the Experiment Station where it has given the best results for a number of years.

TAX RATES STILL INCREASING.

From figures taken from the 1920 tax rolls returned to the State Tax Commission, from the various counties, it is seen that in 25 of the 29 counties of the state total tax rate for state and county purposes for 1920 is higher than for 1919.
