



CALLS FOR MANY QUALITIES

Archeologist Must Be Scholar, Linguist, Engineer and Artist, and Expert Handler of Men.

The modern archeologist in Egypt must be more than a scholar. He must have studied history, it is true; he must be familiar with what is known of the art and life of Old Egypt and he must have mastered the ancient language so that he can read the hieroglyphs carved on temple and

But scholarship is only part of his equipment. He must know something of engineering and something of drawing; he must have a sense of organization; he must himself be ready to turn to with pick and shovel, should occasion arise

The task of disinterring ancient structures and their precious contents uninjured is a delicate one, not to be done hastily or haphazardly.

In addition to being scholar and engineer, linguist and artist, the modern archeologist must understand how to handle men. The men employed in archeological excavation in Egypt are usually boys from 10 to 20 years of age. Older than that, in a country where men and women age tragically fast, they are likely to be stupid

Usually they are irresponsible and, spurred on by the light-fingered "antika" dealers in neighboring villages. The wise archeologist puts them on piece-work-so much for every cubic foot of earth removed, with bakshish, carefuly calculated on the basis of the "antika" dealers' current rates, for every object unearthed.

Since the bakshish varies with the condition of the object, it is to the interest of the worker to get each "find" out entire, if possible, or, if breakage is inevitable, with no part

What is the proper time to eat candy? At the end of a meal for it is a useful food. If taken in excess or between meals it is apt to cause indigestion or spoil the appetite for nuritious foods that are needed.

Kill every winter fly. Every fly that lives over will produce a million or more before another winter. Flies breed in manure piles and other places of filfth, If premises are kept perfectly clean with no filfth or food exposed, there will be few flies. Flies spread diseases.

Statistics show that rural children show a greater per cent of physical defects than city children do. This is because rural children do not receive the attention that is given those of the city, who are in closer proximity to doctors and nurses. The Farm Bureaus are now working with the State Health Commissioners and every defected shild may receive some attention.

FEED ACCORDING TO MILK PRODUCTION.

Dairy cows should be fed in proportion to the milk they give, as now preparing for the road. They will open the season at Agricultural College. A certain part of a cow's ration must always be used for her maintenance, and it is only the feed in excess of that amount that she can use for making milk. Therecan use for making milk. Therefore, this excess controls her milk production and it is the business of the dairyman to see that it is ample. On the other hand, feed is wasted when the ration is too

The most practical rules that may be given to determine the amount to feed, are the follow-

1. Always feed all the roughage the cows will up clean. 2. Feed one pound of grain

per day for each pound of butterfat the cow produces per week. For instance, a cow producing

eight pounds of butterfat per week would receive eight pounds of grain per day according to this rule. If it is not convenient to test the milk for butter fat. similar results are secured by feeding one pound of grain daily for each three pounds of rich milk such as Jersey milk and one pound for four pounds of Holstein milk.

Since one gallon of milk weighs 8.6 pounds, this means approximately 3 pounds of grain for one gallon of Jersey milk and 2 pounds of grain for one gallon of Holstein milk.

As a rule a dairy cow should be fed all she will take without gaining weight. It is necessary, however, that the individual feeder use his judgment in applining any feeding rules.

CORN VARIETIES THAT GIVE BEST YEALDS

What corn varieties give the best yeilds, is a question frequently asked representatives of the Agricultural College. With a view of arriving at an answer to this question the county agents for the past two years have been carrying on demonstrations in the various counties to compare the

recommonly grown varieties. Mexican June corn has given uniformly good results in the lower valleys of the state, corroborating results obtained at the Experiment Station where it has given the best results for a number of years. In the higher altitudes, Swadley and White Australian Flint gave a good account of themselves. In the northeastern part of the state where a great deal of corn is grown, a variety know as the Union County White has proven a good yielder. Those who desire definite information should get in touch with their county agent.
