CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEET

The Portales Chamber of Commerce met in regular session Monday night with a good crowd present.

Chairman G. L. Reese got his dates mixed and failed to show up. By a unanimous vote Jack Wilcox, Fred Luper and Sheriff McCormack were delegated to go out and bring him "dead or alive." The Judge was found at the movies and brought before the crowd amid much cheering.

Governor Lindsey made report on the move to consolidate the schools near Portales with the Portales district. He stated that all but four of the districts had voted to come in. He also made the statement as to the amount of bonds that could be voted in this district. In addition to the bonds we already have \$98,000.00 can be voted, which with the \$23,000 now on hand would give \$121,000 for this purpose of the High school building.

On motion of Hon. Coe Howard the chair appointed a committee of three for each district to call meetings and circulate petitions to determine whether they desire to come into the Portales district. The committees were instructed to report back to the Chamber of Commerce on Monday night, April 25th. Committees appointed were as follows:

Blackwater Draw:—Governor Lindsey, chairman; Monroe Honca and Mrs. J. T. Wilcox.

Zora:—Prof. Brown, chairman; Mrs. Cunningham, J. H. Cave.

Eiland:—Coe Howard, chairman; Carl Mueller, Mrs. J. P. Stone.

Adobe, No. 6:—J. T. Wilcox, chairman; Fred Luper, Ham McDonald.

The program for the evening was carried out as follows:

"Precautions in handling fruits, vegetables and meats," by Dr. D. B. Williams. The doctor stated that the state health board had ample regulation for the handling of the above, which, if carried out, would be a great benefit to the health of the community at large. He urged that war be made on the house fly, by screening the house and systematic cleaning of the stable and any place where the fly might breed. He showed where 70,000 babies

died in the United States last summer by diseases carried by flies, and the total deaths by preventable diseases equalled the deaths of Americans in the World war. He urged that fly-proof garbage cans be placed in convenient places on the public streets to catch the refuse, and that all vacant lots be kept clean and be made places of beauty and recreation. That they could be used as tennis courts and other sports, which would aid in caring for them.

"Strawberries as a commercial crop in the Portales Valley," was ably handled by E. P. Kuhl. "If conditions are right, yes," said Mr. Kuhl, "but a number of things must be right if it is a success." Mr. Kuhl was the first man to grow the everbearing strawberries commercially in the Portales Valley. He stated that for one thing pickers must be available to handle this crop. That we must have co-operation by the transportation company in the handling of this crop in transit. "That the strawberries delivered to the express company before five o'clock in the afternoon and place in the fireless cooker called an express office till two o'clock in the morning would be fit for human consumption by the time they reached Amarillo and other Texas points. That the time to pick the berries was late the evening before shipping them that night." Mr. Kuhl stated that he had realized from \$600 to \$900 per acre on strawberries in the Portales Valley. He urged that the needs of this industry be taken up with the district superintendent of the Santa Fe. And that a canning and preserving plant would do much to place this industry on a paying basis in the Valley.

"The Swimming Pool"—James Lee Wilson made a good talk on this subject urging that it be built and handled on a basis which would be the greatest benefit to the town and county.

Mr. Wilson was followed by J. T. Wilcox, who made a real booster talk on this subject.

The meeting was adjourned till Monday night, April 25th, when a general meeting will be held at the court house to take up unfinished business and hear the report of the various committees.

The town council would do well to take steps for even better fire protection than we now have. A fire house for the equipment should be built. Fire drills should be made at least once a week to increase the efficiency of the local department. With the equipment at hand the department saved the town thousands of dollars loss last Thursday in confining the fire to the one building. With the chemical mounted on the truck, and the hose now on hand, we will be pretty well equipped for any ordinary fire, but one never knows what may happen. The best insurance is to be ready for any emergency.

EMPIRE BUILDERS

NEW OIL WELL TO BE DRILLED IN PECOS VALLEY

Activity Has Not Abated and Three New Holes Will Be Started this Month.

Roswell, April 16.—The oil activity in the Pecos Valley has not abated and three new wells will be started in the valley before the first of May. The Duncan Syndicate is hauling its rig to the sight in the Pan-Handle in the southwestern part of the county and drilling starts by April 25th. On account of the promising structure here, many larger oil companies have sent men to the field to investigate. Another well is soon to be started on the Bursum-Reid leases, 20 miles east of here, where tests were made fifteen years ago. This work will be done by the Buffalo-Roswell Oil company, financed by men from Buffalo, N. Y. The third well, a new development of the National Exploration company will be drilled about thirty miles southwest.

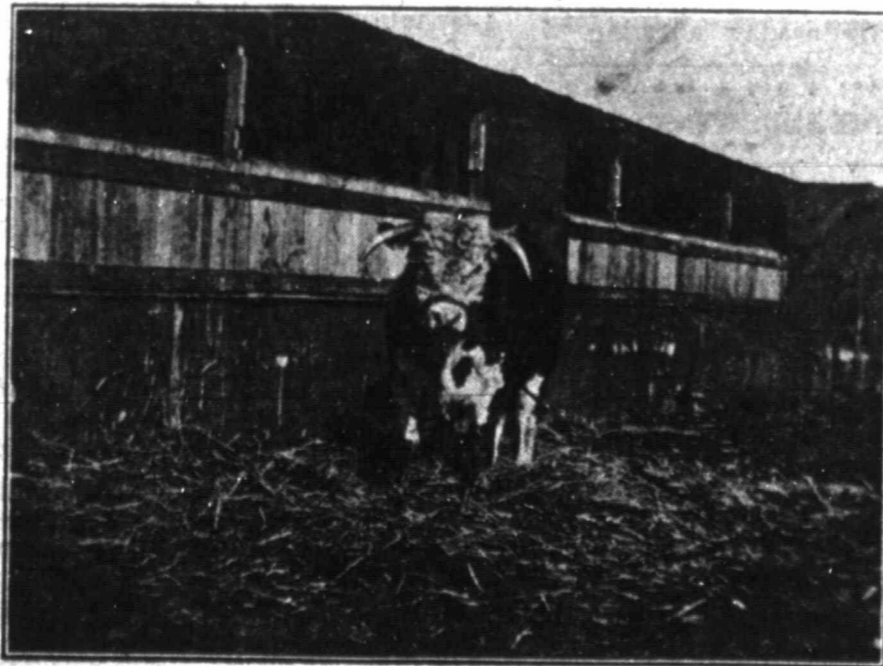

NOTICE TO ALL LIVE-STOCK OWNERS

By THE CATTLE SANITARY BOARD OF NEW MEXICO

By the passing of a law relating to the re-recording of brands by the Fifth Legislature of the State of New Mexico, it is required that all owners of livestock having brands on record in the office of the Cattle Sanitary Board shall re-record such brands by the first day of July, 1921. A failure to have such brands re-recorded as required by this act provides that they shall be stricken from the records and become obsolete.

Proper blanks will be mailed to each brand owner from the office of the Cattle Sanitary Board. The following is the text of the law to which your careful observance is directed.

HOUSE BILL NO. 66. As Amended. AN ACT RELATING TO THE RE-RECORDING OF BRANDS.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. The Cattle Sanitary Board of New Mexico shall have the power to and shall cause all brands now in actual use to be re-recorded. For this purpose the Cattle Sanitary Board shall issue and mail a circular letter through the United States mail addressed to each owner of any brand now of record with said Board, at the post office address shown on the brand record, requiring the owner or owners of brands to file with the Secretary of said Board an exact fac-simile of any brand or brands now being used or owned by such owners. In addition to the above notice, the Sanitary Board shall cause to be published in either English or Spanish, or both, in at least one newspaper in each county in this State, where there is a newspaper, a copy of this act, said publication to continue at least four consecutive weeks.

Section 2. Within three months from the date of the first publication of this act as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of all owners of brands now on record in the office of the Cattle Sanitary Board, to file with the Secretary of said Board, a fac-simile of the brand or brands now in actual use and owned by them. A fee for the re-recording of brands shall be one (\$1.00) dollar for each brand re-recorded, the proceeds to be used for the cost of notice given as provided in Section 1 of this act; provided, that any excess money from such fees shall be placed in the Indemnity Fund of the Cattle Sanitary Board.

For the right to continue the use of any brand or brands recorded with the Cattle Sanitary Board, the owner or owners thereof shall, on or before the first day of January of every third year after its recording, pay to the Cattle Sanitary Board a fee of Fifty Cents (\$.50), which said amount is to be placed in the Indemnity Fund of the Cattle Sanitary Board. Upon receipt of the payment of the said amount, it shall be the duty of the Sanitary Board to mail to any such owners or owners a brand certificate for each brand recorded and for which said fee has been paid. A failure to make such payment shall forfeit the right to use any brand. When the right to use any brand recorded as aforesaid shall have become forfeited, the said brand shall not be recorded by any other person until after the expiration of two years from the date of the forfeiture. The Cattle Sanitary Board shall give notice each year on or before the first day of November by letter mailed through the United States mail to the owner or owners of such recorded brand of the amount due to be paid as hereinbefore provided.

Section 3. That it is necessary for the preservation of the public peace

and safety of the inhabitants of the State of New Mexico that the provisions of this act shall become effective at the earliest possible time, and, therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this act shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
