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HANNA CHOICE OF DEMOCRATS FOR UNITED STATES SENATOR

At the Democratic State Convention at Albuquerque last week, Richard H. Hanna was chosen by the Democrats as their candidate for the United States Senator from New Mexico.

A good representation was present from every county in the state, and the delegation was composed of ladies and gentlemen who were there for the earnest consideration of the welfare of the state.

The convention was opened with invocation by Rev. Kitchner, pastor of the Methodist church of Albuquerque.

The convention call was read by Secretary Byron D. Beall, of Roswell, after which the address of welcome was delivered by Walter N. Connell, of Albuquerque, secretary of City Commission.

Hon. J. S. Vaught, of Deming, responded after which a telegram from Senator A. A. Jones was read.

Mrs. Francis E. Nixon, of DeBaca county was chosen as temporary chairman, this being the first time in the history of the state where a woman presided at a state convention. Mrs. Nixon delivered the keynote speech and made quite a hit with the entire convention.

In the committees appointed, Hon. Coe Howard served on the advisory committee; Senator R. G. Bryant on the committee on rules and order of business; Roy W. Connally on the committee of permanent organization; and J. G. Greaves on the committee on resolutions.

The convention adjourned till nine o'clock Friday morning, when reports of the various committees were received.

Thursday night the committees on resolutions and the advisory committee were in session till after midnight drafting the state platform and considering the selection of a candidate to put before the convention for nomination as Democratic candidate for United States Senator. These two committees failed to complete their work till noon Thursday, and gave their report to the convention in the afternoon session. The party platform as reported by the committee and adopted by the convention appears in full elsewhere in this paper.

Col. Atwood of Roswell was chosen as permanent chairman and presided in the afternoon session. In his speech he flayed the Journal in its flop from the cause of the people to the support of Bursum; endorsed the former Democratic administration and the actions of Senator A. A. Jones. He said that the situation was now in the hands of the people and that the voters who stayed at home would be responsible for the election of the U. S. Senator on September 20th. He urged the women voters to see that there was a full turn out at the election, stating that their intuition was a better guide to voting than the political experiences of their husbands.

Hon. O. N. Marron of Albuquerque put the name of Richard H. Hanna before the convention for nomination. Judge Vaught of Deming making the seconding speech. This was received by the audience with cries of "Hanna! Hanna!" and he was nominated by acclamation.

Judge Hanna was sent for and on mounting the platform told of his appreciation of the honor, but stated that he was a poor man and that he had not recovered financially from the campaign of a year ago, and that he could not make the race without the financial support of the Democrats of New Mexico.

DISTRICT COURT PROCEEDURE

Cases disposed of in the District Court since our last issue are as follows:

John Harth vs. B. B. Great-house, suit over land, jury trial, verdict for plaintiff.

Clyde Cox vs. Roosevelt Oil Corporation, suit on account, non jury trial. Judgment for plaintiff in sum of \$845.

Emzy Roberts vs. Estelle Johnson, et al, suit on account, jury trial. Verdict for plaintiff.

W. T. Raleigh Co., vs. Clinton D. Fortner, et al, suit on contract. Verdict for plaintiff in sum of \$922.79.

This finished the jury cases and the jury was dismissed Wednesday evening.

The case of W. J. Gower vs. John Amster et al, land suit, went to trial Thursday morning.

The injunctions against the County Board of Education are set for hearing Friday of this week.

In the criminal cases of State of New Mexico vs. Lonnie Kirby and Preston Black charged with bringing stolen property into the state, the defendants received a sentence of from 2 to 5 years in the reform school at Springer, N. M.

The above was the case of the stolen automobile which was captured at Elida several days ago.

JUSTICE COURT

This week two boys were taken up and lodged in the county jail charged with vagrancy. These boys are found to be addicted to the drug habit, and are in a very poor state of physical condition.

Hon. Holm O. Bursum Nominated at Santa Fe

Republicans in Convention Choose Successor to Albert B. Fall.

The Republican state convention met at Santa Fe on the 18th for the purpose of nominating a Republican candidate for the United States Senate.

Hon. Holm O. Bursum, now senator by appointment, was chosen by the convention as candidate for the Republican party.

From the start it proved to be a Bursum convention, the supporters of Holt giving away to the majority.

Valencia county refused to send delegates, which was disconcerting to the organization.

The convention lasted only one day, nominated their man and adjourned the night of the 18th.

Governor Lindsey of Portales was honored by being placed on the resolution committee.

GIANT AIRSHIP FALLS IN RIVER ON TRIAL TRIP

HULL, ENG., Aug. 24.—America's giant dirigible, the ZR-2, carrying more than 50 American and British flyers exploded and fell flaming into the river Humber at 5:45 o'clock this afternoon.

So far as known only two men escaped.

They floated free of the doomed air cruiser in parachutes. All the rest are believed to have been hurled to death. At eight o'clock tonight it was stated that 49 men were believed to have been aboard the ZR-2. Of these, 34 were British and 15 Americans. The latter included six officers.

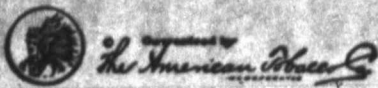

The body was resting in the vestibule of the church and the family and friends were waiting when the minister issued his edict. The Legion immediately took charge of the remains and obtained another minister.

Canadian soldier societies have been asked to co-operate with American Legion posts of the west in the search for Fred E. Woodard, Sidney, Mont., Legion Post commander, veteran of the Princess Pats and the A. E. F., who disappeared June 29. It is feared that Woodard is a victim of aphasia.

Charging that he buried the bodies of two and three soldiers in the same grave and that he charged for hermetically sealed coffin boxes when none were used, the American Legion of New York City recently caused the arrest of William A. Skahill, a Manhattan undertaker. The Legion announced his arrest as the opening of a crusade against unscrupulous undertakers.

The people's idol has fallen. Carl McGee the self-styled defender of the people has gone over to the side of the big interests. It is always the case when anyone seeks to promote his own interests at the expense of the people; the little fellow who puts up the money is told to go way back and sit down. We are disappointed in the Albuquerque Journal and Carl McGee, its editor. We had hoped that a truly big man had invaded the ranks of state journalism to champion the cause of the oppressed. We hope that we are mistaken in our opinion of the actions of McGee and the Journal. If McGee is a leader for the rights of the people, time will tell. If, as it appears, he has sold his birthright for a mess of porridge, the usefulness of the Journal is a thing of the past, and it has lost its influence and its right to the respect of the people of the state.

A new era in New Mexico politics was established at the Democratic State Convention at Albuquerque last week when a candidate was chosen without regard to financial ability to make the race. This is a wedge which will split asunder the theory that a United States Senator must buy his seat. The people have spoken. They have chosen a man fully qualified to represent them. Now will they lay down and permit money bags of the opposition to defeat their will? Let this be a start for pure politics in New Mexico. This section is thickly settled with progressive farmers, and five or six miles of road would bring it to Portales. This contains food for thought on the part of the business interests of Portales.

While in Albuquerque last week the News editor had the pleasure of meeting Roosevelt county's former county agent, Mr. Reynolds, also Mrs. Reynolds. Mr. Reynolds is now county agent over there. He states that the more he sees of New Mexico the more he is convinced that Roosevelt county is the best in the state for agriculture. He says that the people in Roosevelt county do not realize the wonderful possibilities before them.

**KENTUCKY VALLEY
MAINTAINS TEACHERAGE**

The first consolidated school in the county to provide a teacherage for the convenience of the teachers of the school is Kentucky Valley. A letter from J. L. Paxton of this district states that they have provided a two room building to be used as a teacherage, and that they have also drilled a well and are erecting a windmill on the school grounds.

This district has a convenient building for the school, which can be thrown into a large auditorium for the community gatherings. It also has a large garage which accommodated two school trucks and two cars.

Kentucky Valley is one of the best agricultural sections in the county, having never made a crop failure in the past twelve years. While the greater part of this district is devoted to stock raising her farms produce good crops of all kinds. Corn averaging 35 bushels to the acre and in cases reaching 50 and 60 bushels.

A portion of this district is in the shallow water belt and with proper attention could be brought under irrigation. The district is settled with a progressive people who will doubtless develop this section of the county till it is the largest consolidated school in the county.

School will open there on the 19th of September with a big dinner on the ground.

Section 2. All county officers shall be elected for a term of two years, until otherwise provided by law, and no county officer, except the County School Superintendent, after having served two consecutive terms, shall be eligible to hold any County office for two years thereafter.

NO. 11
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO BY ADDING THERETO ANOTHER SECTION TO ARTICLE IX, THE SAME TO BE NUMBERED 16.

H. J. R. No. 25, Filed Feb. 28, 1921. Be it Enacted by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. That the following amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico as an additional section of said Article IX, to be numbered Section 16, is proposed, to be submitted to the electors of the state at an election to be held:

Section 16. Laws enacted by the Fifth Legislature authorizing the issue and sale of State Highway Bonds for the purpose of providing funds for the construction and improvement of State Highways and to enable the State to meet and secure allotments of Federal Funds to aid in construction and improvement of roads, and laws so enacted authorizing the issue and sale of State Highway Debentures to anticipate the collection of revenues from motor vehicle licenses and other revenues provided by law for the State Road Fund, shall take effect without submitting them to the electors of the state, and notwithstanding that the total indebtedness of the state may thereby temporarily exceed one percentum of the assessed valuation of all property subject to taxation in the state. Provided, that the total amount of such State Highway Bonds payable from proceeds of taxes levied on property outstanding at any one time shall not exceed two million dollars. The legislature shall not enact any law which will decrease the amount of the annual revenues pledged for the payment of State Highway Debentures or which will divert any of such revenues to any other purpose so long as any of said debentures issued to anticipate the collection thereof remain unpaid.

NO. 12
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROVIDING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION TWELVE OF ARTICLE NINE OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, ENTITLED "STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL INDEBTEDNESS."

H. J. R. No. 32, Appr. Feb. 14, 1921. Be it Enacted by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. That it is hereby proposed to amend Section 12 of Article 9 of the State Constitution so as to read as follows:

"Section 12. No city, town, or village shall contract any debt, except by an ordinance, which shall be irrevocable until the indebtedness therein provided for shall have been fully paid or discharged, and which shall specify for the purpose to which the funds to be raised shall be applied, and which shall provide for the levy of a tax not exceeding twelve mills on the dollar upon all taxable property within such city, town, or village, sufficient to pay the interest on, and to extinguish the principal of, such debt within fifty years. The proceeds of such tax shall be applied, only to the payment of such interest and principal. No such debt shall be created unless the questions of incurring the same, shall at a regular election for councilmen, aldermen or other officers of such city, town or village, or at a special election duly called for that specific purpose, in the same manner as for a regular election, have been submitted to a vote of such qualified electors thereof as have paid a property tax therein during the preceding year, and a majority of those voting on the question, deposited in a separate ballot box, shall have voted in favor of creating such debt."

Paragraph to Chapter 138, Session Laws of 1921, the following constitutional amendments are submitted to the qualified voters of the State of New Mexico for adoption or rejection at the Special Election to be held September 20, 1921.

NO. 1

JOINT RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE AMENDMENT OF SECTION 3 OF ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.

H. J. R. No. 18, Appr. Feb. 15, 1921. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

That Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 2. Every citizen of the United States who is a legal resident of the State and is a qualified elector therein, shall be qualified to hold any public office in the state except as otherwise provided in this Constitution. The right to hold public office in the state of New Mexico shall not be denied or abridged on account of sex, and wherever the masculine gender is used in this Constitution, in defining the qualifications for specific offices, it shall be construed to include the feminine gender. Provided, however, that the payment of public road poll tax, school poll tax or service on juries shall not be made a prerequisite of the right of a female to vote or hold office."

NO. 2

A RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 22 OF ARTICLE II OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.

Joint Res. No. 9 (As Amended) Appr. March 8, 1921.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. That Section 22 of Article II of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be amended so that the said section shall read as follows:

Section 22. Until otherwise provided by law no alien ineligible to citizenship under the laws of the United States, or corporation, copartnership or association, a majority of the stock or interest in which is owned or held by such aliens, shall acquire title, leasehold or other interest in or to real estate in New Mexico.

NO. 3

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION I OF ARTICLE V OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, ENTITLED "EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT."

H. J. R. No. 19, Appr. Feb. 9, 1921. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

That Section 1 of Article V of the Constitution of the state of New Mexico, entitled "Executive Department," be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general, superintendent of public instruction and commissioner of public lands, who shall be elected for a term of two years beginning on the first day of January next after their election.

Such officers, except the superintendent of public instruction, after having served two consecutive terms, shall be ineligible to hold any state office for two years thereafter.

The officers of the executive department, except the Lieutenant Governor, during their terms of office, shall reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of office at the seat of government."

NO. 4

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 5 OF ARTICLE VIII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, ENTITLED "TAXATION AND REVENUE."

H. J. R. No. 41, Appr. March 11, 1921. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the state of New Mexico, entitled "Taxation and Revenue," be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 5. The legislature may exempt from taxation property of each head of a family to the amount of two hundred dollars, and the property of every honorably discharged soldier, sailor, marine and army nurse, and the widow of every such soldier, sailor, or marine, who served in the armed forces of the United States at any time during the period in which the United States was regularly and officially engaged in any war, in the sum of two thousand dollars. Provided, that in every case where exemption is claimed on the ground of the claimant having served with the naval forces of the United States as aforesaid, the burden of proving actual and bona fide ownership of such property, upon which exemption is claimed, shall be upon the claimant."

NO. 5

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE XI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, ENTITLED "CORPORATIONS OTHER THAN MUNICIPAL" BY ADDING THERE-

TO A NEW SECTION TO BE NUMBERED SECTION 19.

H. J. R. No. 35, Appr. Feb. 13, 1921. Be it Enacted by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, entitled "Corporations and Other Municipal" be amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered Section 19 to read as follows:

"Sec. 19. The Legislature may by enactment change, alter or enlarge the powers and duties of the State Corporation Commission created by Section 1 of this Article for the control and regulation of corporations and may change or alter the provisions for the enforcement of its orders.

Until the Legislature shall otherwise provide any order made by the commission fixing or changing any charge or rate or relating to any matter within its authority shall be binding upon the carrier, or company, or person to whom the same is directed and shall be enforced by the Supreme Court according to the terms of such order unless changed or modified by said court on a hearing applied for by such carrier, company or person within a reasonable time limited in such order.

Upon any hearing or proceeding in any court upon any order issued by the commission within the scope of its authority the burden of proof shall be upon the carrier, company or person to whom such order is directed to show the unreasonableness of any charge or rate fixed or requirement specified in such order and such court may of its own motion and shall upon request of any interested party require or authorize additional evidence.

NO. 6

JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING THE AMENDMENT OF SECTION 3, ARTICLE XX, AND SECTION 5, ARTICLE IV, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.

C. S. for S. J. R. No. 4, Appr. Feb. 11, 1921.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. That Section 3, of Article XX, of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 3. The term of office of every state, county or district officer, except the governor of the state, and those elected to fill vacancies, shall commence on the first day of January next after his election. The term of office of the governor of the state shall commence on the first day of December next after his election.

Section 2. That Section 5, of Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. (A). The regular biennial session of the legislature shall begin at twelve o'clock, noon, on the first Tuesday of February next after each general election. No regular session shall exceed sixty days and no special session shall exceed thirty days.

"Sub-Section (B). All moneys received on account of the state from any source whatsoever, shall be paid into the treasury thereof.

"Sub-Section (C). The legislature shall not appropriate any money out of the treasury except in accordance with the provisions of this section.

"Sub-Section (D). On or before the 15th day of January in each year next preceding the regular biennial session of the legislature, every department, institution and agency of the State, except the legislative department, shall submit to the governor of the state a detailed statement showing actual revenues and expenditures for the two fiscal years intervening since the last regular session of the legislature, together with estimates of appropriations required to meet the financial needs of such department, institution or agency, itemized as the governor may require.

"Sub-Section (E). On or before the twentieth day of every regular session of the legislature, the governor shall prepare, and shall submit to the legislature, a budget containing a detailed statement and estimate of all anticipated revenues of the state, and a complete plan of proposed expenditures for the state government, during the ensuing biennium.

"Sub-Section (F). For the purpose of preparing his budget the governor shall have power to require any board, commission, officer or department to furnish him with any information which he may deem necessary.

"Sub-Section (G). At the time the governor submits his budget to the legislature, he shall also submit a bill, to be known as the "General Appropriation Bill," which shall contain all of the proposed appropriations of the budget clearly itemized and classified; and the presiding officer of each house shall, immediately, cause said bill to be referred, together with the accompanying budget, to the appropriate committee, for its consideration. The governor may, before final action thereon by the legislature, amend or supplement said budget and general appropriation bill, to correct any oversight, or in case of an emergency, by delivering such amendment or supplement to the presiding officers of both houses; and such amendment or supplement shall thereby become a part of said general appropriation bill as an addition to the items of said bill or as a modification of, or a substitution for any item of said bill such amendment or supplement may effect.

"Sub-Section (H). The legislature may amend such general appropriation bill by increasing the items therein relating to the Judicial Department, but may not otherwise alter or amend

such bill, except to strike out or reduce times therein.

"Sub-Section (I). Prior to the final action on the general appropriation bill, the legislature may provide for its salaries, mileage and necessary legislative expenses by special appropriation bills, specifically limited to such purposes, but before final action on the general appropriation bill, it shall not enact any other appropriation bill, except upon recommendation of the governor.

"Sub-Section (J). The governor may, at any time, recommend to the legislature supplementary budgets and supplementary appropriation bills based thereon, all of which shall be subject to the same procedure as the original budget and the general appropriation bill.

"Sub-Section (K). After final action on the general appropriation bill, or on recommendation of the governor, special appropriation may be enacted but every such appropriation shall be embodied in a separate bill, limited to some single word, subject or purpose therein stated.

"Sub-Section (L). In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and any of the other provisions of the Constitution, the provisions of this section shall prevail. But nothing herein shall in any manner affect the provisions of Section 23 of Article IV of the Constitution, or be construed as preventing the governor from calling special sessions of the legislature as provided by Section 6, of Article IV, of the Constitution, or as preventing the legislature at such special sessions, from considering any emergency appropriation or appropriations."

NO. 7

JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE XIII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, ENTITLED "PUBLIC LANDS."

S. J. R. No. 41, Appr. March 12, 1921. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. That Article XIII of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be amended so as to read as follows:

"ARTICLE XIII PUBLIC LANDS"
"Section 1. All lands belonging to the State of New Mexico, and all lands granted, transferred or confirmed to the State by Congress, and all lands hereafter acquired, are declared to be public lands of the state to be held or disposed of as may be provided by law for the purpose for which they have been or may be granted, donated or otherwise acquired.

"Section 2. A permanent Commission to consist of three members, not more than two of whom shall belong to the same political party, is hereby created, which shall be known as the "State Land Commission."

"Section 3. The members of the Commission shall be appointed by the governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall be subject to removal only for cause. Each member shall hold office for a term of six years from and after his appointment, and until his successor shall have been duly appointed and qualified; Provided that the three members of the Commission first appointed and confirmed shall immediately qualify and classify themselves by lot so that one of them shall hold office for two years, one for four years, and one for six years, from and after January 1st, 1923, and thereafter one Commissioner shall be appointed every two years; Provided, however, that the members of the Commission first to be appointed shall be appointed during the regular session of the legislature to convene in the year 1923, and provided further, that until such Commission shall be duly appointed and qualified as hereinabove provided, the Commissioner of Public Lands in the year 1920 shall continue to act as Commissioner of Public Lands with all the powers and authority heretofore exercised by him.

"Section 4. The State Land Commission shall select, locate, classify, and have the direction, control, care and disposition of all public lands, under the provisions of the Acts of Congress relating thereto and such regulations as may be provided by law.

"Section 5. The Commission shall annually elect one of its members Chairman, and shall appoint a Chief Clerk, and such other officers, assistants, and subordinates as may be requisite and necessary for the proper conduct of the affairs of the State Land Office. The commission shall prescribe its own rules of order and procedure concerning its official duties. The salaries of the Commissioners shall be fixed by the legislature.

"Section 6. All of the duties, powers, and prerogatives now by law incumbent upon or vested in the Commissioner of Public Lands of the State of New Mexico, shall as soon as the first three members, appointed and confirmed under authority of this article, shall qualify, be incumbent upon and vested in the State Land Commission, and said Commission shall thereupon be deemed to be the legal successor of the Commissioner of Public Lands of this State, and shall be bound by and have power to enforce all lawful contracts, entered into by the Commissioner of Public Lands on behalf of the State.

"Section 7. Any qualified elector, of the State of New Mexico, who has attained the age of thirty years, and who shall have been a resident of the State of New Mexico for five years next preceding his appointment shall be qualified to hold office as a member of the State Land Commission.

"Section 8. The State Land Commission shall have a seal with an ap-

propriate device thereon, and such seal affixed to any instrument, signed by the Chairman or Acting Chairman, and attested by the Chief Clerk, shall be prima facie evidence of the due execution thereof.

"Section 9. Each member of the Commission shall, before entering upon the oath of office, as prescribed for all State duties of his office, qualify by taking the officers, and shall execute a bond, in favor of the State, in the penal sum of \$50,000.00, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of his office.

"Section 10. The Chairman of the State Land Commission shall be the third member, together with the governor and attorney general, of the Commission created by Section 11, of the Act of Congress, approved June 10th, 1920, commonly called the Enabling Act."

NO. 8

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION TWO OF ARTICLE EIGHT OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.

C. S. for S. J. R. No. 21, Appr. March 12, 1921.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 2. The maximum rate of taxation to be levied for all state purposes and uses, including the educational, penal, and charitable institutions, shall not exceed six mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all property subject to taxation in the state. The maximum rate of tax to be levied for all County purposes and uses, excepting special school levies, general school tax levies, special levies for health purposes, and special levies on specific classes of property, shall not exceed five (5) mills on the dollar; Provided, However, that a tax not exceeding two (2) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all property subject to taxation in this state may be levied for the construction and maintenance of the State Highways, which said two (2) mills levy shall not be within the State or County limitations heretofore fixed. The maximum rate of tax to be levied for all general county school purposes and uses shall not exceed ten (10) mills on the dollar; Provided, However, that an additional levy of not to exceed five (5) mills on the dollar, may be made with the joint, written consent of the Board of County Commissioners and the State Tax Commission. The maximum rate of tax to be levied for City, Town, or Village purposes or uses shall not exceed five (5) mills on the dollar. The maximum amount of tax to be levied for health purposes shall not exceed one-half (1-2) mills. The maximum rate of tax to be levied by school districts for special school district purposes, shall not exceed five (5) mills on the dollar. The foregoing limitations shall not apply to levies for the payment of the public debt or interest thereon; Provided, Further, that the limitations herein contained shall not apply to tax levies authorized by the Fifth Legislature and exempted from similar limitations in existing laws.

JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION TWELVE OF ARTICLE NINE OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, ENTITLED "STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL INDEBTEDNESS."

H. J. R. No. 32, Appr. Feb. 14, 1921. Be it Enacted by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. That it is hereby proposed to amend Section 12 of Article 9 of the State Constitution so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 12. No city, town, or village shall contract any debt, except by an ordinance, which shall be irrevocable until the indebtedness therein provided for shall have been fully paid or discharged, and which shall specify for the purpose to which the funds to be raised shall be applied, and which shall provide for the levy of a tax not exceeding twelve mills on the dollar upon all taxable property within such city, town, or village, sufficient to pay the interest on, and to extinguish the principal of, such debt within fifty years. The proceeds of such tax shall be applied, only to the payment of such interest and principal. No such debt shall be created unless the questions of incurring the same, shall at a regular election for councilmen, aldermen or other officers of such city, town or village, or at a special election duly called for that specific purpose, in the same manner as for a regular election, have been submitted to a vote of such qualified electors thereof as have paid a property tax therein during the preceding year, and a majority of those voting on the question, deposited in a separate ballot box, shall have voted in favor of creating such debt."

JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 9 OF ARTICLE X OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, ENTITLED "COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS."

H. J. R. No. 40, Appr. Feb. 14, 1921. Be it Enacted by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. That Section 9 of Article X of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico entitled "County and Municipal Corporations," be and the same is hereby amended so as to read

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM ADOPTED AT CONVENTION

State Democratic Convention: We, your committee on resolutions, beg to submit the following:

The Democratic Party of New Mexico, in convention assembled, extends its greetings to Woodrow Wilson, whose public services as Chief Executive will forever remain a source of pride to the Party, as to the Nation.

In the eight years of Democratic administration under Woodrow Wilson more constructive legislation in behalf of the people was enacted than under any previous administration in our history.

Among some of the great achievements of the late Democratic administration were:

The World War brought to a successful conclusion although the establishment of World Peace was obstructed and prevented by Republican partisanship resulting in the present chaotic conditions throughout the world.

The World War financed both for the Allied and Associated Nations without a panic, and the credit of the Nation maintained secure—the greatest financial undertaking in the world's history.

Passage of the Federal Reserve Bank Act, the Underwood Tariff Act, the Child Labor Act, and the Workingman's Compensation Act.

Establishment of the Department of Labor; also of a Woman's Bureau in the Department of Labor, which latter a Republican Congress destroyed by withholding appropriations.

Development of the Parcels Post Act and extension of the Rural Free Delivery.

The Democratic party also passed during this period, the Smith-Lever Agriculture Extension Act, established the Bureau of Markets and the Bureau of Farm Management, Federal Trades Commission Act, besides enacting many other measures resulting in incalculable benefit to agriculture.

We are proud of this splendid record of Democratic achievement.

Reversing Our Foreign Policies.

The Republican Party, by mendacious misrepresentation, persistently attacked the foreign policies of the Democratic administration, and its candidate for President in the late election pledged himself to completely reverse the foreign policies of the Wilson administration if elected.

On August 16, 1921, at Marion, Mr. Harding said: "The Republican party expects a Republican administration to make a sweeping change in the foreign policies of the Nation. There will be a complete reversal."

Since it assumed control of the foreign affairs of the Nation, the Republican Party, instead of completely reversing the foreign policies of the previous administration, has followed exactly in its footsteps whenever it has been compelled by the force of circumstances to deal with foreign affairs.

Peace With Germany.

That the failure of the Republican administration to keep its promise to make peace with Germany promptly is largely responsible for the chaotic conditions that exist in world trade today, and in spite of President Harding's promises our soldiers are still on the Rhine.

The Appointment of Harvey.

We repudiate with indignation the assertion of our Ambassador to Great Britain that this country took arms in the great war inspired only by selfish and sordid motives, and we heartily condemn his un-American utterances in minimizing the accomplishments of our Army and Navy in the World War. As these statements have gone unrebuked, we must assume that Col. Harvey voiced the sentiments of the administration.

Mexico.

The Democratic policy in regard to our relations with Mexico has been one of friendship, patience and non-intervention.

This policy has found expression not only in the language of the Mexican plank of the 1920 platform of the National Democratic Party, but in the consistent acts of the last Democratic Administration.

The Mexican plank in the Republican Party is, on the contrary, arrogant, belligerent and threatening.

But notwithstanding this fact the wisdom of the Democratic policy, both as to recognition, and as to intervention, has been acknowledged by the Republican Administration, and that administration has seen no good reason for its reversal.

Equal Rights to Women.

We reaffirm our unflinching faith in the creed of Democracy. We confidently believe in its practical justice, industrial as well as political; for women no less than for men. We pledge ourselves to give enthusiastic support to legislative efforts, state or federal, calculated to wipe out such arbitrary discrimination against women as still obtained under existing law.

The Interests of Labor.

The Democratic Party re-asserts its devotion to the cause of labor. It is true that many who work with their hands apparently voted for normalcy in the last election; but they are rapidly being disillusioned. We remind them that it was a Democratic Congress that wrote the law which proclaimed that "labor is not a commodity."

Moreover, we are persuaded that the workers should share more generally and more authoritatively in the government of industry. It is not enough that they should receive living wages and be granted reasonable hours; industrial justice demands that they

should have some voice in the councils that determine both wages and hours. Soldier's Adjusted Compensation Act.

We commend and endorse the able fight made by Senator A. A. Jones to pass the Soldier's Adjusted Compensation Bill, as recommended by the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign War, and National Disabled Soldier's League, and we call attention to the fearless fight which he made in the United States Senate in support of this much needed legislation in defiance of the expressed wishes of the President of the United States, who urged the Congress of the United States to not pass this legislation. We pledge our candidate for the United States Senate to not only vote but work earnestly for the immediate enactment of this legislation.

Taxation.

We condemn the Republican Congress for its arrogant refusal to follow the recommendations of the Democratic President to revise the Revenue Law and for its utter failure to keep its campaign promise to reduce Federal Taxes.

Reclamation of Arid Lands.

We call attention to the fact that New Mexico is a Public Land State, with many thousands of acres of Federal lands within its boundaries, idle and barren; yielding no tax to the state.

We urgently recommend the inauguration of a sound and rational policy of reclamation; that the plentiful waters of its streams be impounded; that its arid acres be put under cultivation and made to yield sustenance for the millions who should, and would, come to dwell within our borders.

We recommend that every opportunity be afforded ex-service men to share in the ownership and enjoyment of these reclaimed lands, for surely a grateful country should take some practical steps to demonstrate its appreciation of those who did not stop to count the cost to themselves when duty called them to their country's service, and we heartily favor the enactment of legislation which will prevent the transferring of real estate into the hands of persons who are ineligible to citizenship. We favor necessary legislation to exempt from taxation property of each head of a family, to the amount of two hundred dollars, and the property of every honorably discharged soldier, sailor, marine, army nurse, and the widow of every such soldier, sailor or marine, who served in armed forces of the United States at any time during the period when the United States was regularly and officially engaged in any war, in the sum of two thousand dollars.

Republican Pledges and Performance in New Mexico.

We are reminded of the numerous platform and campaign pledges made by the Republican party in this state last fall, and while absolute fairness requires us to concede that the present Governor in his message to the last legislature recommended the enactment into law of all things necessary to carry out the pledges and assurances of the Republican party, yet it is significant to note that the bossridden legislature, then as for so many years dominated and controlled by Hon. H. O. Bursum, failed to enact laws upon the following subjects recommended to it by Governor Mechem, namely:— Passage of the law giving equal rights to women in the matter of the guardianship of minor children. Adoption of a State wide primary law for nomination of all candidates for public office. This was pledged by the candidate for Governor during the campaign, and the State platform contained the pledge for a District primary. No such law was enacted by the legislature.

Legislation making it possible to pay a minimum salary of \$1200.00 per annum to teachers holding a first grade certificate.

Much more might be said concerning the lack of good faith and honest effort to serve the public well, in an analysis of the laws, passed by the legislature. It is sufficient, however, to direct the attention of the voters to the mutilated act recommended by the Governor, for the purpose of establishing an ad valorem system for the taxation of mining property.

The comments by well-informed persons concerning the inefficiency of the law passed by the last legislature, and particularly the studied analysis of that act by Hon. Herbert J. Hagerman, are enlightening upon this subject, and demonstrates the entire lack of good faith on the part of the Republican legislators of the present as well as of the past.

It is sufficient to point out in connection with the legislation passed by the recent Republican Legislature, that a woeful lack of good faith or desire to honestly carry out the campaign promises, has been made evident.

We heartily condemn the action of the Republican Bosses in dragging our educational institutions in politics, which was clearly demonstrated in the removal of Dr. Frank H. H. Roberts from the Presidency of the Las Vegas Normal University, at the behest of the Republican Boss of San Miguel County, and who was supported by Mr. Bursum.

We look on with disfavor and condemn the practices of the Republican State Legislature in fixing the county seats of new counties created, without giving the legal voters living within the confines of said new county an opportunity to select their county seat; also do we condemn the practice of appointing all officers in said new counties from one political party.

As evidence of the Republican party's intention to reduce the tax burden, as promised in their last campaign, and which has become unbearable, we point to the fact that under McDonald's administration, the annual tax in New Mexico was four million dollars, while for the good year 1921 the total tax will reach the astounding total of twelve million dollars. We favor legislation which will reduce the tax burden; to this end we favor an adequate budget system.

The Democratic party condemns any attempt by the Republican Legislature to retard the advancement of our educational institutions, and particularly our rural schools.

The State Democratic Committee and Convention would be ungrateful did it fail to express its deep appreciation of the splendid work for the people done by the Independent and Progressive voters in the last election, and we applaud the gallant fight which they are now making to stamp out the curse of Bursunism which now menaces the State of New Mexico, and we now issue the call to arms of all believers in civic decency and righteousness irrespective of political faith or creed, to fight this alarming prospect, for if we fail, the seating of this ally of all that is evil and vicious in New Mexico politics will herald the darkest hours in the history of our state.

We are very grateful to the Democratic and Independent press for its valuable assistance in past campaigns, as a powerful force for political reform in New Mexico.

PORTALES CO-OPERATIVE BROOM CORN WAREHOUSE ASSOCIATION ELECTS OFFICERS

What promises to be of great importance to the agricultural interests of Roosevelt county was the meeting of the Portales Broom Corn and Warehouse Association held here yesterday. A three hour session was held at which the first directors of the Association were elected. The plan of selecting men from the various districts of the county was carried out with the following selections:

J. W. Thompson, Portales, president; Hugh King, Floyd, vice-president; W. O. McCormack, Rogers, J. D. Hitt, Garrison, and J. A. Vick, Richland.

These men were nominated by the growers of their own neighborhoods and unanimously elected by the Association.

The directors will immediately take up the work of arranging for the details of handling this season's broomcorn crop. It is realized that the time is short and immediate action is necessary.

Loyalty to the Association and a willingness to discuss with each other the points of difference that arose were the outstanding features of the meeting. Several matters of policy to be adopted by the newly formed organization were discussed and settled.

The Association at present has a total of 67 members with an acreage of over 2300, which represents about 80 per cent of the total acreage of the county. According to E. C. Hollinger, county agent of Curry county, who was present at this meeting, the broomcorn growers of Curry county are watching with interest the developments of the Roosevelt growers. He intimated in a short talk that some Curry county farmers may want to enter the Association here until they can organize themselves.

Mr. Arthur F. Jones of Portales was a visitor at the meeting and spoke a few words of encouragement to the members.

Out of 3500 head of cattle here yesterday packers bought only 836 head. Two weeks ago when receipts were smaller packers bought around 2000 head daily. This accounts for the near demoralized state of beef steer trade. Calves were active at strong prices, good light stock bringing \$5.25, with a string of heavies going at \$5.25. Steers were 15c to 25c lower, cows and yearlings were steady at 15c lower.

Hogs sold lower today but the local decline probably was less than elsewhere. Four loads went at a cut of not over 15c, but packers bought at 15c to 25c decline. The shipper top was \$9, while packers stopped at \$8.90. Bulk sales range from \$8.75 to \$9. Receipts were limited to 1500 head.

The sheep and lamb market was steady, the count calling for 1300 head, Fairly good wethers brought \$4.50.
