WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Prohibition officials in the opinion of the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morale of the Methodist Episcopal church, should be instructed to remember their wives, children and the people of the United States when their lives are placed in danger by bootleggers and moonshiners."

"Some people seem to be surprised that the Board of Temperance of the Methodist Episcopal church that prohibition officers have

a right to defend themselves only and effectively when hreatened by armed crimianls the Board said in a statement issued today, amplifying a previous statement along the same lines.
"The crires of bereft children of faithful prohibition officers

"It is nothing less than murderous to expect prohibition offi cers to await the arrest of bootleggers with guns in their hands.
"Bootleggers are the worst kind of criminals, frequently ex-

convicts and cruel killers. "They are dangerous, in the extreme. When a bootlegger draws a gun he should be fired upon and that quickly. They (prohibition officers) owe it to themselves, to their wives, to their children, and above all to the majesty of the law, to do so."

TOKIO, Nov. 5.—The Japanese ministry, deprived of its head

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—"Takashi Hara, Premier of Japan, was stabbed here at 7:25 p. m. Friday and died soon afterward," the Japanese Embassy here was advised today by the Tokio foreign office in the first word of the assassination to reach Washington from the Japanese Government.

The embassy communication said Viscount Uchida, foreign minister in the Hara cabinet, had been made acting Premier, but gave no details as to the assassination. The messge was received in uncoded form, but its filing time

indicated that it had experienced considerable delay. Admiral Baron Kato, one of the Japanese delegates to the armament conference, acting in accord with other members of the Hara cabinet, today cabled his resignation as minister of marine to

LONDON, Nov. 5—Public interest in the assassination of Premier Hara of Japan was intensified in London by consideration of the influence his removal might have upon Japan's attitude toward the Washington conference. Newspapers today published Tokio dispatches regarding the tragedy with great prominence and in their editorial columns expressed deep sympathy for Japan in the loss of a minister who was regarded here as an enlightened democrat. In the absence of full details of the crime of which accounts are meager and in some respects contradictory, comment upon the incident was somewhat restrained.

who I am, or why I am here at all. "All that I know is that I am supposed to be an inexhaustible supply of money for every known need, desire or hope of the human race, and because I will not sell all I have and go out and beg, borrow or steal money to give away, I am cussed, discussed, boycotted, talked to, taked about, lied about and held up hung up, robbed nd damn near ruined, and the only reason why I am clinging to life now is to see what will happen next."
