MOTOR STAMPS MAY BE SECURED

Postmaster Tom Bice announced this week that the Dimmitt post office now has on hand ready to issue Motor Vehicle Tax Stamps, which the Federal Government requires to be placed on all motor vehicles—passenger cars, trucks and pickups. The stamps will cost \$2.09, and must be stuck on the windshield or car windows in such a place as they will remain until the end of the fiscal year of the II. S. Government—or June, 1942. Next June motor vehicle owners will be required to buy a new Motor Vehicle Tax Stamp during the month of June, which will cost \$5.00 and be good for one year. Cars bought each month thereafter will be required to secure such stamps for the remaining months at a decreasing rate of about 42c a month.

REGISTERED **CATTLE BOUGHT** BY CASTRO MEN

COUNTY FARMERS BUY GOOD FOUNDATION STOCK, WILL DEVELOP BETTER CATTLE

Fifteen head of registered Jerseys were purchased by three Castro County farmers less week after an inspection of several here around Dallas and Cleburne Four Castro County men made the management with County Agent May. Making the trip were Frank Huseman of Nazareth, 28,99 W Lilley of Sunnyside, Rayford David of Hart, and Pete Coke of Place.

Among the cattle purchased was a two-year-old registered Jersey bull with one of the best production records back of his ancestory to be found on the Plains. Pete Coke purchased two cows and three heavy springer heifers. T. R. Davis purchased two bred heifers, and three heifers of breeding age, and S. W. Lilley bought one bull, one cow and three springer heifers.

The cattle were purchased from Reed and Butler of Trenton, who have been breeding registered Jerseys for many years and have bred one of the best herds in that section of the state.

The introduction of these regis the first ever introduced by farmers alone to the county and will no doubt lay the foundation for better dairy cattle in the county. Before the addition of these cattle there were only two or the registered cattle in the county,

The four men who purchased these cattle are no doubt pioneering registered Jerseys in Castro County—which will affect the income of the farmers in this section for many years to come.

It is hoped that this is only the beginning and will mean more reg-istered Jersey bulls will be added and every time such an animal is will be made by every farmer —which will do much to help make Castro County a leading agricul-tural county on the Plains.

Congratulations are in order to these men who have brought these first cattle who have made the move that will improve the dairy cattle of Castro County each vear. They are not only going to help improve the cattle but will do much to help increase the pro-duction of milk for the National Defense program and keep the production up in the future by improving the bords of the county by the distribution of better bulls.

Precautions About Handling NATURAL GAS

In Case Of Air-Raid Alarms!

Natural gas is the safest fuel you could be using during an air raid. BUT, the HANDLING of natural gas is a technical matter, requiring the services of trained men who know how to avoid the hazards involved.

It is therefore extremely important that everyone should study and follow the carefully prepared instructions relating to the handling of natural gas during air raid alarms. If these instructions are not followed, serious consequences may result. Untrained persons should not attempt to turn gas off and on at the meters.

Following are the official instructions which have been approved and adopted by local Office of Civilian Defense. They are simple. Read them carefully. Discuss them in the family circle so all will understand. Cut them out and post them where all can see them. Above all, follow them!

In Case Of An Air-Raid Alarm:

1. Make no attempt to shut off the gas at the meter.

2. Simply turn off all burners which you customarily turn on and off. Do not turn off pilot lights.

3. Only in case the house or building is badly damaged should he gas be turned off at the meter. If, for any reason, the gas is turned off at the meter, do of turn it on again yourself. Call for a trained man.

WHEREAS, Failure to comply with orders, rules and regulations excavations, movements, congregation of perplaces will result in confusion and unnecessary loss of life both during blackouts and during air raids n the daytime, now therefore.

Be It Ordered by the City Council of the City of Dimmitt, Texas: Section 1. Authority to Pront gate necessary orders, rules and Raids. In order to protect life and property in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, from enemy action the Mayor is authorized and directed out blackouts and air raid protection measures in said city at are authorized or ordered by the Army or Navy and to promulgate such orders, rules, and regulation as may be necessary to insure the success of the blackouts and air raid protection noasures and to protect life and property such periods. Said orders, rules and regulations shall include traffic rovements of emergency or other vehicles, evacuation of residents congregation of persons on public streets, sidewalks, and in public places or buildings, but this enumeration or any enumeration contained in this ordinance shall not be taken as a limitation on the power to promulgate orders, rules, subject, persons or property which must be regulated in order to in-sure the proper carrying out of any duly authorized blackout or air raid protection measure. Practice blackouts and air raid drills may be carried out at such times and for such period as the Mayor shall in his discretion deem appropriate or necessary but subject always to the orders and directions county, Texas, as their doing and give my entire services always to the orders and directions in any way possible to my country.

I will appreciate all persons of ders, rules and regulations authorized by the control of the Army or Navy, and the organic half the 64th Judicial District invessignment.

Section 1a. A "blackout" is here-by defined as any period of time designated by United States Mili-tary or Naval Authorities for ex-tinguishing or effectively screening lights of all kinds. During such period it shall be unlawful:

(1). For any person in the occupancy or in the possession or con-trol of any building or structure to fail to turn out or cause to be turned out all exterior lights thereon or connected therewith.

For any person to allow any light in any house, room or apartments, lodging houses and office buildings shall be responsible for all exterior lights, lights in passageways, stairways, halls, corridors and other spaces not occupied by tenants or other persons and in all unoccupied rooms, apart-

ments or offices. (3). For any person excepting as may be herein otherwise provided to display or allow to shine, any light in any open space, or for any person owning or controlling any sign to allow the same to be luminated or any light to be dislaved therefrom.

(4). For any person to drive an emergency vehicle with the lights on unless screened and shielded according to regulation promulgated by the Mayor or by United States Military or Naval Authority.

(5). For any person to place or leave any vehicle or any obstruc-tion of any character in any pubstreet, avenue or alley in such manner as to obstruct traffic, fire hydrants, or exists from pub-

Emergency vehicles shall those designated as such by the Mayor, shall exhibit on the front windshield an insignia to be desig-nated by him, and all lights there-on shall be shielded in accordance with rules and regulations pre-scribed by him.

In extinguishing or turning off electric lights in any building or structure the main switch should ot be used for such purpose. When deemed necessary for the

rotection of the public safety the Mayor shall make rules and regulations to be observed during "blackouts" in addition to those this ordinance which shall have the force and effect of

wuntil repealed. Section 2. General Orders, Rules nd Regulations to be in Writing. All orders, rules and regulations authorized by this ordinance for the conduct of the general public shall be in writing and shall be available for public inspection at the place. Id during the hours fixed by the Mayor (or other authorized official).

Section 3. Orders, Rules and Regulations Effective Until Re-pealed by Council. Any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the authority conferred by this ordinance shall be in force and effect from the time of promulgation antil amended or repealed by the Mayor (or other authorized official) or until repealed by the City Council. Section 4. Appointment of Spe-ial Fire and Police Force and Air

Raid Wardens—identifying Em-blem. The Mayor may appoint for a specified time as many special or auxiliary firemen and policemen and air raid wardens, without pay, from among residents of the as may be deemed adviseable for in connection with any blackout or aid raid protection measure. During the term of servof such auxiliary hremer policemen and air raid wardens, they shall possess all the powers and privileges and perform all the duties as may be set out by law, ordinance or rules and regulations ordinance or pursuant thereto. They must wear such identifying emblem as may

them to attempt to carry out any order, rule, or regulation promulgated under authority conferred by this ordinance when he is not wearing said identifying emblem.

Section 5, Unauthorized warning or All-Clear Signals Prohibited. Any unauthorized person who shall operate a siren or other device so as to simulate a blackout signal or air raid, or the termination of a blackout or raid, shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this or-

Section 6. No Municipal or Private Liability. This ordinance is an exercise by the city of its governmental functions for the protection of the public peace, health and safety and neither the City of Dimmitt, the agents and representatives of said city, or any individual, receiver, firm, partnership, corporation, association, or trustee, or any agents thereof, in good faith carrying out, complying with or attempting to comply with, any order, rule, or regulation promulguted pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable for any damage sustained to person or property as the result of said activity.

Section 7. Lights During Blackouts Declared Public Nuisance. Any light displayed contrary to any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provis-ions of this ordinance constitutes a public nuisance and when deemod necessary in order to protect life or property during a black-out or air raid the police, or the special police authorized herein, are authorized and directed to enter upon any premises within the City, using reasonable force, and extinguish lights or take other necessary action to make effective any order, rule or regulation pro-mulgated under the authority conred by this ordinance.

Section 8, Conflicting Ordinances, Orders, Ru'es and Regulations Suspended. At all times the orders, rules and regulations made and promulgated pursuant to this ordinance shall be in effect, they shall supersede all existing ordinances, orders, rules and regula-tions insofar as the latter may be inconsistent therewith.

Section 9. No Conflict with State or Federal Statutes. This ordin-ance shall not be construed so as to conflict with any State or Federal statute or with any Military or

Naval order, rule or regulation. Section 10. Penalties for Violations. Any person, firm or cor-poration violating any of the pro-visions of this ordinance or any

prescribed by the Mayor and order, rule or regulation issued shall be unlawful for any of pursuant thereto shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punone Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

Section 11 .Separability of Provisions. It is the intention of the City Council that each separate provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein, and it is fur-ther the intention of the City Council that if any provisions of this Ordinance be declared to be invalid all other pprovisions there-of shall remain valid and enforce-

quickly enforce any blackout order and to render the maximum pro-tection to its inhabitants and their property against loss from air

raids, it is necessary that appropriate regulations be promulgated by the City of Dimmitt and put immediately in effect, and the lack of such regulations creates an urgency and an emergency in the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety requires that this ordinance shall take effect from and after its pas-sage and publication as required law, and it is accordingly so
