That Will Help Improve It, Says Former Postmaster General

(By Will H. Hays) New York, April 3 .- I am delighted wit hthe progress Postmaster General Work is making in preparing for "Postal Improve-ment Week." It is a splendid idea and I congratulate him.

The men and women in the postal service have always had the brain and the hands to do their work well; they now have the heart to do it and they are doing it well. My earnest wish now is that the public may appreciate the service and bring that cooperation without which there can not be the maximum quality of good service.

We know there is something stirring and wonderful about the relation of that faithful figure in gray in the daily lives of the great hundred million. He is a part of a vast business which can be tabulated in terms of annual turnover and number of employes and curves of profit and loss like any other business, but which is nevertheless the strangest, most human, and most romantic business in which men were ever engaged.

On the New York Postoffice is this inscription:

Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds.

We all know that this is literally true. Whatever the heat or the cold or the storm, the mail carrier goes out into it with NATIONAL COMMANDER, his bag slung on his shoulder. It is his business, and he is paid to do it; but that fact need not blind us to a greater fact: That as he goes from house to house on his "appointed round" he ceases to be merely a cog in a great machine and becomes in a sense dence. To one man he brings who showed us the way-gave us news which means disaster; to another a mesage that opens the day came and our country gates of Paradise; to one woman called. he brings news of a loved one's to be the citizens who follow our visitor who comes to the door. Even though he may have brought bad news a dozen times he is always welcome, for the next time he comes the news he brings may America. he good. He is the children's Santa Claus at Christmas, and the grownup's Santa Claus all of the year. The mail carrier plays a more important part in the average family than the family doctor, the family lawyer, the family preacher, and the school and the bank and the life insurance company rolled into one. He is before the Posts with information. their main point of contact with the world. He is the one greatest humanizing agent we have.

Behind the partitions of mail rooms, and on mail cars speeding across the plains, away from the public eye, are the highly skilled postoffice clerks and railway postal clerks distributing letters through the great transportation artery of the Postal Service, concerning which the public knows far too little. Without the all important work of these clerks with highly trained minds, stored with the incredible numbers of names of cities, towns, villages, hamlets, and mail routes, the letter carrier would cease to be the romantie figure he is.

So all the postal employees are in a high sense the servants of the Republic. They make the functioning of democracy possible. Without the Postal Service pubic opinion would die of dry rot, sectionalism only would flourish and provincialism thrive.'

Increase In Panhandle Grain Rates Threatened

Amarillo, Texas, April 14.-A groupe of Kansas City grain dealers have filed complaint with the Interstate Commerce Commission alleging discrimination against Kansas City in rates on grain and grain products from Panhandle points. The territory specifically mentioned includes the Panhandle of Texas and Eastern New Mexico and the rates involved are from this territory to Galveston and other Gulf ports and also to other Texas points, Texarkana, etc.

In view of the fact that the railroads have always claimed that the rates on grain from the Panhandle to the Gulf are entirely too low, this will undoubtedly be a fight for a large increase in our grain rates. In other words, the carriers will contend for the Kansas City basis to Galveston, which, under present figures, will mean an increase of 121/2 cents per cwt. on wheat and 111/2 cents on kaffir and maize, at Panhandle common points. At other points it will be more.

There never was a more serious proposition confronting us nor one more threatening to the prosperity of this section and it will be necessary for the entire Panhandle and Plains region to bring all its sources of defence into action, and the expense will be large.

The Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce was organized for just such situations as this. In all probability we shall have to employ counsel and devote all the energy of our traffic department to defending this action. We shall need your fullest cooperation financially and otherwise. We urge you to get together your leading citizens and take some action in this matter and advise us. Very truly yours,



The Moravian churches of this country have their Passion week, with somewhat peculiar rites. They settled in Pennsylvania and North Carolina. There they have a strong church and one of the finest colleges in the country. Religious service is a daily occurrence in the church during Passion week. The sacrament is admin-To cry on Easter is a sign that you istered and many of the younger set are confirmed. On Saturday, the closing day, they have the love feast and break bread together as one happy family. The juvenile pleasures are not overlooked. Late in the afternoon of Saturday the children are to he seen busily engaged about the hedges and fences constructing rabbit nests in which they expect rabbits to lay eggs during the night, and they find the nests bountifully supplied with various colored eggs on Easter morn-

The church congregation is up before the dawn of Easter day. They assemble at the church and proceed to the burying ground to welcome the dead should they rise. They are led by a brass band and church choir. The concourse passes up the broad graveled walk, which runs between rows of ancient cedars, to the center of the cemetery, which is odd, quaint and beautiful. There they pause and sing hymns, in which all the people join. The singing stops as the sunhills. All is silent and solemn while the clergyman reads out the names of those who have been placed to rest in the burying ground since the previous Easter.

Easter and the Passover.

Although the date of Easter had been settled with the particular intention of preventing it from ever occurring on the same day as the Jewish Passover, the Nicean decree failed to prevent this entirely. Since 1800 Easter and the Passover have been observed together on April 12 in 1805, 1825 and 1906. Also they will occur together on April 1, 1923; April 17, 1927, and April 9, 1981. However, the Passover usually falls on the week before Easter. It never comes before





CHAPTER I.

The Man Whom the Storm Haunted. Near the northern end of Lake Michigan, where the bluff-bowed orecarriers and the big, low-lying, wheatladen steel freighters from Lake Superior push out from the Straits of Mackinac and dispute the right of way, in the island-divided channel, with the white-and-gold, electric-lighted, wireless-equipped passenger steamers bound for Detroit and Buffalo, there is a copse of pine and hemlock back from the shingly beach. From this copse dark, blue, primeval, silent at most times as when the Great Maniton ruled his inland waters there comes at time of storm a sound like the booming of an old Indian drum. This drum beat, so the tradition says, whenever the lake took a life; and, as a sign perhaps that it is still the Manitou who rules the waters in spite of all the commerce of the cities, the drum still beats its roll for every ship lost on the lake, one beat for every

So-men say-they heard and counted the beatings of the drum to thirtyfive upon the hour when, as afterward they learned, the great steel steamer Wenota sank with twenty-four of its crew and eleven passengers; so-men say-they heard the regulem of the five who went down with the schooner Grant; and of the seventeen lost with the Susan Hart; and so of a score of ships more. Once only, it is told, has the drum counted wrong, At the height of the great storm of

December, 1895, the drum beat the roll of a sinking ship. One, two, three-the hearers counted the drum beats, time and again, in their intermittent booming, to twenty-four. They waited, therefore, for report of a ship lost with twenty-four lives; no such he turned immediately to the window news came. The new steel freighter at his side and scraped on it a little Miwaka, on her maiden trip during clear opening through which he could the storm with twenty-five-not twenty-four-aboard never made her port; no news was ever heard from her; no wreckage ever was found. On this account, throughout the families whose fathers, brothers and sons were the officers and crew of the Miwaka, there stirred for a time a desperate belief that one of the men on the Miwaka was saved; that somewhere, somehow. he was alive and might return. The day of the destruction of the Miwaka was fixed as December 5 by the time at which she passed the government lookout at the straits; the hour was fixed as five o'clock in the morning only by the sounding of the drum.

Storm-the stinging, frozen sleet slash of the February norther whistling down the floe-jammed length of the lake-was assaulting Chicago, Soheavy was this frost on the panes of the Fort Dearborn club-one of 'the staidest of the down-town clubs for men-that the great log fires blazing on the open hearths added appreciable fight as well as warmth to the rooms.

The few members present at this hour of the afternoon showed by their lazy attitudes and the desultoriness of their conversation the dulling of vitality which warmth and shelter bring on a day of cold and storm. On one, however, the storm had had a contrary effect. With swift, uneven steps he paced now one room, now another: from time to time he stopped abruptly by a window, scraped from it with finger nail the frost, stared out for an instant through the little opening he had made, then resumed as abruptly his nervous pacing with a manner so uneasy and distraught that, since his arrival at the club an hour before, none even among those who knew him best had ventured to speak to him

The man who was pacing restlessly and alone the rooms of the Fort Dearborn club on this stormy afternoon was the man who, to most people, bodied forth the life underlying all other commerce thereabouts but the least known, the life of the lakes.

The lakes, which mark unmistakably those who get their living from them, had put their marks on him. Though he was slight in frame with a spare, almost ascetic leanness, he had the wiry strength and endurance of the man whose youth had been passed upon the water. He was very close to sixty now, but his thick, straight hair was still jet black except for a slash of pure white above one temple: his brows were black above his deep blue eyes. His acquaintances, in exfaining him to strangers, said he had lived too much by himself of late; he and one man servant shared the great house which had been unchanged-and in which nothing appeared to have needed replacing—since his wife left him, suddenly and unaccountably, about twenty years before. People said he looked more French, referring to his father who was known to have been a skin-hunter north of Lake Superior in the '50s but who later mar-

ried an English girl at Muckinac and settled down to become a trader in the woods of the North peninsula, where Benjamin Corvet was born.

During his boyhood men came to the peninsula to cut timber; young Corvet worked with them and began building ships. Thirty-five years ago he had been only one of the hundreds with his fortune in the fate of a single bottom; but today in Cleveland, in Duluth, in Chicago, more than a score of great steamers under the names of various interdependent companies were owned or controlled by him and his two partners, Sherrill and young Spearman. He was a quiet, gentle-mannered

man. At times, however, he suffered from fits of intense irritability, and these of late had increased in frequency and violence. It had been noticed that these outhursts occurred generally at times of storm upon the lake, but the mere threat of financial loss through the destruction of one or even more of his ships was not now enough to cause them; it was believed that they were the result of some obscure physical reaction to the storm, and that this had grown upon him as he grew older.

Today his irritability was so marked, his uneasiness so much greater than anyone had seen it before, that the attendant whom Corvet had sent, a half hour earlier, to reserve his usual table for him in the grill-"The table by the second window"-had started away without daring to ask whether the table was to be set for one or more. Corvet himself had corrected the omission: "For two," he had shot after the man.

The tables, at this hour, were all unoccupied. Corvet crossed to the one he had reserved and sat down; see the storm outside. Ten minutes later he looked up sharply but did not r'se, as the man he had been awaiting-Spearman, the younger of his two partners-came in.

Spearman seated himself, his big. powerful hands clasped on the table, his gray eyes studying Corvet closely. The waiter took the order and went

When he returned, the two men were obviously in bitter quarrel. Corvet's tone, low pitched but violent, sounded steadily in the room, though his words were inaudible. The waiter, as he set the food upon the table, felt reflef that Corvet's outburst had fallen on other shoulders than his.

For nearly an hour the quarrel continued with intermitted truces of al-

lence. The waiter, listening, as waiters always do, caught at times single sentences

"You have had that idea for some time?" he heard from Corvet. "We have had an understanding for

more than a month."

"How definite?" Spearman's answer was not audible. but it more intensely agitated Corvet;

he dropped his fork and, after that made no pretense of eating. The waiter, following this, caught only single words, "Sherrill"-that, of course, was the other partner. "Constance"-that was Sherrill's daughter. The other names he heard were names of ships. But, as the quarrel went on, the manners of the two men changed; Spearman, who at first had been as sailed by Corvet, now was assailing hlm. Corvet sat back in his seat, while Spearman pulled at his cigar and

now and then took it from his lips and gestured with it between his fingers, as he jerked some ejaculation across the table.

Corvet leaned over to the frosted window, as he had done when alone, and looked out. Spearman shot a comment which made Corvet wince and draw back from the window; then Spearman rose. Corvet looked up at him once and asked a question, to which Spearman replied with a snap of the burnt match down on the table; he turned abruptly and strode from the room. Corvet sat motionless.

The revulsion to self-control, some times even to apology, which ordinarily followed Corvet's bursts of irritation had not come to him; his agitation plainly had increased. SYSTEM IS ALL WRONG The great difficulty that stands in the way of discussing Uncle Sam as an employer is that there is no such person. The men who stand in the relation of employer to their subordinates are nothing but employees themselves, and temporary ones at that, with a very fleeting tenure of office. Cabinet officers and members of congress, to whom the rank and file of employees look for guidance for a solution of their problems, are simply fleeting figures that come and go, with their own interests to serve. They testify freely enough as to conditions of government employment. Senator Carter Glass, recently secretary of the H. Thomas and W. E. Finley, defentreasury, for example:

"The largely multiplied business of the government cannot be conducted with efficiency and economy unless there be attracted to and retained in the public service a group of highly trained, well-paid and permanent officials of supervisory grades. "Only prompt action by the congress to build up a permanent and dignified civil service which will include men of great ability and high attainments can prevent mistakes and failures in the transaction of the public business. the consequences of which may be

Ex-Representative Good, who was chairman of the appropriations committee of the house, is equally frank:

"Today duplication in the government service abounds on every hand. UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT For example, eight different departments of the government, with large overhead organizations, are engaged in engineering work, in navigation, irrigation and drainage; eleven different bureaus are engaged in engineering research; twelve different organizations are engaged in road construction, while twelve, with large overhead organizations, are engaged in hydraulic construction and sixteen are engaged in surveying and map ping. Sixteen different bureaus exer cise jurisdiction over water-power development. Nine Offerent organiza: tions are collecting information on the consumption of coal. Forty-two different organizations, with overhead expenses, are dealing with the question of public health.

"The Treasury department, the War department, the Interior department and the Labor department each has a bureau dealing with the question of general education. These departments ruptey. operate independently; instances of cooperation between them are exception prepared to carry the peak of the tond and maintains an expensive ready-to-serve personnel. A lack of co-operation in the executive departments necessarily leads to gross extravagance. The system is wrong, and congress alone can change the system,"
