

### **Excavation** For Water Treatment Plant Is Begun

Excavation for the water treatment plant at Lake Cisco was under way Saturday with a considerable yardage of earth moved by the big caterpillar tractor of the city and the industry of more than a score of workers.

The \$30,000 WPA project, which will provide Cisco with insurance against future contamination of the water supply, will be located south and west of the pump house under the towering flank of the big dam, and will be capable of treating one and a half million gallons of water daily. It will require four months to complete. A paved road will be laid from a junction with the present zoo road pavement to the site of the treatment plant.

The city's share of the cost will be about \$5,000. Wesley Harrell is engineer for the city and R. S. Glenn is in charge for the WPA. Twenty-four men were employed Saturday, the third day of
