Blanton and Fred O. eye in six of the 12 counties of e district and that he received plurality in one other. He alran ahead of Blanton in Coanche county, the home of aye, who held a slight lead over Blanton there. Comanche was the only county in which the De-Leon candidate, endorsed by the Townsend clubs of the district, chieved a lead over either of his

Blanton gained majorities over Garrett and Jaye in Taylor and Shackelford counties, and received pluralities in Fisher, Hamilton and Erath. The latter are the three new counties added to the district in the last redistricting of the state.

Garrett's majorities were he vote is in and there is hardly more than 10,000 yet to be accounted for if the district vote is consistent with the history of primary balloting. On the other hand Blanton's plurality in Fisher was little more than a hundred votes and it was also slight in Hamilton and Erath. Stephens county gave Garrett a plurality of a little over 300 votes, so that Garrett was only 69 votes behind the combined total of both his opponents.

Political contests are like football games. They have their moments of supreme thrill and bitter disappointment. It is better, say some, to be beaten by a thousand points than one. There is so much of conclusiveness about a big beating, and there is so much of "it might have been" about the narrow victory. The disappointed contestant has the feeling that if he could just strain a little he could push the immovable margin of defeat into a margin of victory.

Take the race between Clyde Karkalits and Harl O'Brien for assessor-collector, for instance. According to unofficial complete returns C'Brien won it by 19 votes. That is a heart-breaking score for Karkalits, a shuddery one for O'Brien. The latter does not like to think of the margin, no doubt, for fear it might turn out to be a nightmare of some sort and the 19 votes in his favor flop over to Clyde's side of the ledger. Clyde, on the other hand, thinks of the 19 in terms of what he might have done to convert that narrow number against him into supporters.

Lotief and Tip Ross are headed for the run-off in the campaign for nomination for representative from the 107th district. Thus Eastland county has the certainty of placing two men in the house of representatives, one o represent the 106th, which is
