





# **Olives Flourish** in Cisco, 2 Trees Are Bearing Here

That the Cisco country is adapted to the growing of practically all benefits of the social security kinds of fruits and crops, with the exception of tropical plants, has been demonstrated in the growing of olves within the limits of this


> The climate of Eastland county is said to be practically the same as that of the Jerusalem country, where olives are indigenous. Many ave known that there is a bearing live tree on the park site back of the federal building here. Although never given any attention the tree has borne full crops of olives.


The Daily Press has just been notified that another young olive tree is bearing its first crop at the Kennon home, 507 West Fifth street. This shrub was brought in during the winter of 1934 by Frank Hagerman, living south of Cisco, and was planted on the Kennon lot. The shrub has grown into a lively bush now, the Press was informed by Mrs. Abbie C. Daniel, who with her daughter, Miss Elizabeth Daniel, are occupying the home. Mrs. Daniel stated that the bush is bearing two well developed berries this year, its first crop.

In describing the shrub, Mr. Hagerman said the original seed vas smuggled out of Japan, but the time he did not know whether it was an olive or not. Hagerman got hold of some of the seed and has al years.
