As a result hundreds of homes have been swept away, cattle and sheep lost in large numbers and no doubt much valuable soil has gone down the turgid, roily water courses to the gulf. Such a condition may not happen again in a generation or longer. And, it may happen tomorrow. When the ambitious and wise program of flood control and conservation on the Brazos basin is completed, a similar condition will not be such a threat to the safety of lives and property and the wealth of the soil in that area. Instead, strategic dams will catch the flow and conserve it against future need, spreading out the peaks of excess and bridg-THE Lake Cisco dam is a concrete example

of flood control and water conservation on a considerable scale. Once while the dam was building, a tremendous waterspout on the upper Sandy drainage area charged down the canyon sweeping away the scaffolding and inundating thousands of acres of farming and ranch land. Since that time many heavy rains have occurred, which would have caused similar floods. These, had the dam not been there, would have rushed down the stream, sweeping away tons of valuable soil, water to supply the ranches and the farms for a brief spell, and generally playing more havoc than doing good. Today the people who live or have their property on Sandy have no fear of floods.
