BUT PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT is aware of the danger. He said in his speech at Syracuse, in which he repudiated the support of communism in terms that even a child could understand and his bitterest critic could not doubt, that he also repudiated any 'other foreign 'ism'," which left no doubt of his feelings toward fascism, nazism, etc., and at the same time reiterated the purpose behind the program of his administration. 

TOLEDO, Spain (A)-A Span. ish army may come out of the present conflict that will be a force to be reckoned with in international affairs, insurgents

With proper guidance, they say, Spain may be able in a few years to put at least 2,000,-000 men into battle, most of whom will have had some form of military training.

At least 500,000 now wear the uniforms of fascist or Carlist (anti-Bourbon monarchists) in territory the nationalists, or insurgents, have occupied. Many have had little training, but they provide a nucleus for military development with the regular army.

Under a military regime, such as Spain may have if the nationalists win, it is assumed the regular army would be built up, with the fascist and Carlist
