How H. D. Gorham became a Methodist minister much against his inclinations but with results as effective and complete as hoped for is related by a group of Cisco business men who have just returned from a business trip north. The story exhibits a resourcefulness and a virtue in getting rid of the pullman car pest which others, so beset, may study with profit and our ministers may reflect upon with satisfaction in the fact that their cloth still carries with it the power to command respect and shame the indiscreet. Fortunately for the success of his role Drew (that is, our hero) retired from the company when his assumed identity was announced, so that his inability to portray the characteristics of that role were not observed by the fellow it was desired to impress.

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The pullman pest is a creature of common genus and distribution He is usually some ordinarily sane and sober fellow who feels that temporary disassociation with the responsibilities of home and business life entitle him to "loosen up." He does so with an enthusiasm in which his new companions do not participate and the result is a very unsatisfactory social relationship. Our Ciscoans travelling northward on a hurried trip encountered one such fellow in the pullman lounge car who persisted in his determination to attach himself to their group. To say that he was far gone in his cups is putting it mildly, according to F. D. Wright, R. L. Ponsler and Gorham. Very shortly he attracted the attention of the entire car, telling smutty jokes between perilous hiccoughs and conducting himself with loud and irritating familiarity. Ponsler and Gorham sneaked off to another part of the car and left the pest on Wright's hands, but when they returned to go to dinner the fellow was still there. After the dinner, during which the Cisco attorney sat directly in front of their uninvited companion and could not eat for having to hold a napkin ready in both hands. Wright got tired of the comedy and told the man quite

seriously: "I forgot to tell you, but Brother Gorham here is pastor of the First Methodist church at Cisco. and although he is a very broadminded man, he doesn't appreciate these dirty stories you've been telling.'

The inebriate went into a tailspin of abject apology and concern. He declared he was one of the most religious men in the world, that his present condition was a temporary state induced by the thought that going to a convention required a man to limber up a little, and from that moment he got soberer and soberer. But unfortunately for Gorham, the fellow did appear to know a good many Methodist ministers in his section of the state, and when Gorham failed to recognize them the truth came out. Thereafter, the Ciscoans were well rid of his company.



Revising Corporation Tax Laws

A house bill, approved by committee, would increase corporation francise taxes in Texas to an estimated 700 per cent by collecting five per cent of net income or onetenth of one per cent of gross assets, whichever happens to be larger. The franchise tax is not a property tax, but it is a tax paid for the privilege of existing as a corporation with the special privileges that attach to that organization, and doing business in Texas. The theory behind the new bill is that corporations, instead of paying on a "flat rate" basis should pay on the basis of their earnings, so that the tax will be distributed proportionately. That consideration is complied with in the taxation of net profits. The corporation which loses money on its operation or which makes a profit below what it Entered as Second Class Matter December 11, is entitled to make on the basis of its assets, would pay on the latter. Thus no company would escape the levy, which is designed to increase the income from this source from \$1,500,000 to \$12,000,000 annually.

> OPPONENTS of the measure assert that it will operate to keep new industry out of Texas. Proponents argue that corporation taxes would remain lower than that of neighboring states under the bill. The revenue 'meat" of the measure seems to lie in the provisions which would tap the earnings of the more profitable concerns. The gross assets levy appears to figure out but little above the rate of the tax now collected. The alternate provision for collecting one-tenth of one sums from corporations making large prof-



A revetment usually is a rock, masonry or A levee is a permanent embankment, often of concrete-slab facing, along the sides of a earth, to prevent overflows. These men are introublesome stream to protect the banks from creasing the height of a levee. A dike is similar but is usually an emergency structure, often washing away. This one was made of concrete built of sand bags as an overflow threatens. slabs and reinforces an earthen levee.



A spillway is a passageway for the release of excess water; also, the top of a dam over which water may escape, without washing the dam away with it. A floodgate is a sliding section of a dam which may be opened to release water



A floodway is a section of land near a stream onto which flood waters may be diverted deliberately to lessen the danger to other areas. A levee was dynamited to permit flood waters to flow into this one. The opening is a fuse plug.
