



"It amounts essentially to abolshing the supreme court as it has existed since the foundation of the republic, and the setting up of a new tribunal in its stead with reference to a particular situation and with reference to particular litigation which has recently been or may in the near future be pending before the court."

Clark, former house parliamentarian and a founder of the American Legion, said "I would be the last to believe the supreme court is sacroscant or above criticism.

"But the conclusion is inescapable that to increase the court at one time by the increase of an additional two-thirds of its present membership is to pack the court with reference to a particular situation and particular liti-
