"If nature has not made us all equally beautiful, that is no reason why those of lesser charms should neglect themselves. Away with sackcloth and ashes! When there is a will to beauty, there is a way!"

Von Schirach admitted that in pre-Nazi times, too, German women had tried to make the best of their natural attractions.

"But," said he, "they failed in achieving that divine harmony of body, soul and spirit which can emerge under Nazism alone."

No Hothouse Plants

"At the same time let it be known that we don't want delicate pampered hothouse plants," he warned.

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Improper Birth Registration Embarrassing

AUSTIN, March 14 (Spc)—It unexpectedly faced with the necessity of legally establishing the date of their birth, their age, their American citizenship, thousands of Texans would not know whether or not their births were registered with the proper authorities. Great embarrassment, inconvenience, or even serious loss of property could conceivably result from either an absence of registration or an error made in filing it with the state.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, cited an unnamed but prominent Texas citizen who upon investigation found that his son had been registered for more than 20 years as illegitimate. Another instance the health official related concerned a veteran of the World War who, after leaving a family of three children, found that he had been registered as birth as a girl child. The experiences of workers with vital statistics are rich with stories of persons vainly seeking to establish their rights to property because of neglect of their parents or attending physicians to register them properly at time of birth.

The law requires the birth of all Texas babies to be registered with the local registrar, who is the justice of the peace in rural areas and city secretary in incorporated towns, within five days after the blessed event takes place, and forms are furnished physicians and midwives for this purpose. A copy of the registration is returned for permanent filing. These records are "vital" not only to the individual from a legal standpoint, Doctor Cox said, but to the state as well.

More Than Gold Is Found in California Hills

SAN FRANCISCO, March 14—A succession of rare mineral discoveries in the west has scientists scratching their heads as to what they mean in new wealth, new industries or value in time of war.

Fifty-three new minerals have been discovered in California 41 of them never found elsewhere. New Jersey is the nation's second greatest "mineral museum."

In 1870 a gold prospector in California stumbled on metacinnabar, which became a leading source of quicksilver and produced some great fortunes. In 1873, W. T. Coleman of San Francisco found the world's greatest source of borax out in the desert and named the deposit Colemanite. Now Kevrite, discovered in 1927, has displaced it.

Lured Away From Gold

Walter W. Bradley, state mineralogist, says many of the discoveries may prove only of scientific interest. This seems to be the case with all of those found since 1930.

The fascination of geological sidelines has lured many a prospector from gold and silver. Take Charles D. Dorsey, who works out of Lovelock, Nev., where he has made and lost two fortunes in gold.

Dorsey has found deposits of Bentorite (used in soap), Dumortierite (spark plug), barium (fil-

Fish in Ghost Lake Puzzle Natives

Some quirks of mineral exploration are revealed by Mineralogist Bradley.

Salt water from the Long Beach oil wells was found to contain iodine which yielded \$100,000 annually to the owners.

California sea-water salt works recovered bromine as a by-product, sold it to the ethyl gasoline makers.

Wells drilled for oil beside the Salton sea gushed carbon dioxide gas. This is now compressed at the surface and forms the dry ice of commerce.

The gem stone Beraitite probably is the rarest mineral known—so rare that the market is confined to collectors.
