### BRAZIL NIPS FASCIST PLOT

Assassination of Vargas Was Object

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, March 18 (AP)—The central police headquarters announced today that the fascist plot to assassinate President Getulio Vargas and for revolts in several provinces had been smashed.

Three thousand daggers, were found in a raid on the home of Plinto Salgado, leader of the fascist integralist party. Police said Salgado escaped.

FORT WORTH, March 18 (AP)—Doctor and Mrs. H. K. Hinde of San Angelo were killed near here today in an automobile collision. Two others were injured seriously.

### Two Years Given Eastland Man on Bigamy Charge

BAIRD, March 18 (Sp.)—After first indicating that his defense would be based on a divorce assertedly granted in Juarez, Mexico, Frances U. Bourland pleaded guilty in 42nd district court Thursday to a charge of bigamy.

He was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary by Judge Milburn S. Long. "Go on to the penitentiary, serve your two years and go back to your wife and children," the court advised.

Bourland has a wife and children in Eastland county, whom he was charged abandoning. His second wife formerly was a Baird cafe waitress.

His plea of guilty was entered after Bourland had been advised that the state was prepared to offer certified evidence there was no record of his divorce in Juarez. Court attaches said Judge Long was prepared to rule the Mexican divorce invalid in the event Bourland had made that his defense. He was represented by J. K. Baker of Coleman.

### Freighter Reported to Be Torpedoed

CERBERE, France, March 18 (AP)—A freighter flying the British flag ran aground in flames today near the Spanish port Llansa. Reports said she had been torpedoed.

### BROCKELHURST DIES TODAY IN LETHAL CHAIR

Protests Crimes Did Not Warrant The Death Penalty

TUCKER FARM, Arkansas, March 18 (AP)—Lester Brockelhurst, 24, confessed hitchhiking killer, was electrocuted today protesting that his crime did not warrant the death penalty.

He was convicted of the slaying of Victor Gates, Little Rock landowner, last May.

He also confessed to killing Albin Theander at Rockford, Illinois, and Jack Griffith at Fort Worth during a hitch-hiking tour across 18 states.

Chained to the floor of his death-house cell after a series of suicide attempts, the pasty-faced youth heard late yesterday that his last chance to escape the lethal chair had been lost.

At Helena, shortly after 5 p. m., U. S. District Judge T. C. Trimble refused to interfere in the scheduled execution after hearing in Chambers a petition for a habeas corpus writ.

Brockelhurst's counsel accepted the ruling as final.

Brockelhurst was tried and convicted at Lonoke for the murder of Victor A. Gates, Little Rock landowner, after Gates had given Brockelhurst and his sweetheart, Bennice Filton, a "lift" in his car. The two were arrested several days later in New York state for a minor traffic violation and confessed to killing Gates, Albin Theander at Rockford, Ill., and Jack Griffith at Fort Worth, Tex., in the course of a hitch-hiking tour across 18 states.

Returned to Arkansas with Brockelhurst, Miss Felton, 18, was acquitted of a murder charge in the killing of Gates, returned to her home in Rockford and gave birth last December to a daughter.

### Jim White, Who Discovered Big Caverns, Here

Jim White, chief guide and discoverer of the famed Carlsbad Caverns near Carlsbad, N. M., was here with Mrs. White briefly this morning en route to Temple, where Mr. White will receive medical treatment.

Mr. White said that 207,000 persons visited the caverns last year. Reported discovery of a large new cavern near the present one was discounted by White, who said that he had himself entered that cavern years ago and found it of minor importance.

Mr. White is a former cowboy who once lived at Cisco before going to New Mexico where he discovered the Carlsbad cave when he investigated what he thought was a spiral of smoke and found it to be a horde of bats issuing from the ground.

### Four Meet Centers For Playground Ball Are Named

EASTLAND, March 18.—"In checking over the potential centers in playground ball I have found that there will be about 60 teams entered from Class A and Class B and ward divisions," a notice sent out by H. D. Thomason, director of athletics of the County Interscholastic League states.

"The county has been divided into four meet centers for the three divisions in playground ball, Ranger, Eastland, Cisco and Gorman, and all playground ball teams representing Class A, Class B and ward schools are asked to report to one of these meet centers with all players ready to play and eliminate each other to one boys' team and one girls' team in each of the three divisions, and these winners only will participate in the county meet on March 25, the date set for the county meet in this event," the announcement continues. "Any school has the privilege of selecting any one of the four meet centers in which to participate in the sub-county eliminations; that is, if one of the Ranger ward schools wishes to go to Gorman, it may do so."

The sub-county meets will be held on Friday afternoon, March 18, and run into Saturday, March 19. The tournament manager for the Ranger meet is P. O. Hatley, for Eastland E. E. Layton, for Cisco A. C. Bradley and for Gorman B. H. Pettitt.

Hatley announced that teams entered in the Ranger meet so far represented the three Ranger ward schools, the Ranger high school, which will have a junior team, Olden high, Colony high, Alameda high, with Alameda having a junior ward school team, as will Colony.

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### Grammar Tennis Squad Improves

Thursday the Cisco grammar school tennis squad played a return match with Breckenridge junior high on the local courts. The locals made a much better showing than they did in their earlier matches with Breckenridge. Both of the singles matches went to Cisco. Joleen Hanrahan won at 6-3; Billy Ray Dill defeated his opponent 6-1. The boys' doubles match was close, Billy Sherman and Glenn Doggett losing 5-7; Golda Warren and Betty Slicker lost 2-6.

### Whitney Is Keat Out of Exchange

NEW YORK, March 18 (AP)—Richard Whitney, fallen "strong man" of Wall street, was read out of the New York Stock exchange for life today.

The bankrupt broker, who faces a possible prison term of 20 years for grand larceny, was expelled for "conduct contrary to just and equitable principles of trade."

### MORE POWER FOR PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—The senate voted 43 to 39 today to permit the president to transfer and consolidate federal agencies without obtaining congressional approval.

### 17-YEAR-OLD QUARREL OVER LAND FLARES

German and Polish Agreement Is Seen in Ultimatum

Armed conflict between Poland and Lithuania, with the possibility that other nations would become involved, loomed ominously today as statesmen over Europe acted in haste to avoid war.

Poland sent Lithuania last night a note demanding settlement of their 17-year-old quarrel over territory, a quarrel born of the World war. The ultimatum must be answered by 9 p. m. Saturday.

The Lithuania parliament was summoned to meet tomorrow to decide on an answer.

In Paris it was announced that France and Russia had agreed to bring simultaneous pressure to bear on two countries for a peaceful settlement of their friction.

A source close to the German chancellery said Germany's opposition to the threat of Polish military action in Lithuania had been withdrawn in return for Polish acquiescence in the possible German annexation of the free city of Danzig. Previously Germany threatened to send troops into Lithuania if Poland attacked her. Europe anxiously awaited Reich-fuehrer Hitler's scheduled address tonight.

England, with Prime Minister Chamberlain in personal charge, also sought despatchly to avert a Baltic war.

Details of the Polish note were not made public, but the newspaper Weizsar Warsawski declared it centered on six points, which it described as:

1. Immediate reestablishment of diplomatic relations between the countries.
2. Immediate resumption of railway and postal communications.
3. Cancellation of a paragraph in the Lithuanian constitution referring to Wilno as the Lithuanian capital.
4. Conclusion of an agreement on treatment of minorities in both countries.
5. Immediate conclusion of commercial and customs treaties.
6. Complete and proper satisfaction for the frontier incident March 11 in which a Polish border guard was killed.

The border incident heightened friction between the two countries which started eighteen years ago when Poland occupied Wilno, which Lithuania claims as her rightful capital.

Polish official sources refused to state whether a time limit had been placed upon demands made to the Lithuanian government.

It was intimated to correspondents, however, that an announcement might be expected tomorrow afternoon.

A Dangerous Drift

ONCE in a blue moon a speaker appearing before a service club or similar organization brings a message of real and timely meaning. Such, in the opinion of those who heard it, was the address delivered by Chief Justice Leslie of the eleventh court of civil appeals before the Cisco Rotary club yesterday. As one member remarked, "It is unfortunate, but those who need most to hear this are not hearing it." Unfortunately, also, it is that the force of conviction which gives

power to the speaker's words cannot be captured in the printed accounts. But the logic is plain, and to all self-thinking citizens what Judge Leslie said is burdened with imminent and ghastly threat to the future of free democracy in this country.

FOR the security of our government depends not upon ideals but upon the strength of principles in the practical life of its citizens. Those principles command an individual responsibility that cannot be shirked if it endures.

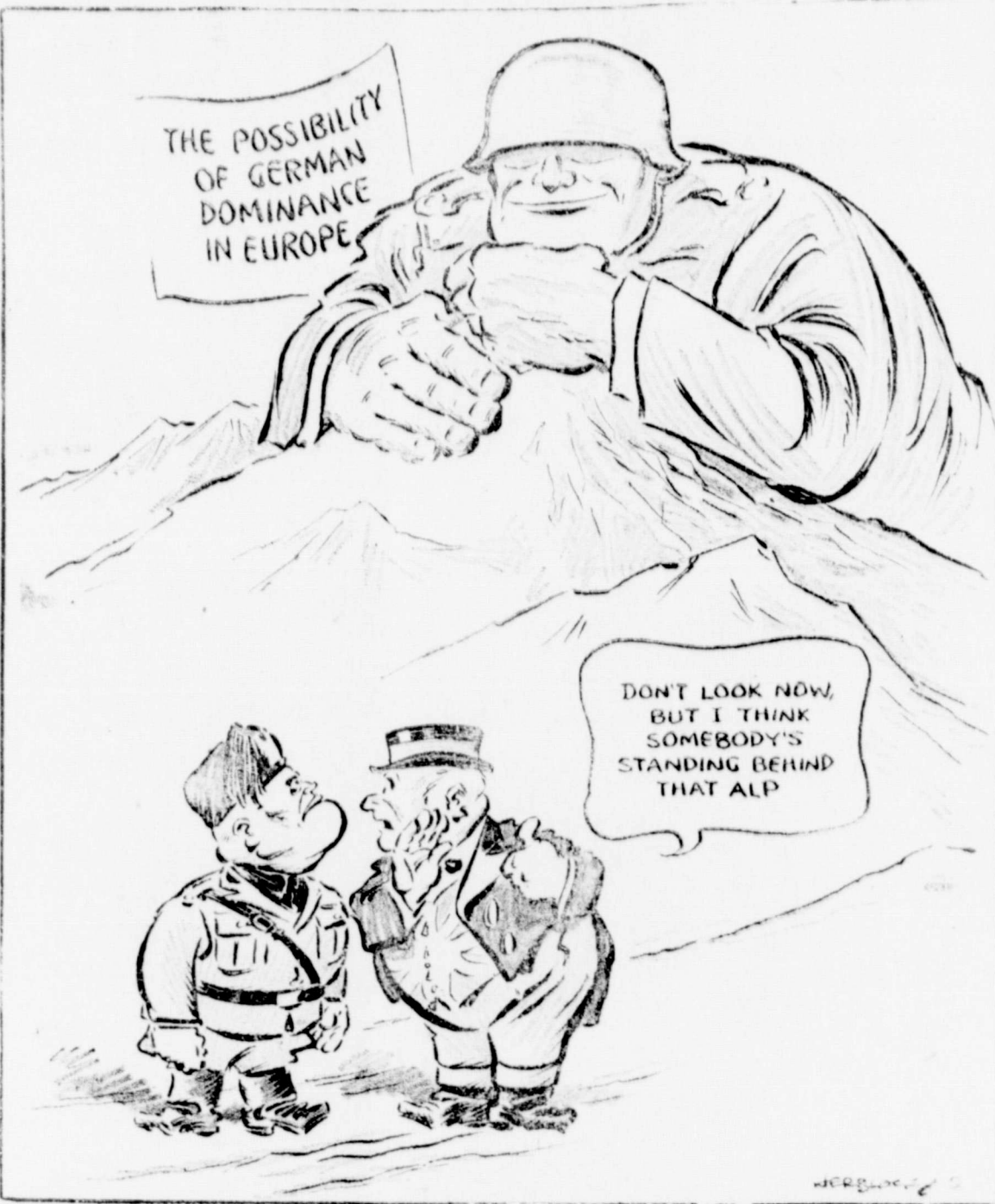
WHEN we look back upon the national record of the past few years to consider that nineteen billions of dollars have been spent for relief in a great "pump-priming" experiment, a sum of such enormity that its very symbols are of staggering magnitude, we are compelled to ask ourselves: "What has it accomplished?" All the persuasive eloquence of the high priests of a national doctrine cannot erase the indelible realities of the situation that has come about. America can pay the dollars and cents of this debt. But it is a serious question whether it can discharge satisfactorily that other obligation, which is nothing less than a lein against the forces of American citizenship. Would it not now be pertinent to ask whether or not in this train of events, in this modern, streamlined version of the ancient Roman corn laws, we are heading toward bankruptcy of the sole resource of our national strength?

A dependent citizenship surrenders power. As Judge Leslie warned, that power drifts from the individual to the state, from the state to the federal government. The ballot is of itself no insurance against this drift. The ballot promoted the dictatorships of Germany and Italy. Today, in those countries it does not mean the expression of the public will, but is the instrument of a dictator in maintaining the farce of a democratic form.

WE in this country, the greatest stronghold of free government, must come to the startling realization that we are in immediate danger of a similar drift, unless it is arrested before the inevitable consequences are reached.

A Washington Daybook

This is the first of two articles on that haven of military scholars, the war college. WASHINGTON, March 10.—While there is eager talk of peace, a dozen phases of the next war are being fought out already in secluded Washington class rooms. Selected army officers, among them many headed for generalships at an early date, drill their agile minds on war business for eight to ten hours a day—then break up perhaps for a baseball game or a round of winter golf. The officers are scholars at the Army War College. When Admiral Leahy, chief of

is certain the Army War College course, at any rate, trains its men on "abstract" problems of such a nature that they would apply closely to actual international combat.

The Curriculum In an article in a recent edition of The Military Engineer, an Army War College graduate indicates that the course is broad enough to include almost everything bearing on war. He outlined the course as including: International relations; probable causes of war that may involve the United States; essential peacetime preparations for war; preparation of specific war plans; conduct of war.

Mostly the assignments to the War College are from the ranks of major, lieutenant colonel and colonel. That puts the students, between 40 and 50 years of age.

It is the top ranking school in the army. Any officer who hopes to be a general needs to wrangle himself an assignment to it. The normal course for an officer is to go first to a school of his own branch of the service, such as the cavalry school at Ft. Riley, Kas. In the next step, the staff and command school at Fort Leavenworth, latest tactics in battle practice are studied.

An Honorary Alumnus At the War College, which comes next, the problems are vastly broader. They cover such questions of the strategic operations of a whole army or several armies. For instance, a problem like this might be posed: An enemy has broken through the Pacific fleet and appeared off the southwest coast. Prepare the defense.

While it's true that no officer now may be elevated to membership on the War Department general staff without first completing the War College course, the country's outstanding soldier, Gen. John J. Pershing, made it without such experience. He was appointed to the first war college class in 1904 but was recalled to act as observer in the Russo-Japanese war. In 1924, after the world war, he was given a diploma. He slyly observed that the college evidently considered that some of his activities in the meantime had merited the award.

War Still at 91

March 18 (Spe.)— Billy Garrett was 91 years old on March 11, and was healthy and hearty as at his age. Uncle Billy thinks nothing of walking a day's work and a half to town and a few hours on the farm with his friends.

Billy was born in Clarksburg, West Virginia, on March 11, 1847. His father was a plantation owner and had a few slaves. His education was rather poor, as there were no schools in the neighborhood.

After the war, Uncle Billy attended one session of school, and then farmed for a while. In 1865 he was married to Fidelity Clark. He showed the wool, helped his mother pack, card, wash, spin and weave the cloth for his marriage suit. He then gathered some black

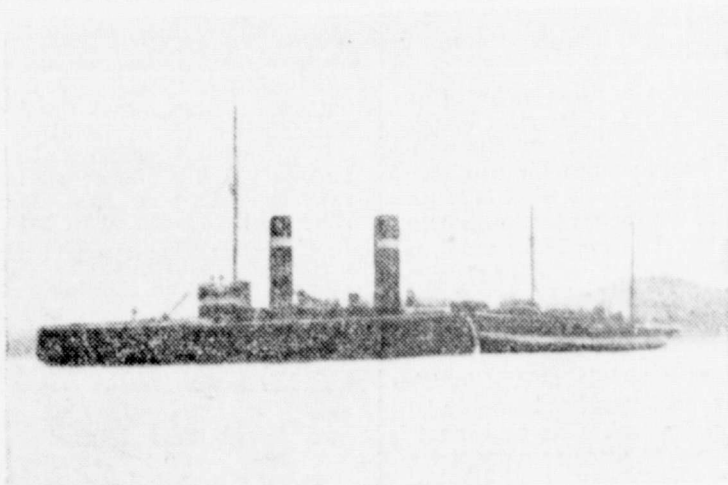

The Oil Belt district executive committee will meet in a called session at Abilene Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock, with its chief business the rearrangement of the eastern division's schedule following Mineral Wells' transfer into this area, and action on the request of Lamesa to be transferred to District 1 from District 1.

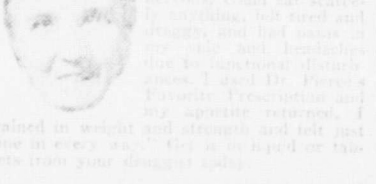
