KEEPS SILENT ON MOVES IN TVA QUARREL

Roosevelt Gives Chair-
man Until This Af-
ternoon to Answer

YELLOW SPRINGS, Ohio, March 22 (AP)—Arthur Morgan announced today his refusal to meet President Roosevelt's request that he give reasons why he should not be removed as chairman of the Tennessee Valley authority.

He said he had no further statement to make. He arrived home here today.

The president had given Morgan until 2:30 this afternoon to provide "any reason."

Morgan said at a press conference he called shortly after Roosevelt had threatened to remove him that "I challenged his action and I denied his right of power to suspend me."

The president had asked Morgan to resign as a result of the bitter internal dispute which has split the chairman apart from the other two TVA directors.

Statement

Morgan said that at the White House meeting at which the other directors, David E. Lilienthal and H. A. Morgan, were present, he gave Roosevelt this statement:

"It is my judgment that my resignation at this time would not be in the public interest. Therefore, I do not tender my resignation."

Cisco Needs

THE eventuality foreseen by the Cisco Daily Press in its editorials aent the need of a zoning ordinance in Cisco arrived on March 12 when the citizenship of Eastland county voted to legalize the sale of four per cent beer. If legalization had not been voted then, the history of prohibition in this section teaches that it would have been voted at some later period. The ebb and flow of pro-

hibition sentiment in this closely divided electorate is governed by economic factors as well as moral considerations.

BUT the point to consider now is that the sale of beer was legalized. This fact will certainly have its influence upon the character of business construction which will adorn our business thoroughfares. Although the law under which the sale of legal beer is now administered operates to eliminate undesirable places and to restrict sale to responsible and decent businesses, it is a fact that some types of legitimate business construction are discouraging to a balanced and attractive civic growth when not governed as to their location and character of building. This is true not merely of those which handle beer, it is true of all kinds when a hit-or-miss, hodge-podge system of development is permitted. Such a system influences adversely the factors of desirability and depresses real estate values. A well-planned, orderly development, on the other hand, contributes to those values which encourage more and better building. It is common sense to lay the proper foundation first.

ANOTHER influence which must be considered in this matter is the revival that is taking place in the oil industry here. This, if it reaches any magnitude, as it now promises to do, will assuredly exert a stimulating effect on local development.

WE all want our community to be attractive. We realize a very practical value in beauty and orderliness. But this prideful quality cannot be achieved unless there is regulation. And, contrary to any fears that the enactment of such regulations will discourage development, the fact is that it will do the opposite. It will suggest a stability of community assets inviting to investors and it will impress our own citizens with a sense of community character and intelligent direction that will confirm local faith in its future.

WE need a zoning ordinance for progressive, orderly community development. We may, perhaps, have waited too long already to have realized the full value of such a program.

Human and Other Nature

A little jaunt to our neighboring municipality on the west gave me a little insight into its persistence in staying on the map in the face of present odds against the small town. Putnam has its own broadcast system identical with the Broadway of America and that is one advantage—to both. Its filling stations and cafes cater to Americans throughout the season including winter when northern routes are blocked with snow. Its beer joint is kept orderly so that "you'd hardly know they are selling it," though the young fellow who informed me did not intentionally mean, perhaps, that inconspicuous sale is a virtue. The editor of the Putnam News was just emerging from her office for the lunch hour as I came to the door; the local paper helps Putnam citizens communicate with one another in business, social, school, and religious matters.

The community school is the pride of Putnam and might well be of a larger section and of the state. Under Superintendent Webb the system has built up an efficient handling of the educational needs of its district, training boys and girls to know how to take care of themselves as their stimulated ambitions lead them out into competition in affairs. The electric communication system (I forgot its technical name) is the only one I have seen. Administrative officers can listen in on every room, can address every room at the same time, or can be communicated with from any room in the building; or either victrola or radio programs can be transmitted to one or all of the rooms, or to the auditorium. We see that with sufficient community interest and interest and initiative anywhere the advantages need not all be found in the city.




