

From the political standpoint such a discussion would be unwise. It might gain support in one quarter but consider the heads it would thwack! What an unadulterated lot of courage it would take in this day of growing dependence upon government largess and political employment!

O the platforms of the gubernatorial candidates may be read with an eye to the genius of their authors in circumlocution and Entered as Second Class Matter December 11, evasion. 




