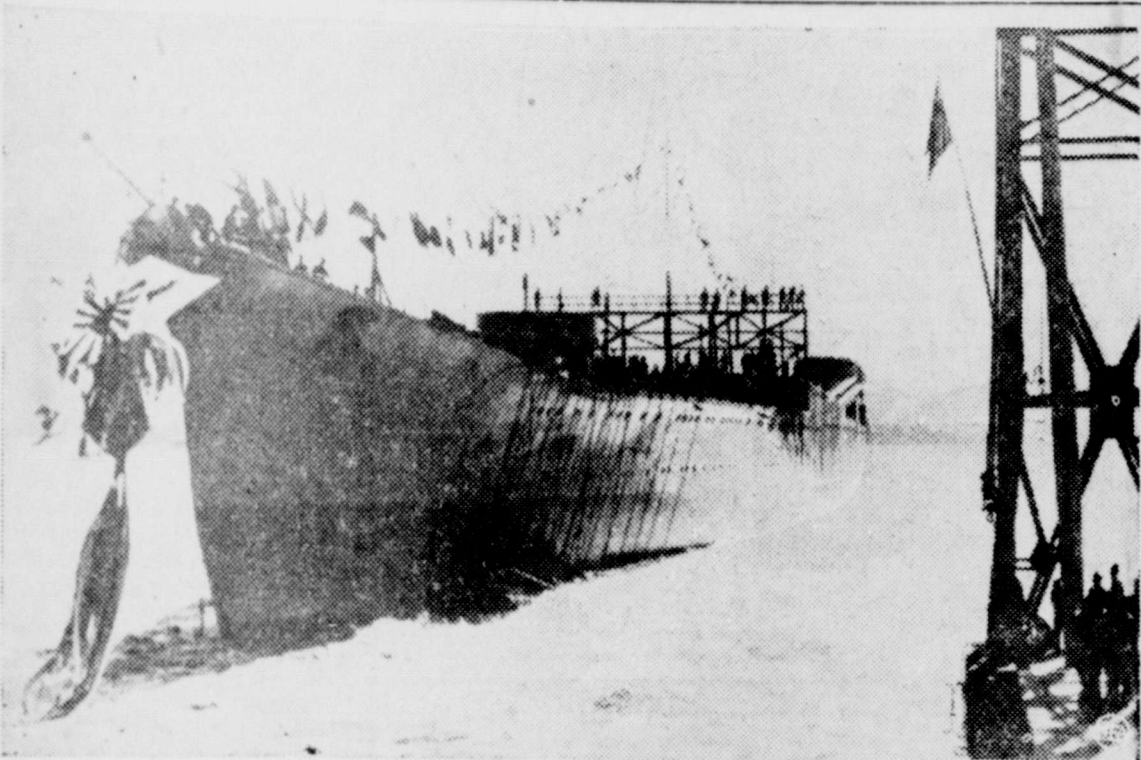

Italy Ready to Bury Hatchet French Envoy Assured

ROME, April 19 (AP)—Italy and France agreed today to begin conversations immediately to re-establish their traditional friendship, shattered by the Ethiopian war. Italy's readiness to bury the hatchet was expressed to Jules Blondel, French charge d'affaires, by Foreign Minister Gleazzo Ciano. Blondel Saturday asked Ciano if Italy were prepared to open negotiations and an affirmative answer was handed Blondel today.

### Large Numbers of Loyalist Troops Taken

TORTOSA, Spain, April 19 (AP)—Large detachments of government troops, including international brigade units, were captured south of Tortosa today after the Ebro river bridges were dynamited by government to hold back the insurgent movement to encircle its strategic south Catalan city. From Perpignan, Franco came the report that government troops in the Aran valley just below the French border surrendered without a battle.

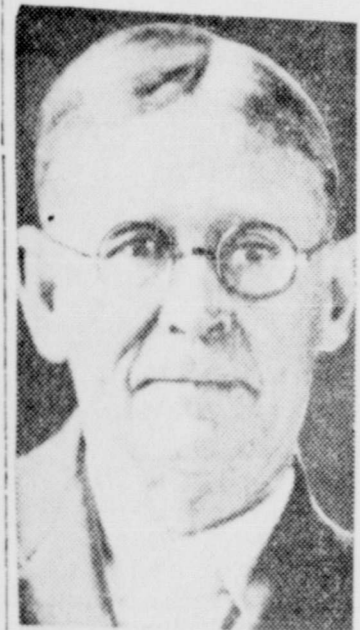

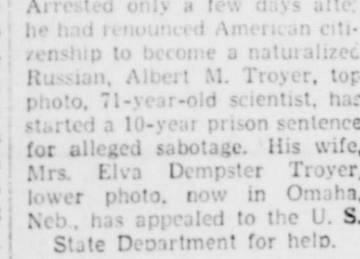

### The Literary Guidepost--

By JOHN SELBY

"Uncle Sam Ward and His Circle," by Maud Howe Elliott (Macmillan; \$5); "Tom Watson; Agrarian Rebel," by C. Vahn Woodward Macmillan; \$3.75).

It is probably true that any kind of book about Sam Ward, the young man who exactly 100 years ago married one of John Jacob Astor's granddaughters, would be amusing. "Uncle Sam Ward and His Circle" is not a particularly well done book, but it seems to prove the point, for it is often delightful, and seldom dull.

Ward was, in brief, an "original." He inherited a great fortune and wasted it. He made some other fortunes, and threw them away. He liked all the things, which go into life, particularly friendship, and among his friends he includes a diverse and sometimes interesting selection—Emperor Dom Pedro of Brazil to Henry Wadsworth Longfellow.

Maud Howe Elliott, who has assembled the book out of Ward's correspondence, is his niece. She admits that for years she thought her Uncle Sam was being caricatured by all those cartoonists who drew a lanky, rather saturnine chap as symbol of America. And not very well caricatured at that. Ward was, when in funds, the ideal uncle. He showered his

### Texas Youth Is Real Boy Despite Defects

AZLE, Tex., April 19.—Sixteen-year-old Kenneth Tucker, born without arms and legs, is getting help from his schoolmates in living a normal life despite his handicaps.

The three and a half foot youngster plays and works almost as well as his more fortunate classmates. At school, he writes—better than most normal children—by holding the pencil between his face and shoulder. He passed every grade in school except the one year when he fell from a swing and was confined for two months with a fractured shoulder.

Kenneth is one of the school's best marble players and can engage his schoolmates in baseball and basketball.

Young Tucker lives at his father's farm home six miles southwest of Azle. At home he gathers wood and helps herd and feed a

number of cows, goats and sheep. He owns 10 sheep and recently received \$13.90 for their wool.

Kenneth's desire to live like his friends may prevent his accepting an offer to travel with a commercial show this summer to demonstrate his unusual abilities for the public.

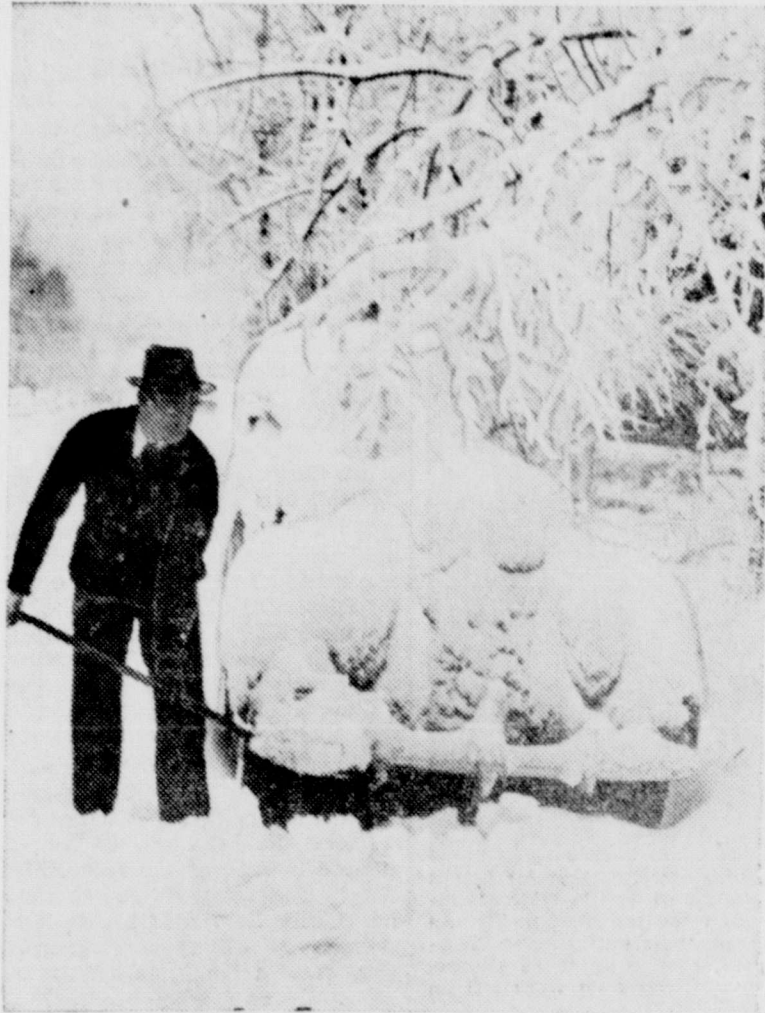
### Strong Alone Survive In Bill Cody's Home

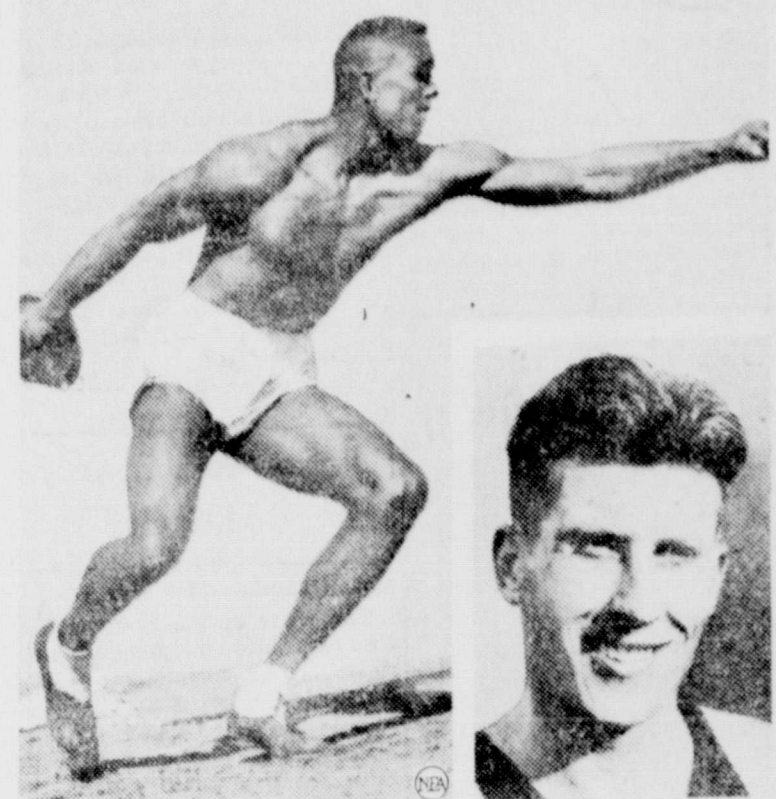

### Tulane Prof Tells Purpose of College

SAN ANTONIO, April 19.—The purpose of a college education, Dr. Rufus C. Harris, president of Tulane university, said today, is to prepare men for the world, not to world for men.

Dr. Harris and other members of the Tulane faculty visited San Antonio on route to New Orleans from Dallas where they attended a meeting of the Southern Association of Colleges and Universities.

A problem in university education today, Dr. Harris said, is to strive for quality in education through limiting enrollment.

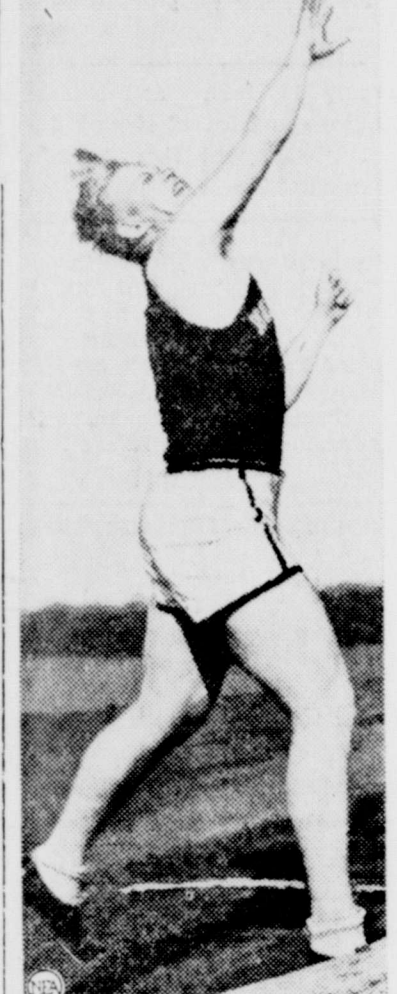

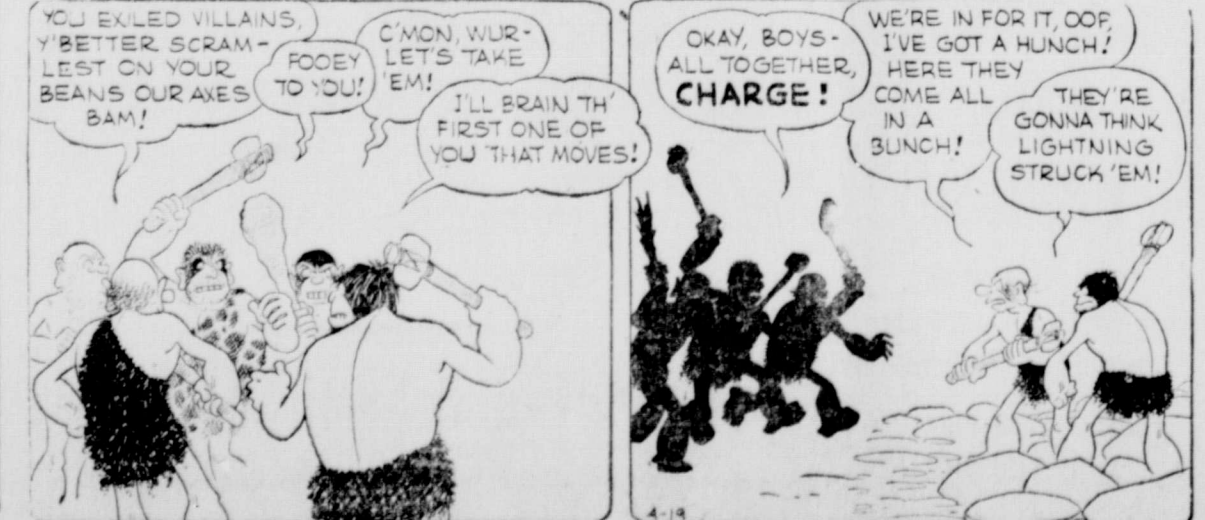

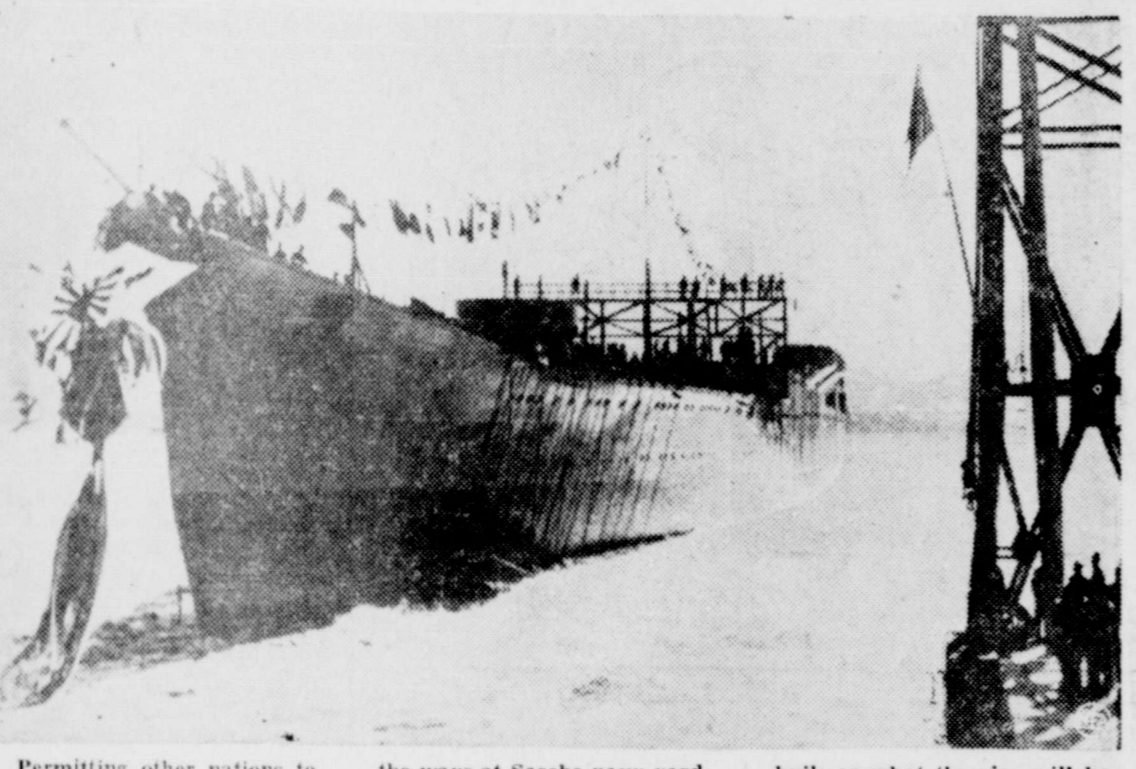
