Neutrality Act to Prevent Discrimination, Says FD

ROOSEVELT LAW OPERATED WITH SUCCESS

President to Send Monopoly Message This Week

WASHINGTON, April 22 — President Roosevelt declared the neutrality act today to prevent this from penalizing one nation and so favoring another. He stated that the law had been satisfactorily applied in so far as possible. The president, talking to reporters at a press conference, said that a copy message would be sent to congress next week. Roosevelt also said he would send his message regarding federal-state tax matters to the federal officials. He stated that the issues of state and federal taxes would be dispatched to the states today. 2 DOOMED MEN STILL ALIVE; CHAIR FAILS

Week Reprieve Given Condemned When Generator Quits

HUNTSVILLE, April 22 (AP) — Two men scheduled for electrocution in the state prison here, remained alive because the electric chair failed to work today. They were given a week's reprieve. John Vaughn, head shaven for contact with electrodes, stood near the chair protesting his innocence when the generator went out of order. Johnnie Banks, negro preacher, was in the death cell awaiting his turn. Executions set for midnight, had been postponed until 3 a. m., while electricians worked on the equipment.

Lights Way to Safer Surgery



Through the 3000 germ-killing volt of this powerful ultraviolet ray lamp, demonstrated by its builder, Elmer Ries, above, of Cincinnati, science hopes eventually to achieve the completely sterile operating room and to reduce death by infection to an absolute minimum. The lamp, which will be used first in the Magee hospital in Pittsburgh, is the result of long research by Dr. Deryl Hart, professor of surgery at Duke University, Durham, N. C. Working on the knowledge that the ultraviolet ray destroyed germs, Dr. Hart first placed an ultraviolet ray screen around an operating table, found that bacteria were almost entirely destroyed. He then proceeded with construction of the new lamp.

Royalists Halt Insurgent Thrust With Numbers

(By Associated Press) Despite technological advances in war-making, the supply and demand of manpower assumed new importance in reports from the world's two wars today. In Spain, the republican government's almost 2-1 superiority in numbers apparently had halted the attempt to widen the gap which insurgents, with superior equipment, had slashed in Spain. Japan, with greater advantage in weapons, was forced to sacrifice much of the territory they had gained in north China to throw more troops into the central front in making up for recent reverses. The Spanish insurgent war fleet today captured or sank a score of fishing boats in which government militiamen were attempting to get from Catalonia to the coast farther south to join the forces of General Jose Miaja.

REINTEGRATED JAPS PRESS FORWARD

SHANGHAI, April 22 (AP) — Re-integrated Japanese troops pushed south from captured Lini today for a sweeping flank attack on the Taiherchwang-Yihsein sector of the Central China front, seeking to wipe out a major defeat at Taiherchwang early this month. With the Japanese in full possession of Lini after five days of heavy bombardment which culminated in a capture.

AUSTIN, April 21 — Senator Collie of Eastland probably will not run for lieutenant governor, his friends say, but he has indicated that within a few days he will make a public statement. Earlier in the year many regarded Collie as definitely in the race. Collie is definite about certain campaign issues, especially the proposed unicameral legislature, which he opposes. He also favors cutting down government costs and a slowing up in mounting tax increases. In the senate he was an economy leader.

Pastor and officials of the Church of the Nazarene in Cisco today issued a statement disclaiming any connection with a movement reported now on foot soliciting funds for a Nazarene church or mission on the east side of the railroad yards in Cisco. The statement, signed by the Rev. J. Walter Hall, district superintendent of the Abilene district of the church, with headquarters here, and the Rev. Luther Pryor, pastor of the local church, said: "Anyone soliciting funds for a Nazarene church or mission on the east side of the railroad tracks in Cisco, Texas, or any location, other than the church being sponsored by the Rev. Luther Pryor and his congregation, has no official connection with our church and no endorsement from our church or district authority."

Moran is Held in Counterfeit Probe

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP) — George "Bugs" Moran, prohibition era gangster chief and five other persons were seized here today by the police investigating a nationwide plot to pass counterfeit traveler's checks. Police expressed the opinion that as much as \$1,000,000 in counterfeit American Express company checks had been printed for distribution in the principal cities of the nation.

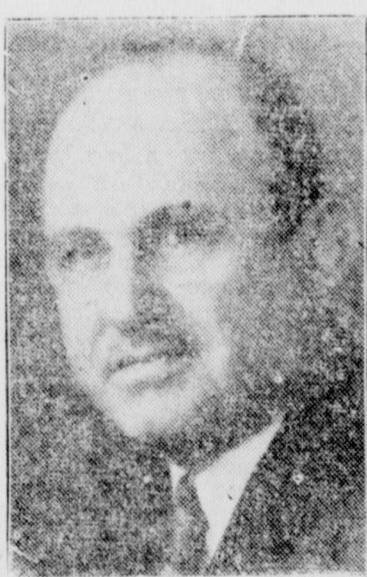
East Side Revival to Begin Sunday

Weekly Sunday School Lesson

THE TEST OF LOYALTY

Text: Mark 9:2-10

THE story of the transfiguration of Jesus is very remarkable, even in a New Testament that tells us remarkable things. We have the portrayal of Jesus as He preached to the multitudes and as they thronged upon Him, not only to hear His words but also to see His wonderful works.

But here, even from the inner circle of twelve, we have Jesus taking three of the disciples—Peter, James, and John—and bringing them up onto a high mountain, where they had an experience that must have strengthened their faith and in some ways changed their whole lives.

Peter, always the ready spokesman, was so overwhelmed by the vision that in his eagerness, he exclaimed, "Master, it is good for us to be here; and let us make three tabernacles; one for thee, and one for Moses, and one for Elijah."

It may serve to demonstrate that the administration realizes the need of getting industrial building under way sufficiently to make some definite concessions. The luncheon arranged between the president and Henry Ford substantiates this view of the present White House attitude.

OTHER OPINIONS

Peace Prospects Brighter

INTERNATIONAL agreements like the Anglo-Italian accord, at first blush may appear merely to avert or delay war as they preserve peace only temporarily at certain points in a world which is armed or is arming itself to the teeth.

For immediate usefulness the agreement between Great Britain and Italy relieves the pressure toward war in the Mediterranean theater, involving Spain and the possessions of the two countries. But it also serves to render less probable another European war in its notice to Germany that Italy might cast her lot with Great Britain and France again if Germany should appear to be threatening the three, as in 1914.

The Anglo-Italian accord does not destroy the Rome-Berlin axis, but materially weakens it, certainly to the extent of showing that Great Britain and Italy are still interested in a balance of power in Europe. The sentimental exchanges between Hitler and Mussolini did not allow for the extraordinary aggrandizement of either, and Germany's acquisition of Austria upset the balance.

The combination of three greedy powers—Japan, Italy and Germany—was too terrible a bogey to be true or to prevail long. Japan has her hands full in China with a dangerous foe, Soviet Russia, entirely too near at hand. Nazi Germany has gotten to Brenner Pass, entirely too near to Italy in the light of further Nazi designs in southeastern Europe.

Thus, we see a balance of power again rising in the world, where every nation should be afraid to jump on another nation. The modern theory that peace is to be obtained by armaments that inspire fear is being borne out. At the same time, the experiments in China and Spain are demonstrating effectively the costliness of waging a modern war.

As the danger of war is moved back further by such developments as the Anglo-Italian pact, we can hope for the fallacy of militarism to have better opportunity to explode itself by its own nations.—Ft. Worth Star-Telegram.

(It is through the courtesy of the Hamlin Herald that we are permitted to reprint the following article, written by that paper's able columnist, Doris Pope, which appeared in a recent issue of the Herald. We are deeply indebted to her for so accurately describing the after-effects of this spring's unusual storms.)

Now with everything at our finger tips with just a click of a switch, we are inclined to take too much for granted. However, there are times when we are forced to stop and think what a world it would be without such conveniences—you know, we kinda' get a taste of the "good old days" that we hear dad and grand-dad talk about. That's what happened to Hamlin folks Saturday afternoon when the electric current was dead from 2:10 until 5:40.

Low, gray rain clouds made lights almost a necessity in order to carry on business, so when the current went off, the sale of candles increased a thousand per cent. We stayed in the dry goods stores awhile observing the effect of candle lights, and it struck us as rather amusing when people grabbed a bolt of material, a pair of socks or some other merchandise and ran to the front door, holding the article up and squinting, trying to see what color it really was—just like in the "good old days." (Maybe that will account for some of the terrorizing colors people are wearing.)

And the poor kids, how they did miss the Saturday afternoon picture show! It's really a shame that they didn't have some stereoscopic parlor pictures to look at like ma and pa had—back in the "good old days."

We wandered over to two of our beauty shops and found dozens of women and girls draped on the floor, chairs and stools, literally sticking their heads in the fire to dry that new wave set. That reminded us that back in the "good old days" grandma didn't shampoo her hair in the winter or in rainy weather; she just rolled it up on curlers.

We noticed the barber shops also felt the lack of electricity. You know back in the "good old days" they weren't bothered with all those little electric gadgets 'cause grandpa just turned a bowl down on pa's head and started cuttin'. The finishing touches were accomplished with the old blue and white shaving mug and razor.

We stopped in to see how the drug stores were making out with their Frigidaire motors stopped and their candle light. Somehow or other they didn't seem too happy about it. Now we could rave on and on about this, but what's the use? Printing presses were stopped, bank machines halted, in fact, there wasn't a business house in Hamlin that did not feel great lack of electricity. And when the current finally did come on after three and a half hours, people gave whoops and boilers that made the Indians back in the "good old days" look like sissies. (No charge to the West Texas Utilities Co. for this spiel.)

European Cities' Traffic Problems Rough, Too

(By Feature Service) — Europe developed a few of its efforts to do something to increasingly hazardous traffic conditions.

Drivers and hikers, who encountered virtually unmanageable traffic in America, most countries built separate paths for main highways.

Provisional licenses for persons just learning to drive. They cannot take a car unless they are accompanied by a licensed driver. In some countries, a car must bear a big "L" on the front and rear to warn other drivers "here comes a learner."

Diagrams and med-

als are awarded annually by the National Safety First association, an organization comparable to the National Safety Council in Chicago, to commercial drivers who have gone a year or more without an accident for which they can be blamed. As a result, many companies report not only a reduction in accidents but a reduction in insurance premiums as well.

Highway Phone Booths

Telephone booths, some of them public, others available only to members of auto associations, dot the English countryside. Thus, the stalled car does not remain a highway hazard, for the driver seldom has far to walk to telephone for help.

Britain carries on an extensive educational campaign in home and school, tries to get the idea across with humorous verses and catch words, vetting horror propaganda such as "and sudden death" as unsuitable to the British temperament.

Until 1934, says the traffic ministry, accident figures were going up steadily but they were arrested

in 1935 and held stationary since then despite an increase in traffic. An average of 6,500 are killed and 230,000 injured annually.

Offenders' Cars Garaged

Germany is constructing a nationwide net of super-highways valuable for swift-moving traffic both in peace and in war.

In Munich a repeating traffic offender's car may be garaged for four weeks at his expense.

At Bad Nauheim a whimsical warning printed on an artistically decorated sticker may be pasted to your windshield. Here's a typical one:

"From this wrong parking place quickly hie, 'The Bad Nauheim police will turn a blind eye.'

In Berlin, cars detected in frequent or serious offenses often are branded with a yellow cross. Defective cars are painted with a yellow circle and must be taken to central traffic authorities at once for an overhaul.

France gives her tram and bus drivers grueling psychotechnical tests every five years up to the age of 40, and every two years after that. Fatal bus accidents have fallen from 77 to 354 per 62,000 miles run since these tests were instituted four years ago.

Slight Increase In Texas Lumber Sales

AUSTIN, April 22 (Sp.)—Lumber statistics during March were slightly more favorable than during the preceding month but were well below those of the like month last year, the University of Texas bureau of business research has announced.

Reports from the Southern Pine association show average weekly production per unit, 278,053 board feet, a decline of 14.3 per cent from the year before, but an increase of 4.5 per cent over the preceding month; average weekly

shipments per unit, 281,770 board feet, a decrease of 8.8 per cent from March last year but a gain of 2.7 per cent over February; average unfilled orders as of March 31, 576,563 board feet, a decline of 30.9 per cent from the corresponding date last year and 11.8 per cent under those at the end of the preceding month.

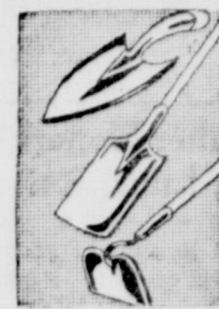

The public be informed on the facts. Before Nebraska installed the unicameral it was represented to that state that one house would prove more economical, but 10 different and important points against it have developed.

"The people should know that if such a system is adopted in Texas the 10 large cities will control the legislature and probably the election of congressmen. With but 40 or 50 members in one house instead of 181 in two the large populated centers will elect the entire body, depriving rural sections of proper representation."

"The way the Nebraska experiment turned out borders on the ludicrous," Collie said. "It had been represented that time would be saved in enactment of laws. Well, the saving of time in enactment of laws never compensates for one single law that is detrimental and a speeding up by having one house only makes certain of improperly considered bills. There should be no speed when the welfare of 6,000,000 Texans is involved in lawmaking."

"It is represented that a better class of legislators would be elected. In Nebraska the results were the same as under the two-house legislature, merely a cross section of the state. There will be no difference a cross section whether it is under two houses or one."

"It was claimed in Nebraska and is now being claimed in Texas that fewer bills would be offered but the opposite was the experience."

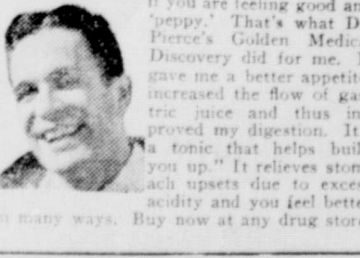
