The Garner Function

If there is a term appropriate for describing the function which Vice President John N. Garner exercises in an office hitherto regarded as little more than a meaningless political distinction it is "balance wheel." It is well known that Garner does not approve of all that his chief, the president does, and his antagonism to much of the New Deal policy

is reported to have been forthrightly expressed in the presence of Mr. Roosevelt. But the doughty Texan, whose long service in congress, preceded by service in the Texas legislature, has given him a sound underfooting of experience and political knowledge, is much too wise to bring this antagonism into the open and split up the party organization. Instead he uses his talents and his knowledge of human nature within the administration in the effort to keep it on the course which Garner believes consistent with the true functions of government. Time and again Garner appears to have steered through legislation which violated his personal convictions in the interest of party harmony and cooperation, and in this attitude he has revealed a true concept of the democratic principle and a consistent regard for its processes which necessarily involve compromise. Garner undoubtedly does not expect government to do the things which private economy and business enterprise are required to in this country, and from that conviction springs his reported opposition to the new spending and lending program of the administration. But he also realizes that it would do no good, but would accomplish great harm to eventual recovery to make a public issue of this matter, because it would wreck the party organization and develop a stalemate which would be eagerly abetted by the republicans for political motives entirely. For Garner, more so than did any vice president, wields a tremendous influence in congress. He is a party man and an influential one and the function which he exercises in Washington is that of leadership of the legislative element of his party. He realizes the value of keeping this element intact, and his responsibility to that function is something which he weighs along with his duty to convictions. There have been times when his disgust with certain features of administration policy have led him to near revolt, but he has invariably swallowed his pride and compromised his objections when crises that threatened the party organization arose, and put a guiding hand to the wheel. There seems to us to be an example in the Garner attitude which ought to register influence in other sections of the administration leadership where the importance of compromise to achieve a commonly desired end appears not fully appreciated.

After pleading guilty to a charge of burglarizing the home of J. Q. Eakins No. 5 last year, J. C. Basham, of Ranger received a five-year sentence which was suspended. Jurors had been waived.

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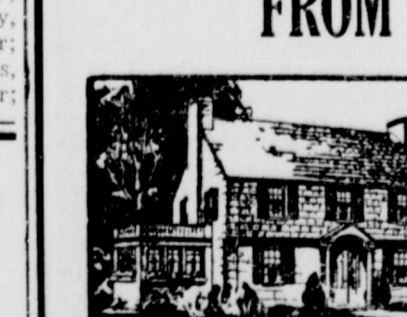

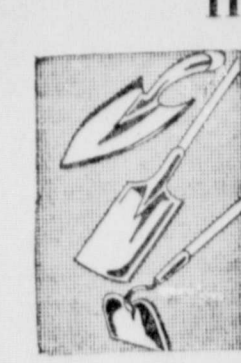

Schools Rely On Students for Safety

RALEIGH, N. C., April 25 (AP)—This state's school bus system—believed to be the largest in the United States—is using student drivers to solve its safety and economy problems.

Out of 4,179 buses transporting nearly 300,000 children daily to 1,226 consolidated rural schools, 3,600 are operated by students 16 years or older, several girls among them.

So far this year, there has not been a fatal or serious accident. Last year, there was only one fatality; in 1935-36, two.

The state allows the drivers \$9.50 a month for their services.

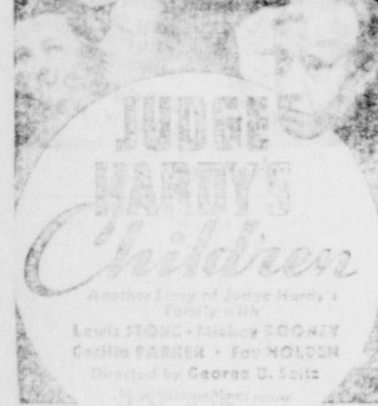

The major work committee, headed by H. S. Hilburn, Plainview publisher and first vice-president of the WTCC, begins its sessions Monday morning.

To the work committee D. A. Baudene, WTCC manager, Abilene, will present a 14-point program to deal with tax conservation problems.

Preliminary elimination in the annual "My Home Town Contest" will begin Monday afternoon. Judge C. M. Caldwell, Abilene, had a total of 56 entries today.

Finalists will be heard at the Wednesday morning session, to be addressed by Senator Connally.

On Tuesday night, Senator Connally will preside at the coronation of Her Majesty, Miss West Texas, at an Oil Festival revue.

Beauty Nominations More than a score of west Texas beauty nominees will be presented Monday night, when the convention delegates will ballot for the queen.
